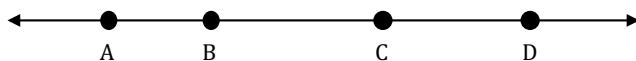

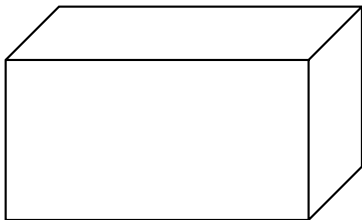

Chapter 5

Solutions – Problem Solving Questions

5.1 Number properties

1. Here given expression is in the format $a^2 - b^2 = (a + b)(a - b)$

$$\Rightarrow 99999^2 - 1^2 = (99,999 + 1)(99,999 - 1)$$

$$\Rightarrow 100,000 \times (100,000 - 2) = 10^5 \times (10^5 - 2)$$

The correct answer is option C.

2. The highest exponent of 3 in $n!$ can be calculated by adding the quotients (integer parts) when n is successively divided by 3:

If $[x]$ denotes the integer part of x , we have:

$$\left[\frac{n}{3}\right] + \left[\frac{\left[\frac{n}{3}\right]}{3}\right] + \dots = 8$$

Assuming that only $\left[\frac{n}{3}\right]$ equals 8, we have: $n = 3 \times 8 = 24$

However, for $n = 24$ the actual value of the exponent of 3 is:

- $\frac{24}{3} = 8$
- $\frac{8}{3} = 2.6 \equiv 2$

The exponent is $8 + 2 = 10$, which is greater by 2 than what was required.

Thus, we need to reduce 24 by 2 multiples of 3 i.e. $2 \times 3 = 6$.

Thus, the approximate value of $n = 24 - 6 = 18$.

For $n = 18$, the actual value of the exponent of 3 is:

- $\frac{18}{3} = 6$
- $\frac{6}{3} = 2$

The exponent is $6 + 2 = 8$, which is the exact exponent required.

However, since we need to find the largest value of the highest exponent of 5 in $n!$, we need to check if any higher value of n is possible.

We have obtained the highest exponent of 3 as 8 in $18!$

However, we can increase n till a point before the next multiple of 3 gets included.

Thus, we can increase n to 20!

Let us verify:

For $n = 20$, the actual value of the exponent of 3 is:

- $\frac{20}{3} = 6.6 \equiv 6$
- $\frac{6}{3} = 2$

Thus the exponent is $6 + 2 = 8$, which is the exact exponent required.

Thus, the maximum value of $n! = 20!$

Thus, for $n = 20$, the value of the highest exponent of 5 is:

- $\frac{20}{5} = 4$

Thus the highest exponent of 5 in 20! is 4.

The correct answer is option C.

3. We have: $0 < r < 1$

Also, $s = r^2$ and $t = \sqrt{r}$

Multiplying both sides of the inequality, $r < 1$, by r (since r is positive, multiplying r will not change the sign of inequality):

$$r \times r < 1 \times r$$

$$\Rightarrow r^2 < r$$

Thus, we have:

$$r > r^2 = s$$

Again, since $r < 1$; taking square root on both the sides, we have: $\sqrt{r} < 1$

Multiplying both sides of the above inequality by $\sqrt{r}$, we have:

$$\sqrt{r} \times \sqrt{r} < \sqrt{r}$$

$$\Rightarrow r < \sqrt{r}$$

Thus, we have:

$$r^2 < r < \sqrt{r}$$

$$\Rightarrow s < r < t$$

The correct answer is option D.

Alternate Approach:

For any number less than 1, its squares, cubes & higher order numbers would be less than the number, and its square roots, cube roots & n^{th} roots would be greater than the number.

Since $r = 0.345 < 1$, this follows that $s < r < t$.

4. Given that,

$$s = 100 \times 101 \times \cdots \times 200$$

$$t = 100 \times 101 \times \cdots \times 200 \times 201 = 201 \times s$$

Thus, we have:

$$\begin{aligned} \frac{1}{s} + \frac{1}{t} &= \frac{1}{s} + \frac{1}{201 \times s} \\ &\Rightarrow \frac{201 + 1}{201 \times s} \\ &\Rightarrow \frac{202}{201 \times s} \\ &\Rightarrow \frac{202}{t} \end{aligned}$$

The correct answer is option D.

5. The sum of all integers from 1 to n is given by $\frac{n(n+1)}{2}$.

$$\text{Thus, sum of all integers from 1 to 30} = \frac{30 \times 31}{2} = 15 \times 31.$$

$$\text{Thus, } s = 15 \times 31 = 3 \times 5 \times 31$$

Thus, the prime factors of s are: 3, 5 and 31.

Thus, the factors of s are: 1, 3, 5, 31, $3 \times 5 = 15$, $3 \times 31 = 93$, $5 \times 31 = 155$, and $3 \times 5 \times 31 = 465$.

Thus, the sum of all the factors of $s = 1 + 3 + 5 + 31 + 15 + 93 + 155 + 465 = 768$.

The correct answer is option E.

6. $s = \frac{1}{91} + \frac{1}{92} + \cdots + \frac{1}{100}$

Let us try to find the range of values of s .

We know that s is of the sum of 10 terms.

Thus, we can say:

$$s < \frac{1}{91} + \frac{1}{91} + \dots (10 \text{ times})$$

$$\Rightarrow s < \frac{10}{91} = \frac{1}{9.1}$$

$$\Rightarrow s < \frac{1}{9}$$

Again, we have:

$$s > \frac{1}{100} + \frac{1}{100} + \dots (10 \text{ terms})$$

$$\Rightarrow s > \frac{10}{100} = \frac{1}{10}$$

Thus, we have:

$$\frac{1}{10} < s < \frac{1}{9}$$

Thus, from the statements I and II, we see that s is less than $\frac{1}{9}$ and hence s is also less than $\frac{1}{8}$ (since $\frac{1}{8} > \frac{1}{9}$).

The correct answer is option C.

7. Since the number is divisible by 36, it is divisible by both 4 and 9.

The number $5m15n$ is divisible by 4, if the last two digits of the number is divisible by 4.

Thus, the number $5n$ is divisible by 4.

This is possible if $n = 2$ or 6 (since both 52 and 56 are divisible by 4).

The number $5m15n$ is divisible by 9, if the sum of the digits of the number is divisible by 9.

The sum of the digits = $5 + m + 1 + 5 + n = (11 + m + n)$.

Thus, $(11 + m + n)$ should be divisible by 9.

If $n = 2$:

$$11 + m + n$$

$$= 11 + m + 2$$

$$= 13 + m.$$

Thus, $(13 + m)$ is divisible by 9 if $m = 5$ (since $13 + 5 = 18$, which is divisible by 9).

If $n = 6$:

$$11 + m + n$$

$$= 11 + m + 6$$

$$= 17 + m.$$

Thus, $(17 + m)$ is divisible by 9 if $m = 1$ (since $17 + 1 = 18$, which is divisible by 9).

Thus we have two possible situations:

$$m = 5, n = 2 \Rightarrow |m - n| = 3$$

OR

$$m = 1, n = 6 \Rightarrow |m - n| = 5$$

Thus, the maximum value of $|m - n| = 5$.

The correct answer is option C.

8. Working with the options one at a time:

• Option A:

$$n = 99 = 3^2 \times 11$$

$\Rightarrow$ The prime factors of n are 3 and 11

Also, $\sqrt{n} = \sqrt{99}$, which lies between 9 and 10

Product of the prime factors of $n = 3 \times 11 = 33 \not\leq \sqrt{99}$ - Does not satisfy

• Option B:

$$n = 98 = 2 \times 7^2$$

=> The prime factors of n are 2 and 7

Also, $\sqrt{n} = \sqrt{98}$, which lies between 9 and 10

Product of the prime factors of $n = 2 \times 7 = 14 \not\leq \sqrt{98}$ - Does not satisfy

• Option C:

$n = 97$, which is a prime number

=> The prime factor of n is 97

Also, $\sqrt{n} = \sqrt{97}$, which lies between 9 and 10

Product of the prime factors of $n = 97 \not\leq \sqrt{97}$ - Does not satisfy

• Option D:

$$n = 96 = 2^5 \times 3$$

=> The prime factors of n are 2 and 3

Also, $\sqrt{n} = \sqrt{96}$, which lies between 9 and 10

Product of the prime factors of $n = 2 \times 3 = 6 < \sqrt{97}$ - Satisfies

Verifying option E...

• Option E:

$$n = 95 = 5 \times 19$$

=> The prime factors of n are 5 and 19

Also, $\sqrt{n} = \sqrt{95}$, which lies between 9 and 10

Product of the prime factors of $n = 5 \times 19 = 95 \not\leq \sqrt{95}$ - Does not satisfy

The correct answer is option D.

9. According to the problem:

If t is in the set, then $(t + 2)$ is also in the set.

However, it does NOT imply that: If $(t + 2)$ is in the set, then t must be in the set.

What it does imply is that: If $(t + 2)$ is NOT in the set, then t is NOT in the set.

Thus, if we have $t = -1$ as a member of the set, then $(t + 2) = 1$ is a member of the set.

Thus, statement II is correct.

Proceeding in the same way:

Since $t = 1$ is a member of the set, then $(t + 2) = 3$ is a member of the set.

Again, since $t = 3$ is a member of the set, then $(t + 2) = 5$ is a member of the set.

Thus, statement III is correct.

Thus, the correct answer is option D.

10. We have:

$$x_1 = 3 = 2^1 + 1 \dots (i)$$

$$\begin{aligned} x_2 &= 2 \times x_1 - 1 \\ &= 2 \times (2^1 + 1) - 1 \\ &= 2 \times 2^1 + 2 \times 1 - 1 \\ &= 2^2 + 2 - 1 \\ &= 2^2 + 1 \dots (ii) \end{aligned}$$

$$\begin{aligned} x_3 &= 2 \times x_2 - 1 \\ &= 2 \times (2^2 + 1) - 1 \\ &= 2 \times 2^2 + 2 \times 1 - 1 \\ &= 2^3 + 2 - 1 \\ &= 2^3 + 1 \dots (iii) \end{aligned}$$

Thus, we see that the sequence follows the pattern:

$$x_n = 2^n + 1$$

$$\Rightarrow x_{20} = 2^{20} + 1, \text{ and } x_{19} = 2^{19} + 1$$

$$\Rightarrow x_{20} - x_{19}$$

$$= (2^{20} + 1) - (2^{19} - 1)$$

$$= 2^{20} - 2^{19}$$

$$= 2 \times 2^{19} - 2^{19}$$

$$= 2^{19} (2 - 1)$$

$$= 2^{19}$$

The correct answer is option A.

11. $924 = 2^2 \times 3 \times 7 \times 11$

We see that there is an extra '2' since the exponent of 2 is 2.

This extra '2' can be combined with the other factors to generate different values of z .

Also, keeping the two 2's separate, the other factors may be combined to generate different values of z .

Thus, possible values of w, x, y and z such that $1 < w \leq x \leq y \leq z$, are:

w	x	y	z
3	$2 \times 2 = 4$	7	11
2	$2 \times 3 = 6$	7	11
2	3	7	$2 \times 11 = \mathbf{22}$
2	3	11	$2 \times 7 = \mathbf{14}$
2	2	7	$3 \times 11 = \mathbf{33}$
2	2	11	$3 \times 7 = \mathbf{21}$
2	2	3	$7 \times 11 = \mathbf{77}$

Thus, there are six possible values of z , which are 11, 14, 21, 22, 33 and 77.

The correct answer is option D.

12. $(\sqrt{x+y-2\sqrt{xy}}) + (\sqrt{x+y+2\sqrt{xy}})$

$$= \left(\sqrt{(\sqrt{x})^2 + (\sqrt{y})^2 - 2\sqrt{x}\sqrt{y}} \right) + \left(\sqrt{(\sqrt{x})^2 + (\sqrt{y})^2 + 2\sqrt{x}\sqrt{y}} \right)$$

Since $y > x$, we have:

$$\sqrt{(\sqrt{x})^2 + (\sqrt{y})^2 - 2\sqrt{x}\sqrt{y}}$$

$$= \sqrt{(\sqrt{y} - \sqrt{x})^2}$$

$$= \sqrt{y} - \sqrt{x}$$

Note: We should not write $(\sqrt{x} - \sqrt{y})$, since this value is negative while the radical sign will only take the positive square root.

Thus, the given expression: $\left(\sqrt{(\sqrt{x})^2 + (\sqrt{y})^2 - 2\sqrt{x}\sqrt{y}}\right) + \left(\sqrt{(\sqrt{x})^2 + (\sqrt{y})^2 + 2\sqrt{x}\sqrt{y}}\right)$

$$= (\sqrt{y} - \sqrt{x}) + (\sqrt{y} + \sqrt{x})$$

$$= 2\sqrt{y}$$

The correct answer is option E.

Alternate Approach:

Above approach may be time-consuming. We may have an alternate approach for this questions.

We see that in the options, we have to deal with square roots of x & y , thus with the given constraints ($0 < x < 1$ and $y > 1$), we can assume smarter values for x & y .

Say $x = \frac{1}{4}$ & $y = 4$

So, now we have to see what is the value of $(\sqrt{x + y - 2\sqrt{xy}} + \sqrt{x + y + 2\sqrt{xy}})$?

$$(\sqrt{x + y - 2\sqrt{xy}} + \sqrt{x + y + 2\sqrt{xy}}) = \left(\sqrt{\frac{1}{4} + 4 - 2\sqrt{\frac{1}{4} \times 4}} + \sqrt{\frac{1}{4} + 4 + 2\sqrt{\frac{1}{4} \times 4}}\right)$$

$$\Rightarrow \left(\sqrt{\frac{1}{4} + 4 - 2\sqrt{1}} + \sqrt{\frac{1}{4} + 4 + 2\sqrt{1}}\right)$$

$$\Rightarrow \left(\sqrt{\frac{1}{4} + 2} + \sqrt{\frac{1}{4} + 6}\right)$$

$$\Rightarrow \left(\sqrt{\frac{9}{4}} + \sqrt{\frac{25}{4}}\right)$$

$$\Rightarrow \left(\frac{3}{2} + \frac{5}{2}\right)$$

$$\Rightarrow 4$$

Plugging in the value of $x = \frac{1}{4}$ & $y = 4$ in options, we find that the value of only option E equals 4, the correct answer.

13. For $0 < x < 1$, Multiplying x throughout:

$$\Rightarrow 0 < x^2 < x$$

Taking square root throughout:

$$\Rightarrow 0 < x < \sqrt{x}$$

Thus, we have:

$$\sqrt{x} > x$$

Taking reciprocal:

$$\frac{1}{\sqrt{x}} < \frac{1}{x} \dots (i)$$

We know that:

$$x \geq 0.9$$

$$\Rightarrow \frac{1}{x} \leq \frac{1}{0.9} = 1.11 \dots (ii)$$

Thus, from (i) and (ii), we have:

$$\frac{1}{\sqrt{x}} < 1.11$$

The correct answer is option A.

Alternate Approach:

Say $x = 1$,

$$\Rightarrow \left(\frac{1}{\sqrt{x}} \right) = \left(\frac{1}{\sqrt{1}} \right) = 1$$

We see that the value of x increases, the value of $\left(\frac{1}{\sqrt{x}} \right)$ decreases; but we see that no value in the options are less than 1.

Since all the values in options are more than 1, we need to probe further.

If we plug in a value for x , lying between 1 and 0.9, the value of $\left(\frac{1}{\sqrt{x}} \right)$ would be greater 1. However, all the options are greater than 1, so this does not seem to solve the problem, but it is not so.

Since this is a question of MCQ category and only one among five options are correct, at least option A (1.02, least among all the options) must be correct, thus the correct answer.

14. We have: $180x = y^3$

$$180 = 2^2 \times 3^2 \times 5$$

Since $180x$ is a perfect cube, we have:

$$x = 2 \times 3 \times 5^2 \times k^3, \text{ where } k \text{ is a positive integer.}$$

In that case, we have:

$$180x = 2^3 \times 3^3 \times 5^3 \times k^3, \text{ which is a perfect cube.}$$

Thus, among the statements I, II and III, only those would be an integer where the denominator is a factor of x .

Only in option III, where the denominator is $2 \times 3 \times 5^2$, x is divisible by the denominator and hence would be an integer.

The correct answer is option C.

15. Given that,

$$\begin{array}{r} A \quad B \\ + \quad B \quad A \\ \hline A \quad A \quad C \\ \hline \end{array}$$

In the addition in the unit digits, we have:

$$B + A = C + \text{carry}$$

(Since in the tens position, the same addition results in a different value)

The value of the carry must be 1 (adding 2 digits can result in a maximum carry of 1)

We observe that in the addition of the tens digits, i.e. $(1 + A + B)$, we get a carry to the hundreds' position (since the result is a three-digit number).

Also, we have:

$$(1 + A + B) \text{ results in the digit } A \text{ in the tens position}$$

$$\Rightarrow (1 + B) = 10$$

(Since only $(A + 10)$ would result is the digit A in the tens position)

$$\Rightarrow B = 9$$

Since the hundreds' position in the sum comes only from the carry from the tens position, we have:

$$A = 1$$

Thus, the correct addition is:

$$\begin{array}{r} 1 \ 9 \\ + \ 9 \ 1 \\ \hline 1 \ 1 \ 0 \end{array}$$

Thus, the value of the unit digit of the integer AAC , i.e. $C = 0$.

The correct answer is option E.

Alternate Approach:

As AB and BA are two digit positive integers, we must have:

$$AB + BA = AAC < 200$$

$\Rightarrow A$ must be equal to 1

$\Rightarrow AAC = 11C$, where C is the unit digit

We can write a two digit positive number with digits A and B as:

$$AB \equiv 10A + B$$

Similarly, we have, the two digit positive number: $BA \equiv 10B + A$

Thus, we have:

$$AB + BA \equiv (10A + B) + (10B + A) = 11(A + B)$$

We know: $AB + BA = AAC$

$$\Rightarrow AAC = 11C \equiv 11(A + B)$$

Thus, AAC is a multiple 11, and also less than 200:

$$\Rightarrow AAC \equiv 110.$$

$$\Rightarrow C = 0$$

16. Amount saved by Nancy in the first week = \$1.

Amount saved by Nancy in the second week = \$ (1 + 1) = \$2.

Amount saved by Nancy in the third week = \$ (2 + 1) = \$3.

Thus, we see that the amount saved by Nancy forms an arithmetic progression with first term 1 and constant difference between consecutive terms as 1.

Thus, the amount saved by Nancy in the 52nd week = \$52.

Thus, the average amount saved by Nancy every week

$$\begin{aligned} &= \frac{(\text{Amount saved in the 1}^{\text{st}} \text{ week}) + (\text{Amount saved in the 52}^{\text{nd}} \text{ week})}{2} \\ &= \$ \left(\frac{1 + 52}{2} \right) = \$ \left(\frac{53}{2} \right) \end{aligned}$$

Thus, total amount saved = (Average amount saved per week) $\times$ (Number of weeks)

$$= \$ \left(\frac{53}{2} \times 52 \right)$$

$$= \$ (53 \times 26)$$

$$= \$1378$$

The correct answer is option C.

Alternate Approach:

$$\text{Sum of first } n \text{ natural numbers} = \frac{n \times (n + 1)}{2}$$

$$\text{Thus, the sum of first 52 natural numbers} = \frac{52 \times 53}{2} = 53 \times 26 = 1378$$

5.2 Percents

17. The cost of repairing a pair of used shoes so that they last for one year = \$12.5

The cost of a pair of new shoes = \$28.

Since the new shoes last for two years, the average cost per year = $\$ \frac{28}{2} = \14 .

Thus, the required percentage = $\frac{14 - 12.5}{12.5} \times 100 = 12\%$.

The correct answer is option C.

18. Let the purchase price of the item be $\$x$.

So tax is applicable on $\$(x - 100)$

Thus, tax paid = 5% of $\$(x - 100)$

$$\Rightarrow \$ \left(\frac{5}{100} \times (x - 100) \right)$$

$$\Rightarrow \$ \left(\frac{x - 100}{20} \right), \text{ which is equals to } \$4.$$

Thus, we have:

$$\frac{x - 100}{20} = 4$$

$$\Rightarrow x = 180$$

The correct answer is option C.

19. Tax paid on \$50 = \$0.82

Thus, a tax which thrice as much as the above, would be $\$(0.82 \times 3) = \2.46 on \$50.

Thus, the new tax on \$100 = $2 \times$ Tax paid on \$50

$$\Rightarrow \$(2.46 \times 2) = \$4.92$$

Thus, this tax, expressed as a percentage = $\frac{4.92}{100} \times 100 = 4.92\%$.

The correct answer is option C.

20. For X, visual range increased from 90 kilometers to 270 kilometers.

Total increase in visual range of X = $270 - 90 = 180$ kilometers

Thus, Percentage increase in visual range using X = $\frac{180}{90} \times 100 = 200\%$.

For Y, visual range increased from 45 kilometers to 180 kilometers.

Total increase in visual range of X = $180 - 45 = 135$ kilometers

Thus, Percentage increase in visual range using Y = $\frac{135}{45} \times 100 = 300\%$.

Apparently it seems that the required answer is simply: $300\% - 200\% = 100\%$.

However, it is not so since we are here asked to find percent change not absolute change

Here absolute change is $300\% - 200\% = 100\%$, which we are going to compare with percent change in X which is 200%.

The required percent = $\frac{100}{200} \times 100 = 50\%$.

What this shows us is that the use of telescope Y is 50% more effective than that of telescope X.

The correct answer is option B.

21. Population of country X = 120,108,000 $\approx$ 120,000,000.

Land area of country X = 2,998,000 square kilometers $\approx$ 3,000,000 square kilometers.

Thus, population density of country X = $\frac{120000000}{3000000} = 40$.

Population of country Y = 200,323,000 $\approx$ 200,000,000.

Land area of country Y = 7,899,000 square kilometers $\approx$ 8,000,000 square kilometers.

Thus, population density of country Y = $\frac{200000000}{8000000} = 25$.

Thus, the percent by which population density of country X is greater than that of country Y
 $= \left(\frac{40 - 25}{25} \right) \times 100$
 $= 60\%$.

Note: An exact calculation would lead to:

Population density of country X = $\frac{120108000}{2998000} = 40.06$.

Thus, population density of country Y = $\frac{200323000}{7899000} = 25.36$.

Thus, required percent difference = $\frac{40.06 - 25.36}{25.36} \times 100 = 57.96\% \approx 60\%$.

Thus, the above approximations are justified. The closest option (50%) to 57.96% is too far compared to 60%, thus it cannot be an answer.

In the GMAT, whenever, approximate answer is expected, the options are wide apart from each other.

The correct answer is option A.

22. Since we need to find the overall percent change, we can assume the original price as \$100 (since the overall percent change does not depend on the actual value of the coat).

Price after the price was reduced by 20%

$$= (100 - 20) \% \text{ of } \$100$$

$$= \$100 \times \left(\frac{80}{100} \right)$$

$$= \$80.$$

Price after the new price was increased by 20%

$$= (100 + 20) \% \text{ of } \$80$$

$$= \$80 \times \left(\frac{120}{100} \right)$$

$$= \$96.$$

$$\text{Thus, the overall percent change} = \frac{\text{Change in value}}{\text{Initial value}} \times 100$$

$$= \frac{100 - 96}{100} \times 100$$

$$= 4\%$$

Working with the options one at a time:

- Option A:

$$100(1 - 0.2)^2 = 100 \times 0.8^2 = 64\% - \text{Incorrect}$$

- Option B:

$$100(1 - 0.4) = 100 \times 0.6 = 60\% - \text{Incorrect}$$

- Option C:

$$100(1 - 0.4)^2 = 100 \times 0.36 = 36\% - \text{Incorrect}$$

- Option D:

$$100(1 - 0.8) = 100 \times 0.2 = 20\% - \text{Incorrect}$$

- Option E:

$$100(1 - 0.96) = 100 \times 0.04 = 4\% - \text{Correct}$$

The correct answer is option E.

Alternate Approach:

We can find the overall percent change using the relation:

$$\left(x + y + \frac{xy}{100}\right)\%, \text{ where } x\% \text{ and } y\% \text{ represent successive percent changes.}$$

Applying in this problem, we get:

$$\left(20 - 20 - \frac{20 \times 20}{100}\right) = -4\%$$

Thus, the overall percent change is 4%.

23. The prescribed drug dosage for 120 pounds of body weight was 18 cubic centimeters.

The typical drug dosage for every 15 pounds of body weight was 2 cubic centimeters.

Thus, as per the typical dosage, amount of drug required for 120 pounds of body weight
 $= \frac{2}{15} \times 120 = 16$ cubic centimeters.

Thus, the prescribed dosage has to be reduced by $(18 - 16) = 2$ cubic centimeters.

Thus, the percent change in the dosage $= \frac{2}{18} \times 100 = \frac{100}{9} = 11.11\%$.

The correct answer is option C.

24. Number of workers who worked for 20 hours in the week = 30% of 100 = 30.

Rate of pay per hour = \$5.

Thus, pay per worker = \$ $(5 \times 20) = \$100$.

Thus, total pay for all 30 workers = \$ $(100 \times 30) = \$3000 \dots (i)$

Number of workers who worked for 40 hours in the week = 50% of 100 = 50.

Rate of pay per hour = \$5.

Thus, pay per worker = \$ $(5 \times 40) = \$200$.

Thus, total pay for all 50 workers = \$ $(200 \times 50) = \$10000 \dots (ii)$

Number of workers who worked for 50 hours in the week = $100 - (30 + 50) = 20$.

Rate of pay is \$5 per hour for the first 40 hours and \$ $\left(5 \times 1\frac{1}{2}\right) = \$\left(5 \times \frac{3}{2}\right) = \$\left(\frac{15}{2}\right)$ per hour for the remaining $(50 - 40) = 10$ hours.

Thus, pay per worker = \$ $\left(5 \times 40 + \frac{15}{2} \times 10\right) = \275 .

Thus, total pay for all 20 workers = \$ $(275 \times 20) = \$5500 \dots (iii)$

Thus, total payroll for the entire assembly-line workers
= \$ $(3000 + 10000 + 5500) = \18500 .

The correct answer is option B.

25. On the first \$20 million in sales, amount received in royalties = \$3 million

Thus, ratio of royalties to sales = $\frac{3}{20}$.

On the next \$108 million in sales, amount received in royalties = \$9 million

Thus, ratio of royalties to sales = $\frac{9}{108} = \frac{3}{36}$.

Since $\frac{3}{20} > \frac{3}{36}$, there is a decrease in royalties.

Thus, the required percent decrease

$$\begin{aligned}
 &= \left(\frac{\frac{3}{20} - \frac{3}{36}}{\frac{3}{20}} \right) \times 100 \\
 &= \left(1 - \left(\frac{3}{36} \times \frac{20}{3} \right) \right) \times 100; \text{ taking } \frac{3}{20} \text{ common from numerator and canceling it from the denominator} \\
 &= \left(1 - \frac{5}{9} \right) \times 100 \\
 &= \frac{4}{9} \times 100 \\
 &= 44.44\% \approx 44\%
 \end{aligned}$$

The correct answer is option C.

26. Total sales = \$14000.

Thus, commission on the first \$10000 = 6% of \$10000 = $\$ \left(\frac{6}{100} \times 10000 \right) = \600 .

Total commission received by the salesman = \$920.

Thus, commission received on the remaining sales = $\$ (920 - 600) = \320 .

Commission received on the remaining $\$ (14000 - 10000) = \4000 at $r\%$

= $r\%$ of \$4000

= $\$ \left(\frac{r}{100} \times 4000 \right)$

= $\$40r$.

Thus, we have:

$$40r = 320$$

$$\Rightarrow r = 8$$

The correct answer is option D.

27. Total cost of the 1500 heads of cabbage = \$600.

Cost of $\frac{2}{3}$ of the above heads of cabbage = $\$ \left(600 \times \frac{2}{3} \right) = \400 .

On first day, these were sold at a 25% higher than the cost price.

Thus, selling price of the above heads of cabbage

= $(100 + 25)\%$ of \$400

= $\$ \left(\frac{125}{100} \times 400 \right)$

= \$500 ... (i)

Cost of the remaining heads of cabbage = $\$ (600 - 400) = \200 .

On the second day, these remaining heads of cabbage were sold at a 10% lower than the cost price.

Thus, selling price of the above heads of cabbage on the second day

= $(100 - 10)\%$ of \$200

$$= \$ \left(\frac{90}{100} \times 200 \right)$$

$$= \$180 \dots (\text{ii})$$

Thus, total selling price = \$ (500 + 180) = \$680.

Thus, percent profit

$$= \left(\frac{\text{Selling price} - \text{Cost price}}{\text{Cost price}} \right) \times 100$$

$$= \left(\frac{680 - 600}{600} \right) \times 100$$

$$= 13.33\%.$$

The correct answer is option B.

Alternate Approach:

Percent profit made on $\frac{2}{3}$ of the stock = 25%

Percent profit made on the remaining $\frac{1}{3}$ of the stock = -10% (since price is 10% less)

Thus, overall percent profit

$$= \left(\frac{2}{3} \times 25 + \frac{1}{3} \times (-10) \right)$$

$$= \frac{50}{3} - \frac{10}{3}$$

$$= \frac{40}{3}$$

$$= 13.33\%.$$

28. We know that the price of diesel increased by 25%.

Let the original price of diesel per liter be \$ x .

Thus, the price of diesel per liter after the price increase

$$= \$ (100 + 25) \% \text{ of } x = \$ (125\% \text{ of } x) = \$ \left(\frac{5x}{4} \right).$$

$$\text{Number of liters of diesel} = \left(\frac{\text{Total Price}}{\text{Price per liter}} \right)$$

Thus, difference in quantity of diesel obtained for \$50

$$= \frac{50}{x} - \frac{50}{\frac{5x}{4}} = 10$$

$$\Rightarrow \frac{50}{x} - \frac{40}{x} = 10$$

$$\Rightarrow \frac{10}{x} = 10$$

$$\Rightarrow x = 1$$

Thus, the correct answer is option A.

Alternate Approach:

If the price of an item goes up/down by $x\%$, the quantity consumed should be reduced/increased by $\left(\frac{100x}{100 \pm x}\right)\%$ so that the total expenditure remains the same.

Since the price of diesel increased by 25%, the quantity obtained for \$50 would reduce by $100 \times \left(\frac{25}{100 + 25}\right) = 20\%$

Thus, 20% of the original quantity = 10 liters

$$\Rightarrow \text{Original quantity} = 10 \times \frac{100}{20} = 50 \text{ liters}$$

$$\text{Thus, the initial price per liter of diesel} = \left(\frac{\text{Total Initial Price}}{\text{Total Initial number of liters}}\right) = \$\left(\frac{50}{50}\right) = \$1.$$

29. Since the problem asks us to find a percent value, we can assume any suitable value of the annual budget for ease of calculation, since the initial value does not affect the final answer.

Since we have the fractions $\frac{1}{5}$ and $\frac{1}{8}$, we take the budget to be \$40 (LCM of 5 and 8 = 40).

$$\text{Thus, amount spent during the first quarter} = \$\left(\frac{1}{5} \times 40\right) = \$8.$$

$$\text{Amount of money left} = \$ (40 - 8) = \$32.$$

$$\text{Thus, amount spent during the second quarter} = \$\left(\frac{1}{8} \times 32\right) = \$4.$$

$$\text{Thus, amount left} = \$ (32 - 4) = \$28.$$

$$\text{Total amount spent} = \$ (8 + 4) = \$12.$$

Thus, the required percent

$$= \frac{28 - 12}{12} \times 100$$

$$= \frac{400}{3}\%$$

$$= 133.33\%$$

The correct answer is option D.

- 30.** Amount Dick saved in 2006 = \$3000.

Amount Dick saved in 2007

= 8% more than what he saved in 2006

= (100 + 8) % of what he saved in 2006

$$= \$ \left(\frac{108}{100} \times 3000 \right)$$

$$= \$3240$$

Total amount saved by Dick and Jane in 2007 = \$5000.

Thus, amount saved by Jane in 2007 = \$ (5000 – 3240) = \$1760.

We know that Jane had saved \$3000 in 2006.

Thus, the required percent

$$= \frac{(\text{Amount saved by Jane in 2006}) - (\text{Amount saved by Jane in 2007})}{(\text{Amount saved by Jane in 2006})} \times 100\%$$

$$= \frac{3000 - 1760}{3000} \times 100\%$$

$$= \frac{1240}{3000} \times 100\%$$

$$= \frac{124}{3}\%$$

$$= 41.33\%$$

$$= \approx 41\%$$

The correct answer is option C.

- 31.** It is easier to solve this question can be solved by observing the answer options than by actual solving.

We observe that the options are very large compared to the price change after the first up-down cycle, i.e. \$2.

Let the original price of each share of stock K be $\$x$.

After one up-down cycle, the price of each share reduces by $\$2$.

Thus, after one up-down cycle, the price per share = $\$(x - 2)$.

The next up-down cycle would be calculated on $\$(x - 2)$ instead of $\$x$.

However, since 2 is negligible as compared to x , we can say that the reduction in price per share would be very slightly less than $\$2$.

Thus, the final price $\approx \$(x - 2) - 2 = \$(x - 4)$.

Thus, we have:

$$(x - 4) \approx 196.02$$

$$\Rightarrow x \approx 200.02$$

Thus, the only option that satisfies is 200.

The actual calculation is shown below:

Assuming the initial price of a share to be $\$x$, we have:

$$x - x \left(1 + \frac{k}{100}\right) \left(1 - \frac{k}{100}\right) = 2 \dots (i)$$

$$x \left(1 + \frac{k}{100}\right) \left(1 - \frac{k}{100}\right) \left(1 + \frac{k}{100}\right) \left(1 - \frac{k}{100}\right) = 196.02 \dots (ii)$$

We need to solve for x from the above two equations.

Note: The actual solution is time taking and very involved, and hence, is not suggested.

The correct answer is option D.

32. Cost of planting n trees = $\$p$.

Since the cost increases by 25%, the new cost of planting n trees

$$= \$((100 + 25)\% \text{ of } p)$$

$$= \$\left(\frac{125}{100} \times p\right)$$

$$= \$\left(\frac{5p}{4}\right)$$

Thus, with a budget of \$ $\left(\frac{5p}{4}\right)$, the orchard grower could plant n trees next year.

Thus, with a budget of \$ $(2p)$, the number of trees that can be planted

$$\begin{aligned} &= \frac{2p}{\left(\frac{5p}{4}\right)} \times n \\ &= \frac{8}{5}n \end{aligned}$$

Thus, percent increase in the number of trees from last year

$$\begin{aligned} &= \left(\frac{\frac{8}{5}n - n}{n} \right) \times 100 \\ &= \frac{3}{5} \times 100 \\ &= 60\% \end{aligned}$$

Thus, there would be a 60% increase in the number of trees that can be planted next year.

The correct answer is option D.

33. Since the question asks about a percent value, we can choose any suitable initial value of the total weight of the tire for ease of calculation, since the initial value will not affect the final answer.

Let the total weight of the tire initially = 100 units.

Thus, weight of tread = 40% of 100 = 40 units.

Weight of the remaining parts of the tire = 100 - 40 = 60 units.

Loss in weight of tread = 50%.

Thus, final weight of tire after a lifetime of use = (100 - 50)% of 40 = 20 units.

Since there is no weight loss in the other parts of the tire, final weight of the tire
= 60 + 20 = 80 units.

$$\begin{aligned} \text{Thus, the required percent value} &= \left(\frac{\text{Final weight of tread}}{\text{Final weight of tire}} \right) \times 100 \\ &= \frac{20}{80} \times 100 \\ &= 25\% \end{aligned}$$

The correct answer is option D.

34. Since the question asks about a percent value, we can choose any suitable initial value of the total weight of the mix for ease of calculation, since the initial value will not affect the final answer.

Let the total weight of the mix be 100 units.

Thus, weight of peanuts = 20% of 100 = 20 units.

Weight of cashews = 100 - 20 = 80 units.

Let the price of 100 units (an equal quantity) of peanuts be $100x$.

Since the mix costs 10 percent more than the cost of an equal quantity of pure peanuts, the price of 100 units of the mix

$$= \$((100 + 10)\% \text{ of } 100x)$$

$$= \$110x$$

$$\text{The price of 20 units of peanuts present in the mix} = \$\left(\frac{100x}{100} \times 20\right) = \$20x.$$

$$\text{Thus, the price of 80 units of cashews present in the mix} = \$ (110x - 20x) = \$90x.$$

$$\text{Thus, the price of 100 units of cashews} = \$\left(\frac{90x}{80} \times 100\right)$$

$$= \$\left(90x \times \frac{5}{4}\right)$$

$$= \$112.5x$$

Thus, the percent by which cashews are more expensive than peanuts

$$= \frac{(\text{price of 100 units of cashews}) - (\text{price of 100 units of peanuts})}{(\text{price of 100 units of peanuts})} \times 100$$

$$= \frac{112.5x - 100x}{100x} \times 100$$

$$= 12.5\%$$

The correct answer is option B.

35. Let us assume the number of days in a year to be 365 (it does not matter if one takes 366 for one of the years).

Thus, in a 2-year period, total number of days = $2 \times 365 = 730$.

We know that senior sales representatives visit the home office once every 30 days and junior sales representatives visit the home office once every 20 days.

Thus, we have:

Number of visits to the home office by senior sales representatives

$$= \frac{730}{30}$$

$$= 24.33 \equiv 24$$

Number of visits to the home office by junior sales representatives

$$= \frac{730}{20}$$

$$= 36.5 \equiv 36$$

Thus, the required percent difference

$$= \frac{(\text{Number of visits by juniors}) - (\text{Number of visits by seniors})}{(\text{Number of visits by seniors})} \times 100$$

$$= \frac{36 - 24}{24} \times 100$$

$$= 50\%$$

The correct answer is option D.

Alternate Approach I:

Instead of working with exactly a 2-year period, we may take any suitable period (LCM of 20 and 30) and calculate the answer.

Let us consider a period of 60 days:

$$\text{Number of visits to the home office by senior sales representatives} = \frac{60}{30} = 2$$

$$\text{Number of visits to the home office by junior sales representatives} = \frac{60}{20} = 3$$

$$\text{Thus, the required percent difference} = \left(\frac{3 - 2}{2} \times 100 \right) = 50\%$$

Alternate Approach II:

We know that senior sales representatives visit the home office once every 30 days and junior sales representatives visit the home office once every 20 days.

Thus, the time gap between 2 consecutive meetings for juniors is $\frac{20}{30} = \frac{2}{3}$ times the corresponding time gap for seniors.

Thus, in the same time period, juniors would make $\left(1 \div \frac{2}{3} \right) = \frac{3}{2} = 1.5$ times as many visits as made by the seniors.

Thus, the number of visits by the juniors is 50% more than that made by the seniors.

36. Cost of the computer purchased by Anne = \$2000.

$$\text{Sales tax paid} = 5\% \text{ of } \$2000 = \$ \left(\frac{5}{100} \times 2000 \right) = \$100.$$

$$\text{Thus, total price paid by Anne} = \$ (2000 + 100) = \$2100.$$

$$\text{Cost of the computer purchased by Henry} = \$1800.$$

$$\text{Sales tax paid} = 12\% \text{ of } \$1800 = \$ \left(\frac{12}{100} \times 1800 \right) = \$216.$$

$$\text{Thus, total price paid by Henry} = \$ (1800 + 216) = \$2016.$$

$$\text{Thus, the amount which Henry paid less compared to Anne} = \$ (2100 - 2016) = \$84.$$

Thus, the required % value

$$= \left(\frac{\text{Total price paid by Anne} - \text{Total price paid by Henry}}{\text{Total price paid by Anne}} \right) \times 100$$

$$= \left(\frac{84}{2100} \right) \times 100$$

$$= 4\%$$

The correct answer is option B.

37. Let the number of male and female employees be m and f respectively.

$$\text{Number of male employees who are at least 35 years old} = 50\% \text{ of } m$$

$$= \frac{50}{100} \times m$$

$$= \frac{m}{2}$$

$$\text{Number of female employees who are at least 35 years old}$$

$$= 40\% \text{ of } f$$

$$= \frac{40}{100} \times f$$

$$= \frac{2f}{5}$$

$$\text{Thus, total number of employees who are at least 35 years old} = \left(\frac{m}{2} + \frac{2f}{5} \right).$$

$$\text{Total number of employees} = (m + f).$$

Since 42% of all employees are at least 35 years old, we have:

$$\frac{42}{100} \times (m + f) = \frac{m}{2} + \frac{2f}{5}$$

$$\Rightarrow 21m + 21f = 25m + 20f$$

$$\Rightarrow f = 4m$$

Thus, fraction of all employees who are female

$$= \frac{f}{m + f}$$

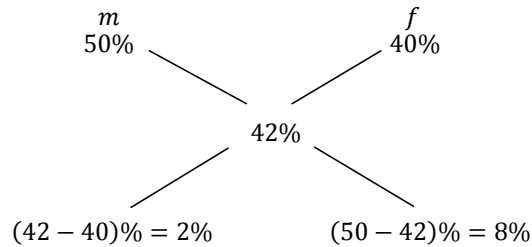
$$= \frac{4m}{m + 4m}$$

$$= \frac{4}{5}$$

The correct answer is option D.

Alternate Approach:

We can solve the problem using the method of alligation, as shown below:



Thus, we have:

$$m : f = 2 : 8 = 1 : 4$$

$$\Rightarrow \frac{f}{m + f} = \frac{4}{1 + 4} = \frac{4}{5}$$

38. Total number of votes cast = N .

Since 40% of the votes cast were cast by independent voters, percent of votes cast by voters registered with a political party = $(100 - 40) = 60\%$.

Thus, number of votes cast by voters registered with a political party

$$= 60\% \text{ of } N$$

$$= 0.6N$$

Of the above, Ms. Robbins received 10% of the votes.

Thus, number of votes received by Ms. Robbins from voters registered with a political party
= 10% of $0.6N$
= $0.06N$

Number of votes received by Ms. Robbins from independent voters = 8000.

Thus, total votes received by Ms. Robbins = $(0.06N + 8000)$.

The correct answer is option D.

39. Since the problem asks about a percent value, we can assume any suitable value of the number of employees in company X for ease of calculation.

Let the number of employees in company X be 100.

Number of employees who live over 10 miles from work = 30% of 100 = 30.

Number of employees who live over 10 miles from work and use car pools
= 60% of 30
= 18

Total number of employees who use car pools = 40% of 100 = 40.

Thus, the number of employees who do not live over 10 miles from work (i.e. live ten miles or less from work) and use car pools
= $40 - 18$
= 22

Thus, the percent of the employees of Company X live ten miles or less from work and use car pools
= $\frac{22}{100} \times 100$
= 22%

The correct answer is option C.

40. Let the total number of geese in the study = 100 (since the question asks about a ratio, the answer is independent of the initial number chosen, so we choose a suitable number for ease of calculation).

The number of male geese = 30% of 100 = 30.

Thus, the number of female geese = $100 - 30 = 70$.

Let the number of geese migrated = x .

$$\text{Thus, number of male geese migrated} = 20\% \text{ of } x = \frac{20}{100} \times x = \frac{x}{5}$$

$$\text{Thus, number of female geese migrated} = \left(x - \frac{x}{5}\right) = \frac{4x}{5}$$

Here we know that:

$$\text{Migration rate for geese of a certain gender} = \frac{\text{Number of geese of that gender migrating}}{\text{Total number of geese of that gender}}$$

$$\text{Thus, the migration rate for the male geese} = \left(\frac{\frac{x}{5}}{30}\right) = \frac{x}{150}.$$

$$\text{Also, the migration rate for the female geese} = \left(\frac{\frac{4x}{5}}{70}\right) = \frac{4x}{350}.$$

$$\text{Thus, the required ratio} = \frac{x}{150} : \frac{4x}{350}$$

$$= \frac{1}{150} : \frac{4}{350}$$

$$= \frac{1}{3} : \frac{4}{7}$$

$$= 7 : 12$$

$$= \frac{7}{12}$$

The correct answer is option B.

41. Since the problem asks us about a percent change, we can assume a suitable initial value of the original purchase price for ease of calculations.

We see that we need to take $\frac{2}{3}$ and $\frac{1}{2}$ of the original purchase price.

So, we should take a value which is a multiple of 6 (LCM of denominators, 2 and 3) for ease of calculations.

Thus, let the original purchase price be \$600.

$$\text{Thus, the book value in 2006} = \$ \left(\frac{2}{3} \times 600\right) = \$400.$$

$$\text{The book value in 2008} = \$ \left(\frac{1}{2} \times 600\right) = \$300.$$

Thus, the required percent decrease

$$= \left(\frac{\text{Change in value}}{\text{Initial value}}\right) \times 100$$

$$= \left(\frac{\text{Value in 2006} - \text{Value in 2008}}{\text{Value in 2006}}\right) \times 100$$

$$= \frac{400 - 300}{400} \times 100$$

$$= 25\%$$

The correct answer is option B.

Alternate Approach:

Say the original price be \$1.

Thus, the required percent decrease

$$= \left(\frac{\text{Value in 2006} - \text{Value in 2008}}{\text{Value in 2006}} \right) \times 100$$

$$= \frac{\frac{2}{3} - \frac{1}{2}}{\frac{2}{3}} \times 100$$

$$= \frac{\frac{1}{6}}{\frac{2}{3}} \times 100$$

$$= \frac{1}{2} \times 100$$

$$= 25\%$$

42. Salary increase according to the contract = 6% increase on initial salary and \$450 bonus.

Actual salary increase for the employee = 8% increase on initial salary.

Thus, we have:

$$(\text{6\% increase on Initial salary}) + (\$450) = (\text{8\% increase on Initial salary})$$

$$\Rightarrow (\text{8\% increase on Initial salary}) - (\text{6\% increase on Initial salary}) = \$450$$

$$\Rightarrow 2\% \text{ of Initial salary} = \$450$$

$$\Rightarrow \text{Initial salary} = \$ \left(450 \times \frac{100}{2} \right) = \$22500.$$

The correct answer is option B.

43. Number of bank customers in 2005 = 45% of 60 = $\frac{45}{100} \times 60 = 27$.

$$\text{Number of bank customers in 2007} = 25\% \text{ of } 144 = \frac{25}{100} \times 144 = 36.$$

Thus, increase in the number of bank customers = $36 - 27 = 9$.

Let the simple annual percent growth rate in the number of bank customers be $r\%$.

Thus, in two years (2005 to 2007), increase in the number of bank customers at $r\%$ rate

$$= \left(\frac{27 \times r \times 2}{100} \right)$$

(The value is calculated on 27 since 27 is the value in the former year)

Thus, we have:

$$\frac{27 \times r \times 2}{100} = 9$$

$$\Rightarrow r = \frac{9 \times 100}{2 \times 27} = 16.6\%$$

The correct answer is option B.

44. Since we need to find the greatest overall percent increase, let us assume a suitable initial value.

Let the initial value be 100.

Let there be $x\%$ increase initially.

Thus, value after $x\%$ increase

$$= (100 + x) \% \text{ of } 100$$

$$= \frac{100 + x}{100} \times 100$$

$$= (100 + x)$$

Let there be $y\%$ increase next.

Thus, the final value after $y\%$ increase

$$= (100 + y) \% \text{ of } (100 + x)$$

$$= \frac{(100 + y)}{100} \times (100 + x)$$

$$= \frac{(100 + y)(100 + x)}{100}$$

$$= \frac{100^2 + 100(x + y) + xy}{100}$$

Thus, overall percent increase

$$\begin{aligned}
&= \frac{(\text{Final value}) - (\text{Initial value})}{(\text{Initial value})} \times 100\% \\
&= \frac{\left(\frac{100^2 + 100(x + y) + xy}{100} - 100 \right)}{100} \times 100\% \\
&= \left(\frac{100(x + y) + xy}{100} \right) \% \\
&= \left(x + y + \frac{xy}{100} \right) \%
\end{aligned}$$

In each of the above options, we observe that:

$$x + y = 60$$

Thus, the option with the highest value of xy will have the highest overall percent increase.

We know that if the sum of two terms is a constant, the product of the two terms becomes the maximum only when both the terms are equal

$$\Rightarrow x = y = \frac{60}{2} = 30$$

Alternately, working with the options one at a time:

Option A:

$$x = 10, y = 50 \Rightarrow xy = 500$$

Option B:

$$x = 25, y = 35 \Rightarrow xy = 875$$

Option C:

$$x = 30, y = 30 \Rightarrow xy = \mathbf{900}$$

Option D:

$$x = 40, y = 20 \Rightarrow xy = 800$$

Option E:

$$x = 45, y = 15 \Rightarrow xy = 675$$

Thus, the correct answer is option C.

45. Since the problem asks us about a percent value, we can assume a suitable value of the number of voters for ease of calculations.

Let the number of voters be 100.

Thus, the number of Democrats = 60% of 100 = 60.

Number of Republicans = 100 - 60 = 40.

Number of Democrats who would vote for A = 75% of 60 = $\frac{75}{100} \times 60 = 45$.

Number of Republicans who would vote for A = 20% of 40 = $\frac{20}{100} \times 40 = 8$.

Thus, total number of expected votes for A = 45 + 8 = 53.

Thus, the required percent = $\frac{53}{100} \times 100 = 53\%$.

The correct answer is option B.

Alternate Approach:

Number of expected votes for A = (75% of 60% of all voters) + (20% of 40% of all voters)

Thus, using weighted average, the expected percent of voters for A

$$\begin{aligned} &= \left(\frac{\frac{75}{100} \times 60 + \frac{20}{100} \times 40}{60 + 40} \right) \times 100 \\ &= \frac{53}{100} \times 100 \\ &= 53\% \end{aligned}$$

5.3 Profit & Loss

46. Since $\left(\frac{2}{3}\right)^{\text{rd}}$ of the books were sold, the remaining $\left(1 - \frac{2}{3}\right) = \left(\frac{1}{3}\right)^{\text{rd}}$ of the books were not sold.

Thus, $\left(\frac{1}{3}\right)^{\text{rd}}$ of the total books = 36 books.

Thus, $\left(\frac{2}{3}\right)^{\text{rd}}$ of the total books = $2 \times 36 = 72$ books.

Thus, 72 books were sold each at \$2.50

Thus, total amount received = \$ $(72 \times 2.50) = \$180$.

The correct answer is option A.

47. We know that the farmer produces 750 bushels of a crop at a cost of \$20 per bushel.

Thus, the total cost of crop = \$ $(20 \times 750) = \$15000$.

Selling price of $\left(\frac{2}{3}\right)$ of 750 or 500 bushels = \$ $(2 \times 20) = \$40$ per bushel.

Thus, selling price of 500 bushels = \$ $(40 \times 500) = \$20000$... (i)

Selling price of $(750 - 500)$ or 250 bushels = \$ $\left(\left(100 + 25\right)\% \text{ of } 20\right) = \$\left(\frac{125}{100} \times 20\right) = \25 per bushel.

Thus, selling price of 250 bushels = \$ $(25 \times 250) = \$6250$... (ii)

Thus, from (i) and (ii):

Total selling price = \$ $(20000 + 6250) = \$26250$.

Thus, gross profit = Total selling price - Total cost price

= \$ $(26250 - 15000) = \$11250$.

The correct answer is option A.

48. Selling price of a desk of model A = \$120.

Thus, 30% of the selling price of a desk of model B = \$120.

Thus, selling price of a desk of model B = \$ $\left(120 \times \frac{100}{30}\right) = \400 .

Total number of desks sold by the furniture store = 2000.

Thus, the number of model B desks sold = $\frac{3}{4} \times 2000 = 1500$.

Thus, the number of model A desks sold = $2000 - 1500 = 500$.

Thus, total revenue from the sale of all desks

= Revenue from model A desks + Revenue from model B desks

= \$ $(120 \times 500) + \$ (400 \times 1500)$

= \$ $(60000 + 600000)$

= \$660000

The correct answer is option E.

49. Cost price of the machine = \$90.

Percent profit made on the cost = 20%.

Thus, selling price of the machine

= $(100 + 20)\%$ of \$90

= \$ $\left(\frac{120}{100} \times 90\right)$

= \$108.

This selling price is 10% less than the retail price.

Thus, $(100 - 10)\% = 90\%$ of the retail price is equal to the selling price of \$108.

Thus, the retail price

= \$ $\left(108 \times \frac{100}{90}\right)$

= \$120

The correct answer is option C.

50. Cost of production of each unit = \$0.65

Selling price of each unit = \$1.20

Thus, profit made on each unit = \$ $(1.20 - 0.65) = \$0.55$

Investment made on the equipment = \$9900.

Thus, number of units required to be sold to recover the investment in equipment

$$\begin{aligned} &= \frac{9900}{0.55} \\ &= \frac{99 \times 100}{\frac{55}{100}} \\ &= \frac{99 \times 100 \times 100}{55} \\ &= 18000 \end{aligned}$$

The correct answer is option D.

Alternate Approach:

Let the number of required units = n .

Thus, total cost = \$ $(9900 + 0.65n)$.

Total selling price = $\$1.2n$

Thus, we have:

$$9900 + 0.65n = 1.2n$$

$$\Rightarrow n = 18000$$

51. Initial selling price of the computer

= $(100 + 40)\%$ of the cost of the computer

= 140% of the cost of the computer

New selling price of the computer

= $(100 + 50)\%$ of the cost of the computer

= 150% of the cost of the computer

Thus, difference between the above two selling prices

= $(150\% - 140\%)$ of the cost of the computer

= 10% of the cost of the computer

Since the difference between the two selling prices is \$200, we have:

10% of the cost of the computer = \$200

$$\Rightarrow \text{Cost of the computer} = \$ \left(200 \times \frac{100}{10} \right) = \$2000$$

Thus, the initial selling price of the computer

= 140% of the cost of the computer

$$= \$ \left(2000 \times \frac{140}{100} \right)$$

$$= \$2800$$

The correct answer is option C.

52. Total toy trucks produced = 500.

Price of each of the first 100 toy trucks = \$5.00

Thus, total cost of the first 100 toy trucks = \$ (5 × 100) = \$500.

Price of each of the remaining 400 toy trucks = \$3.50

Thus, total cost of the remaining 400 toy trucks = \$ (3.50 × 400) = \$1400.

Thus, total cost of 500 toy trucks = \$ (500 + 1400) = \$1900.

Total selling price of the 500 toy trucks sold at \$10.00 each = \$ (10 × 500) = \$5000.

Thus, gross profit = Total selling price – Total cost price

$$= \$5000 - \$1900$$

$$= \$ 3100$$

The correct answer is option C.

53. Initial selling price of the game = \$44.

Since the initial percent profit was 10% of the cost, we have:

(100 + 10)% of the Cost of the game = \$44

$$\Rightarrow \text{Cost of the game} = \$ \left(\frac{44}{110} \times 100 \right) = \$40$$

Final selling price of the game = \$46.

Thus, the required percent profit

$$\begin{aligned} &= \left(\frac{\text{Selling price} - \text{Cost price}}{\text{Cost price}} \right) \times 100 \\ &= \left(\frac{46 - 40}{40} \right) \times 100 \\ &= \frac{6}{40} \times 100 \\ &= 15\% \end{aligned}$$

The correct answer is option E.

Alternate Approach:

Initial percent profit when the selling price was \$44 = 10%.

If the selling price is increased from \$44 to \$46, the corresponding percent increase is (approximately)

$$\begin{aligned} &= \left(\frac{46 - 44}{44} \right) \times 100 \\ &= \frac{2}{44} \times 100 \\ &\approx 4.5\% \end{aligned}$$

$$\begin{aligned} \text{Thus, resultant profit percent (based on the increased selling price)} &= 10 + 4.5 + \frac{10 \times 4.5}{100} \\ &= 14.5 + 0.45 \\ &= 14.95 \approx 15\% \end{aligned}$$

54. The wholesaler has 1200 radios priced at (cost price) \$18 each.

Thus, total cost price = \$ (1200 × 18) = \$21600.

Number of radios sold at \$30 each = 60% of 1200 = $\frac{60}{100} \times 1200 = 720$.

Thus, selling price of these 720 radios = \$ (720 × 30) = \$21600.

Number of radios sold at \$15 each = 1200 - 720 = 480.

Thus, selling price of these 480 radios = \$ (480 × 15) = \$7200.

Thus, total selling price of the 1200 radios = \$ (21600 + 7200) = \$28800.

Thus, profit made by selling the 1200 radios = \$ (28800 – 21600) = \$7200.

Thus, average profit made per radio = \$ $\left(\frac{7200}{1200}\right)$ = \$6.

The correct answer is option E.

Alternate Approach:

The wholesaler sold 60% of the radios each at a profit of \$ (30 – 18) = \$12.

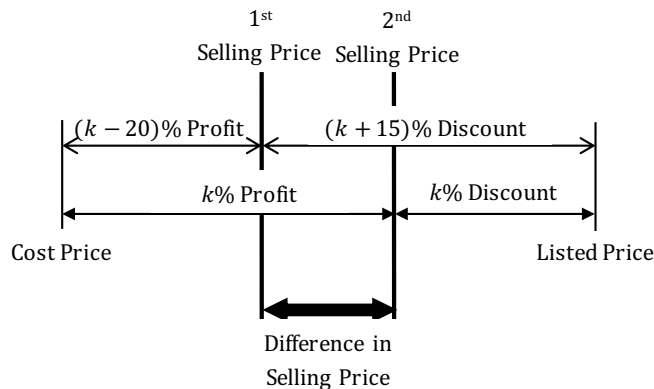
He sold the remaining 40% of the radios each at a loss of \$ (18 – 15) = \$3.

Thus, his average profit per radio = \$ $\left(12 \times \frac{60}{100} + (-3) \times \frac{40}{100}\right)$

= \$ (7.2 – 1.2)

= \$6

55. Let us understand the problem using the diagram shown below:



Let us calculate the difference in the two selling prices:

Since in the first case, the profit was $k\%$ and in the second, the profit was $(k - 20)\%$, the difference in selling price

= $(k - (k - 20))\%$ of Cost Price

= 20% of Cost price ... (i)

(Since percent profit is calculated on the cost price)

Again, in the first case, the discount was $k\%$ and in the second, the discount was $(k + 15)\%$, the difference in selling price

$$= ((k + 15) - k) \% \text{ of Listed Price}$$

$$= 15\% \text{ of Listed price ... (ii)}$$

(Since percent discount is calculated on the listed price)

Thus, from (i) and (ii), we have:

$$20\% \text{ of Cost price} = 15\% \text{ of Listed price}$$

$$\Rightarrow \frac{\text{Listed price}}{\text{Cost price}} = \frac{20}{15} = \frac{4}{3}$$

Thus, if no discount were offered (the listed price becomes the selling price), percent profit

$$= \left(\frac{\text{Listed price} - \text{Cost price}}{\text{Cost price}} \right) \times 100$$

$$= \left(\frac{\text{Listed price}}{\text{Cost price}} - 1 \right) \times 100$$

$$= \left(\frac{4}{3} - 1 \right) \times 100$$

$$= 33.3\%$$

The correct answer is option D.

5.4 Averages

$$56. \text{ Number of teachers} = \frac{\text{Total annual salaries}}{\text{Average annual salaries}} = \frac{6760000}{52000} = 130$$

$$\Rightarrow \text{Number of students} = \frac{11}{1} \times 130 = 1430$$

The correct answer is option D.

57. Let the number of male and female members be m and f respectively.

Total tickets sold to the male members = $96m$.

Total tickets sold to the female members = $84f$.

Thus, total tickets sold = $(96m + 84f)$.

Thus, average number of tickets sold per member

$$= \left(\frac{\text{Total number of tickets sold}}{\text{Total number of people}} \right) = \left(\frac{96m + 84f}{m + f} \right).$$

Thus, we have:

$$\left(\frac{96m + 84f}{m + f} \right) = 92$$

$$\Rightarrow 96m + 84f = 92m + 92f$$

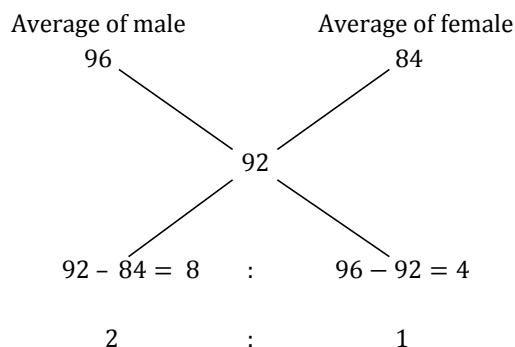
$$\Rightarrow 4m = 8f$$

$$\Rightarrow \frac{m}{f} = \frac{8}{4} = \frac{2}{1}$$

The correct answer is option D.

Alternate Approach:

We can solve the problem by the method of allegation:



58. It is given that the total number of students = 40.

Let the number of students in section A = n .

Thus, the number of students in section B = $(40 - n)$.

Total score of all students in the two sections combined = $92n + 84(40 - n)$.

Thus, average score considering all students

$$= \frac{\text{Total Score}}{\text{Total number of people}} = \frac{92n + 84(40 - n)}{40}$$

Thus, we have:

$$\frac{(92n + 84(40 - n))}{40} = 89$$

$$\Rightarrow 92n + 3360 - 84n = 3560$$

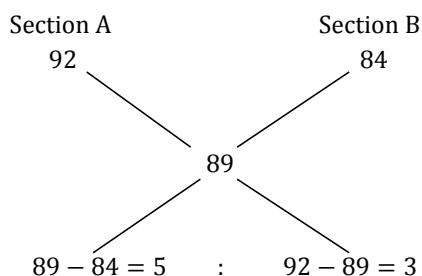
$$\Rightarrow 8n = 200$$

$$\Rightarrow n = 25$$

The correct answer is option E.

Alternate Approach:

We can solve this using the method of allegation as shown below:



Thus, ratio of the number of students in section A to that in section B = 5 : 3.

Thus, number of students in section A = $\left(\frac{5}{5 + 3}\right) \times 40 = 25$.

59. The grocer has 400 pounds of 20% decaffeinated coffee and 100 pounds of 60% decaffeinated coffee.

Thus, the grocer has $(400 + 100) = 500$ pounds of coffee.

Amount of decaffeinated coffee in the first stock = 20% of 400 = 80 pounds.

Amount of decaffeinated coffee in the second stock = 60% of 100 = 60 pounds.

Thus, the total amount of decaffeinated coffee = $80 + 60 = 140$ pounds.

Thus, the percent of decaffeinated coffee in the entire stock

$$= \frac{140}{500} \times 100$$

$$= 28\%.$$

The correct answer is option A.

Alternate Approach:

The required percent is the weighted average of the percentages of the above two stocks

$$= \left(\frac{\left(400 \times \frac{20}{100} \right) + \left(100 \times \frac{60}{100} \right)}{400 + 100} \right) \times 100$$

$$= \left(\frac{80 + 60}{500} \right) \times 100$$

$$= 28\%.$$

60. Let the number of students in the sections P, Q, R and S be p, q, r and s , respectively.

Thus, the average weight of all students together in the four sections

$$= \left(\frac{\text{Total weight of all the students combined}}{\text{Total number of students}} \right)$$

$$= \left(\frac{45 \times p + 50 \times q + 55 \times r + 65 \times s}{p + q + r + s} \right) \text{ lb.}$$

Thus, we have:

$$\left(\frac{45 \times p + 50 \times q + 55 \times r + 65 \times s}{p + q + r + s} \right) = 55$$

$$\Rightarrow 45p + 50q + 55r + 65s = 55p + 55q + 55r + 55s$$

$$\Rightarrow 10p + 5q = 10s$$

$$\Rightarrow 2p + q = 2s$$

Since we need to maximize r , we need to find the minimum possible values of p, q and s so that the above equation holds true.

Since the RHS is $2s$, it is even.

Also, in the LHS, $2p$ is even.

Thus, q must be even.

Since the smallest even number that we can consider for q is 2, as we have at least one student in each section. Thus, we have: $q = 2$.

Thus, the equation gets modified to:

$$2p + 2 = 2s$$

$$\Rightarrow p + 1 = s$$

Thus, we use the minimum possible values: $p = 1, s = 2$.

Thus, we have: $p = 1, q = 2$ and $s = 2$.

Since there are a total of 40 students in all sections combined, the maximum value of students in section R = $r = 40 - (p + q + s)$

$$= 40 - 5 = 35$$

The correct answer is option D.

61. Number of terms in the set $S = (2n + 1)$.

Since the set starts with an odd number and ends with an odd number, number of odd terms is one more than the number of even terms.

Thus, the number of even terms = n

The number of odd terms = $(n + 1)$

We know that the sum (M) of p terms of an arithmetic progression having first term as a and common difference as d is given by:

$$M = \frac{p}{2} (2a + (p - 1) \times d)$$

As X is the average of the odd integers in set S and Y is the average of the even integers in set S , we have:

$$X = \frac{(1 + 3 + 5 + \dots + (2n + 1))}{n + 1} = \frac{\left(\frac{n + 1}{2}\right) \times (2 \times 1 + ((n + 1) - 1) \times 2)}{n + 1} = n + 1$$

$$Y = \frac{(2 + 4 + \dots + 2n)}{n} = \frac{2 \times (1 + 2 + \dots + n)}{n} = \frac{2 \times \left(\frac{n(n + 1)}{2}\right)}{n} = n + 1$$

Thus, we have:

$$X - Y = (n + 1) - (n + 1) = 0$$

The correct answer is option A.

Alternate Approach:

Since there is no restriction on n , let us try to find $(X - Y)$ using a few values of n .

If $n = 1$:

$$S = \{1, 2, 3\}$$

$$X = \frac{1+3}{2} = 2$$

$$Y = 2$$

$$\Rightarrow X - Y = 0$$

Again, if $n = 2$:

$$S = \{1, 2, 3, 4, 5\}$$

$$X = \frac{1+3+5}{3} = 3$$

$$Y = \frac{2+4}{2} = 3$$

$$\Rightarrow X - Y = 0$$

Since $(X - Y) = 0$ for both $n = 1$ and $n = 2$, we can say that the value of $(X - Y)$ would be the same for all values of n , as we have a definite answer among the given answer options.

62. Let the seven numbers be: a, b, c, d, e, f and g .

Thus, we have:

$$\frac{a + b + c + d + e + f + g}{7} = 20$$

$$\Rightarrow a + b + c + d + e + f + g = 140 \dots (i)$$

Since the average of the first four numbers is 19, we have:

$$\frac{a + b + c + d}{4} = 19$$

$$\Rightarrow a + b + c + d = 76 \dots (ii)$$

Since the average of the last four numbers is 24, we have:

$$\frac{d + e + f + g}{4} = 24$$

$$\Rightarrow d + e + f + g = 96 \dots (\text{iii})$$

Adding (ii) and (iii), we have:

$$a + b + c + 2d + e + f + g = 172 \dots (\text{iv})$$

Subtracting (i) from (iv), we have:

$$d = 172 - 140 = 32$$

Thus, the value of the fourth number is 32.

The correct answer is option C.

63. Let the length of each red stick = x inches.

Each red stick is 18 inches less than the average length of the sticks in Box W.

Thus, the average length of sticks in Box W = $(x + 18)$ inches.

Also, each red stick is 6 inches greater than the average length of the sticks in Box V.

Thus, the average length of sticks in Box V = $(x - 6)$ inches.

Thus, the required difference = $((x + 18) - (x - 6)) = 24$ inches.

Note: In this problem, there is a lot of data which has been given to make the question appear complicated. The length of blue sticks is of no consequence. One should carefully read the problem statement and use only the information required to answer the question.

The correct answer is option E.

64. We know that

$$\text{Average salary} = \frac{\# \text{ of emp. of group I} \times \text{Av. sal.} + \# \text{ of emp. of group II} \times \text{Av. sal.} + \# \text{ of emp. of group III} \times \text{Av. sal.}}{\text{Total number of employees}}$$

$$\Rightarrow \text{Average salary} = \$ \left(\frac{10 \times 30000 + 30 \times 40000 + 20 \times 60000}{60} \right)$$

$$= \$45000$$

The correct answer is option C.

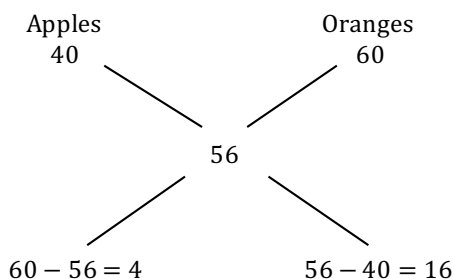
65. Let us use the method of alligation to solve this problem:

Total number of apples and oranges bought = 10.

Price of each apple = 40 cents.

Price of each orange = 60 cents.

Average price of all 10 fruits = 56 cents.



Thus, ratio of the number of apples and the number of oranges = 4 : 16 = 1 : 4.

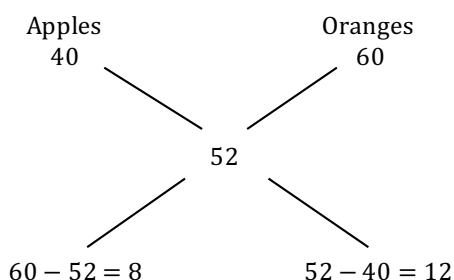
Since total fruits purchased are 10, we have:

$$\text{Number of apples} = \left(\left(\frac{1}{1+4} \right) \times 10 \right) = 2$$

$$\text{Number of oranges} = \left(\left(\frac{4}{1+4} \right) \times 10 \right) = 8$$

We now need to find the number of oranges required to be returned so that the average price falls to 52 cents.

So the situation is this,



Thus, ratio of the number of apples and the number of oranges now = 8 : 12 = 2 : 3.

Since the number of apples remains the same from the initial situation (only oranges are returned) and we had obtained 2 apples, here too, the number of apples should be 2.

Thus, the number of oranges must be 3 (since the ratio of apples to oranges = 2 : 3).

Since initially, there were 8 oranges, number of oranges returned = 8 - 3 = 5.

Alternate Approach I:

Average amount spent for 10 fruits (apples and oranges) = 56 cents.

Total amount spent for 10 fruits = $56 \times 10 = 560$ cents.

Let us assume that Mary returned x oranges so that the average amount spent is 52 cents.

Thus, total amount spent for $(10 - x)$ fruits = $52 \times (10 - x)$ cents.

Thus, price of x oranges returned = $(560 - 52 \times (10 - x))$ cents.

Since the price of one orange is 60 cents, we have:

$$60 = \frac{560 - 52 \times (10 - x)}{x}$$

$$\Rightarrow 60x = 560 - 520 + 52x$$

$$\Rightarrow x = 5$$

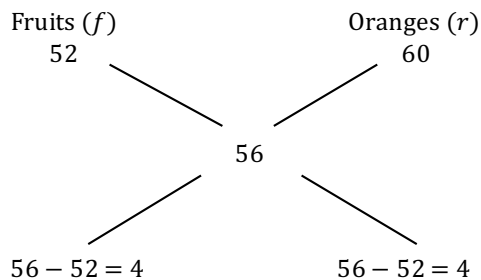
Alternate Approach II:

The average price of 10 fruits was 56 cents and after returning some oranges, say x , the average of $(10 - x)$ fruits became 52 cents.

Alternately, we can say that:

The average price of some fruits, say f , was 52 cents and after adding some oranges, say r (at 60 cents each), the average of $(f + r = 10)$ fruits became 56 cents.

Thus, by alligation method:



Thus, we have:

$$f : r = 1 : 1$$

However, we know that:

$$f + r = 10$$

$$\Rightarrow f = r = \left(\frac{1}{1+1} \times 10 \right) = 5$$

Thus, the number of oranges returned is 5.

Alternate Approach III:

We infer the same conclusion as in the previous approach:

The average price of some fruits, say f , was 52 cents and after adding some oranges say r (at 60 cents each), the average of $(f + r = 10)$ fruits became 56 cents.

Thus, the price of each of the f fruits increased by $(56 - 52) = 4$ cents, resulting in a total increase of $4 \times f = 4f$ cents.

Also, the price of each of the r oranges reduced by $(60 - 56) = 4$ cents resulting in a total increase of $4 \times r = 4r$ cents.

The increase of $4f$ cents came at the expense of the reduction of $4r$ cents, implying:

$$4r = 4f$$

$$\Rightarrow r = f$$

But, we have:

$$f + r = 10$$

$$\Rightarrow f = r = \left(\frac{1}{1+1} \times 10 \right) = 5$$

Thus, the number of oranges returned is 5.

The correct answer is option E.

66. We know that the student's average score on four tests is 78.

Thus, his total score on the four tests $= 4 \times 78 = 312$.

Let the score on the 5th test be n .

Thus, his total score on the five tests $= (312 + n)$.

Thus, his average on the 5 tests $= \left(\frac{312 + n}{5} \right)$.

We know that:

The final average increases from the average on 4 tests by an integer

$$\Rightarrow \left(\frac{312 + n}{5} - 78 \right) \text{ is an integer}$$

$$\Rightarrow \left(\frac{312 + n - 390}{5} \right) \text{ is an integer}$$

$$\Rightarrow \left(\frac{n - 78}{5} \right) \text{ is an integer}$$

$$\Rightarrow (n - 78) \text{ is divisible by 5}$$

Working with the options, we see that only option D, i.e. $n = 93$ satisfies since $(93 - 78) = 15$ is divisible by 5.

The correct answer is option D.

67. We know that the ratio of the numbers of students in classes A, B and C was 4 : 6 : 5, respectively.

Let the number of students in classes A, B and C be $4x$, $6x$ and $5x$, respectively, where x is a constant of proportionality.

We know that the average scores for the classes A, B and C were 65, 80, and 77, respectively.

Thus, the average score for the three classes combined

$$= \left(\frac{65 \times 4x + 80 \times 6x + 77 \times 5x}{4x + 6x + 5x} \right)$$

$$= \left(\frac{260x + 480x + 385x}{15x} \right)$$

$$= \left(\frac{1125x}{15x} \right)$$

$$= 75$$

Note: Instead of number of students as $4x$, $6x$ and $5x$, the answer will be the same if we consider the number of students as 4, 5 and 6.

The correct answer is option B.

Alternate Approach:

Let us solve the problem using the concept of assumed mean (deviation method).

We know that the ratio of the numbers of students in the classes A, B and C was 4 : 6 : 5, respectively.

Let the number of students in classes A, B and C be $4x$, $6x$ and $5x$, respectively, where x is a constant of proportionality.

We know that the average scores for the classes A, B and C were 65, 80, and 77, respectively.

Let the assumed mean score for the three classes combined = 65.

Thus, the effective scores are: $(65 - 65) = 0$, $(80 - 65) = 15$ and $(77 - 65) = 12$

Thus, we have the average as:

$$\begin{aligned} & \left(\frac{0 \times 4x + 15 \times 6x + 12 \times 5x}{4x + 6x + 5x} \right) \\ &= \left(\frac{150x}{15x} \right) \\ &= 10 \end{aligned}$$

Thus, the actual average = $10 + 65 = 75$.

Note: This approach leads to lesser calculations than the previous approach.

68. We know that there are 22 men and 26 women.

Thus, the total number of people = $22 + 26 = 48$.

As the average of all 48 people is 35 years, sum of their ages = $35 \times 48 = 1680$

As the average of 22 men is 38 years, sum of their ages = $38 \times 22 = 836$

Thus, the sum of the ages of 26 women = $1680 - 836 = 844$

Thus, the average age of these 26 women = $\frac{844}{26} = 32.45 \cong 32.5$

Alternate Approach I:

Let the average age of the women be x years.

Thus, the total age of all the women = $26x$ years.

Also, the total age of all the men = $22 \times 38 = 836$ years.

Thus, average age of all the people = $\left(\frac{836 + 26x}{48} \right)$ years.

Since the above average is given as 35 years, we have:

$$\frac{836 + 26x}{48} = 35$$

$$\Rightarrow 836 + 26x = 35 \times 48$$

$$\Rightarrow 26x = 1680 - 836$$

$$\Rightarrow x = 32.46 \approx 32.5$$

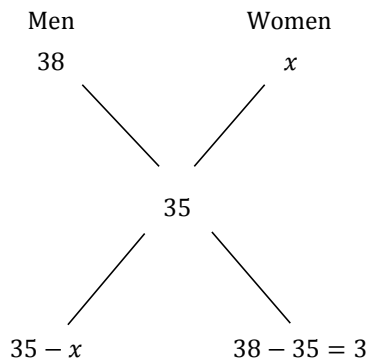
Alternate Approach II:

Here we know that the average age of 48 people = 35 years.

The average age of 22 men = 38

Let us consider the average age of the remaining 26 women = x years.

By the method of alligation:



Thus, we have:

$$\frac{35-x}{3} = \frac{22}{26} = \frac{11}{13}$$

$$\Rightarrow 13(35-x) = 11 \times 3$$

$$\Rightarrow 455 - 13x = 33$$

$$\Rightarrow 422 = 13x$$

$$x = 32.46 \approx 32.5 \text{ years.}$$

Alternate Approach III:

According to the data, we have:

Average age of 22 men is 38 years and the average age of all 48 people is 35 years.

Let us reduce the above averages by 35.

Thus, the modified data is:

Average age of 22 men is 3 years and the average age of all 48 people is 0 years.

Let, in the above situation, the average age of the 26 women be a years.

Thus, we have:

$$\frac{22 \times 3 + 26a}{48} = 0$$

$$\Rightarrow 66a + 26a = 0$$

$$\Rightarrow a = -\frac{66}{26} = -\frac{33}{13} \approx -2.5$$

To get the actual average age of the women, we must add 35 (which we had subtracted initially).

Thus, the actual average age of the women = $(-2.5) + 35 = 32.5$

Although practically, above approach is not preferred one, for the sake of understanding, you must learn it.

The correct answer is option D.

69. This question is crafted to acknowledge the importance of Alternate Approach 3. While other approaches will certainly consume more time, Alternate Approach 3 would excel.

According to the data, we have:

Average age of 22 men is 69.74 years and the average age of all 48 people is 66.74 years.

Let us reduce the above averages by 66.74

Thus, the modified data is:

Average age of 22 men is 3 years and the average age of all 48 people is 0 years.

Let, in the above situation, the average age of the 26 women be a years.

Thus, we have:

$$\frac{22 \times 3 + 26a}{48} = 0$$

$$\Rightarrow 66a + 26a = 0$$

$$\Rightarrow a = -\frac{66}{26} = -\frac{33}{13} \approx -2.5$$

To get the actual average age of the women, we must add 66.74 (which we had subtracted initially).

Thus, the actual average age of the women = $(-2.5) + 66.74 = 64.24$

The correct answer is option C.

5.5 Ratio & Proportion

70. The expense on rent = \$250.

The total expense for 10 guests = \$650.

Thus, the variable component of the total expense for 10 guests = \$ (650 – 250) = \$400.

Thus, variable expense per guest = $\$ \frac{400}{10} = \40 .

Thus, the variable component of the total expense for 20 guests = \$ (40 × 20) = \$800.

The total expense for 20 guests = \$ (250 + 800) = \$1050.

The correct answer is option C.

71. We know that the glass was filled with 10 ounces of water and spirit mixture with the components in the ratio 2 : 3 respectively.

Initial quantity of water = $\left(\frac{2}{2+3}\right) \times 10 = 4$ ounces.

Initial quantity of spirit = $\left(\frac{3}{2+3}\right) \times 10 = 6$ ounces.

Amount of water evaporated per day = 1% of 4 = 0.04 ounces.

Thus, total amount of water evaporated in 20 days = $0.04 \times 20 = 0.8$ ounces.

Amount of spirit evaporated per day = 3% of 6 = 0.18 ounces.

Thus, total amount of spirit evaporated in 20 days = $0.18 \times 20 = 3.6$ ounces.

Thus, total quantity of mixture evaporated in 20 days = $3.6 + 0.8 = 4.4$ ounces.

Thus, the percent of the original amount of mixture evaporated

$$\begin{aligned} &= \frac{4.4}{10} \times 100 \\ &= 44\%. \end{aligned}$$

The correct answer is option C.

72. Fraction of total stamps that are Canadian = $\frac{4}{5} \dots$ (i)

Thus, fraction of total stamps that are not Canadian = $1 - \frac{4}{5} = \frac{1}{5} \dots$ (ii)

Fraction of Canadian stamps issued before 1940 = $\frac{3}{7}$

Thus, fraction of Canadian stamps issued in 1940 or later = $1 - \frac{3}{7} = \frac{4}{7} \dots$ (iii)

Thus, from (i) and (iii), we have:

Fraction of total stamps that are Canadian and issued in 1940 or later

$$= \frac{4}{5} \times \frac{4}{7} = \frac{16}{35}$$

Thus, we have:

$\frac{16}{35}$ of the total stamps = 192

$$\Rightarrow \text{Total stamps} = 192 \times \frac{35}{16} = 12 \times 35 = 420$$

Thus, from (ii):

$$\text{Number of stamps not Canadian} = 420 \times \frac{1}{5} = 84$$

The correct answer is option A.

73. We know that, for a ratio $0 < \frac{x}{y} < 1$, if k is a positive number:

- $0 < \frac{x}{y} < \left(\frac{x+k}{y+k}\right) < 1 \dots$ (i)
- $0 < \left(\frac{x-k}{y-k}\right) < \frac{x}{y} < 1 \dots$ (ii)

Also, for a ratio $\frac{x}{y} > 1$, if k is a positive number:

- $1 < \left(\frac{x+k}{y+k}\right) < \frac{x}{y} \dots$ (iii)
- $1 < \frac{x}{y} < \left(\frac{x-k}{y-k}\right) \dots$ (iv)

In the above problem, we have:

The given ratio of ages of A and B = $\frac{7}{11}$ (< 1) ≈ 0.63

Thus, after 5 years, both their ages would increase by 5.

Hence, the final ratio must be greater than $\frac{7}{11}$ (from relation (i) above).

Working with the options, we have:

Option A:

$$\frac{1}{3} = 0.3 < 0.63 - \text{Does not satisfy}$$

Option B:

$$\frac{9}{20} = 0.45 < 0.63 - \text{Does not satisfy}$$

Option C:

$$\frac{4}{15} = 0.26 < 0.63 - \text{Does not satisfy}$$

Option D:

$$\frac{3}{5} = 0.6 < 0.63 - \text{Does not satisfy}$$

Option E:

$$\frac{2}{3} = 0.66 > 0.63 - \text{Satisfies}$$

The correct answer is option E.

74. Since the problem asks us to find a fraction value, we can assume any suitable value of the total number of stereos and the time taken to produce a basic stereo, since the initial value does not affect the final answer.

Let the total number of stereos be 3.

$$\text{Thus, the number of basic stereos} = \frac{2}{3} \times 3 = 2.$$

$$\text{Number of deluxe stereos} = 3 - 2 = 1.$$

Let the time taken to produce a basic stereo = 5 hours.

$$\text{Thus, the time taken to produce a deluxe stereo} = \frac{7}{5} \times 5 = 7 \text{ hours.}$$

$$\text{Thus, total time taken to produce deluxe stereos} = 1 \times 7 = 7 \text{ hours.}$$

$$\text{Total time taken to produce basic stereos} = 2 \times 5 = 10 \text{ hours.}$$

$$\text{Thus, total time taken to produce all the stereos} = 7 + 10 = 17 \text{ hours.}$$

$$\text{Thus, the required fraction} = \frac{7}{17}$$

The correct answer is option A.

75. We have:

$$\frac{\text{Number of second graders}}{\text{Number of fourth graders}} = \frac{8}{5} \dots (i)$$

$$\frac{\text{Number of first graders}}{\text{Number of second graders}} = \frac{3}{4} \dots (ii)$$

$$\frac{\text{Number of third graders}}{\text{Number of fourth graders}} = \frac{3}{2} ; \text{taking reciprocal on both the sides:}$$

$$\Rightarrow \frac{\text{Number of fourth graders}}{\text{Number of third graders}} = \frac{2}{3} \dots (iii)$$

Thus, from the above three equations, we have:

$$\begin{aligned} & \frac{\text{Number of first graders}}{\text{Number of third graders}} \\ &= \left(\frac{\text{Number of first graders}}{\text{Number of second graders}} \right) \times \left(\frac{\text{Number of second graders}}{\text{Number of fourth graders}} \right) \times \left(\frac{\text{Number of fourth graders}}{\text{Number of third graders}} \right) \\ &= \frac{3}{4} \times \frac{8}{5} \times \frac{2}{3} \\ &= \frac{4}{5} \end{aligned}$$

The correct answer is option D.

76. Since the question asks about a fraction value, we can choose any suitable initial value of the total number of attendees for ease of calculation, since the initial value will not affect the final answer.

Let the number of attendees = 100.

Thus, the number of male attendees = $\frac{2}{5} \times 100 = 40$.

Number of female attendees = $100 - 40 = 60$.

Fraction of male attendees who arrived on time = $\frac{7}{8}$

Thus, the fraction of male attendees who did not arrive on time = $\left(1 - \frac{7}{8}\right) = \frac{1}{8}$

Thus, the number of male attendees who did not arrive on time = $\frac{1}{8} \times 40 = 5$.

Fraction of female attendees who arrived on time = $\frac{9}{10}$

Thus, the fraction of female attendees who did not arrive on time = $\left(1 - \frac{9}{10}\right) = \frac{1}{10}$

Thus, the number of female attendees who did not arrive on time = $\frac{1}{10} \times 60 = 6$.

Thus, total number of employees who did not arrive on time = $5 + 6 = 11$.

Thus, the required fraction = $\frac{5}{11}$

The correct answer is option E.

77. Total amount to be paid = \$45.

Amount paid by Carol = \$17.

Thus, the amount paid by Ann and Judy = \$ $(45 - 17) = \$28$.

We know that Ann paid $\left(\frac{2}{5}\right)^{\text{th}}$ of what Judy paid.

Thus, ratio of the amounts paid by Ann and Judy = 2 : 5

Thus, we need to divide \$28 in the ratio 2 : 5

Thus, amount paid by Judy

$$\begin{aligned} &= \$ \left(\frac{5}{2+5} \times 28 \right) \\ &= \$20 \end{aligned}$$

Thus, fraction of the total amount paid by Judy

$$\begin{aligned} &= \frac{20}{45} \\ &= \frac{4}{9} \end{aligned}$$

The correct answer is option E.

78. Total number of trucks and cars = n .

We know that the ratio of the number of cars and the number of trucks = 1 : 4

Thus, the number of trucks

$$\begin{aligned} &= \left(\frac{4}{4+1} \right) \times n \\ &= \frac{4n}{5} \end{aligned}$$

Thus, the number of pickup trucks = $\left(\frac{2}{3}\right)^{\text{th}}$ of the number of trucks

$$= \frac{2}{3} \times \frac{4n}{5}$$

$$= \frac{8n}{15}$$

The correct answer is option D.

- 79.** Total weight of the wire = 20 pounds.

We know that the weight (w) of each piece is directly proportional to the square of its length (l).

Weight of the first piece (w_1) which is 36 feet long (l_1) = 16 pounds.

Thus, weight of the other piece (w_2) = $20 - 16 = 4$ pounds.

Thus, we have:

$$w \propto l^2$$

$$\Rightarrow \frac{w_1}{w_2} = \frac{(l_1)^2}{(l_2)^2}$$

$$\Rightarrow \frac{16}{4} = \frac{36^2}{(l_2)^2}$$

$$\Rightarrow (l_2)^2 = 36^2 \times \left(\frac{4}{16}\right)$$

$$\Rightarrow (l_2)^2 = \frac{36^2}{4}$$

$$\Rightarrow (l_2)^2 = \left(\frac{36}{2}\right)^2$$

$$\Rightarrow (l_2)^2 = 18^2$$

$$\Rightarrow (l_2)^2 = 18$$

Thus, the length of the second piece = 18 feet.

The correct answer is option C.

- 80.** We know that the ratio of shares of John to that of Bob = 5 : 3

Let John's and Bob's share be $\$(5x)$ and $\$(3x)$, respectively, where x is a constant of proportionality.

Thus, the total sum of money = \$ $(5x + 3x) = \$8x$.

Since John's share exceeded $\left(\frac{5}{9}\right)^{\text{th}}$ of the total sum of money by \$50, we have:

$$5x = \frac{5}{9}(8x) + 50$$

$$\Rightarrow 45x = 40x + 450$$

$$\Rightarrow x = 90$$

Thus, Bob's share

$$= \$ (3x) = \$ (3 \times 90) = \$270.$$

The correct answer is option B.

- 81.** Total expenses = \$18000

$$\text{Fuel and maintenance costs} = \$ \left(\frac{1}{3} \times 18000 \right) = \$6000.$$

$$\text{Depreciation} = \$ \left(\frac{3}{5} \times (18000 - 6000) \right) = \$7200.$$

$$\text{Total cost of insurance and financing} = \$ \left(\frac{1}{5} \times 18000 \right) = \$3600.$$

Since cost of insurance was 3 times the cost of financing, we have:

$$\text{Cost of financing} = \$ \left(\frac{1}{3+1} \times 3600 \right) = \$900.$$

$$\text{Total cost accounted for} = \$ (6000 + 7200 + 3600) = \$16800.$$

$$\text{Thus, cost of taxes and license fees} = \$ (18000 - 16800) = \$1200.$$

Thus, the amount by which the cost of financing is **less** than the cost of taxes and license fees

$$= \$ (1200 - 900) = \$300.$$

The correct answer is option D.

- 82.** Let the number of points for the 1st question = x .

We know that each question is worth 4 points more than the preceding question.

Thus, the worth of each question in points for the 10 questions forms an arithmetic progression with the first term as x and a constant difference between consecutive terms of 4.

The n^{th} term in arithmetic progression = $A + (n - 1) \times d$; (A is the first term, and d is the constant difference between consecutive terms)

Thus, the number of points for the 10th question = $x + (10 - 1) \times 4 = (x + 36)$.

Since the points for the above questions have a constant difference, the average points per question

$$\begin{aligned}
 &= \left(\frac{\text{First term} + \text{Last term}}{2} \right) \\
 &= \frac{x + (x + 36)}{2} \\
 &= (x + 18)
 \end{aligned}$$

Thus, the total points for all 10 questions = $10 \times (x + 18)$.

Thus, we have:

$$10(x + 18) = 360$$

$$\Rightarrow x = 18$$

Thus, the number of points for the 3rd question = $x + (3 - 1) \times 4 = 18 + 8 = 26$.

The correct answer is option C.

83. Let the number of students in the school = x .

Thus, number of students taking a science course = $\left(40 + \frac{x}{3}\right)$.

Thus, the number of students taking physics = $\frac{1}{4} \left(40 + \frac{x}{3}\right)$.

Since $\left(\frac{1}{8}\right)^{\text{th}}$ of the students are taking physics, we have:

$$\begin{aligned}
 \frac{1}{4} \left(40 + \frac{x}{3}\right) &= \frac{x}{8} \\
 \Rightarrow 40 + \frac{x}{3} &= \frac{x}{2} \\
 \Rightarrow \frac{x}{2} - \frac{x}{3} &= 40 \\
 \Rightarrow \frac{x}{6} &= 40 \\
 \Rightarrow x &= 240
 \end{aligned}$$

The correct answer is option A.

84. We know that $\left(\frac{1}{3}\right)^{\text{rd}}$ of the boys and $\left(\frac{1}{4}\right)^{\text{th}}$ of the girls walk to school.

Also, as a fraction, $\frac{1}{3} > \frac{1}{4}$

Thus, we would have the greatest number of students who walk to school, if the number of boys was the maximum possible.

Since $\left(\frac{1}{4}\right)^{\text{th}}$ of the girls walk to school, the number of girls must be a multiple of 4.

Also, since $\left(\frac{1}{3}\right)^{\text{rd}}$ of the boys walk to school, the number of boys must be a multiple of 3.

Since the number of boys must be the maximum possible, let us work with some values:

- Let the number of boys = 33 (largest number divisible by 3 but less than 36).
Thus, the number of girls = $36 - 33 = 3$ (not divisible by 4) – **Not possible**.
- Let the number of boys = 30.
Thus, the number of girls = $36 - 30 = 6$ (not divisible by 4) – **Not possible**.
- Let the number of boys = 27.
Thus, the number of girls = $36 - 27 = 9$ (not divisible by 4) – **Not possible**.
- Let the number of boys = 24.
Thus, the number of girls = $36 - 24 = 12$ (divisible by 4) – **Possible**.

Thus, to maximize the number of students who walk to school, we must have the number of boys as 24 and the number of girls as 12.

Thus, the number of boys who walk to school = $24 \times \frac{1}{3} = 8$.

The number of girls who walk to school = $12 \times \frac{1}{4} = 3$.

Thus, the number (maximum) of students who walk to school = $8 + 3 = 11$.

Alternate Approach:

Let the number of boys = x .

Thus, the number of girls = $(36 - x)$.

Thus, the number of students who walk to school

$$= \frac{x}{3} + \frac{36 - x}{4}$$

$$\begin{aligned}
 &= \frac{4x + 3(36 - x)}{12} \\
 &= \frac{x + 108}{12} \\
 &= \frac{x}{12} + 9
 \end{aligned}$$

Thus, to maximize the above value, we must have the largest possible value of x .

Also, since $\frac{x}{12}$ must be an integer, we have to choose $x = 24$ (x cannot be 36, as then there would be no girls at all).

$$\text{Thus, the required maximum value} = \frac{24}{12} + 9 = 11$$

The correct answer is option C.

85. Let T, G and B be the total number of students, the number of girls and the number of boys, respectively

We have:

$$\begin{aligned}
 \frac{1}{4} \times G &= \frac{1}{6} \times T \\
 \Rightarrow G &= \frac{4}{6} \times T \\
 \Rightarrow G &= \frac{2}{3} \times T \\
 \Rightarrow B &= \left(1 - \frac{2}{3}\right) \times T \\
 \Rightarrow B &= \frac{1}{3} \times T \\
 \Rightarrow \frac{B}{G} &= \frac{\frac{1}{3} \times T}{\frac{2}{3} \times T} \\
 \Rightarrow \frac{B}{G} &= \frac{\frac{1}{3}}{\frac{2}{3}} = \frac{1}{2}
 \end{aligned}$$

$$\text{Thus, the required ratio} = \frac{1}{2}$$

The correct answer is option C.

86. Effectively, we have 30 boxes with an average weight 18 pounds, and we need to include, say, x number of 10-pound boxes so that the average weight of the $(30 + x)$ boxes becomes 16 pounds.

Initial total weight of the 30 boxes = $30 \times 18 = 540$ pounds.

Weight of the extra boxes to be included = $10x$ pounds.

Total weight of the $(30 + x)$ boxes = $(540 + 10x)$ pounds.

Thus, average weight of the $(30 + x)$ boxes = $\left(\frac{540 + 10x}{x + 30}\right)$ pounds.

Thus, we have:

$$\left(\frac{540 + 10x}{x + 30}\right) = 16$$

$$\Rightarrow 540 + 10x = 16x + 480$$

$$\Rightarrow 6x = 60$$

$$\Rightarrow x = 10$$

The correct answer is option C.

- 87.** We have 90 liters of 20% alcohol solution.

Thus, amount of alcohol = 20% of 90

$$\begin{aligned} &= \frac{20}{100} \times 90 \\ &= 18 \text{ liters} \end{aligned}$$

Let x liters of pure alcohol be added.

Thus, the final amount of alcohol = $(x + 18)$ liters.

Total volume of the solution = $(x + 90)$ liters.

Since the final concentration of alcohol is 25%, we have:

$$\frac{x + 18}{x + 90} \times 100 = 25$$

$$\Rightarrow \frac{x + 18}{x + 90} = \frac{25}{100} = \frac{1}{4}$$

$$\Rightarrow 4x + 72 = x + 90$$

$$\Rightarrow x = 6$$

The correct answer is option D.

Alternate Approach:

Amount of water in the initial solution = $(100 - 20)\%$ of 90 = 80% of 90 = 72 liters.

Let x liters of pure alcohol be added.

Total volume of the solution = $(x + 90)$ liters.

Final concentration of water = $(100 - 25)\% = 75\%$

Since water is not added, the quantity of water remains the same, i.e. 72 liters.

Thus, we have:

$$\frac{72}{x + 90} \times 100 = 75$$

$$\Rightarrow \frac{72}{x + 90} = \frac{75}{100} = \frac{3}{4}$$

$$\Rightarrow x + 90 = 96$$

$$\Rightarrow x = 6$$

5.6 Speed, Time, & Distance

88. T_1 = Time required to travel 450 miles with speed $S = \frac{450}{S}$ hours

S is increased by 5 miles; so new speed = $(S + 5)$ mph

$$T_2 = \text{Time required to travel 450 miles with speed } (S + 5) = \frac{450}{S + 5} \text{ hours}$$

Given that the difference between T_1 and T_2 is one hour

$$\Rightarrow \frac{450}{S} - \frac{450}{S + 5} = 1$$

$$\Rightarrow 450 \left(\frac{1}{S} - \frac{1}{S + 5} \right) = 1$$

$$\Rightarrow \frac{S + 5 - S}{S(S + 5)} = \frac{1}{450}$$

$$\Rightarrow 5 \times 450 = S^2 + 5S$$

$$\Rightarrow S^2 + 5S - 2250 = 0$$

Roots of above quadratic equations are '45' and '-50'.

Since speed cannot be negative, -50 is ignored, so $S = 45$ mph.

The correct answer is option C.

89. Car traveled 6 miles less per gallon in city as compared with on highway.

Let's consider if car travels x miles per gallon on highway then car travels $(x - 6)$ miles per gallon in the city.

$$\text{Capacity of the full tank of gasoline on highway} = \frac{462}{x} \text{ gallons}$$

$$\text{Capacity of the full tank of gasoline in the city} = \frac{336}{x - 6} \text{ gallons}$$

Since the above fractions must be equal, we have:

$$\frac{462}{x} = \frac{336}{x - 6}$$

$$\Rightarrow \frac{77}{x} = \frac{56}{x - 6}$$

$$\Rightarrow \frac{11}{x} = \frac{8}{x - 6}$$

$$\Rightarrow 11x - 66 = 8x$$

$$\Rightarrow 3x = 66$$

$$\Rightarrow x = 22$$

As car travels $(x - 6)$ miles per gallon in the city, required answer is $22 - 6 = 16$.

The correct answer is option B.

90. Time required to travel 1 kilometer with speed 75 kilometers per hour

$$= \frac{1}{75} \text{ hours} = \frac{1}{75} \times 60 \times 60 = \frac{240}{5} = 48 \text{ seconds}$$

$$\text{Now new time required} = 48 + 2 = 50 \text{ seconds} = \frac{50}{60 \times 60} \text{ hours.}$$

$$\text{Speed} = \frac{\text{Distance}}{\text{Time}}$$

$$\Rightarrow \frac{1 \text{ Kilometer}}{50 \text{ Seconds}} = \frac{1}{\frac{50}{60 \times 60}} = \frac{3600}{50} = 72 \text{ kilometers per hour}$$

The correct answer is option B.

91. Speed for first 5-minutes interval = 20 miles per hour

Speed for second 5-minutes interval = 25 miles per hour

Speed for third 5-minute interval = 30 miles per hour

$$\text{Distance travelled for third 5-minutes interval} = \frac{30}{60} \times 5 = \frac{5}{2} \text{ miles} = 2.5 \text{ miles}$$

The correct answer is option D.

92. Time taken for the onward journey = $\frac{400}{350} = \frac{8}{7}$ hours.

$$\text{Time taken for the return journey} = \frac{400}{250} = \frac{8}{5} \text{ hours.}$$

$$\text{Thus, total time taken for the round trip} = \frac{8}{7} + \frac{8}{5} = \frac{96}{35} \text{ hours.}$$

$$\text{Total distance travelled} = 2 \times 400 = 800 \text{ miles.}$$

$$\text{Thus, average speed} = \frac{\text{Total distance}}{\text{Total time}} = \frac{800}{\frac{96}{35}} = 800 \times \frac{35}{96} = 100 \times \frac{35}{12} = 100 \times 2.9 = 290 \text{ miles/hr.}$$

The correct answer is option B.

Alternate Approach:

Since the distance travelled for the onward and the return journey is the same, we have:

$$\text{Average speed} = \frac{2 \times \text{Speed}_1 \times \text{Speed}_2}{\text{Speed}_1 + \text{Speed}_2} = \frac{2 \times 350 \times 250}{350 + 250} = \frac{2 \times 350 \times 250}{600} = \frac{35 \times 25}{3} = 290 \text{ miles/hr.}$$

93. Average speed of the driver over the first 20 miles is 50 miles per hour.

$$\text{Thus, time taken to cover the above distance} = \frac{20}{50} = \frac{2}{5} \text{ hours.}$$

Average speed of the driver over the entire 40 miles is 60 miles per hour.

$$\text{Thus, time taken to cover the total distance} = \frac{40}{60} = \frac{2}{3} \text{ hours.}$$

$$\text{Thus, time taken by the driver to cover the last 20 miles} = \frac{2}{3} - \frac{2}{5} = \frac{4}{15} \text{ hours.}$$

$$\text{Thus, average speed of the driver over the last 20 miles} = \frac{\frac{20}{4}}{\frac{4}{15}} = 75 \text{ miles per hour.}$$

The correct answer is option D.

94. Let the hiker's speed on the first day be x miles per hour.

Thus, the hiker's speed on the second day was $(x + 1)$ miles per hour.

Let the time for which the hiker walked on the first day be t hours.

Thus, the time for which the hiker walked on the second day = $(18 - t)$ hours.

Distance covered by the hiker on the first day = $(x \times t)$ miles.

Distance covered by the hiker on the second day = $((x + 1) \times (18 - t))$ miles.

Thus, total distance covered in two days = $(xt + (x + 1)(18 - t))$ miles.

Thus, we have:

$$xt + (x + 1)(18 - t) = 64$$

$$\Rightarrow xt + 18x - xt + 18 - t = 64$$

$$\Rightarrow 18x - t = 46$$

Working with the options one at a time:

- Option A:

$x = 2 \Rightarrow t = -10$ - Not possible, since t cannot be negative

- Option B:

$x = 3 \Rightarrow t = 8$ - Possible

Verifying with the other options:

- Option C:

$x = 4 \Rightarrow t = 26$ - Not possible, since t cannot be greater than the total time of 18 hours

Since with $x = 4$, we get a value of t greater than 18, with the options D and E, where x is even greater, the value of t would be even greater and hence would not be possible.

Thus, we have: $x = 3$

The correct answer is option B.

Alternate Approach:

Average speed of the hiker for the two days = $\left(\frac{\text{Total distance}}{\text{Total time}} \right) = \frac{64}{18} = 3.5$ miles per hour.

If the average speed on the first day be x miles per hour, the average speed on the second day should be $(x + 1)$ miles per hour.

Thus, the average speed of 3.5 miles per hour must lie between the values of the speeds on the two days.

Thus, we have:

$$x < 3.5 < x + 1$$

Among the options, only $x = 3$ satisfies.

95. On seeing this question, one would immediately calculate the time taken to meet using the data given.

From there on, one would try to find the distance between them one hour before.

However, such calculations are not necessary.

The question simply asks us: "If two trains traveling at 30 miles per hour and 40 miles per hour need one hour to meet, how far away are they from one another".

Since both trains travel for one hour before they meet, one train travels $30 \times 1 = 30$ miles and the other train travels $40 \times 1 = 40$ miles.

Thus, together the trains travel $(30 + 40) = 70$ miles before they meet.

Thus, distance between the trains one hour before they meet = 70 miles.

The correct answer is option E.

96. Length of section of the highway = 8 miles.

Original speed limit = 55 miles per hour.

Thus, time taken to cover this distance = $\frac{8}{55}$ hours

New speed limit = 35 miles per hour.

Thus, time taken to cover this distance = $\frac{8}{35}$ hours

Thus, the required difference between the time durations is given = $\left(\frac{8}{35} - \frac{8}{55}\right)$ hours

$$= \frac{8}{5} \left(\frac{1}{7} - \frac{1}{11}\right) \text{ hours}$$

$$= \left(\frac{8}{5} \times \frac{4}{77}\right) \text{ hours}$$

$$= \frac{8}{5} \times \frac{4}{77} \times 60 \text{ minutes}$$

$$\approx 5 \text{ minutes}$$

The correct answer is option A.

97. We know that:

Speed of car Y = 50% more than the speed of car X

=> Speed of car Y = $(100 + 50)\%$ of the speed of car X

=> Speed of car Y = 150% of the speed of car X

$$\Rightarrow (\text{Speed of car Y}) = \frac{150}{100} \times (\text{Speed of car X})$$

$$\Rightarrow (\text{Speed of car Y}) = \frac{3}{2} \times (\text{Speed of car X})$$

$$\Rightarrow \frac{\text{Speed of car Y}}{\text{Speed of car X}} = \frac{3}{2}$$

Since time is inversely proportional to speed for a constant distance, we have:

$$\frac{\text{Time taken by car Y to cover a distance}}{\text{Time taken by car X to cover the same distance}} = \frac{1}{\left(\frac{3}{2}\right)} = \frac{2}{3}$$

We know that car X took 2 hours to cover the distance of 80 miles.

Thus, we have:

$$\frac{\text{Time taken by car Y to cover a distance}}{2} = \frac{2}{3}$$

$$\Rightarrow \text{Time taken by car Y to cover a distance} = 2 \times \frac{2}{3} = \frac{4}{3} = 1\frac{1}{3} \text{ hours}$$

The correct answer is option C.

Alternate Approach:

Car X took 2 hours to travel 80 miles.

Thus, the average speed of car X = 40 miles per hour.

Since the average speed of car Y is 50% more than that of car X, we have:

$$\text{Average speed of car Y} = 40 + 50\% \text{ of } 40 = 40 + \frac{1}{2} \times 40 = 60 \text{ miles per hour.}$$

Thus, time required to travel 80 miles by car Y

$$= \frac{\text{Distance}}{\text{Speed}} = \frac{80}{60} = 1\frac{1}{3} \text{ hours}$$

98. Joe's speed = 36 miles per hour.

Thus, distance covered by Joe in 60 minutes = 36 miles.

$$\text{Thus, distance covered by Joe in 50 minutes} = \frac{36}{60} \times 50 = 30 \text{ miles.}$$

This distance of 30 miles is 5 times of what Bob drives in 40 minutes.

$$\text{Thus, distance covered by Bob in 40 minutes} = \frac{30}{5} = 6 \text{ miles.}$$

$$\text{Thus, distance covered by Bob in 60 minutes} = \frac{6}{40} \times 60 = 9 \text{ miles.}$$

Thus, Bob's speed = 9 miles per hour.

The correct answer is option B.

99. Time taken for the first train to cover the distance between the two stations P & Q = 5 hours.

Time taken for the second train to cover the distance between the two stations P & Q = 3 hours.

Since we need to find the time when the two trains pass one another, the actual length of the distance is not required.

So, we can assume a suitable value of the distance for ease of calculations.

Let the distance between the stations = least common multiple of 5 and 3 = 15 miles.

Thus, speed of the first train = $\frac{15}{5} = 3$ miles/hour.

Speed of the second train = $\frac{15}{3} = 5$ miles/hour.

We know that the first train started one hour earlier than when the second train started.

Thus, in 1 hour, the distance covered by the first train = $3 \times 1 = 3$ miles.

Thus, at 7:00 am, the distance between the two trains = $(15 - 3) = 12$ miles.

At 7:00 am, both trains approach one another at speeds 3 miles/hour and 5 miles/hour.

Thus, when the trains pass one another, the ratio of the distances covered by the trains would be equal to the ratio of their respective speeds = 3 : 5

Thus, distance covered by the first train = $\left(\frac{3}{3+5}\right) \times 12 = 4.5$ miles.

Time taken by the first train to cover 4.5 miles = $\frac{4.5}{3} = 1.5$ hours = 1 hour, 30 minutes.

Alternately, we can use the concept of relative speed:

Since the trains travel in opposite directions, their relative speed = $(3 + 5) = 8$ miles/hour.

Thus, time taken to cover 12 miles = $\frac{12}{8} = 1.5$ hours = 1 hour, 30 minutes.

Thus, the time when the two trains pass one another = 1 hour, 30 minutes past 7:00 am

(since both trains are simultaneously moving towards each other at 7:00am) = 8:30 am.

The correct answer is option C.

5.7 Time & Work

100. Number of units of P produced per hour by the first machine = 1000.

Thus, number of units of P produced per hour by the second machine = 2000

(Since it is twice as efficient as the first machine)

Since the machine works 12 hours a day, number of units produced in a day

$$= 2000 \times 12 = 24000$$

Thus, number of units produced in seven days = $24000 \times 7 = 168000$

The correct answer is option E.

101. According to the given data, the pump filled $\left(\frac{3}{4} - \frac{1}{3}\right) = \left(\frac{5}{12}\right)^{\text{th}}$ of the pool in $1\frac{1}{4} = \frac{5}{4}$ hours

$$\text{Thus, time taken by the pump to fill the entire pool} = \frac{\left(\frac{5}{4}\right)}{\left(\frac{5}{12}\right)} = \frac{5}{4} \times \frac{12}{5} = 3 \text{ hours}$$

Thus, the time taken by this same pump to fill a pool twice as large = $(3 \times 2) = 6$ hours (since time is directly proportional to the quantity of work)

Since the other pump is thrice as efficient, time taken by the new pump to fill the larger tank = $\frac{6}{3} = 2$ hours (since time is inversely proportional to the efficiency)

The correct answer is option A.

102. Let the volume of the tank = LCM (20, 30) = 60 liters.

The first tap can fill the tank in 20 minutes.

Thus, efficiency of the first tap = $\frac{60}{20} = 3$ liters per minute.

The second tap can fill the tank in 30 minutes.

Thus, efficiency of the second tap = $\frac{60}{30} = 2$ liters per minute.

The first tap was open for the entire 15 minutes in which it filled = $15 \times 3 = 45$ liters.

Thus, the remaining $(60 - 45) = 15$ liters were filled by the second tap.

Time taken for the second tap to fill 15 liters = $\frac{15}{2} = 7.5$ minutes.

Thus, of the total 15 minutes, the second tap was open for 7.5 minutes.

Thus, the first tap alone was open for $(15 - 7.5) = 7.5$ minutes.

Thus, $x = 7.5$

The correct answer is option B.

- 103.** The emptying pipe can empty pool which is $\left(\frac{3}{4}\right)^{\text{th}}$ full in 9 hours.

Thus, time taken to empty the entire pool $= 9 \times \frac{4}{3} = 12$ hours.

It is given that capacity of swimming pool is 5760 gallons.

Thus, the rate at which the emptying pipe removes water
 $= \frac{5760}{12} = 480$ gallons per hour.

The rate at which the pool can be filled
 $= 12$ gallons per minute

$= 12 \times 60 = 720$ gallons per hour.

Thus, the effective filling rate when both filling and emptying occur simultaneously
 $= 720 - 480 = 240$ gallons per hour.

Since we need to fill only half the pool, the volume required to be filled
 $= \frac{5760}{2} = 2880$ gallons.

Thus, time required $= \frac{2880}{240} = 12$ hours.

The correct answer is option B.

- 104.** Machine B produces 100 parts of product X in 40 minutes.

Since machine A produces parts twice as fast as machine B does, time taken by machine A to produce 100 parts of product X

$= \frac{40}{2} = 20$ minutes

Since each part of product Y takes $\frac{3}{2}$ times the time taken to produce each part of product X, the time taken by machine A to produce 100 parts of product Y

$= 20 \times \frac{3}{2} = 30$ minutes

Thus, the number of parts of product Y produced by machine A in 30 minutes = 100.

Thus, the number of parts produced in 6 minutes

$$= \frac{100}{30} \times 6 = 20$$

The correct answer is option D.

105. Length of fiber produced by Machine A in 1 hour = $\frac{500}{2}$ feet.

Length of fiber produced by Machine B in 1 hour = $\frac{500}{3}$ feet.

Length of fiber produced by Machine C in 1 hour = $\frac{500}{6}$ feet.

Thus, if all three machines work together, total length of fiber produced in 1 hour

$$= \frac{500}{2} + \frac{500}{3} + \frac{500}{6}$$

$$= 500 \left(\frac{1}{2} + \frac{1}{3} + \frac{1}{6} \right)$$

$$= 500 \text{ feet}$$

Thus, time taken to produce 1000 feet = $\frac{1000}{500} = 2$ hours.

The correct answer is option C.

106. Cost of food consumed by 4 adults in 3 days = \$60

$$\Rightarrow \text{Cost of food consumed by 1 adult in 3 days} = \$ \left(\frac{60}{4} \right) = \$15$$

$$\Rightarrow \text{Cost of food consumed by 1 adult in 1 day} = \$ \left(\frac{15}{3} \right) = \$5$$

We know that one child consumes half the amount of food consumed by an adult.

Thus, 3 children consume food equivalent to $\frac{3}{2}$ adults.

Thus, 6 adults and 3 children are equivalent to $\left(6 + \frac{3}{2} \right) = \frac{15}{2}$ adults.

Thus, cost of food consumed by $\frac{15}{2}$ adults in 1 day = $\$ \left(5 \times \frac{15}{2} \right) = \$ \left(\frac{75}{2} \right)$

$$\Rightarrow \text{Cost of food consumed by } \frac{15}{2} \text{ adults in 4 days} = \$ \left(\frac{75}{2} \times 4 \right) = \$150$$

The correct answer is option B.

107. Let the time taken by Mark and Kate working together = x hours

Thus, time taken by Mark, working alone = $(x + 12)$ hours

Time taken by Kate, working alone = $(x + 27)$ hours

Let us assume the total work to be 1 unit.

Part of work done by Mark and Kate, working together, in 1 hour = $\left(\frac{1}{x}\right)$

Part of work done by Mark in 1 hour = $\left(\frac{1}{x + 12}\right)$

Part of work done by Kate in 1 hour = $\left(\frac{1}{x + 27}\right)$

Thus, we have:

$$\frac{1}{x} = \frac{1}{x + 12} + \frac{1}{x + 27}$$

$$\Rightarrow \frac{1}{x} = \frac{(x + 27) + (x + 12)}{(x + 12)(x + 27)}$$

$$\Rightarrow (x + 12)(x + 27) = x(2x + 39)$$

$$\Rightarrow x^2 + 39x + 324 = 2x^2 + 39x$$

$$\Rightarrow x^2 = 324$$

Since x is positive, we have:

$$x = \sqrt{324} = 18$$

The correct answer is option C.

Alternate Approach:

Work done by Mark and Kate in x hours = Work done by Mark in $(x + 12)$ hours

Cancelling work done by Mark in x hours from both sides:

Work done by Kate in x hours = Work done by Mark in 12 hours

$$\Rightarrow \text{Work done by Kate in 1 hour} = \text{Work done by Mark in } \left(\frac{12}{x}\right) \text{ hours} \dots (i)$$

Again, we have:

Work done by Mark and Kate in x hours = Work done by Kate in $(x + 27)$ hours

Cancelling work done by Kate in x hours from both sides:

Work done by Mark in x hours = Work done by Kate in 27 hours

=> Work done by Kate in 27 hours = Work done by Mark in x hours

=> Work done by Kate in 1 hour = Work done by Mark in $\left(\frac{x}{27}\right)$ hours ... (ii)

Thus, from (i) and (ii), we have:

$$\frac{12}{x} = \frac{x}{27}$$

$$\Rightarrow x^2 = 324$$

$$\Rightarrow x = 18$$

5.8 Computational

108. Amount of liquid leaked out in x hours = k liters.

Thus, the amount of liquid leaked out in 1 hour = $\frac{k}{x}$ liters.

Thus, the amount of liquid leaked out in y hours = $\frac{ky}{x}$ liters.

Cost of 1 liter of the liquid = \$6.

Thus, cost of the liquid leaked out in y hours = $\$ \left(6 \times \frac{ky}{x} \right) = \$ \left(\frac{6ky}{x} \right)$.

The correct answer is option D.

109. We know that: Measurements on the R-scale of 6 and 24 correspond to measurements on the S-scale of 30 and 60, respectively.

$60 - 30 = 30$ divisions of the S-scale equals $24 - 6 = 18$ divisions of the R-scale

Thus, 1 division of the S-scale equals $\frac{18}{30} = \frac{3}{5}$ divisions of the R-scale.

A measurement of 100 on the S-scale corresponds to $100 - 60 = 40$ divisions above the measurement of 60.

Now, 40 divisions of the S-scale equals $\frac{3}{5} \times 40 = 24$ divisions of the R-scale.

Thus, the corresponding measure on the R-scale is 24 divisions above the measurement of 24 (since 60 on the S-scale corresponds to 24 on the R-scale) = $24 + 24 = 48$.

The correct answer is option C.

110. The cost of three hamburgers = $\$ (0.96 \times 3) = \2.88

The cost of two milk shakes = $\$ (1.28 \times 2) = \2.56

Thus, total cost = $\$ (2.88 + 2.56) = \5.44

Thus, Jack has half the above amount = $\$ \left(\frac{5.44}{2} \right) = \2.72

The correct answer is option C.

111. Total increase in population = $378 - 300 = 18$ million

Increase in population per month = 30,000

Thus, increase in population per year = $30,000 \times 12 = 360,000 = 0.36$ million

Thus, number of years required for the increase = $\frac{18}{0.36} = 50$ years

Thus, the population would be 378 million in the year $(2012 + 50) = 2,062$

The correct answer is option C.

112. The restaurant uses $\frac{1}{2}$ cup fruit in each serving of its fruit compote.

Since each can has $3\frac{1}{2} = \frac{7}{2}$ cups of fruit, number of servings of fruit compote possible using one can = $\frac{\left(\frac{7}{2}\right)}{\left(\frac{1}{2}\right)} = 7$

Thus, number of cans required for 60 servings of the fruit compote = $\frac{60}{7} \approx 8.5$

However, the number of cans must be an integer.

Thus, the minimum number of cans required is 9.

The correct answer is option C.

113. We need to minimize the total number of coins such that each pocket has at least 1 coin.

We know that at the most 3 pockets can have the same number of coins.

Since we need to minimize the total number of coins, we must have as many pockets having the same number (minimum possible number, i.e. 1 coin) of coins as possible.

Thus, for each of the 3 pockets containing an equal number of coins, we have 1 coin.

Thus, number of coins in the 3 pockets = $1 \times 3 = 3$.

Since each of the remaining 4 pockets have a different number of coins, let us use 2, 3, 4 and 5 coins for those pockets.

Thus, the total number of coins = $3 + 2 + 3 + 4 + 5 = 17$.

The correct answer is option C.

114. Distance covered by the glacier in 25 days

$$= \frac{1}{4} \text{ mile}$$

$$= \frac{1}{4} \times 5280 \text{ feet} = 1320 \text{ feet.}$$

Number of hours present in 25 days = (25×24) hours.

Thus, time taken by the glacier (in hours) to cover 1 foot

$$= \frac{25 \times 24}{1320}$$

$$= \frac{5 \times 5 \times 24}{11 \times 5 \times 24}$$

$$= \frac{5}{11}$$

The correct answer is option C.

- 115.** Width of the carpeting = 10 feet.

Rate at which the carpeting moves through the dryer

$$= 2160 \text{ feet per hour}$$

$$= \frac{2160}{60 \times 60} \text{ feet per second}$$

$$= 0.6 \text{ feet per second}$$

Thus, area of carpeting that moves through the dryer per second

$$= 0.6 \times 10 \text{ square feet}$$

$$= 6 \text{ square feet}$$

Thus, time taken to move 6 square feet of carpeting through the dryer = 1 second.

Thus, time taken to move 1 square feet of carpeting through the dryer = $\frac{1}{6}$ seconds.

The correct answer is option A.

- 116.** We know that for a salary grade s , the hourly wage p , in dollars, is given by:

$$p = 950 + 0.25(s - 1)$$

Thus, for a salary grade $s = 1$, the corresponding hourly wage p

$$= \$ (950 + 0.25 (1 - 1))$$

$$= \$950$$

Again, for a salary grade $s = 5$, the corresponding hourly wage p

$$= \$ (950 + 0.25 (5 - 1))$$

$$= \$ (950 + 1)$$

$$= \$951$$

Thus, the required difference = $\$ (951 - 950) = \1 .

The correct answer is option B.

117. Considering the radios sold:

We know that the price of a particular radio was the 15th highest price as well as the 20th lowest price among the prices of the radios sold.

Thus, the number of radios sold at a price greater than the price of the particular radio
 $= 15 - 1 = 14$

Also, the number of radios sold at a price lower than the price of the particular radio $= 20 - 1 = 19$

Thus, total number of radios sold $= 14 + 19 + 1$ (including that particular radio) $= 34$

Considering all the items sold:

We know that the price of a particular DVD player was the 29th highest price as well as the 37th lowest price among the prices of all the items sold.

Thus, the number of items sold at a price greater than the price of the particular item (i.e. DVD player) $= 29 - 1 = 28$

Also, the number of items sold at a price lower than the price of the particular item (i.e. DVD player) $= 37 - 1 = 36$.

Thus, total number of items sold $= 28 + 36 + 1$ (including that particular radio)
 $= 65$

Thus, the number of DVD players sold $= 65 - 34 = 31$

The correct answer is option C.

118. Royalty received on the first 100,000 copies at the rate of \$0.80 per copy

$$= \$ (0.80 \times 100,000) = \$80,000$$

Total royalty received is given as \$260,000.

Thus, royalty received on the additional copies (above 100,000) at \$0.60 per copy
 $= \$ (260,000 - 80,000) = \$180,000$

Thus, number of additional copies sold
 $= \frac{180,000}{0.60}$
 $= 300,000$

Thus, total copies sold = Initial 100,000 copies + Additional 300,000 copies
 $= 400,000$ copies

The correct answer is option D.

119. The loss would be minimum if fewer number of \$50 checks were lost as compared to \$10 checks.

Thus, the traveler should have cashed a greater number of \$50 checks than \$10 checks.

We know that the number of \$10 checks cashed was one more or one less than the number of \$50 checks cashed.

Thus, from the above reasoning, we can conclude that the number of \$10 checks was one less than the number of \$50 checks.

Since the total number of checks cashed was 7, from the above information, we have:

Number of \$50 checks cashed = 4
Number of \$10 checks cashed = 3

Alternately:

Let the number of \$10 checks cashed = x

Thus, the number of \$50 checks cashed = $(x + 1)$

Since the total number of checks cashed is 7, we have:

$$x + (x + 1) = 7$$

$$\Rightarrow x = 3$$

Thus, the total value of \$10 checks cashed = $\$ (3 \times 10) = \30 .

The total value of \$50 checks cashed = $\$ (4 \times 50) = \200 .

Thus, the total value of all the checks cashed = $\$ (30 + 200) = \230 .

We know that the total value of all the checks with him was \$1500.

Thus, the total value of all the checks lost = \$ $(1500 - 230) = \$1270$.

The correct answer is option D.

5.9 Interest

120. Amount after three years = \$1200

Amount after five years = \$1500

Thus, interest accumulated in two years = \$ (1500 – 1200) = \$300

Thus, interest accumulated per year = \$ $\left(\frac{300}{2}\right)$ = \$150 (since under simple interest, interest accumulated every year is constant)

Thus, interest accumulated in the first three years = \$ (150 × 3) = \$450

Thus, principal amount invested = \$ (1200 – 450) = \$750

Thus, on \$750 invested, interest accumulated is \$150 every year.

Thus, rate of interest = $\frac{150}{750} \times 100 = 20\%$

The correct answer is option C.

121. Simple interest accumulated after two years = \$180

Thus, simple interest every year = \$ $\left(\frac{180}{2}\right)$ = \$90 (since under simple interest, interest accumulated every year is constant)

Thus, compound interest accumulated after the first year = \$90 (equal to the simple interest accumulated after one year)

Thus, compound interest accumulated in the second year = \$ (90 + 18) = \$108 (since the total compound interest accumulated in two years is \$18 more than that under simple interest)

The higher interest in the second year is due to the additional interest on the interest accumulated after one year.

Thus, we can say that interest on \$90 in one year = \$18

Thus rate of interest = $\frac{18}{90} \times 100 = 20\%$

The correct answer is option D.

122. Let the sum borrowed at 4% and 5% rate of interest be \$ x each.

Let the time after which he repays the second sum be t years.

Thus, the time after which he repays the first sum is $\left(t - \frac{1}{2}\right)$ years.

Since the amount to be repaid in either case is the same, the interest accumulated is also equal.

Simple Interest = $\left(\frac{PRT}{100}\right)$, where P = Principal, R = Rate of Interest, and T = Time Interval

Hence, we have:

$$\frac{4 \times x \times \left(t - \frac{1}{2}\right)}{100} = \frac{5 \times x \times t}{100}$$

$$\Rightarrow 4 \left(t - \frac{1}{2}\right) = 5t$$

$$\Rightarrow t = 2$$

Since the amount to be repaid is \$1100, we have:

Principal amount + Interest accumulated in two years = 1100

$$\Rightarrow x + \frac{5 \times x \times 2}{100} = 1100$$

$$\Rightarrow \frac{11x}{10} = 1100$$

$$\Rightarrow x = 1000$$

Thus, the total sum borrowed = $x + x = 2x = \$2000$.

The correct answer is option D.

123. Total amount invested = \$10,000.

Let \$ x be invested at 6% and \$(10000 - x) be invested at 8%

Thus, at the end of 1 year, interest on \$ x

$$= \$ \frac{(x \times 6 \times 1)}{100} = \$ \left(\frac{6x}{100}\right)$$

Also, at the end of 1 year, interest on \$(10000 - x)

$$= \$ \frac{((10000 - x) \times 8 \times 1)}{100} = \$ \left(\frac{8(10000 - x)}{100}\right)$$

Since the total interest is \$720, we have:

$$\frac{6x}{100} + \frac{8(10000 - x)}{100} = 720$$

$$\Rightarrow 80000 - 2x = 72000$$

$$\Rightarrow x = 4000$$

$$\Rightarrow 10000 - x = 6000$$

Thus, the fraction of the total invested at the higher rate i.e. $8\% = \frac{6000}{10000} = \frac{3}{5}$

The correct answer is option D.

Alternate Approach:

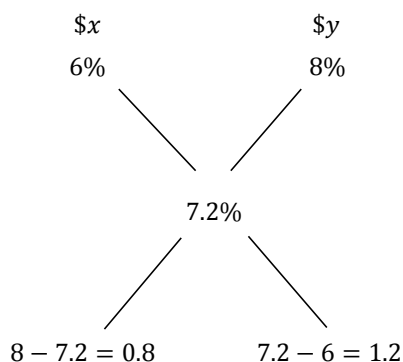
We can use the method of alligation:

Let the amounts invested at 6% and 8% be \$ x and \$ y , respectively.

The total interest on \$10000 is \$720.

Thus, the effective rate of interest as a whole $= \frac{720}{10000} \times 100 = 7.2\%$.

Thus, we have:



Hence, we have:

$$\frac{x}{y} = \frac{0.8}{1.2} = \frac{2}{3}$$

Hence, the required fraction $= \frac{3}{2+3} = \frac{3}{5}$

124. Number of bank customers in 2005 $= 45\% \text{ of } 60 = \frac{45}{100} \times 60 = 27$

Number of bank customers in 2007 $= 25\% \text{ of } 144 = \frac{25}{100} \times 144 = 36$

Thus, increase in the number of bank customers $= 36 - 27 = 9$

Let the simple annual percent growth rate in the number of bank customers be $r\%$.

Thus, in two years (2005 to 2007), increase in the number of bank customers at $r\%$ rate

$$= \left(\frac{27 \times r \times 2}{100} \right)$$

(The value is calculated on 27 since 27 is the value in the former year)

Thus, we have:

$$\frac{27 \times r \times 2}{100} = 9$$

$$\Rightarrow r = \frac{9 \times 100}{2 \times 27} = 16.6\%$$

The correct answer is option B.

125. Number of ways of selecting 2 apples from 5 apples = $C_2^5 = \frac{5!}{2!(5-2)!} = 10$

Number of ways of selecting 2 apples from 4 (Un-spoiled) apples = $C_2^4 = \frac{4!}{2!(4-2)!} = 6$

So number of ways of selecting 2 apples from 5 apples such that at least one of them is spoiled

$$= [\text{Ways of selecting 2 apples from 5}] - [\text{Ways of selecting 2 apples from 4 (non-spoiled) apples}]$$

$$= 10 - 6 = 4$$

$$\text{So required probability} = \frac{\text{Desired outcomes}}{\text{Total outcomes}} = \frac{4}{10} = \frac{2}{5}$$

The correct answer is option D.

126. Population at the start of the experiment = x

Increase in population at the end of the 1st month = $2x$

$$\text{Thus here we can say that, rate of increase} = \left(\frac{2x}{x} \right) \times 100 = 200\%$$

This 200% increase remains same for each of the next 4 months.

Thus, applying the concept of compounding, we have:

$$x \left(1 + \frac{200}{100} \right)^5 > 1000$$

$$\Rightarrow x > \frac{1000}{(3)^5}$$

$$\Rightarrow x > \frac{1000}{243}$$

$$\Rightarrow x > \left[\frac{1000}{\approx 250} \approx 4 \right]$$

Since we $250 > 243$, thus $\frac{1000}{243} > 4 \Rightarrow x > 4$

Since x must be an integer value (it represents the number of organisms), the minimum possible value of $x = 5$.

The correct answer is option D.

Alternate Approach:

Population at the start of the experiment = x .

Increase in population at the end of the 1st month = $2x$.

Thus, population size at the end of the 1st month = $x + 2x = 3x$.

Increase in population after the 2nd month = $2 \times 3x = 6x$.

Thus, population size at the end of the 2nd month = $3x + 6x = 9x$.

Thus, we observe that the population size triples after every month.

Thus, the population size at the end of the 5th month

= $3 \times$ (The population size at the end of the 4th month)

= $3 \times 3 \times$ (The population size at the end of the 3rd month)

= $3 \times 3 \times 3 \times$ (The population size at the end of the 2nd month) = $3^3 \times 9x$

= $243x$

Thus, we have:

$$243x > 1000$$

$$\Rightarrow x > \frac{1000}{243}$$

$$\Rightarrow x > 4.1$$

Since x must be an integer value (it represents the number of organisms), the minimum possible value of $x = 5$.

127. The value of the watch increases by $c\%$ every year

The value of the watch on January 1, 1992 = \$ k

Thus, the value of the watch on January 1, 1994 (i.e. after 2 years) = \$ $\left(k \times \left(1 + \frac{c}{100}\right)^2\right)$

Since the value of the watch on January 1, 1994 was \$ m , we have: $k \times \left(1 + \frac{c}{100}\right)^2 = m$

$$\Rightarrow \left(1 + \frac{c}{100}\right)^2 = \frac{m}{k}$$

$$\Rightarrow \left(1 + \frac{c}{100}\right) = \sqrt{\frac{m}{k}} \dots (i)$$

Thus, the value of the watch on January 1, 1995 (= $c\%$ higher than that on January 1, 1994)

$$= \$((100 + c)\% \text{ of } m)$$

$$= \$\left(\left(\frac{100 + c}{100}\right) \times m\right)$$

$$= \$\left(\left(1 + \frac{c}{100}\right) \times m\right)$$

Substituting the value of $\left(1 + \frac{c}{100}\right)$ from (i):

$$= \$\left(\sqrt{\frac{m}{k}} \times m\right)$$

$$= \$\left(\frac{m\sqrt{m}}{\sqrt{k}}\right)$$

The correct answer is option C.

Alternate Approach:

Dealing with three variable, c , k , & m can be taxing; however this questions can be solved through an alternate approach by assuming few smart numbers for the variables.

Say, $c = 10\%$ & $k = \$100$

Thus, the value of the watch on January 1, 1994 (i.e. after 2 years) = $m = \$\left(100\left(1 + \frac{10}{100}\right)^2\right) = 121$.

So the value of the watch on January 1, 1995 = $121 \times (1 + 10\%) = \133.1 ;

So we have the following values for the variables, $c = 10\%$, $k = 100$, & $m = 121$.

By plugging in above values in options, you will find that only option C matches the desired value, \$133.1.

Let us cross check this.

$$\Rightarrow \frac{m\sqrt{m}}{\sqrt{k}} = 121 \times \frac{\sqrt{121}}{\sqrt{100}} = \frac{121 \times 11}{10} = 133.1$$

128. The first \$ x deposited in the account earned interest for 2 years while the additional \$ x earned interest for only 1 year.

The amount A under compound interest on a sum of money (P) invested at ($r\%$) rate of interest for (t) years is given by:

$$A = P \left(1 + \frac{r}{100} \right)^t$$

Thus, the final value after 2 years of the first \$ x deposited

$$= \$x \left(1 + \frac{8}{100} \right)^2$$

$$= \$ (x \times 1.08^2)$$

The final value after 1 year of the additional \$ x deposited

$$= \$x \left(1 + \frac{8}{100} \right)^1$$

$$= \$1.08x$$

Thus, total value of the money present in the account (w)

$$= \$ \left\{ (x \times 1.08^2) + (x \times 1.08) \right\}$$

$$= \$ (x (1.08^2 + 1.08))$$

Thus, we have:

$$w = x (1.08^2 + 1.08)$$

$$\Rightarrow x = \frac{w}{(1.08^2 + 1.08)}$$

The correct answer is option D.

129. We need to understand that the interest in the 2nd year and 3rd year is **not** the total interest accumulated in two years and three years respectively.

Thus, we **cannot** use the formula for the interest after t years on a sum of money P at $r\%$

$$\text{interest} = \left\{ P \left(1 + \frac{r}{100} \right)^t - P \right\}$$

Let us understand the concept of the interest in the n^{th} year with an example:

Let \$100 be invested at 10% rate of interest.

Interest accumulated after one year (or in the **first year**)

$$= \$ (10\% \text{ of } 100) = \$10$$

Thus, amount after one year = $\$ (100 + 10) = \110

Thus, interest in the **second year**

$$= \$ (10\% \text{ of } 110) = \$11 \text{ (= 110\% of interest in the first year)}$$

Thus, total interest accumulated in two years

$$= (\text{Interest in the first year} + \text{Interest in the second year})$$

$$= \$ (10 + 11) = \$21$$

Thus, amount after two years = $\$ (100 + 21) = \121

Thus, interest in the **third year**

$$\$ (10\% \text{ of } 121) = \$12.10 \text{ (= 110\% of interest in the second year)}$$

If we observe the values of the interest in the 1st, 2nd and 3rd years, we observe that:

The interest in the n^{th} year = $(100 + r)\%$ of (The interest in the $(n - 1)^{\text{th}}$ year)

Using the above relation in our problem:

Interest in the 2nd year = \$600

Interest in the 3rd year = \$720

Thus, we have:

$$720 = (100 + r)\% \text{ of } 600$$

$$\Rightarrow 720 = \left(\frac{100 + r}{100} \right) \times 600$$

$$\Rightarrow r = 20$$

The correct answer is option D.

5.10 Functions

130. We have:

$$\begin{aligned}f(x) &= x^2 + \frac{1}{x^2} \\ \Rightarrow f\left(-\frac{1}{\sqrt{x}}\right) &= \left(-\frac{1}{\sqrt{x}}\right)^2 + \frac{1}{\left(-\frac{1}{\sqrt{x}}\right)^2} \\ &= \frac{1}{x} + x \\ \Rightarrow \left(f\left(-\frac{1}{\sqrt{x}}\right)\right)^2 &= \left(\frac{1}{x} + x\right)^2 \\ &= \frac{1}{x^2} + x^2 + 2 \times \frac{1}{x} \times x \\ &= x^2 + \frac{1}{x^2} + 2 = f(x) + 2\end{aligned}$$

The correct answer is option E.

$$\begin{aligned}131. \quad f(x) &= -\frac{1}{x} \\ \Rightarrow f(a) &= -\frac{1}{a} = -\frac{1}{2} \\ \Rightarrow a &= 2\end{aligned}$$

Also, we have:

$$\begin{aligned}f(ab) &= -\frac{1}{ab} = \frac{1}{6} \\ \Rightarrow ab &= -6 \\ \Rightarrow b &= -\frac{6}{a} = -\frac{6}{2} \\ \Rightarrow b &= -3\end{aligned}$$

The correct answer is option D.

$$\begin{aligned}132. \quad f(x) &= \sqrt{x} - 10 \\ \Rightarrow f(t) &= \sqrt{t} - 10\end{aligned}$$

Since $u = f(t)$, we have:

$$u = \sqrt{t} - 10$$

$$\Rightarrow \sqrt{t} = u + 10$$

Squaring both sides, we have:

$$\Rightarrow t = (u + 10)^2$$

The correct answer is option D.

133. Let p , q and r be the hundreds', tens and unit digits of m , respectively and a , b and c be the hundreds', tens and unit digits of v , respectively.

Thus, we have:

$$f(m) = 2^p 3^q 5^r$$

$$f(v) = 2^a 3^b 5^c$$

Since $f(m) = 9f(v)$, we have:

$$2^p 3^q 5^r = 9 \times 2^a 3^b 5^c$$

$$\Rightarrow 2^p 3^q 5^r = 2^a 3^{b+2} 5^c$$

Since p, q, r, a, b, c are integers, comparing coefficients of 2, 3 and 5:

$$p = a, q = b + 2 \text{ and } r = c$$

Thus, we have:

The three-digit number $v \equiv abc$, where a is the digit in the hundreds' place, b is the digit in the tens place and c is the digit in the units place

$$\Rightarrow v = 100a + 10b + c$$

The three-digit number $m \equiv pqr \equiv a(b+2)c$, where a is the digit in the hundreds' place, $(b+2)$ is the digit in the tens place and c is the digit in the units place

$$\Rightarrow m = 100a + 10(b+2) + c$$

$$\Rightarrow m = (100a + 10b + c) + 20$$

$$\Rightarrow m = v + 20$$

$$\Rightarrow m - v = 20$$

The correct answer is option D.

134. Working with the options one at a time:

Option A:

$$f(x) = 1 - x$$

$$\Rightarrow f(1 - x) = 1 - (1 - x) = x \neq f(x) - \text{Incorrect}$$

Option B:

$$f(x) = 1 - x^2$$

$$\Rightarrow f(1 - x) = 1 - (1 - x)^2 = 1 - (1 - 2x + x^2) = 2x - x^2 \neq f(x) - \text{Incorrect}$$

Option C:

$$f(x) = x^2 - (1 - x)^2$$

$$\Rightarrow f(1 - x) = (1 - x)^2 - (1 - (1 - x))^2 = (1 - x)^2 - x^2 \neq f(x) - \text{Incorrect}$$

Option D:

$$f(x) = x^2(1 - x)^2$$

$$\Rightarrow f(1 - x) = (1 - x)^2(1 - (1 - x))^2 = (1 - x)^2x^2 = f(x) - \text{Correct}$$

Since we already have the answer, we need not check option E.

Verifying option E, we would have had:

$$f(x) = \frac{x}{1 - x}$$

$$\Rightarrow f(1 - x) = \frac{1 - x}{1 - (1 - x)} = \frac{1 - x}{x} \neq f(x)$$

The correct answer is option D.

135. $f(x) = \frac{1}{x}$

$$g(x) = \frac{x}{x^2 + 1}$$

$$\Rightarrow f(g(x)) = \frac{1}{g(x)} = \frac{1}{\left(\frac{x}{x^2 + 1}\right)}$$

$$= \frac{x^2 + 1}{x}$$

$$= \frac{(x - 1)^2 + 2x}{x}$$

$$= \frac{(x - 1)^2}{x} + 2$$

Since $x > 0$, the minimum value of the above expression will occur when the square term becomes zero (since a square term is always non-negative, the minimum possible value occurs when it is zero).

$$\Rightarrow (x - 1)^2 = 0 \Rightarrow x = 1$$

Thus, the minimum value of $f(g(x)) = 0 + 2 = 2$

The correct answer is option E.

136. $P(r) = \frac{8r}{1-r}$

$$\Rightarrow P(3) = \frac{8 \times 3}{1-3} = -12$$

Thus, we have:

$$P(r) = \frac{1}{2} \times (-12)$$

$$\Rightarrow \frac{8r}{1-r} = -6$$

$$\Rightarrow 8r = -6 + 6r$$

$$\Rightarrow r = -3$$

The correct answer is option D.

137. We have:

$$3f(x) + 2f(-x) = 5x - 10 \dots (i)$$

Substituting $x = 1$ in equation (i):

$$3f(1) + 2f(-1) = 5 - 10$$

$$\Rightarrow 3f(1) + 2f(-1) = -5 \dots (ii)$$

Substituting $x = -1$ in equation (i):

$$3f(-1) + 2f(1) = -5 - 10$$

$$\Rightarrow 3f(-1) + 2f(1) = -15 \dots (iii)$$

Equation (ii) $\times 3$ - Equation (iii) $\times 2$:

$$5f(1) = -15 - (-30) = 15$$

$$\Rightarrow f(1) = 3$$

The correct answer is option D.

5.11 Permutation & Combination & Probability

138. Since $C_3^5 = C_x^5$, $x = 3$, but it is given that $x \neq 3$.

We know that $C_n^m = C_{m-n}^m$

$$\Rightarrow C_3^5 = C_x^5 = C_{5-x}^5$$

$$\Rightarrow 3 = 5 - x$$

$$\Rightarrow x = 2$$

The correct answer is option C.

139. This is a question on permutation with indistinguishable objects.

We know that if there are n objects, out of which p objects are indistinguishable, then

$$\text{Total number of way of arranging them} = \frac{n!}{p!}$$

In this question, let's first assume that we use two BLUE and one YELLOW dot, thus,

$$\text{Total number of way of arranging them} = \frac{3!}{2!} = 3.$$

Similarly, let's first assume that we use two YELLOW and one BLUE dot, thus,

$$\text{Total number of way of arranging them} = \frac{3!}{2!} = 3.$$

There can be two more cases where we use all three BLUE or all three YELLOW.

(Note: the question does not say that both colors must be used)

$$\text{Total number of codes} = 3 + 3 + 2 = 8.$$

The codes would be: YYB, YBY, YBB, BBY, BYB, BYY, BBB, & YYY.

The correct answer is option D.

140. There are two different sizes and four different colors of notepads.

Packages having the same size and same color of notepads:

$$\text{Number of ways in which the size can be chosen} = C_1^2 = \frac{2!}{(2-1)! \times 1!} = 2 \text{ ways.}$$

$$\text{Number of ways in which the color can be chosen} = C_1^4 = \frac{4!}{(4-1)! \times 1!} = 4 \text{ ways.}$$

Thus, total number of such packages = $2 \times 4 = 8$.

Packages having the same size and different colors of notepads:

Number of ways in which the size can be chosen = $C_1^2 = \frac{2!}{(2-1)! \times 1!} = 2$ ways.

Number of ways in which the three different colors can be chosen = $C_3^4 = \frac{4!}{(4-3)! \times 3!} = 4$ ways.

Thus, total number of such packages = $2 \times 4 = 8$.

Thus, total number of different packages = $8 + 8 = 16$.

The correct answer is option C.

- 141.** We know that there are six kinds of cheese and two kinds of fruits for dessert.

Since there are equal number of kinds of cheese and an equal number of kinds of fruit, we have the following two possibilities:

- (1) If there is one kind of cheese and one kind of fruit:

Number of ways of selecting one kind of cheese = $C_1^6 = 6$.

Number of ways of selecting one kind of fruit = $C_1^2 = 2$.

Thus, number of desert platters possible = $6 \times 2 = 12$.

- (2) If there are two kinds of cheese and two kinds of fruits:

Number of ways of selecting two kinds of cheese = $C_2^6 = \frac{6!}{4!2!} = 15$.

Number of ways of selecting two kinds of fruits = $C_2^2 = 1$.

Thus, number of desert platters possible = $15 \times 1 = 15$.

Thus, total possibilities = $12 + 15 = 27$.

The correct answer is option E.

- 142.** Using one-letter code, we can uniquely designate 26 stocks (since there are a total of 26 letters).

Using two-letter codes:

The first position can be assigned in 26 ways.

The second position can be assigned again in 26 ways (since the letters may be repeated).

Thus, total two-letter codes possible = $26 \times 26 = 676$.

Thus, using two-letter codes, we can uniquely designate 676 stocks.

Using three-letter codes:

Each of the three positions can be assigned in 26 ways.

Thus, total three-letter codes possible = $26 \times 26 \times 26 = 17576$.

Thus, using three-letter codes, we can uniquely designate 17576 stocks.

Thus, total number of unique designations possible using one, two or three-letter codes
= $26 + 676 + 17576 = 18278$.

The correct answer is option E.

Alternate Approach:

Using one-letter codes: $26 \equiv$ unit digit is 6.

Using two-letter codes: $26 \times 26 \equiv$ unit digit is 6.

Using three-letter codes: $26 \times 26 \times 26 \equiv$ unit digit is 6.

Thus, the unit digit of the sum = $6 + 6 + 6 \equiv 8$.

Only option E has the unit digit as 8.

Note: This method is not to be used when two or more options are with same unit digit.

143. We know that no candidate is eligible for a position in both departments.

Here events “Selection of a candidate in Mathematics department” and “Selection of two candidates in Computer Science department” are mutually exclusive or disjoint events.

Number of ways of selecting one candidate from seven candidates = $C_1^7 = 7$

Number of ways of selecting two candidates from ten candidates = $C_2^{10} = \frac{10 \times 9}{2 \times 1} = 45$.

Thus, total number of ways of filling up the three positions = $7 \times 45 = 315$.

The correct answer is option E.

144. We need to form a three-digit code using the digits 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, and 9 i.e. 8 possible digits.

Also, it is known that repetition of digits is not allowed.

The hundreds' position of the code can be filled using any of the 8 digits in 8 ways.

The tens position of the code can be filled using any of the remaining 7 digits in 7 ways.

The tens position of the code can be filled using any of the remaining 6 digits in 6 ways.

Thus, the number of distinct codes possible = $8 \times 7 \times 6 = 336$.

Since there are 330 employees, number of unassigned codes = $336 - 330 = 6$.

The correct answer is option A.

145. We need to form a four-digit code using the digits 0, 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, and 9 i.e. 10 possible digits.

Also, it is known that repetition of digits is allowed, the code has to be an odd number, and the thousands' position of the code can't be 0.

The thousands' position of the code can be filled using any of the 9 digits (except 0) in 9 ways.

The hundreds' position of the code can be filled using any of the 10 digits (since 0 can now be used and repetition is allowed) in 10 ways.

The tens position of the code can be filled using any of the 10 digits (since 0 can now be used and repetition is allowed) in 10 ways.

The tens position of the code can be filled using any of the 5 odd digits 1, 3, 5, 7, or 9 in 5 ways.

Thus, the number of distinct codes possible = $9 \times 10 \times 10 \times 5 = 4500$.

The correct answer is option D.

146. Number of ways of selecting four sites out of six

= (Number of ways in which any four of the six sites are selected without consideration to any constraint) – (Number of ways in which sites both A and B are selected)

Number of ways in which any four of the six sites may be selected without paying consideration to any constraint = C_4^6

$$= C_{(6-4)}^6 = C_2^6 = \frac{6 \times 5}{2 \times 1}$$

$$= 15$$

Number of ways in which four of the six sites may be selected so that both the sites A and B are selected (i.e. two more sites to be selected from the remaining four) = $C_{(4-2)}^{(6-2)}$

$$= C_2^4 = \frac{4 \times 3}{2 \times 1}$$

= 6; the above 6 ways do not satisfy the condition given

Thus, the number of ways in which four of the six sites can be selected so that both A and B are not selected simultaneously = $15 - 6 = 9$

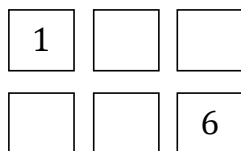
The correct answer is option D.

147. In this question, we need to logically decide the positions of the men and manually count the number of possible arrangements.

Randomly checking possible combinations would take a lot of time, so a proper logical approach is necessary.

Let us number the six men using the numbers 1 to 6 in ascending order of height, where 1 represents the shortest man and 6 represents the tallest man.

The positions of the six seats are shown below:



We know that:

- (1) The heights of the men within each row must increase from left to right.
- (2) Each man in the second row must be taller than the man standing in front of him.

Thus, the top left seat must be occupied by '1' and the bottom right seat must be occupied by '6'.

The bottom left seat may be occupied by '2', '3', or '4'.

Note: '5' cannot be seated in that seat since there would be no one to fill the bottom middle seat (since height increases from left to right).

Similarly, the top right seat may be occupied by '3', '4' or '5'.

Note: '2' cannot be seated in that seat since there would be no one to fill the top middle seat (since height increases from left to right).

Based on this, we list down the possible cases as shown below:

Thus, there are 5 possible ways.

Though this appears to be a straightforward permutation and combination question, it is not so because of the constraints involved.

The correct answer is option A.

148. Let the number of letters to be used be n .

The number of participants who can be identified using a single letter = $C_1^n = n$.

The number of participants who can be identified using two distinct letters = $C_2^n = \frac{n(n-1)}{2}$
(since the letters are to be kept in alphabetic order, we do not need to order them)

Thus, total number of participants who can be identified

$$= \left(n + \frac{n(n-1)}{2} \right)$$

Since we need to have at least 12 identifications, we have:

$$\begin{aligned}
n + \frac{n(n-1)}{2} &\geq 12 \\
\Rightarrow \frac{2n + n(n-1)}{2} &\geq 12 \\
\Rightarrow \frac{n(2 + (n-1))}{2} &\geq 12 \\
\Rightarrow \frac{n(n+1)}{2} &\geq 12 \\
\Rightarrow n(n+1) &\geq 24
\end{aligned}$$

Working with the options and starting with the least value of n , we see that $n = 5$ satisfies the above inequality.

The correct answer is option B.

- 149.** We have to select 1 employee each from Departments A, B, C each having 10 employees and 2 employees from Department D having 20 employees.

Number of ways of selecting 1 employee from Department A = $C_1^{10} = 10$.

Number of ways of selecting 1 employee from Department B = $C_1^{10} = 10$.

Number of ways of selecting 1 employee from Department C = $C_1^{10} = 10$.

Number of ways of selecting 2 employees from Department D = $C_2^{20} = \frac{20 \times 19}{2 \times 1} = 190$.

As all four events are independent of each other, the number of ways of forming the task force
 $= 10 \times 10 \times 10 \times 190$

$= 190,000$

The correct answer is option D.

- 150.** Total number of stocks available: 5 industrial, 4 transportation, and 3 utility stocks.

Number of stocks to be selected = 3 industrial, 2 transportation, and 2 utility stocks.

Number of ways of selecting 3 out of 5 industrial stocks = $C_3^5 = C_{(5-3)}^5 = C_2^5$

$$= \frac{5 \times 4}{2 \times 1} = 10$$

Number of ways of selecting 2 out of 4 transportation stocks = C_2^4

$$= \frac{4 \times 3}{2 \times 1} = 6$$

Number of ways of selecting 2 out of 3 utility stocks = C_2^3

$$= \frac{3 \times 2}{2 \times 1} = 3$$

Thus, the total number of ways of selecting the required number of stocks

= $10 \times 6 \times 3$ (we multiply since the above selections are independent of one another)

$$= 180$$

The correct answer is option D.

151. Total number of people present = $3 \times 6 = 18$.

Number of handshakes if the representatives shook hands with every person other than those from his or her own company

= (Number of handshakes without any constraint) – (Number of handshakes with people from their own company)

$$\text{Number of handshakes without any constraint} = C_2^{18} = \frac{18 \times 17}{2 \times 1} = 153$$

(Since a handshake requires 2 people, we need to **select** any 2 people from the 18 for a handshake)

$$\text{Number of handshakes with people from their own company} = 6 \times C_2^3 = 6 \times \frac{3 \times 2}{2 \times 1} = 18$$

(We need to select any 2 representatives from 3 representatives of the same company, for each of the 6 companies)

Thus, the number of handshakes if the representatives shook hands with every person other than those from his or her own company

$$= 153 - 18$$

$$= 135$$

The correct answer is option B.

152. We need to select three digits for the code.

The digits to be used are from 0 to 9, thus there are 10 possible digits.

Since the first digit cannot be 0 or 1, number of possibilities for the first digit

$$= (10 - 2) = 8.$$

Since the second digit can only be 0 or 1, number of possibilities for the second digit = 2.

Let us ignore the restriction for the third digit.

Thus, number of possibilities for the third digit = 10.

Thus, total number of codes possible (ignoring the condition for the third digit)
 $= 8 \times 2 \times 10$

$$= 160$$

In the above cases, there are a few cases which are unacceptable since they violate the condition for the third digit.

The codes which violate the condition for the third digit are of the form $(a00)$, where a is the first digit and both second and third digits are simultaneously 0.

The number of such codes equals the number of possibilities for the first digit, i.e. 8.

Thus, the number of codes possible without violating any of the given conditions
 $= 160 - 8$

$$= 152$$

The correct answer is option B.

- 153.** There are total 24 balls, out of which 12 are red.

Probability that both balls will be red = $\frac{\text{Number of ways of drawing both Red balls}}{\text{Number of ways of drawing any two balls}}$

$$\Rightarrow \frac{C_2^{12}}{C_2^{24}} = \frac{\frac{12 \times 11}{1 \times 2}}{\frac{24 \times 23}{1 \times 2}} = \frac{12 \times 11}{24 \times 23} = \frac{11}{46}$$

The correct answer is option A.

- 154.** In a basket, out of 10 apples, seven are red and three are green.

Number of ways we can select three apples from 10 apples = $C_3^{10} = \frac{10 \times 9 \times 8}{3 \times 2 \times 1} = 120$.

Number of ways of selecting two red apples and one green apple

$$= C_2^7 C_1^3 = \frac{7 \times 6}{1 \times 2} \times 3 = 21 \times 3 = 63.$$

$$\text{So required probability} = \frac{C_2^7 C_1^3}{C_3^{10}} = \frac{63}{120} = \frac{21}{40}$$

The correct answer is option D.

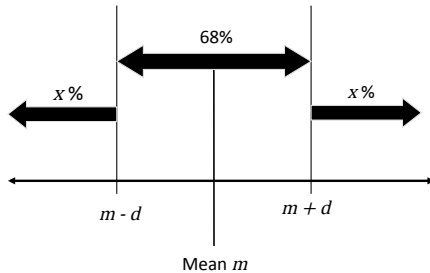
155. We know that the distribution is symmetric about the mean.

Thus, the percent of the distribution equidistant from the mean on either side of it is the same.

Let the percent of the distribution less than $(m + d)$ be $x\%$.

Thus, the percent of the distribution more than $(m + d)$ is also $x\%$.

The situation is shown in the diagram below.



Thus, we have:

$$x + 68 + x = 100$$

$$\Rightarrow x = 16$$

Thus, the percent of the distribution less than $(m + d) = x + 68 = 16 + 68 = 84\%$.

The correct answer is option D.

156. The number of 5-member committees that can be formed from the 20 members = C_5^{20}

$$= \frac{20 \times 19 \times 18 \times 17 \times 16}{5 \times 4 \times 3 \times 2 \times 1}$$

The number of 4-member committees that can be formed from the 20 members = C_4^{20}

$$= \frac{20 \times 19 \times 18 \times 17}{4 \times 3 \times 2 \times 1}$$

Thus, the required ratio

$$\begin{aligned} &= \frac{\left(\frac{20 \times 19 \times 18 \times 17 \times 16}{5 \times 4 \times 3 \times 2 \times 1} \right)}{\left(\frac{20 \times 19 \times 18 \times 17}{4 \times 3 \times 2 \times 1} \right)} \\ &= \frac{16}{5} = 16 \text{ to } 5 \end{aligned}$$

The correct answer is option C.

- 157.** There are two offices to which the three employees need to be assigned.

Thus, the number of options for each employee = 2 (since each employee can be assigned to any of the two offices).

Thus, the total number of ways of assigning the employees = $2 \times 2 \times 2 = 2^3 = 8$.

Note: For n objects, each with r options, the total number of options = r^n

The correct answer is option D.

- 158.** We need to select three senior officers from six senior officers.

The number of ways of achieving it = $C_3^6 = \left(\frac{6 \times 5 \times 4}{3 \times 2 \times 1} \right) = 20$.

We also need to select one junior officer from four junior officers.

The number of ways of achieving it = $C_1^4 = 4$.

Thus, the number of ways in which three senior officers and one junior office can be selected = $20 \times 4 = 80$.

The correct answer is option D.

- 159.** We see that the quarterly earnings are \$1.10 per share, which is more than the expected earnings of \$0.80 per share.

Thus, the dividend distributed will be half of \$0.80 per share along with an additional payment.

The additional pay is \$0.04 per share for each additional \$0.10 per share earnings.

The additional earning per share = $\$ (1.10 - 0.80) = \0.30

Thus, the additional pay in dividend = $\$ \left(0.04 \times \left(\frac{0.30}{0.10} \right) \right) = \0.12

Thus, the total dividend paid per share = $\$ \left(\frac{0.80}{2} + 0.12 \right) = \0.52 ; since the dividend distributed will be half of \$0.80 per share, thus it would be $\$ \frac{0.80}{2} = \0.40

Thus, total dividend paid to the person having 200 shares = $\$ (0.52 \times 200) = \104 .

The correct answer is option C.

- 160.** Total number of units sold = $800 + 1000 = 1800$.

Cost of producing each unit = \$6.

Thus, total cost of producing 1800 units = $$(6 \times 1800) = \10800 .

Selling price of 800 units of the product = $$(800 \times 8) = \6400 .

Selling price of 1000 units of the product = $$(1000 \times 5) = \5000 .

Thus, the total selling price = $$(6400 + 5000) = \11400 .

Thus, profit = $$(11400 - 10800) = \600 .

The correct answer is option D.

- 161.** Let the car and truck sales in 1996 be c and t respectively.

Thus, the revenue from car sales in 1997 = $(100 - 11)\%$ of $c = 89\%$ of $c = 0.89c$.

Also, the revenue from truck sales in 1997 = $(100 + 7)\%$ of $c = 107\%$ of $c = 1.07c$.

Thus, total revenue in 1996 = $(c + t)$.

Also, total revenue in 1997 = $(0.89c + 1.07t)$.

Thus, we have:

$$(0.89c + 1.07t) = (100 + 1)\% \text{ of } (c + t)$$

$$\Rightarrow (0.89c + 1.07t) = 1.01c + 1.01t$$

$$\Rightarrow 0.12c = 0.06t$$

$$\Rightarrow \frac{c}{t} = \frac{0.06}{0.12} = \frac{1}{2}$$

$$\Rightarrow c : t = 1 : 2$$

The correct answer is option A.

- 162.** Let the profit of the company in 1995 be \$100 (the assumption of \$100, or any other number does not affect the answer since we have to find the percent change).

Thus, the profit of the company in 1996 = $$(100 + 15)\% \text{ of } 100 = \115 .

Thus, the profit of the company in 1997 = $$(100 + 20)\% \text{ of } 115 = \138 .

$$\text{Thus, the percent change in profit from 1995 to 1997} = \frac{138 - 100}{100} \times 100 = 38\%.$$

The correct answer is option E.

Alternate Approach:

If the value of a commodity changes by $x\%$ and then by $y\%$ successively, the overall percent change is given by:

$$\left(x + y + \frac{xy}{100}\right)\%$$

Here, we have:

x = Percentage change from 1995 to 1996 = 15 %

y = Percentage change from 1996 to 1997 = 20 %

Thus, the overall percent change

$$= 15 + 20 + \frac{15 \times 20}{100}$$

$$= 38\%$$

163. We have: $a_1 = a_2 = 1$

We also know that: $a_k = a_{(k-1)} + 2a_{(k-2)}$

Substituting different values of k in the above equation, we have:

$$\text{At } k = 3 : a_3 = a_{(3-1)} + 2a_{(3-2)}$$

$$\Rightarrow a_3 = a_2 + 2a_1$$

$$\Rightarrow a_3 = 1 + 2 \times 1 = 3$$

$$\text{At } k = 4 : a_4 = a_{(4-1)} + 2a_{(4-2)}$$

$$\Rightarrow a_4 = a_3 + 2a_2$$

$$\Rightarrow a_4 = 3 + 2 \times 1 = 5$$

$$\text{At } k = 5 : a_5 = a_{(5-1)} + 2a_{(5-2)}$$

$$\Rightarrow a_5 = a_4 + 2a_3$$

$$\Rightarrow a_5 = 5 + 2 \times 3 = 11$$

$$\text{At } k = 6 : a_6 = a_{(6-1)} + 2a_{(6-2)}$$

$$\Rightarrow a_6 = a_5 + 2a_4$$

$$\Rightarrow a_6 = 11 + 2 \times 5 = 21$$

$$\text{Finally, at } k = 7 : a_7 = a_{(7-1)} + 2a_{(7-2)}$$

$$\Rightarrow a_7 = a_6 + 2a_5$$

$$\Rightarrow a_7 = 21 + 2 \times 11 = 43$$

The correct answer is option B.

164. Given that,

Probability that stock A increases in value = $P_A = 0.54$;

Probability that stock B increases in value = $P_B = 0.38$

Exactly one of the stocks would increase in value if:

Stock A increases AND stock B does not

OR

Stock B increases AND stock A does not

Probability that stock A does not increase in value = $P(\bar{A}) = 1 - 0.54 = 0.46$

Probability that stock B does not increase in value = $P(\bar{B}) = 1 - 0.38 = 0.62$

Thus, the required probability = $P(A) \times P(\bar{B}) + P_B \times P(\bar{A})$

$$= 0.54 \times 0.62 + 0.38 \times 0.46$$

$$\Rightarrow \approx 0.5 \times 0.6 + 0.4 \times 0.5 = 0.30 + 0.20 = 0.50$$

Thus, the actual answer would be approximately 0.50.

Note: The actual calculation = $0.54 \times 0.62 + 0.38 \times 0.46 = 0.5096 \approx 0.51$

Thus, the above approximations are justified as the options are widely apart.

The correct answer is option C.

165. Since probability of landing on heads or tails is the same, each must be $\frac{1}{2} \Rightarrow P(H) = P(T) = \frac{1}{2}$

Probability that the coin will land on heads at least once on two tosses

$$= 1 - \text{Probability that it will not land on heads at all}$$

= 1 – Probability that it will land on tails on both occasions

= 1 – (Probability that the first toss will show tails AND the second toss will show tails)

= 1 – $P(T) \times P(T)$

$$= 1 - \frac{1}{2} \times \frac{1}{2}$$

$$= 1 - \frac{1}{4}$$

$$= \frac{3}{4}$$

The correct answer is option E.

- 166.** Each question has two options of which only one is correct.

Thus, the probability of randomly guessing an answer and getting it correct = $\frac{1}{2}$.

Thus, the probability of randomly guessing answers to all n questions and getting them correct

$$= \frac{1}{2} \times \frac{1}{2} \times \frac{1}{2} \times \dots n \text{ times}$$

$$= \left(\frac{1}{2}\right)^n$$

Thus, we have:

$$\left(\frac{1}{2}\right)^n < \frac{1}{1000}$$

$$\Rightarrow 2^n > 1000$$

We observe from the options that $2^{10} = 1024$, which just exceeds 1000.

Thus, the least value of $n = 10$.

The correct answer is option B.

- 167.** We know that the first three gum balls were black.

Thus, there are $(24 - 3) = 21$ gum balls left.

Of these, number of black gum balls = $12 - 3 = 9$.

We need the next two gum balls to be black.

Thus, we need to select 2 black gum balls from the remaining 9 black gum balls.

Number of ways in which the above case can be achieved (favorable cases) = C_2^9

$$= \frac{9 \times 8}{2 \times 1}$$

$$= 36.$$

Number of ways in which two gum balls can be selected from the remaining 21 gum balls (total cases) = C_2^{21}

$$= \frac{21 \times 20}{2 \times 1}$$

$$= 210.$$

Thus, required probability = $\frac{\text{Favorable cases}}{\text{Total cases}}$

$$= \frac{36}{210}$$

$$= \frac{6}{35}$$

The correct answer is option A.

- 168.** We need to select two marbles one at a time.

On drawing 2 marbles, one red and one blue can be obtained if:

The first marble is red AND the second marble is blue

OR

The first marble is blue AND the second marble is red

Since the marbles are not replaced after drawing, after the first draw, the total number of marbles would be 1 less than what was present initially, i.e. $(16 - 1) = 15$.

Thus, the required probability

= $p(\text{The first marble is red AND the second marble is blue})$

OR

$p(\text{The first marble is blue AND the second marble is red})$

$$= \{p(1^{\text{st}} \text{ marble red}) \times p(2^{\text{nd}} \text{ marble blue})\} + \{p(1^{\text{st}} \text{ marble blue}) \times p(2^{\text{nd}} \text{ marble red})\}$$

$$= \left\{ \frac{4}{16} \times \frac{3}{15} \right\} + \left\{ \frac{3}{16} \times \frac{4}{15} \right\}$$

$$= \frac{1}{20} + \frac{1}{20}$$

$$= \frac{1}{10}$$

The correct answer is option C.

- 169.** Probability that at least one set is LCD

$$= 1 - \text{Probability that none is LCD}$$

Probability of selecting two television sets such that none is LCD

= Probability of selecting two LED television sets

$$= \left(\frac{\text{Number of ways of selecting 2 LED television sets from 6 sets}}{\text{Number of ways of selecting 2 television sets from 8 sets}} \right)$$

$$= \frac{C_2^6}{C_2^8}$$

$$= \frac{\left(\frac{6 \times 5}{2 \times 1} \right)}{\left(\frac{8 \times 7}{2 \times 1} \right)}$$

$$= \frac{15}{28}$$

$$\text{Thus, the required probability} = 1 - \frac{15}{28} = \frac{13}{28}.$$

The correct answer is option D.

- 170.** Let the number of red cards = r .

Number of blue cards = 9.

Thus, total number of cards = $(r + 9)$.

Thus, probability that both cards would be blue

$$= \left(\frac{\text{Number of ways of selecting 2 blue cards from 9 blue cards}}{\text{Number of ways of selecting 2 cards from } (r+9) \text{ cards}} \right)$$

$$= \frac{C_2^9}{C_2^{(r+9)}}$$

$$= \frac{\frac{9 \times 8}{2 \times 1}}{\frac{(r+9) \times (r+9-1)}{2 \times 1}}$$

$$= \frac{72}{(r+9) \times (r+8)}$$

Thus, we have:

$$\frac{72}{(r+9) \times (r+8)} = \frac{6}{11}$$

$$\Rightarrow (r+9) \times (r+8) = 132$$

$$\Rightarrow r^2 + 17r - 60 = 0$$

$$\Rightarrow (r+20)(r-3) = 0$$

$$\Rightarrow r = -20 \text{ or } 3$$

Since the number of cards cannot be negative, we have: $r = 3$

Thus, the total number of cards $= 3 + 9 = 12$.

The correct answer is option C.

- 171.** The probability that a bulb fails $= P(F) = 0.06$

Thus, the probability that a bulb does not fail $= P(\bar{F}) = 1 - 0.06 = 0.94$

Thus, the probability that none of the 10 bulbs fail $= 0.94^{10}$

The string will fail if at least one bulb fails.

Thus, the probability that at least one bulb fails $= 1 - 0.94^{10}$

The correct answer is option C.

- 172.** Total number of pens $= 12$.

Number of defective pens $= 3$.

Thus, the number of non-defective pens $= 12 - 3 = 9$.

Thus, the customer has to pick 2 pens out of the 9 non-defective pens.

Thus, number of ways (favorable cases)

$$= {}^9C_2 = \frac{9 \times 8}{2 \times 1} = 36.$$

Number of ways in which he can pick 2 pens from the 12 pens (total cases)

$$= {}^{12}C_2 = \frac{12 \times 11}{2 \times 1} = 66.$$

Thus, the required probability

$$= \frac{\text{Favorable cases}}{\text{Total no. of cases}} = \frac{36}{66} = \frac{6}{11}$$

The correct answer is option C.

173. Total number of pens = 12.

Number of defective pens = 3.

Thus, the number of non-defective pens = $12 - 3 = 9$.

Thus, the customer has to pick 2 pens out of the 9 non-defective pens.

Thus, number of ways (favorable cases)

$$= C_2^9 = \frac{9 \times 8}{2 \times 1} = 36.$$

Number of ways in which he can pick 2 pens from the 12 pens (total cases)

$$= C_2^{12} = \frac{12 \times 11}{2 \times 1} = 66.$$

Thus, the required probability

$$= \frac{\text{Favorable cases}}{\text{Total no. of cases}} = \frac{36}{66} = \frac{6}{11}$$

The correct answer is option C.

5.12 Sets

174. Number of members on the committee M = 8.

As no member of the committee M is on either of the other two committees, the above 8 members belong to only committee M.

However, there may be an overlap with the members of committees S and R.

Number of members on committee S = 12.

Number of members on committee R = 5.

We get the greatest number of members who would not be any of the committees, if there is maximum overlap between the members of committees S and R.

The maximum overlap between the members of committees S and R would be the minimum of the number of members in the two committees i.e. minimum of 5 and 12 = 5.

Thus, we have:

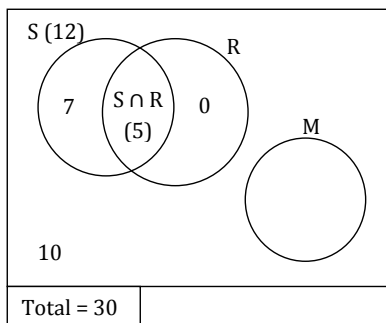
$$S \cap R = 5$$

Thus, the number of members in the committees S or R = $S + R - S \cap R = 12 + 5 - 5 = 12$

Thus, total number of members belonging to one or more committees = $8 + 12 = 20$.

Thus, maximum number of members who don't belong to any committee = $30 - 20 = 10$.

The above information can be represented in a Venn-diagram as shown below:



The correct answer is option D.

175. Total number of toys = 100

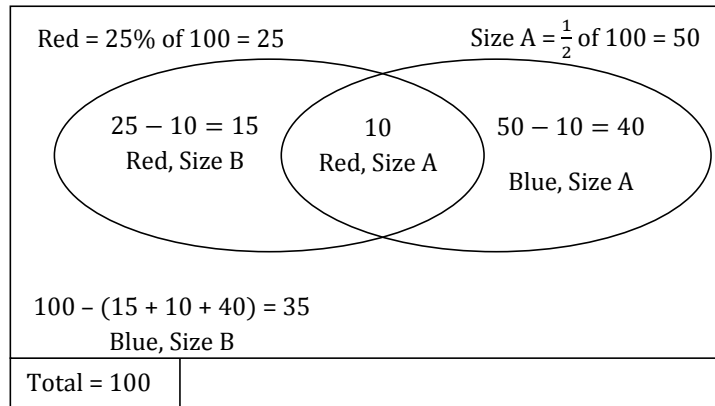
Number of red toys = 25

Number of blue toys = 75

$$\text{Number of toys of size A} = \text{Number of toys of size B} = \frac{100}{2} = 50$$

$$\text{Number of red toys of size A} = 10$$

Let us represent the above information using a Venn-diagram, as shown below:



Thus, from the above Venn-diagram, we have:

$$\text{Number of blue toys of size B} = 35$$

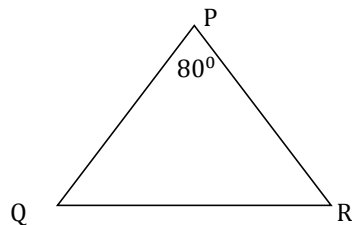
The correct answer is option D.

176. Since the triangle PQR is isosceles, there can be three possible cases:

$$(1) \quad PQ = PR \neq QR$$

$$\Rightarrow \angle PQR = \angle PRQ$$

$$\text{We know that: } \angle QPR = 80^\circ$$



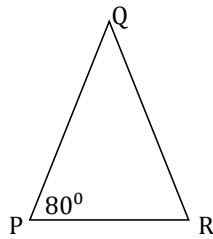
$$\Rightarrow \angle PQR + \angle PRQ = 180^\circ - 80^\circ = 100^\circ$$

$$\Rightarrow \angle PRQ = \frac{100^\circ}{2} = 50^\circ$$

$$(2) \quad QP = QR \neq PR$$

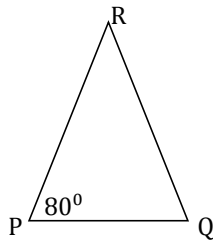
$$\Rightarrow \angle QPR = \angle QRP$$

We know that: $\angle QPR = 80^\circ$



$$\Rightarrow \angle QRP = 80^\circ$$

$$(3) \quad RQ = RP \neq QR$$



$$\Rightarrow \angle RPQ = \angle RQP = 80^\circ \text{ (given)}$$

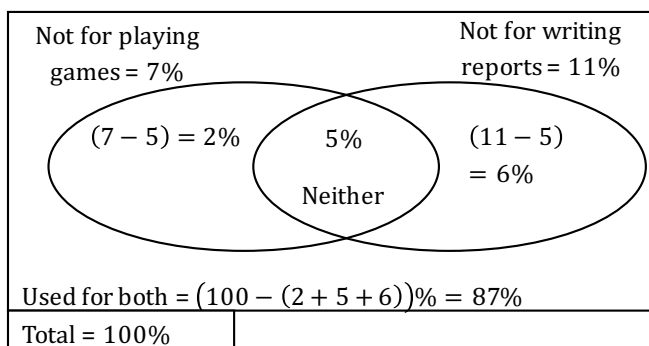
$$\Rightarrow \angle QRP = 180^\circ - (80^\circ + 80^\circ) = 20^\circ$$

Thus, $(100 - 95) = 5\%$ teenagers have not used a computer for either of these purposes.

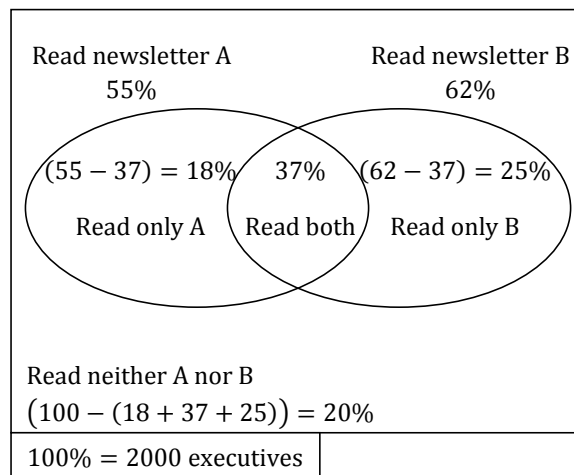
Let us represent the above information using a Venn-diagram, as shown below:

= (Those who read only A) + (Those who read only B) + (Those who read neither A nor B)

= $(18 + 25 + 20)\%$ of 2000

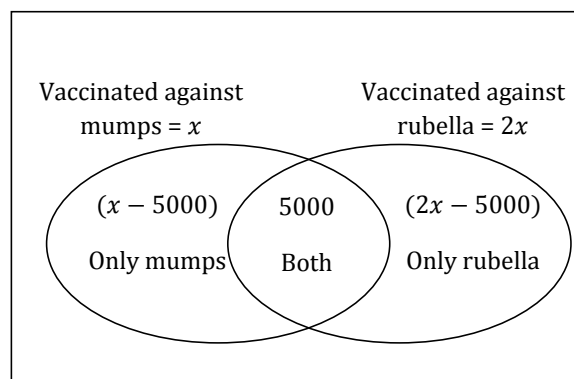
= 63% of 2000

= $\frac{63}{100} \times 2000$

= 1260

The correct answer is option B.

179. Let us represent the given information using a Venn-diagram, as shown below:



We know that the number of children who have been vaccinated against both is twice the number of children who have been vaccinated only against mumps

Thus, we have:

$$5000 = 2(x - 5000)$$

$$\Rightarrow 2x = 15000$$

$$\Rightarrow x = 7500$$

Thus, the number of children vaccinated only against rubella = $2x - 5000$

$$= 10000$$

The correct answer is option C.

5.13 Statistics & Data Interpretation

180. We know that the median is the middle-most value of any series/data set, but we do not know the value of n , so we cannot calculate exact value of Median; however we can surely find its range.

- Case 1: If n is smallest, the series would be $n, 150, 200, 250$ and median = average of 150 & 200 = 175—smallest median value.
- Case 2: If n is largest, the series would be 150, 200, 250, n and median = average of 200 & 250 = 225—largest median value.

Thus, the median would lie between 175 & 225, inclusive. Since only options I & II are in the range, option C is correct.

The correct answer is option C.

181. The question asks how many number of scores $> (\text{Mean} + \text{SD})$?

$$\text{Mean} = \frac{40 + 45 + 50 + 55 + 60 + 75 + 75 + 100 + 100 + 100}{10} = 70$$

$$\text{Mean} + \text{SD} = 70 + 22.4 = 92.4.$$

It is clear that three scores (100, 100, and 100) are greater.

The correct answer is option C.

182. Let the sum of the 20 numbers other than n be s .

Thus, we have:

$$n = 4 \times \left(\frac{s}{20} \right)$$

$$\Rightarrow s = 5n$$

Thus, the sum of all 21 numbers in the list = $s + n = 5n + n = 6n$

$$\text{Thus, the required fraction} = \frac{n}{6n} = \frac{1}{6}.$$

The correct answer is option B.

183. We have:

$$w \leq \frac{3 + 8 + w}{3} \leq 3w$$

$$\Rightarrow 3w \leq 11 + w \leq 9w$$

$$\Rightarrow 2w \leq 11 \leq 8w$$

$$\Rightarrow 2w \leq 11 \text{ and } 8w \geq 11$$

$$\Rightarrow w \leq \frac{11}{2} = 5\frac{1}{2}$$

and

$$\Rightarrow w \geq \frac{11}{8} = 1\frac{3}{8}$$

Since w is an integer, possible values of w are: 2, 3, 4 or 5,

Thus, there are four possible values of w .

The correct answer is option B.

184. Let the five numbers be v, w, x, y and z such that $v > w > x > y > z$.

Thus, we need to find the least possible value of the largest among the five, i.e. v .

Let us assume that $v = w = x = y = z = 10$, because the average is 10.

Now, we reduce z by 2 and increase v by 2.

At the same time, we reduce y by 1 and increase w by 1.

Thus, we get the values:

$$v = 12, w = 11, x = 10, y = 9, z = 8$$

Thus, the least possible value of the greatest of the five numbers = 12.

The correct answer is option B.

185. We have:

$$\frac{x + y + 20}{3} = 10 + \frac{x + y + 20 + 30}{4}$$

$$\Rightarrow 4x + 4y + 80 = 120 + 3x + 3y + 150$$

$$\Rightarrow x + y = 190$$

$$\Rightarrow \frac{x + y}{2} = \frac{190}{2} = 95$$

Thus, the average of x and y = $\frac{x + y}{2} = 95$.

The correct answer is option E.

186. If the 15 different integers are arranged in order, the median is the $\left(\frac{15+1}{2}\right)^{\text{th}} = 8^{\text{th}}$ integer.

Thus, the 8th integer is 30.

Since we need to find the maximum possible integer (given a constant range of 30), we need to have the maximum value of the least integer as well.

Since the integers are distinct, we can have the first 8 integers as:

$$(30 - 7) = 23, (30 - 6) = 24, (30 - 5) = 25, (30 - 4) = 26, (30 - 3) = 27, \\ (30 - 2) = 28, (30 - 1) = 29 \text{ and } 30$$

Thus, the maximum value of the smallest integer = 23.

Since the range is 30, the value of the greatest integer = $23 + 30 = 53$.

The correct answer is option D.

187. We have Mean = $\left(\frac{\text{Sum of the terms}}{\text{Total number of terms}}\right)$

$$\Rightarrow \frac{3 + 2 + 6 + 8 + 5 + x}{6} = \frac{x^2}{2}$$

$$\Rightarrow \frac{24 + x}{6} = \frac{x^2}{2}$$

$$\Rightarrow 24 + x = 3x^2$$

$$\Rightarrow 3x^2 - x - 24 = 0$$

$$\Rightarrow (3x + 8)(x - 3) = 0$$

$$\Rightarrow x = -\frac{8}{3} \text{ or } 3$$

Since x is an integer, we have: $x = 3$

Thus, the set of integers = $\{3, 4, 4, 5, 5, 6\}$.

Thus, the range = $6 - 3 = 3$.

The correct answer is option C.

188. We know that there are n employees, where n is an odd number.

The median value of n terms, where n is odd, is given by:

$$\text{Median} = \left(\frac{n+1}{2} \right)^{\text{th}} \text{ term}$$

Thus, we have:

$$\frac{n+1}{2} = 16$$

$$\Rightarrow n = 31$$

Thus, there are 31 employees in Company A.

Thus, the average salary of the employees in Company A

$$\begin{aligned} &= \frac{\text{Total salary}}{\text{Number of employees}} \\ &= \$ \left(\frac{942400}{31} \right) \\ &= \$30400 \end{aligned}$$

The correct answer is option B.

- 189.** Increase in the amount of bacteria from 1:00 pm (10.0 grams) to 4:00 pm (x grams)
= $(x - 10)$ grams.

Thus, fractional increase

$$\begin{aligned} &= \frac{\text{Increase}}{\text{Original value}} \\ &= \left(\frac{x - 10}{10} \right) \end{aligned}$$

Increase in the amount of bacteria from 4:00 pm (x grams) to 7:00 pm (14.4 grams)
= $(14.4 - x)$ grams.

Thus, fractional increase

$$\begin{aligned} &= \frac{\text{Increase}}{\text{Original value}} \\ &= \left(\frac{14.4 - x}{x} \right) \end{aligned}$$

Since the fractional increases are the same, we have:

$$\begin{aligned} \frac{x - 10}{10} &= \frac{14.4 - x}{x} \\ \Rightarrow \frac{x}{10} - 1 &= \frac{14.4}{x} - 1 \end{aligned}$$

$$\Rightarrow \frac{x}{10} = \frac{14.4}{x}$$

$$\Rightarrow x^2 = 14.4 \times 10$$

$$\Rightarrow x^2 = 144$$

$$\Rightarrow x = 12$$

The correct answer is option A.

Alternate Approach I:

Since the amount of bacteria present increased by the same fraction during each of the two 3-hour periods, we can say that the ratio of the number of bacteria in consecutive intervals would be equal.

Thus we have:

$$\frac{10.0}{x} = \frac{x}{14.4}$$

$$\Rightarrow x^2 = 14.4 \times 10.0$$

$$\Rightarrow x^2 = 144$$

$$\Rightarrow x = 12.0$$

Alternate Approach II:

Since the fractional increase in each 3-hour period is the same, we can conclude that the percent change in each 3-hour period is also the same.

Let the percent change be p .

Thus, using the concept of compound interest, we have:

$$14.4 = 10 \times \left(1 + \frac{p}{100}\right)^2$$

$$\Rightarrow \left(1 + \frac{p}{100}\right)^2 = 1.44 = 1.2^2$$

$$\Rightarrow 1 + \frac{p}{100} = 1.2$$

$$\Rightarrow p = 20\%$$

$$\Rightarrow x = 10 \times \left(1 + \frac{20}{100}\right)^1 = 12$$

190. We can make a quick calculation by taking approximate values as shown below:

	Actual Calculation	Approximate Calculation	More Approximation
Honorary	78	≈ 80	≈ 100
Fellows	9209	≈ 9200	≈ 9000
Members	35509	≈ 35500	≈ 36000
Associate	27909	≈ 27900	≈ 28000
Affiliates	2372	≈ 2370	≈ 2400
Total	75077	75050	75500
fellows (%)	$\frac{9209}{75077} \times 100 = 12.26\%$	$\frac{9200}{75050} \times 100 = 12.26\%$	$\frac{9000}{75500} \times 100 = 11.9\%$

Thus, we can see that even in the case with the most approximation, the answer comes to 11.9% which is enough to mark the correct answer as 12%.

In the GMAT, the options would be sufficiently apart from each other so that reasonable approximations would not deviate the correct answer to a greater degree.

The reason for such large approximations to work is that the total number of members is around 75000 and compared to that, even an error of 500 (in the total) is negligible, in fact, it accounts for $\left(\frac{500}{75000} \times 100\right) = 0.66\%$, i.e. not even 1%.

Here, the number of Fellows has been approximated from 9209 to 9000, i.e. only an error of 209.

Such approximations help in increased calculation speed with almost negligible error.

In fact, we could have even made an extreme level of approximation as follows (though, not suggested in every situation):

	Extreme Approximation (easiest calculation)
Honorary	≈ 0
Fellows	≈ 9000
Members	≈ 36000
Associate	≈ 28000
Affiliates	≈ 2000
Total	75000
% of fellows	$\frac{9000}{75000} \times 100 = 12\%$

The correct answer is option B.

191. We can calculate the total number of watts of electricity consumed as shown below:

Appliance	Number of hours in use	Number of watts of electricity used per hour	Total number of watts of electricity used
TV	4	145	$4 \times 145 = 580$
Computer	3	155	$3 \times 155 = 465$
VCR	2	45	$2 \times 45 = 90$
Stereo	2	109	$2 \times 109 = 218$
Total	$4 + 3 + 2 + 2 = 11$ hours		$580 + 465 + 90 + 218 = 1353$ watts

Thus, the approximate average number of watts of electricity used per hour per appliance

$$= \frac{1353}{11} = 123 \text{ watts.}$$

The correct answer is option C.

5.14 Linear Equations

192. Let us recall the property of two-digit number:

“Difference between the particular two digit number and number obtained by interchanging digits of same two digit number is always 9 times the difference between the digits.”

Thus, the difference between actual amount and reversed amount = 45

= $9 \times$ difference between digits

$$\Rightarrow \text{Difference between digits} = \frac{45}{9} = 5$$

The difference between digits of the number, 5, is satisfied only by option E.

The correct answer is option E.

Alternate Approach 1:

If we consider correct amount as $[xy] = 10x + y$, then interchanged amount becomes $[yx] = 10y + x$.

According to the given condition, difference between the new amount and the original amount is 45 cents.

$$\Rightarrow (10x + y) - (10y + x) = 45$$

$$\Rightarrow 10x - x - 10y + y = 45$$

$$\Rightarrow 9x - 9y = 45$$

On dividing by 9, we have:

$$x - y = 5.$$

Thus, the difference between the digits is 5, which is satisfied only by option E.

Alternate Approach 2:

Since the cash register contained 45 cents more than it should have as a result of this error, this implies that the tens digit of the correct amount must be greater than its unit digit.

Only three options can qualify. Let us analyze them:

(C) 54: $54 - 45 \neq 45$

(D) 65: $65 - 56 \neq 45$

(E) 83: $83 - 38 = 45$; correct answer

193. A certain business produced x rakes per month during November to February.

So total number of rakes produced during this period = $4x$.

Till now, storage cost paid by business = 0.

From next month onwards, that is March till October, business shipped exactly $\frac{x}{2}$ rakes per month.

In the month of March, the business would pay for $4x - \frac{x}{2} = \frac{7x}{2} = 3.5x$ rakes;

Similarly, in the month of April, it would pay for $\frac{7x}{2} - \frac{x}{2} = \frac{6x}{2} = 3x$ rakes;

This way business would pay its last payment in September for $\frac{x}{2} = 0.5x$ rakes.

We see that above is in the form of an Arithmetic Progression, with the first term = $3.5x$, common difference = $-\frac{x}{2}$, and number of terms = 7 (from March to September).

Sum of all the rakes

$$= \frac{\text{Number of months}}{2} \times (\text{Number of rakes in March} + \text{Number of rakes in September})$$

$$\Rightarrow \frac{7}{2} (3.5x + 0.5x) = 14x$$

Amount paid per un-shipped rake per month = \$0.10

So total amount paid = $14x \times 0.10 = 1.4x$

See the following table for a better understanding:

Month	No. of rakes shipped	Un-shipped rakes	Storage amount paid (\$)
March	$\frac{x}{2}$	$4x - \frac{x}{2} = \frac{7x}{2}$	$\frac{7x}{2} \times 0.10 = 0.35x$
April	$\frac{x}{2}$	$\frac{7x}{2} - \frac{x}{2} = \frac{6x}{2} = 3x$	$3x \times 0.10 = 0.30x$
May	$\frac{x}{2}$	$3x - \frac{x}{2} = \frac{5x}{2}$	$\frac{5x}{2} \times 0.10 = 0.25x$
June	$\frac{x}{2}$	$\frac{5x}{2} - \frac{x}{2} = \frac{4x}{2} = 2x$	$2x \times 0.10 = 0.20x$
July	$\frac{x}{2}$	$2x - \frac{x}{2} = \frac{3x}{2}$	$\frac{3x}{2} \times 0.10 = 0.15x$

The correct answer is option C.

Alternatively, we can solve this question by assuming a convenient number; choosing a number is also tricky. The smart number should be divisible by '2' at each stage, thus a number with a higher exponent, such as $2^8 = 256$ can be a good number.

194. Let the number of apples and bananas purchased be a and b , respectively.

Thus, total cost of the fruits = \$ $(0.7a + 0.5b)$

Thus, we have:

$$(0.7a + 0.5b) = 6.3$$

$$\Rightarrow 7a + 5b = 63$$

It is clear that a and b are positive integers.

As a starting solution, we can see that 63 is divisible by 7 and hence we take:

$a = 9$, $b = 0$; However this is not possible as the number of bananas > 0 .

The other solutions can be obtained by reducing a by the coefficient of b i.e. 5, and increasing b by the coefficient of a i.e. 7.

Thus, we have:

$$a = 9 - 5 = 4$$

$$b = 0 + 7 = 7$$

If we apply the same approach again, then the value of a becomes $4 - 5 = -1$ (negative), which is not possible.

Hence, there is only one possible solution to the equation: $a = 4$, $b = 7$

Thus, the total number of fruits purchased = $4 + 7 = 11$.

The correct answer is option B.

195. We have:

$$x + y + z = 2 \dots (i)$$

$$x + 2y + 3z = 6 \dots (ii)$$

Multiplying (i) by 3 and subtracting (ii) from the result:

$$3 \times (x + y + z = 2) - (x + 2y + 3z = 6)$$

$$\Rightarrow 2x + y = 0$$

$$\Rightarrow 2x = -y$$

$$\Rightarrow \frac{x}{y} = -\frac{1}{2}$$

The correct answer is option A.

196. Let the number pairs of hard contact lenses sold last week be h .

Since the number of pairs of soft contact lenses sold was 5 more than hard contact lenses, the number pairs of soft contact lenses sold last week = $(h + 5)$.

Selling price for each pair of soft contact lens = \$150.

Selling price for each pair of hard contact lens = \$85.

Thus, total selling price obtained = \$ $(85h + 150(h + 5))$.

Thus, we have:

$$85h + 150(h + 5) = 1690$$

$$\Rightarrow 235h = 1690 - 750$$

$$\Rightarrow h = \frac{940}{235} = 4$$

Thus, the number of pairs of hard contact lenses sold = 4.

Thus, the number of pairs of soft contact lenses sold = $4 + 5 = 9$.

Thus, the total number of pairs of contact lenses sold = $4 + 9 = 13$.

The correct answer is option B.

Alternate Approach:

Number of pairs of soft contact lenses sold is 5 more than the number of pairs of hard contact lenses.

The price of 5 pairs of soft contact lenses = \$ (150×5) = \$750.

Removing this from the total, i.e. \$1690, we are left with \$ $(1690 - 750)$ = \$940.

This amount was obtained by selling equal numbers of pairs of soft and hard contact lenses.

Total price of one pair of soft and one pair of hard contact lenses (i.e. 2 pairs of lenses)
= \$ $(150 + 85)$ = \$235.

Thus, number of lenses sold for \$940

$$\begin{aligned} &= \frac{940}{235} \times 2 \\ &= 8 \end{aligned}$$

Thus, total number of pairs of lenses sold = $5 + 8 = 13$.

5.15 Quadratic Equations & Polynomials

197. We have:

$$x = \sqrt{8xy - 16y^2}$$

Squaring both the sides:

$$x^2 = 8xy - 16y^2$$

$$\Rightarrow x^2 - 8xy + 16y^2 = 0$$

$$\Rightarrow (x - 4y)^2 = 0$$

$$\Rightarrow x - 4y = 0$$

$$\Rightarrow x = 4y$$

The correct answer is option D.

198. Given that,

$$(x - 2)^2 = 9$$

$$\Rightarrow x - 2 = \pm 3$$

$$\Rightarrow x = 2 \pm 3$$

$$\Rightarrow x = 5 \text{ OR } -1$$

Given that,

$$(y - 3)^2 = 25$$

$$\Rightarrow y - 3 = \pm 5$$

$$\Rightarrow y = 3 \pm 5$$

$$\Rightarrow y = 8 \text{ OR } -2$$

The minimum value of $\left(\frac{x}{y}\right)$ will be that value with the greatest magnitude of x , least magnitude of y and exactly one of x and y being negative in sign.

Thus, we have:

$$x = 5, y = -2 \Rightarrow \frac{x}{y} = -\frac{5}{2}$$

The maximum value of $\left(\frac{x}{y}\right)$ will be that value with the greatest magnitude of x , least magnitude of y and both x and y being simultaneously positive or negative in sign.

Thus, we have:

$$x = 5, y = 8 \Rightarrow \frac{x}{y} = \frac{5}{8}$$

OR

$$x = -1, y = -2 \Rightarrow \frac{x}{y} = \frac{1}{2}$$

Among $\frac{5}{8}$ and $\frac{1}{2}$, the fraction $\frac{5}{8}$ is greater.

Thus, the required difference

$$\begin{aligned} &= \frac{5}{8} - \left(-\frac{5}{2}\right) \\ &= \frac{5}{8} + \frac{5}{2} \\ &= \frac{25}{8} \end{aligned}$$

The correct answer is option E.

199. Given that,

$$2x + 3y + xy = 12$$

$\Rightarrow 2x + 3y + xy + 6 = 12 + 6 = 18$; (adding the product of the coefficients of x and y to both sides)

$$\Rightarrow (2x + 6) + (xy + 3y) = 18$$

$$\Rightarrow 2(x + 3) + y(x + 3) = 18$$

$$\Rightarrow (x + 3)(y + 2) = 18$$

Since x and y are positive integers, we must have:

$$x + 3 > 3, \text{ and}$$

$$y + 2 > 2$$

Possible ways of getting 18 are: 1×18 , 2×9 , *and* 3×6

Thus, the only possible solution is:

$$x + 3 = 6 \Rightarrow x = 3, \text{ and}$$

$$y + 2 = 3 \Rightarrow y = 1$$

Thus, we have: $x + y = 3 + 1 = 4$.

The correct answer is option B.

200. We know that:

$$h = -16(t - 3)^2 + 150 \dots (i)$$

We need to find the value of t so that the value of h is maximum.

In the expression for h , we have a term: $-16(t - 3)^2$

We know that: $(t - 3)^2 \geq 0$ for all values of t (since it is a perfect square).

Thus, we have:

$-16(t - 3)^2 \leq 0$ for all values of t (multiplying with a negative reverses the inequality).

Thus, in order that h attains a maximum value, the term $-16(t - 3)^2$ must be 0.

Thus, we have: $-16(t - 3)^2 = 0$

$$\Rightarrow t = 3$$

Thus, h attains a maximum value at $t = 3$

Thus, two seconds after the maximum height is attained, i.e. at $t = 3 + 2 = 5$, we have the corresponding value of h (in feet) as:

$$-16(5 - 3)^2 + 150; \text{ substituting the value of } t = 5 \text{ in (i)}$$

$$= -16 \times 4 + 150$$

$$= 86$$

The correct answer is option B.

201. We know that:

$$N(t) = -20(t - 5)^2 + 500, \text{ where } 0 \leq t \leq 10$$

We need to find the value of t so that the value of $N(t)$ is maximum.

In the expression for $N(t)$, we have a term: $-20(t - 5)^2$

We know that: $(t - 5)^2 \geq 0$ for all values of t (since it is a perfect square).

Thus, we have:

$$-20(t - 5)^2 \leq 0 \text{ for all values of } t \text{ (multiplying with a negative reverses the inequality).}$$

Thus, in order that $N(t)$ attains a maximum value, the term $-20(t - 5)^2$ must be 0.

Thus, we have:

$$-20(t - 5)^2 = 0$$

$$\Rightarrow t = 5$$

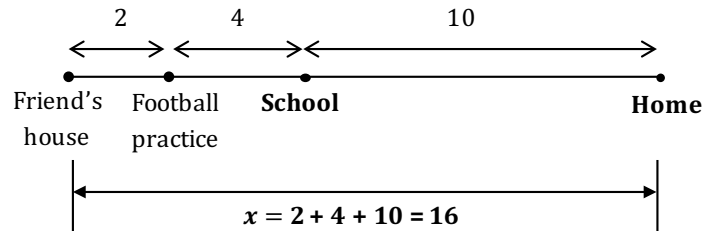
Thus, $N(t)$ attains a maximum value at $t = 5$ i.e. 5 hours past 2:00 am i.e. 7:00 am.

The correct answer is option B.

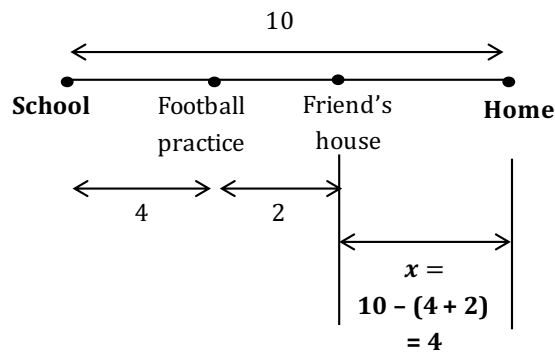
5.16 Inequalities

202. The possible extreme scenarios are shown in the diagrams below:

(1) Maximum distance away from home:



(2) Minimum distance away from home:



Thus, the maximum value of x is 16 and minimum value of x is 4

$$\Rightarrow 4 \leq x \leq 16$$

The correct answer is option D.

203. As per given inequality: $|y| \leq 12$, value of ' y ' ranges from ' -12 ' to ' $+12$ '. So by putting these values in first equation: $2x + y = 12$, we can form a table of consistent values of x & y .

x	y
0	12
1	10
2	8
3	6
4	4
5	2
6	0

x	y
Cont...	
7	-2
8	-4
9	-6
10	-8
11	-10
12	-12

So a total 13 ordered pairs are possible.

The correct answer is option D.

Alternate Approach:

We see that the value of y ranges from -12 to $+12$; this follows that y can have 25 number of integer values.

Now let us see how many integer values x can have.

$$2x + y = 12 \Rightarrow x = \frac{12 - y}{2};$$

$$\Rightarrow x = 6 - \frac{y}{2}$$

We see that for x to be an integer, $\frac{y}{2}$ must be an integer; this follows that y must be an even number or '0'.

Out of 25 possible values of y , 12 values are even and one value is '0'; so for x to be an integer, the set of arrangement can only have 13 ordered pairs.

204. Let the cost of an egg be $\$x$ and the cost of a sandwich be $\$y$.

Thus, we need to find the range within which $(4x + 3y)$ lies.

We have:

$$0.90 < 12x < 1.20$$

$$\Rightarrow \frac{0.90}{3} < \frac{12x}{3} < \frac{1.20}{3}$$

$$\Rightarrow 0.30 < 4x < 0.40 \dots (i)$$

Also, we have:

$$10 < 5y < 15$$

$$\Rightarrow \frac{10}{5} < y < \frac{15}{5}$$

$$\Rightarrow 2 < y < 3$$

$$\Rightarrow 6 < 3y < 9 \dots (ii)$$

Adding (i) and (ii):

$$6.30 < 4x + 3y < 9.40$$

Thus, the correct answer is option D.

205. Working with the options one at a time:

Comparing options A and B:

$$(xy)^2 = x^2y^2 < x^2 \text{ (since } 0 < y < 1 \Rightarrow y^2 \text{ is a fraction between 0 and 1)}$$

Thus, option B cannot have the greatest value.

Comparing options A and C:

$$\left(\frac{x}{y}\right)^2 = \frac{x^2}{y^2} = x^2 \times \left(\frac{1}{y^2}\right) > x^2 \text{ (since } 0 < y < 1 \Rightarrow 0 < y^2 < 1 \Rightarrow \frac{1}{y^2} > 1)$$

Thus, option A cannot have the greatest value.

Comparing options C and D:

$$\frac{x^2}{y} = \frac{x^2}{y^2} \times y = \left(\frac{x}{y}\right)^2 \times y < \left(\frac{x}{y}\right)^2 \text{ (since } 0 < y < 1 \Rightarrow y \text{ is a fraction between 0 and 1)}$$

Thus, option D cannot have the greatest value.

Comparing options C and E:

$$x^2y = \frac{x^2}{y^2} \times y^3 = \left(\frac{x}{y}\right)^2 \times y^3 < \left(\frac{x}{y}\right)^2 \text{ (since } 0 < y < 1 \Rightarrow y^3 \text{ is a fraction between 0 and 1)}$$

Thus, option E cannot have the greatest value.

The correct answer is option C.

Alternate Approach:

Since $x < 0$ and $0 < y < 1$ must be true for all the values x & y assumes, let us assume convenient, smart values of x & y .

$$\text{Say } x = -1 \text{ \& } y = \frac{1}{2}$$

Let us calculate the values of each option.

$$\text{(A) } x^2 = (-1)^2 = 1$$

$$\text{(B) } (xy)^2 = \left(-1 \times \frac{1}{2}\right)^2 = \frac{1}{4}$$

$$\text{(C) } \left(\frac{x}{y}\right)^2 = \left(\frac{-1}{\frac{1}{2}}\right)^2 = 4 : \text{Maximum}$$

$$\text{(D) } \frac{x^2}{y} = \frac{(-1)^2}{\frac{1}{2}} = 2$$

$$\text{(E) } x^2y = (-1)^2 \times \frac{1}{2} = \frac{1}{2}$$

206. Let the distance between the cities A and B be d miles.

Range of speeds of Anne = 25 miles per hour to 45 miles per hour.

Time taken by Anne to cover the distance = 4 hours.

So, the range of distance between cities A and B

= $[25 \times 4 \text{ miles}]$ to $[45 \times 4 \text{ miles}]$

= 100 miles to 180 miles

$\Rightarrow 100 < d < 180 \dots (i)$

Range of speeds of John = 45 miles per hour to 60 miles per hour.

Time taken by Anne to cover the distance = 2 hours.

So, the range of distance between cities A and B

= $[45 \times 2 \text{ miles}]$ to $[60 \times 2 \text{ miles}]$

= 90 miles to 120 miles

$\Rightarrow 90 < d < 120 \dots (ii)$

Thus, from (i) and (ii), we have:

Range of distance between cities A and B

= (Higher of the two minimum values) to (Lower of the two maximum values)

= (Higher of 100 and 90) to (Lower of 180 and 120)

= 100 miles to 120 miles

$\Rightarrow 100 < d < 120$

The only option which satisfies is 115 miles.

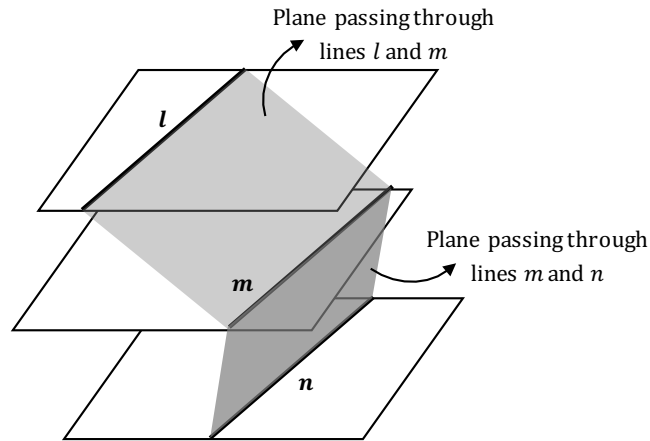
The correct answer is option B.

5.17 Geometry-Lines & Triangles

207. Working with the statements:

Statement I:

We can have a situation as shown below:



The lines l , m and n are parallel, however, the plane passing through l and m does not pass through n , implying that the lines are in different planes.

Thus, statement I is incorrect.

Statement II:

Since both l and m are separately parallel to n , the lines l and m must be parallel to each other as well.

Thus, statement II is correct.

Statement III:

From the above diagram, it is clear that lines l and m do not need to be the same line.

Thus, statement III is incorrect.

The correct answer is option B.

208. We know that:

$$AB = \frac{1}{2}CD$$

$$\Rightarrow CD = 2AB \dots (i)$$

$$BD = \frac{3}{2}AC \dots (ii)$$

$$BC = 24 \dots (iii)$$

From (ii):

$$\Rightarrow BC + CD = \frac{3}{2}(AB + BC)$$

Using (i) and (iii):

$$\Rightarrow 24 + 2AB = \frac{3}{2}(AB + 24)$$

$$\Rightarrow 48 + 4AB = 3AB + 72$$

$$\Rightarrow AB = 24$$

$$\Rightarrow CD = 2 \times 24 = 48$$

$$\Rightarrow AD = AB + BC + CD$$

$$= 24 + 24 + 48$$

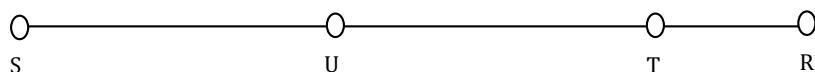
$$= 96$$

The correct answer is option D.

209. Since the length of $RS >$ the length of RT , R must be closer to T than to S .

Also, since sum of the lengths of RS and RT is greater than the length of ST , R must line beyond the line segment ST .

The sequence of the points R , S , T and U is shown in the diagram below:



Since U is the midpoint of ST , we have:

$$SU = UT = \frac{ST}{2}$$

$$= \frac{16}{2}$$

$$= 8$$

$$RU = RT + TU$$

$$= 4 + 8$$

$$= 12$$

The correct answer is option C.

- 210.** Here we know that both dressing rooms are equidistant from a cash register and distance between these 2 dressing tables is constant that is 16. So if we join all these 3 places with each other, it will give us an isosceles triangle.

So here property about lengths of sides of triangle is “Sum of any two sides is always greater than third side and positive difference between any two sides is always less than third side.”

- Case I – Isosceles triangle is of sides: 6, 6, 16. Here $6 + 6 \not> 16$ so such a triangle does not exist. So this is NOT the possible case.
- Case II – Isosceles triangle is of sides: 12, 12, and 16. This triangle follows above mentioned property. So this is a possible case.
- Case III – Isosceles triangle is of sides: 24, 24, and 16. This triangle follows above mentioned property. So this is a possible case.

The correct answer is option E.

- 211.** Given that:

$$x < y < z$$

Since z is the longest side in the right triangle, it must be the hypotenuse.

Also, x and y are the perpendicular legs of this right angled triangle.

Here let us recall formula to find the area of Right Angled Triangle:

$$= \frac{1}{2} \times \text{Product of two legs}$$

Thus, area of the triangle:

$$= \frac{1}{2} \times x \times y = 1$$

$$\Rightarrow xy = 2$$

If we assume that $x = y$, we have:

$$x = y = \sqrt{2}$$

However, it is known that $y > x$, we can conclude that $x < \sqrt{2}$ and $y > \sqrt{2}$.

$$\Rightarrow y > \sqrt{2}$$

The correct answer is option A.

212. Since z is the longest side in the right triangle, it must be the hypotenuse.

Thus, we have:

$$x^2 + y^2 = z^2 \dots (i)$$

Also, x and y are the perpendicular legs of the triangle.

Thus, area of the triangle:

$$= \frac{1}{2} \times x \times y = 1$$

$$\Rightarrow xy = 2 \dots (ii)$$

From (i), we have:

$$\begin{aligned} z^2 &= x^2 + y^2 \\ &= (x + y)^2 - 2xy \\ &= (x + y)^2 - 4 \text{ (since } xy = 2, \text{ from (ii))} \end{aligned}$$

Given $xy = 2$, the minimum value of $(x + y)$ occurs if $x = y$.

Let us verify:

Say, $x \neq y$:

$$x = 2, y = 1 \Rightarrow x + y = 3$$

However, if $x = y$:

$$x = y = \sqrt{2} \Rightarrow x + y = 2\sqrt{2} \approx 2 \times 1.4 = 2.8 < 3$$

However, the maximum value of $(x + y)$ is undefined and tends to infinity.

$$\text{Say, we take } y = 100, x = 0.02 \Rightarrow x + y = 100.2$$

Thus, the value of $(x + y)$ can be increased to any arbitrarily high value.

Thus, we can see that given $xy = 2$, $(x + y)$ has only a minimum value of $2\sqrt{2}$.

Hence, we have:

$$z^2 = (x + y)^2 - 4$$

=> The minimum value of z^2 occurs when $(x + y)^2$ is minimum i.e. $(x + y)$ is minimum

$$\Rightarrow \text{Minimum value of } z^2 = (2\sqrt{2})^2 - 4 = 4$$

=> $z > 2$ (the equality does not hold since x and y cannot be equal since $x < y$)

The correct answer is option A.

213. Since $DA = DC$, triangle DAC is isosceles

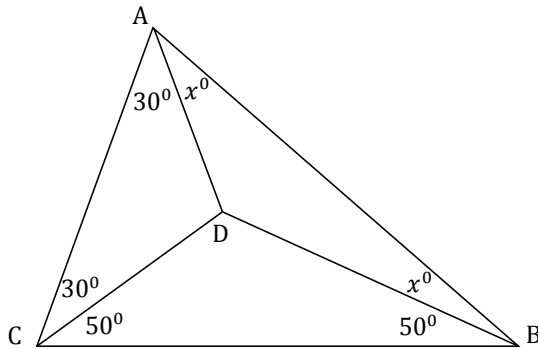
$$\Rightarrow \angle DAC = \angle DCA = 30^\circ$$

Since $DB = DC$, triangle DBC is isosceles

$$\Rightarrow \angle DBC = \angle DCB = 50^\circ$$

Since $DA = DB$, triangle DAB is isosceles

$$\Rightarrow \angle DBA = \angle DAB = x^\circ$$



Since sum of the internal angles in a triangle is 180° , we have:

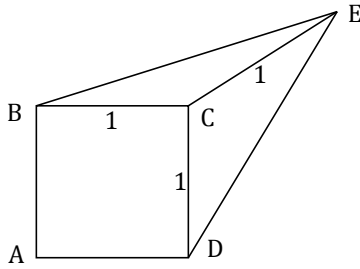
$$(30 + x) + (x + 50) + (50 + 30) = 180$$

$$\Rightarrow 2x = 20$$

$$\Rightarrow x = 10$$

The correct answer is option A.

214.



We observe that triangles BCE and DCE are isosceles.

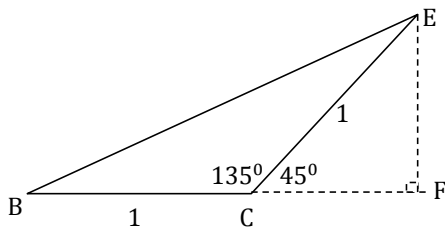
Also, triangle BCE $\cong$ triangle DCE

(Since CE is common, BC = CD and BE = DE)

Thus, $\angle BCE = \angle DCE$

$$= \frac{360^\circ - 90^\circ}{2} = 135^\circ$$

Considering triangle BCE alone, we have:



In triangle CEF:

$$\angle ECF = 180^\circ - 135^\circ = 45^\circ$$

$$\Rightarrow \angle CEF = 180^\circ - (90^\circ + 45^\circ) = 45^\circ$$

Thus, triangle CEF is isosceles.

Let $CF = EF = x$

Thus, from Pythagoras' theorem in triangle CEF:

$$x^2 + x^2 = 1^2$$

$$\Rightarrow EF = x = \frac{1}{\sqrt{2}} = \frac{\sqrt{2}}{2}$$

Thus, area of triangle BCE

$$= \frac{1}{2} \times \text{Base} \times \text{Height}$$

$$= \frac{1}{2} \times BC \times EF$$

$$= \frac{1}{2} \times 1 \times \frac{\sqrt{2}}{2}$$

$$= \frac{\sqrt{2}}{4}$$

The correct answer is option B.

Alternate Approach:

From symmetry, we can say that EC, when extended would pass through A.

$$AC = \sqrt{AB^2 + BC^2} = \sqrt{1 + 1} = \sqrt{2}$$

We know that if the height of two triangles is the same, the ratio of their area equals the ratio of their base.

Thus, we have:

$$\frac{\text{Area of triangle ABC}}{\text{Area of triangle EBC}} = \frac{\text{Base of triangle ABC}}{\text{Base of triangle EBC}}$$

$$= \frac{AC}{CE}$$

$$= \frac{\sqrt{2}}{1}$$

$$\text{Area of triangle ABC} = \frac{\text{Area of square ABCD}}{2}$$

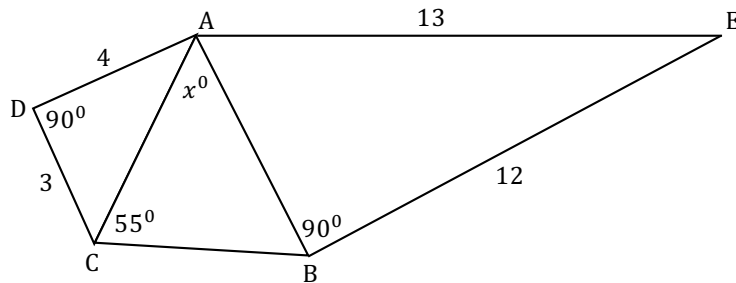
$$\frac{1 \times 1}{2} = \frac{1}{2}$$

Thus, we have:

$$\frac{\left(\frac{1}{2}\right)}{\text{Area of triangle EBC}} = \frac{\sqrt{2}}{1}$$

$$\Rightarrow \text{Area of triangle EBC} = \frac{1}{2\sqrt{2}} = \frac{\sqrt{2}}{4}$$

215. Let us bring out the figure.



In the right angled triangle ADC, as per Pythagoras theorem, we have:

$$AC^2 = AD^2 + CD^2$$

$$\Rightarrow AC^2 = 3^2 + 4^2 = 25$$

$$\Rightarrow AC = 5$$

In the right angled triangle ABE, as per Pythagoras theorem, we have:

$$AB^2 = AE^2 - BE^2$$

$$\Rightarrow AB^2 = 13^2 - 12^2 = 25$$

$$\Rightarrow AB = 5$$

Thus, we have:

$$AB = AC$$

In a triangle, if two sides are equal, angles opposite to them are also equal.

$$\Rightarrow \angle ABC = \angle ACB = 55^\circ$$

$$\Rightarrow \angle BAC = 180^\circ - (\angle ABC + \angle ACB)$$

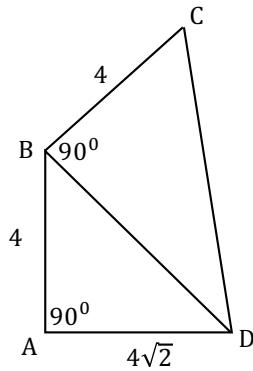
$$\Rightarrow \angle BAC = 180^\circ - (55^\circ + 55^\circ)$$

$$\Rightarrow \angle BAC = 70^\circ$$

$$\Rightarrow x = 70$$

The correct answer is option D.

216. Let us bring out the figure.



In right angled triangle ABD, as per Pythagoras theorem:

$$BD^2 = AB^2 + AD^2$$

$$\Rightarrow BD^2 = 16 + 32 = 48$$

$$\Rightarrow BD = 4\sqrt{3}$$

In right angled triangle CBD, as per Pythagoras theorem:

$$CD^2 = CB^2 + BD^2$$

$$\Rightarrow CD^2 = 16 + 48 = 64$$

$$\Rightarrow CD = 8$$

Thus, perimeter of triangle BCD

$$= BC + CD + BD$$

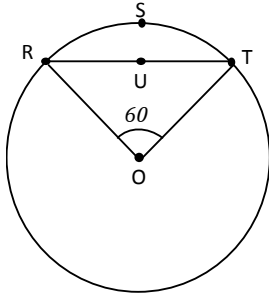
$$= 4 + 8 + 4\sqrt{3}$$

$$= 12 + 4\sqrt{3}$$

The correct answer is option C.

5.18 Geometry–Circles

217. Length of the arc RST (which subtends 60° at the center) $= 2\pi r \times \left(\frac{60}{360}\right)$, where r is the radius of the circle.



Thus, we have:

$$2\pi r \times \left(\frac{60}{360}\right) = 18\pi$$

$$\Rightarrow r = 54$$

In triangle TOR, we have: $RO = TO = \text{radius of the circle}$

Hence, we have:

$$\angle OTR = \angle ORT = \frac{180^\circ - 60^\circ}{2} = 60^\circ$$

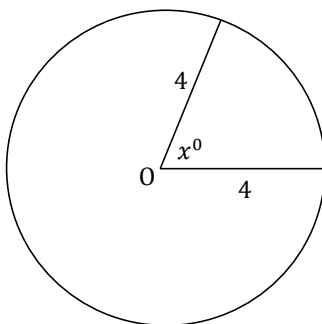
Thus, triangle TOR is equilateral.

Thus, we have: $RT = TO = RO = \text{radius of the circle} = 54$.

Thus, perimeter of the region RSTU $= (18\pi + 54)$.

The correct answer is option D.

218. Let us bring out the figure.



Area of a sector of a circle containing x° at the center is given by:

$$\text{Area} = \pi \times (\text{radius})^2 \times \left(\frac{x}{360}\right)$$

Thus, we have:

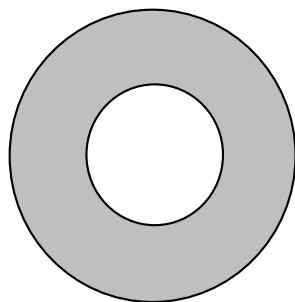
$$\pi \times (4)^2 \times \left(\frac{x}{360}\right) = 2\pi$$

$$\Rightarrow x = \frac{2 \times 360}{16}$$

$$= 45$$

The correct answer is option C.

219. Let us bring out the figure.



Let the radius of the outer circle be R and the radius of the inner circle be r .

Thus, area of the outer circle = πR^2

Area of the inner circle = πr^2

Thus, area of the shaded region = $(\pi R^2 - \pi r^2)$

Since the area of the shaded region is 3 times the area of the smaller circle, we have:

$$\pi R^2 - \pi r^2 = 3\pi r^2$$

$$\Rightarrow \pi R^2 = 4\pi r^2$$

$$\Rightarrow R^2 = 4r^2$$

$$\Rightarrow R = 2r$$

$$\Rightarrow \frac{R}{r} = 2$$

Thus, we have:

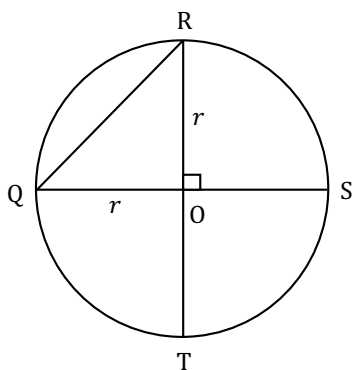
$$\frac{\text{Circumference of the larger circle}}{\text{Circumference of the smaller circle}}$$

$$= \frac{2\pi R}{2\pi r} = \frac{R}{r}$$

$$= 2$$

The correct answer is option C.

220.



In right angled triangle ROQ, as per Pythagoras theorem, we have:

$$\Rightarrow RQ^2 = RO^2 + QO^2$$

Since $RQ = \frac{8}{\sqrt{2}}$ and $RO = QO = \text{radius} = r$, we have:

$$\Rightarrow \left(\frac{8}{\sqrt{2}}\right)^2 = r^2 + r^2$$

$$\Rightarrow 2r^2 = 32$$

$$\Rightarrow r = 4$$

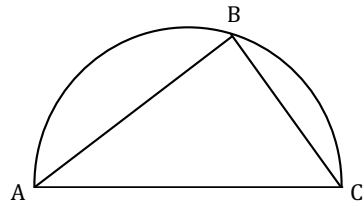
Thus, area of the circle

$$= \pi r^2$$

$$= 16\pi$$

The correct answer is option C.

221. Let us bring out the figure.



AC is the diameter of the semicircle.

Since the diameter subtends 90° at any point on the circumference, in triangle ABC, we have:

$$\angle ABC = 90^\circ$$

Thus, from Pythagoras' theorem, we have:

$$AC^2 = AB^2 + BC^2$$

$$\Rightarrow AC^2 = 8^2 + 6^2 \text{ (it is given that } AB = 8 \text{ and } BC = 6)$$

$$\Rightarrow AC = 10$$

$$\Rightarrow \text{Radius of the semicircle} = \frac{10}{2} = 5$$

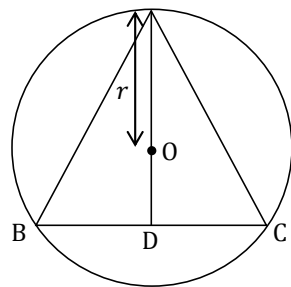
Thus, length of the arc ABC

$$= \pi \times (\text{radius of the circle})$$

$$= 5\pi$$

The correct answer is option E.

222.



$$\text{The area of an equilateral triangle} = \frac{\sqrt{3}}{4} \times (\text{side})^2 = \frac{\sqrt{3}}{4} \times (AB)^2$$

Thus, we have:

$$\frac{\sqrt{3}}{4} \times (AB)^2 = 9\sqrt{3}$$

$$\Rightarrow AB = 6$$

Thus, the height (or, the median) of the equilateral triangle (AD)

$$= \frac{\sqrt{3}}{2} \times (\text{side}) = \frac{\sqrt{3}}{2} \times (AB)$$

$$= \frac{\sqrt{3}}{2} \times 6$$

$$= 3\sqrt{3}$$

In an equilateral triangle, the centre of the circumscribing circle is the centroid of the triangle.

Thus, the centre of the circle (O) is the centroid of the equilateral triangle ABC.

The centroid divided the median AD in the ratio 2 : 1.

Thus, we have:

$$AO = \left(\frac{2}{2+1} \right) \times AD$$

$$= \frac{2}{3} \times 3\sqrt{3}$$

$$= 2\sqrt{3}$$

Thus, the radius (r) of the circle = $AO = 2\sqrt{3}$

Thus, the area of the circle

$$= \pi r^2$$

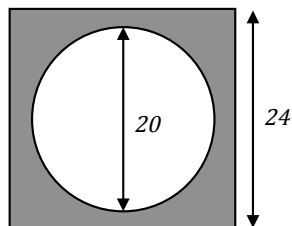
$$= \pi \times (2\sqrt{3})^2$$

$$= 12\pi$$

The correct answer is option C.

5.19 Geometry-Polygon

223. The diagram corresponding to the data provided is shown below:



We need to find what fraction the shaded area represents of the area of square table top.

Side of square table top is 24 inches.

Area of the square tabletop = $(\text{Side})^2$

$\Rightarrow 24^2 = 576$ square inches.

Diameter of circular mat is 20 inches.

Area of the circular mat = $\pi(r)^2$

$\Rightarrow \pi \times \left(\frac{20}{2}\right)^2 \approx 3.14 \times 100 = 314$ square inches.

Thus, area of the tabletop not covered by the mat = $576 - 314 = 262$ square inches.

Thus, the required fraction = $\frac{\text{area of the tabletop not covered by the mat}}{\text{Area of square table top}}$

$\Rightarrow \frac{262}{576} = \frac{131}{288}$.

We can see that 131 is less than half of 288 (= 144)

So here option A, B, and C are eliminated.

However, 131 is more than one-fourth of 288 (= 72)

So here option D is eliminated.

Thus, the required fraction must be between 50% (half) and 25% (one-fourth).

The only option satisfying is option E which is $\frac{9}{20} \times 100 = 45\%$

The correct answer is option E.

224. Let the length and breadth of the rectangular floors be x meters and y meters, where x and y are integers.

Since the perimeter of all such floors is 16 meters, we have:

$$2(x + y) = 16$$

$$\Rightarrow x + y = 8$$

Thus, the possible cases are:

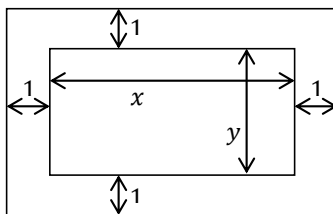
- (1) $(x, y) = (7, 1)$
 $\Rightarrow$ Area of the floor = $1 \times 7 = 7$ square meters
 $\Rightarrow$ Number of carpets required = $\left(\frac{7}{1 \times 1}\right) = 7$
 $\Rightarrow$ Total cost of carpeting = \$ $(7 \times 6) = \$42$
- (2) $(x, y) = (6, 2)$
 $\Rightarrow$ Area of the floor = $2 \times 6 = 12$ square meters
 $\Rightarrow$ Number of carpets required = $\left(\frac{12}{1 \times 1}\right) = 12$
 $\Rightarrow$ Total cost of carpeting = \$ $(12 \times 6) = \$72$
- (3) $(x, y) = (5, 3)$
 $\Rightarrow$ Area of the floor = $3 \times 5 = 15$ square meters
 $\Rightarrow$ Number of carpets required = $\left(\frac{15}{1 \times 1}\right) = 15$
 $\Rightarrow$ Total cost of carpeting = \$ $(15 \times 6) = \$90$
- (4) $(x, y) = (4, 4)$
 $\Rightarrow$ Area of the floor = $4 \times 4 = 16$ square meters
 $\Rightarrow$ Number of carpets required = $\left(\frac{16}{1 \times 1}\right) = 16$
 $\Rightarrow$ Total cost of carpeting = \$ $(16 \times 6) = \$96$

Note: For a given perimeter, the area is the maximum if the length and breadth are equal.

The correct answer is option D.

225. Let the length and breadth of the photograph be x inches and y inches respectively.

Thus, along with the border of 1 inch, the effective length becomes $(x + 2)$ inches and the effective breadth becomes $(y + 2)$ inches (since the border is along all sides) as shown in the figure below:



Thus, we have:

$$(x + 2)(y + 2) = m$$

$$\Rightarrow xy + 2(x + y) = m - 4 \dots (i)$$

Again, along with the border of 2 inches, the effective length becomes $(x + 4)$ inches and the effective breadth becomes $(y + 4)$ inches.

Thus, we have:

$$(x + 4)(y + 4) = m + 52$$

$$\Rightarrow xy + 4(x + y) = m + 52 - 16$$

$$\Rightarrow xy + 4(x + y) = m + 36 \dots (ii)$$

Subtracting (i) from (ii):

$$4(x + y) - 2(x + y) = (m + 36) - (m - 4)$$

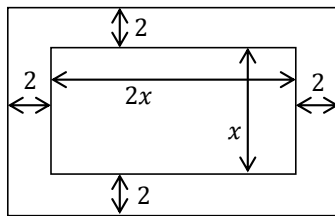
$$\Rightarrow 2(x + y) = 36 - (-4)$$

$$\Rightarrow 2(x + y) = 40$$

$\Rightarrow$ Perimeter of the photograph = 40 inches.

The correct answer is option D.

226. Let the breadth of the picture without the border be x inches.



Thus, the length of the picture without the border is $2x$ inches.

Thus, area of the above rectangle without the border = $2x \times x = 2x^2$ square inches.

Including the border, the length and breadth are $(2x + 4)$ and $(x + 4)$ inches respectively.

Thus, area of the above rectangle including the border = $(2x + 4)(x + 4)$ square inches.

Thus, the area of the border

$$= (\text{Area of the outer rectangle}) - (\text{Area of the inner rectangle})$$

$$= (2x + 4)(x + 4) - 2x^2$$

$$= 2x^2 + 12x + 16 - 2x^2$$

$$= 12x + 16$$

Thus, we have:

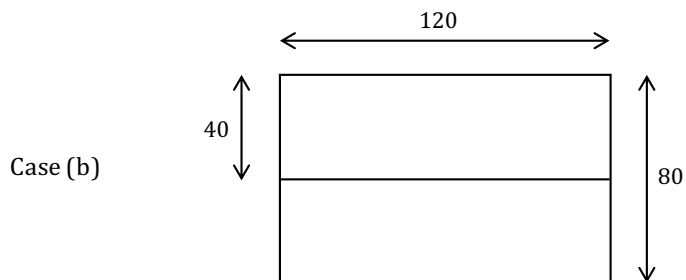
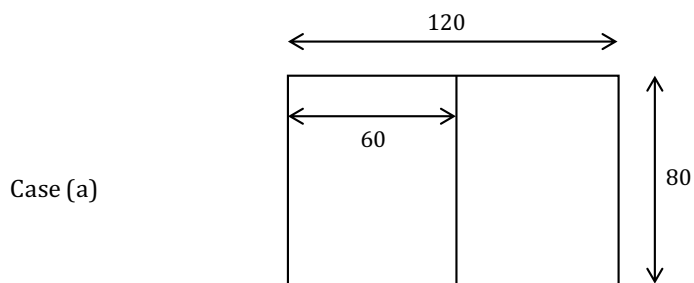
$$12x + 16 = 196$$

$$\Rightarrow x = 15$$

Thus, the length of the picture without the border = $2x = 30$ inches.

The correct answer is option C.

227. The two possible ways in which the field may be partitioned are shown below:



Case A: Perimeter of one half of the field = $2 \times (60 + 80) = 280$ feet.

Case B: Perimeter of one half of the field = $2 \times (40 + 120) = 320$ feet.

Thus, the perimeter is the minimum in the first case.

Thus, the minimum cost of fencing = \$ $(280 \times 2) = \$560$.

The correct answer is option D.

228. We know that the perimeter is 560 feet.

Thus, twice the sum of the length and breadth is 560 feet.

Thus, the sum of the length and breadth is $\frac{560}{2} = 280$ feet.

Let the length of the field = l feet.

Thus, the breadth of the field = $(280 - l)$ feet.

The diagonal of a rectangle is the square-root of the sum of squares of the length and breadth (from Pythagoras' theorem).

Since the diagonal is 200 feet long, we have:

$$\sqrt{l^2 + (280 - l)^2} = 200$$

$$\Rightarrow l^2 + (280 - l)^2 = 200^2$$

$$\Rightarrow 2l^2 + 280^2 - 560l = 200^2$$

$$\Rightarrow 2l^2 - 560l + 38400 = 0$$

$$\Rightarrow l^2 - 280l + 19200 = 0$$

$$\Rightarrow 280l - l^2 = 19200$$

$$\Rightarrow l \times (280 - l) = 19200$$

$$\Rightarrow \text{Length} \times \text{Breadth} = 19200$$

Note: We do not need to solve for the length to get the answer.

Thus, area = 19200 square feet.

The correct answer is option A.

Alternate Approach:

We know that the perimeter of the rectangle is 560 feet.

Thus, the sum of the length and breadth is $\frac{560}{2} = 280$ feet.

The area of the rectangle would be the maximum if the length and breadth are equal.

In that case, we would have:

$$\text{Length} = \text{Breadth} = \frac{280}{2} = 140 \text{ feet.}$$

Thus, the maximum possible area would be $= 140 \times 140 = 19600$ square feet.

However, in this case, the diagonal would not be 200 feet (since it does not satisfy Pythagoras' theorem).

Thus, the actual area would be less than 19600 square feet.

There is only one option, 19200 square feet which satisfies the above condition.

229. Width of the strip = t inches

$$= \left(\frac{t}{12} \right) \text{ feet}$$

Length of the strip = m miles

$$= 5280 \times m \text{ feet}$$

Thus, total area of the strip

$$\begin{aligned} &= \left(\frac{t}{12} \right) \times (5280 \times m) \\ &= \left(\frac{5280 \times m \times t}{12} \right) \text{ square feet} \end{aligned}$$

Quantity of paint required to paint p square feet = 1 gallon.

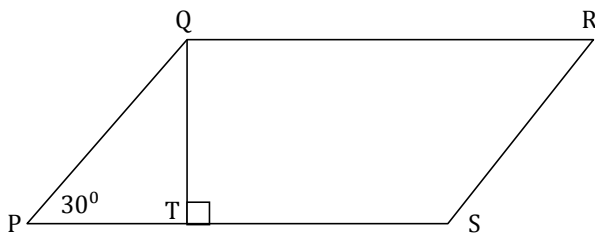
Thus, quantity of paint required to paint 1 square foot = $\left(\frac{1}{p} \right)$ gallon.

Thus, quantity of paint required to paint $\left(\frac{5280 \times m \times t}{12} \right)$ square feet

$$\begin{aligned} &= \left(\frac{1}{p} \right) \times \left(\frac{5280 \times m \times t}{12} \right) \\ &= \left(\frac{5280 \times m \times t}{12 \times p} \right) \text{ gallons} \end{aligned}$$

The correct answer is option A.

230. Let us bring out the figure.

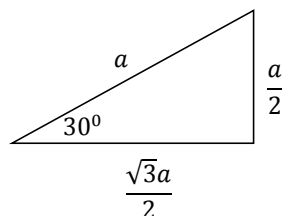


We know that the area of a parallelogram = Base $\times$ Height = $PS \times QT$

In triangle PQT, we have:

$PQ = 4$, and $\angle QPT = 30^\circ$

In a 30-60-90 triangle, the ratio of the sides of the triangle is shown below:



If the hypotenuse is of length a :

- (1) The side opposite to 30° is $\frac{a}{2}$
- (2) The side opposite to 60° is $\frac{\sqrt{3}a}{2}$

In the given problem, we have:

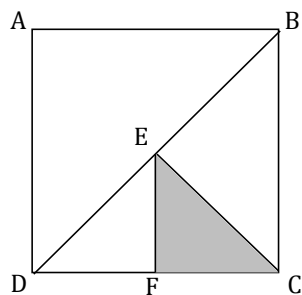
$PQ = \text{Hypotenuse} = 4$

$\Rightarrow QT (\text{side opposite to } 30^\circ) = \frac{4}{2} = 2$

Thus, area of the parallelogram $= QT \times PS = QT \times QR = 2 \times 6 = 12$.

The correct answer is option B.

231. Let us bring out the figure.



We know that:

E is the mid-point of BD, and

F is the mid-point of DC.

Thus, from intercept theorem, we have: $EF \parallel BC$.

Thus, triangle $DEF \cong$ triangle DBC

The ratio of the corresponding sides of the above two similar triangles

$$= \frac{DE}{DB} = \frac{1}{2}$$

Thus, ratio of the area of similar triangles DEF and DBC

$$= (\text{Ratio of their corresponding sides})^2$$

$$= \left(\frac{1}{2}\right)^2 = \frac{1}{4}$$

Thus, we have:

$$\frac{\text{Area of triangle DEF}}{\text{Area of triangle DBC}} = \frac{1}{4}$$

Since area of triangle DBC is $\frac{1}{2}$ area of square ABCD, we have:

$$\Rightarrow \frac{\text{Area of triangle DEF}}{\left(\frac{\text{Area of square ABCD}}{2}\right)} = \frac{1}{4}$$

$$\Rightarrow 2 \times \frac{\text{Area of triangle DEF}}{\text{Area of square ABCD}} = \frac{1}{4}$$

$$\Rightarrow \frac{\text{Area of triangle DEF}}{\text{Area of square ABCD}} = \frac{1}{8}$$

From the diagram, it is clear that triangles DEF and EFC are congruent and hence, have equal area.

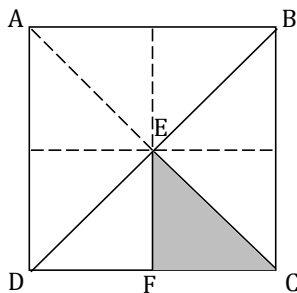
Thus, we have:

$$\frac{\text{Area of triangle EFC}}{\text{Area of square ABCD}} = \frac{1}{8}$$

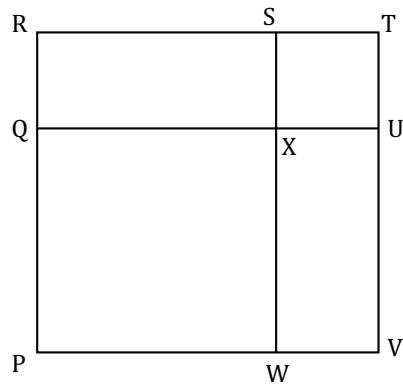
The correct answer is option B.

Alternate Approach:

Constructing a few lines (shown below as dotted lines) makes it clear that the shaded part i.e. triangle EFC is 1 out of 8 identical parts in which the square has been divided into.



232. Let us bring out the figure.



Area of square PRTV = 81

Thus, we have:

$$RT^2 = 81$$

$$\Rightarrow RT = 9 \dots (i)$$

Ratio of the area of square region XSTU to the area of square region PQXW = 1 : 4

$$\Rightarrow ST^2 : QX^2 = 1 : 4$$

$$\Rightarrow ST : QX = 1 : 2$$

Since RSXQ is a rectangle, RS = QX

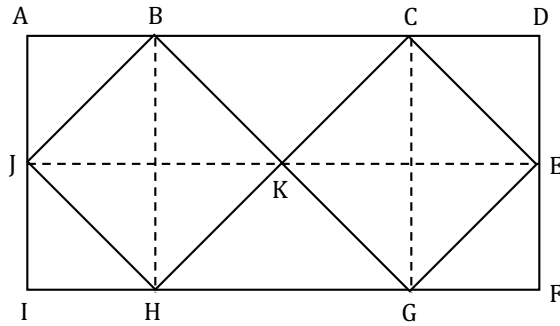
$$\Rightarrow ST : RS = 1 : 2 \dots (ii)$$

Thus, from (i) and (ii):

$$RS = \left(\frac{2}{1+2} \right) \times 9 = 6.$$

The correct answer is option C.

233. Let us redraw the figure.



Since BJHK and CKGE are identical squares, we have:

$$BH = CG = JK = KE \text{ (since diagonals of a square are equal)}$$

Thus, we have:

$$AD = JK + KE$$

$$= BH + CG$$

$$= AI + AI \text{ (since } BH = CG = AI \text{)}$$

$$\Rightarrow AD = 2 \times AI$$

Since, perimeter of the rectangle is $18\sqrt{2}$, we have:

$$2 \times (AD + AI) = 18\sqrt{2}$$

$$\Rightarrow 2 \times (2 \times AI + AI) = 18\sqrt{2}$$

$$\Rightarrow AI = 3\sqrt{2}$$

$$\Rightarrow \text{Diagonal of each square} = 3\sqrt{2}$$

If the side of each square be x , then the length of the diagonal $= x\sqrt{2}$

Thus, we have:

$$x\sqrt{2} = 3\sqrt{2}$$

$$\Rightarrow x = 3$$

Thus, perimeter of each square

$$= 4x$$

$$= 4 \times 3$$

$$= 12$$

The correct answer is option B.

234. Let the number of desks placed be d and the number of bookshelves placed be b .

Each desk is 2.0 meters long, and each bookshelf is 1.5 meters long.

Thus, the total length covered by d desks and b bookshelves = $(2.0d + 1.5b)$ meters.

We need to find the closest we can take the above value of $(2.0d + 1.5b)$ to 16 (since available space is 16 meters long).

Since we need to maximize the total number of desks and bookshelves, and bookshelves are shorter than desks, we must have a larger number of bookshelves than desks, keeping at least one of each.

Thus, we have:

$$(2d + 1.5b) \leq 16 \text{ (Where } d \text{ and } b \text{ are positive integers which are not equal to zero)}$$

If we take the maximum value of b to be 10, we have: $1.5b = 1.5 \times 10 = 15 < 16$

In the above situation, there is only $(16 - 15) = 1$ meter left which is not sufficient to accommodate a desk.

Checking with the next possible value of $b = 9$, we have: $1.5b = 1.5 \times 9 = 13.5 < 16$

Length of space left = $(16 - 13.5) = 2.5$ meters.

Thus, 1 desk (of length 2 meters) can be accommodated in this space.

Thus, space left after accommodating the desk = $(2.5 - 2) = 0.5$ meters.

The correct answer is option A.

235. We know that the radius of the circle formed is r .

Thus, circumference of the circle = $2\pi r$.

Thus, length of wire left to form the square = $(40 - 2\pi r)$.

Thus, length of each side of the square = $\frac{1}{4}(40 - 2\pi r) = \left(10 - \frac{1}{2}\pi r\right)$.

Thus, total area of the circle and the square formed

$$= \pi r^2 + \left(10 - \frac{1}{2}\pi r\right)^2$$

The correct answer is option E.

5.20 Geometry–3 Dimensional

236. The volume of liquid is the same in both cylinders.

$$\text{Volume of cylinder} = \pi \times r^2 \times h$$

For first cylinder, we know that $r = 5$ inches and $h = 9$ inches.

$$\text{Volume of liquid in the first cylinder} = v = \pi \times 5^2 \times 9 = 225\pi \text{ cubic inches.}$$

Let the radius of the second cylinder be R inches and height be 4 inches.

$$\text{Thus, volume of liquid in the second cylinder} = V = \pi \times R^2 \times 4 = 4R^2\pi \text{ cubic inches.}$$

As per given data,

$$v = V$$

Thus, we have:

$$4R^2\pi = 225\pi$$

$$\Rightarrow R^2 = \frac{225\pi}{4\pi}$$

$$\Rightarrow R = \frac{15}{2} = 7.5$$

The correct answer is option D.

237. Diameter of the smaller rim = 28 inches.

Circumference of the smaller rim = Distance covered by smaller ring in one revolution

$$\Rightarrow \pi \times 28 = 28\pi \text{ inch.}$$

Number of revolutions made per second by the smaller rim = x .

D_1 = distance covered per second by the smaller rim

= No. of revolutions per second $\times$ Distance covered by smaller ring in one revolution

$$\Rightarrow 28\pi x \text{ inch.}$$

Diameter of the larger rim = 35 inch.

Circumference of the larger rim = Distance covered by larger ring in one revolution

$$\Rightarrow \pi \times 35 = 35\pi \text{ inch.}$$

Let the number of revolutions made per second by the larger rim be y .

D_2 = distance covered per sec. by larger rim

= No. of revolutions per sec. $\times$ Distance covered by larger ring in one revolution

$$\Rightarrow 35\pi y \text{ inch.}$$

Hence, we have:

$$D_1 = D_2$$

$$28\pi x = 35\pi y$$

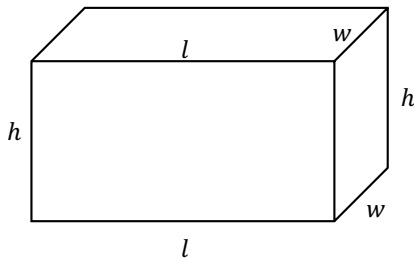
$$\Rightarrow y = \frac{4x}{5}$$

Thus, the number of revolutions made per second by the larger rim = $\frac{4x}{5}$.

Hence, the number of revolutions made per minute by the larger rim = $\frac{4x}{5} \times 60 = 48x$.

The correct answer is option C.

238.



Let the dimensions of the length, width and height be l , w and h respectively.

Since three faces shown have areas 12, 15, and 20, we have:

$$\text{Top face: } l \times w = 12 \dots (i)$$

$$\text{Front face: } l \times h = 15 \dots (ii)$$

$$\text{Right face: } h \times w = 20 \dots (iii)$$

Multiplying the above three equations:

$$l^2 \times w^2 \times h^2 = 12 \times 15 \times 20 = 3600$$

$$\Rightarrow l \times w \times h = \sqrt{3600} = 60$$

Since the volume of the solid is given by $l \times w \times h$, we have:

Volume of the solid = 60.

The correct answer is option A.

239. Since the ratio of length to width to height is 3 : 2 : 2, we can assume that:

- Length = $3k$
- Width = $2k$
- Height = $2k$

Thus, the volume of the rectangular carton

$$= 3k \times 2k \times 2k$$

$$= 12k^3$$

Thus, we have:

$$12k^3 = x$$

$$\Rightarrow k^3 = \frac{x}{12}$$

$$\Rightarrow k = \sqrt[3]{\frac{x}{12}}$$

Thus, the height of the carton

$$= 2k$$

$$= 2 \times \sqrt[3]{\frac{x}{12}}$$

$$= \sqrt[3]{8 \times \frac{x}{12}}$$

$$= \sqrt[3]{\frac{2}{3}x}$$

The correct answer is option B.

240. Let the height and radius of can X are h and r , respectively.

Thus, volume of oil in can X = $\pi r^2 h$

Thus, price of oil of quantity $\pi r^2 h = \$2 \dots (i)$

Height and radius of can Y = $2h$ and $2r$, respectively.

Thus, volume of can Y = $\pi(2r)^2(2h) = 8\pi r^2 h$

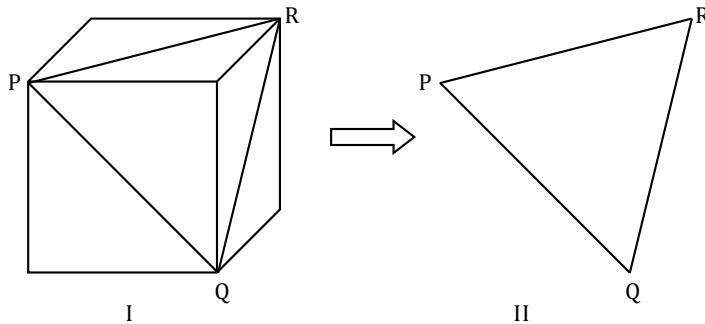
Since can Y is filled to half the capacity, volume of oil in can Y = $\frac{1}{2} \times 8\pi r^2 h = 4\pi r^2 h$

Thus, from (i), we have:

Price of oil of quantity $4\pi r^2 h = \$ (4 \times 2) = \8

The correct answer is option D.

241.



Let us join PR as shown in the figure (I) above.

Let us now remove the edges of the cube from the figure (I) so that only the triangle PQR is left behind as shown in figure (II).

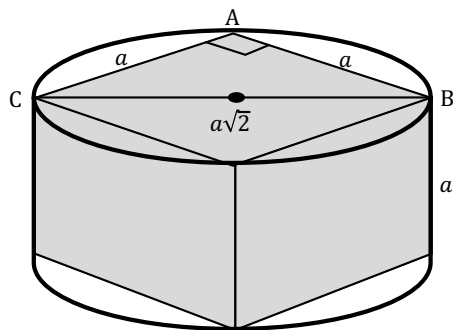
We can see that PR, RQ and PQ are the face diagonals of the cube and hence, are equal to one another.

Thus, triangle PQR is an equilateral triangle.

Thus, $\angle PQR = 60^\circ$

The correct answer is option C.

242. Let us consider the situation where the largest possible cube (shaded in grey) fits perfectly in a particular cylinder as shown in the diagram below; however, the question does not state that we must fit in a largest possible cube into the cylinder.



Let the edge of the cube be a .

Since the cube has to have a perfect fit (minimum non-utilization of cylinder space), we must have:

Height of the cylinder = edge of the cube = a

In right angled triangle CAB:

$$CB^2 = CA^2 + AB^2 = a^2 + a^2 = 2a^2$$

$$\Rightarrow CB = a\sqrt{2}$$

Thus, the diameter of the cylinder = $a\sqrt{2}$

$$\Rightarrow \text{Radius of the cylinder} = \frac{a\sqrt{2}}{2} = \frac{a}{\sqrt{2}}$$

Thus, volume of the cylinder

$$= \pi \times \text{radius}^2 \times \text{height}$$

$$= \pi \times \left(\frac{a}{\sqrt{2}} \right)^2 \times a$$

$$= \frac{\pi a^3}{2}$$

$$= \frac{3}{2}a^3$$

Volume of the cube = a^3

Thus, volume of the cylinder not occupied by the cube

$$= \frac{3}{2}a^3 - a^3$$

$$= \frac{a^3}{2}$$

Thus, the required percent

$$\begin{aligned} &= \frac{\text{Volume of the cylinder not occupied by the cube}}{\text{Volume of the cylinder}} \times 100 \\ &= \frac{\left(\frac{a^3}{2}\right)}{\left(\frac{3}{2}a^3\right)} \times 100 \\ &= 33.3\% \end{aligned}$$

The above situation depicts the case where minimum volume of the cylinder as a percent of the total volume of the cylinder is unutilized, i.e. not covered by the cube.

Thus, in any other scenario, the required percent value would be either greater than or equal to 33.3%

The only possible value from the answer options is 36%

The correct answer is option E.

5.21 Co-ordinate geometry

243. The length of the line segment between 2 points $(x_1, y_1) = (-3, -6)$ and $(x_2, y_2) = (5, 0)$ is given by:

$$\begin{aligned} L &= \sqrt{(x_2 - x_1)^2 + (y_2 - y_1)^2} \\ &= \sqrt{(5 - (-3))^2 + (0 - (-6))^2} \\ &= \sqrt{8^2 + 6^2} \\ &= 10 \end{aligned}$$

Thus, the length of the diameter of the circle = 10.

Thus, the length of the radius of the circle = $\frac{10}{2} = 5$.

Thus, the area of the circle = $\pi \times 5^2 = 25\pi$.

The correct answer is option C.

244. Equation of a line is: $y = mx + c$, where m is the slope and c is the Y-intercept.

Thus, we have the equation of the given line as:

$$y = 2x + 2$$

Let the required point on the above line be: $(a, 500)$.

Thus, we have:

$$500 = 2a + 2$$

$$\Rightarrow a = 249$$

Thus, the required X-coordinate of the point is 249.

The correct answer is option A.

245. Equation of a line passing through a point (p, q) and slope m is given as:

$$y - q = m(x - p)$$

Thus, the equation of the line n that passes through the origin $(0, 0)$ and has slope 4 is:

$$y - 0 = 4(x - 0)$$

$$\Rightarrow y = 4x$$

Since $(1, c)$ is a point on the line, we have:

$$c = 4 \times 1$$

$$\Rightarrow c = 4 \dots (i)$$

Since $(d, 2)$ is a point on the line, we have:

$$2 = 4 \times d$$

$$\Rightarrow d = \frac{1}{2} \dots (ii)$$

Thus, from (i) and (ii), we have:

$$\frac{c}{d} = \frac{4}{\left(\frac{1}{2}\right)} = 8$$

The correct answer is option E.

246. The equation of a circle having center at (p, q) and radius r is:

$$(x - p)^2 + (y - q)^2 = r^2$$

Since the center of the circle is at $(-2, -3)$, the equation of the circle is:

$$(x - (-2))^2 + (y - (-3))^2 = r^2$$

$$\Rightarrow (x + 2)^2 + (y + 3)^2 = r^2$$

If a point (m, n) lies inside the circle $(x - p)^2 + (y - q)^2 = r^2$, it must satisfy:
 $(m - p)^2 + (n - q)^2 < r^2$

Since $(-2, 1)$ lies inside the circle, it must satisfy:

$$(-2 + 2)^2 + (1 + 3)^2 < r^2$$

$$\Rightarrow r^2 > 16$$

$$\Rightarrow r > 4 \text{ OR } r < -4$$

Since r must be positive, we have:

$$r > 4 \dots (i)$$

If a point (m, n) lies outside the circle, it must satisfy:

$$(m - p)^2 + (n - q)^2 > r^2$$

Since $(4, -3)$ lies outside the circle, it must satisfy:

$$(4 + 2)^2 + (-3 + 3)^2 > r^2$$

$$\Rightarrow r^2 < 36$$

$$\Rightarrow -6 < r < 6$$

Since r must be positive, we have:

$$0 < r < 6 \dots \text{(ii)}$$

Thus, from (i) and (ii), we have:

$$r = 5$$

The correct answer is option B.

247. The three vertices are: (c, d) , $(c, -d)$ and $(-c, -d)$

We know that $c < 0$ and $d > 0$

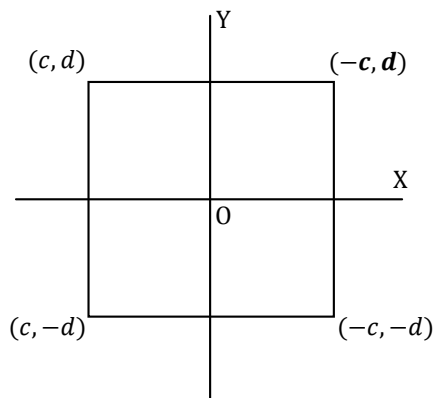
$$\Rightarrow -c > 0 \text{ and } -d < 0$$

We can see that the distance of each of the vertices from the origin $(0, 0) = \sqrt{c^2 + d^2}$

Thus, the three vertices are equidistant from the origin.

Thus, the centre of the square is at the origin.

Thus, the square would be positioned as shown in the diagram below:



Thus, the fourth vertex would be $(-c, d)$, which lies in the first quadrant.

Thus, the X-coordinate of the fourth vertex is positive and the Y-coordinate of the fourth vertex is also positive.

Thus, the only point which also lies in the same quadrant is (3, 5).

The correct answer is option E.

248. Distance between two points (x_1, y_1) and (x_2, y_2) is given by: $\sqrt{(x_2 - x_1)^2 + (y_2 - y_1)^2}$

Distance between the points (0, 0) and (3, 3)

$$= \sqrt{(3 - 0)^2 + (3 - 0)^2}$$

$$= \sqrt{18}$$

$$= 3\sqrt{2}$$

Distance between the points (0, 0) and (7, 0)

$$= \sqrt{(7 - 0)^2 + (0 - 0)^2}$$

$$= \sqrt{49}$$

$$= 7$$

Distance between the points (7, 0) and (3, 3)

$$= \sqrt{(7 - 3)^2 + (0 - 3)^2}$$

$$= \sqrt{25}$$

$$= 5$$

Thus, the perimeter

$$= 3\sqrt{2} + 7 + 5$$

$$= 12 + 3\sqrt{2}$$

The correct answer is option E.

249. Since the points are collinear, their slopes must be equal.

Slope of the line joining two points (x_1, y_1) and (x_2, y_2) is given by: $\left(\frac{x_2 - x_1}{y_2 - y_1}\right)$.

Slope of the line joining the points $(a, 0)$ and $(0, b)$

$$= \frac{b - 0}{0 - a}$$

$$= -\frac{b}{a}$$

Slope of the line joining the points $(a, 0)$ and $(1, 1)$

$$= \frac{1 - 0}{1 - a}$$

$$= \frac{1}{1 - a}$$

Thus, we have:

$$-\frac{b}{a} = \frac{1}{1 - a}$$

$$\Rightarrow -b \times (1 - a) = a$$

$$\Rightarrow -b + ab = a$$

$$\Rightarrow b + a = ab$$

$$\Rightarrow \frac{b + a}{ab} = 1$$

$$\Rightarrow \frac{b}{ab} + \frac{a}{ab} = 1$$

$$\Rightarrow \frac{1}{a} + \frac{1}{b} = 1$$

The correct answer is option C.

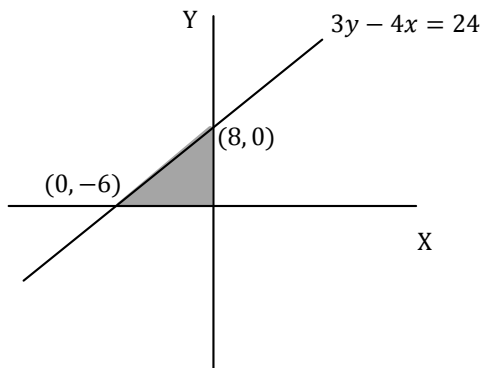
- 250.** The area of the triangle formed by the line with the two axes

$$= \frac{1}{2} \times (\text{Length of X intercept}) \times (\text{Length of Y intercept})$$

We have:

$$3y - 4x = 24 \dots (i)$$

The graph of the line and the area of the triangle formed by the line and the axes is shown in the diagram below:



To calculate the X-intercept:

Substituting $y = 0$ in (i):

$$x = -\frac{24}{4} = -6$$

Thus, the length of the X-intercept = 6.

To calculate the Y-intercept:

Substituting $x = 0$ in (i):

$$y = \frac{24}{3} = 8$$

Thus, the length of the Y-intercept = 8.

Thus, required area

$$= \frac{1}{2} \times 6 \times 8 = 24$$

The correct answer is option C.

Chapter 6

Solutions – Data Sufficiency Questions

6.1 Numbers

251. The 2-height of x is essentially the highest exponent of 2 that perfectly divided x .

For example, if $n = 24 = 2^3 \times 3$

The 2-height of 24 is 3 since the highest exponent of 2 that divided 24 perfectly is 3.

From statement 1:

We have: $k > m$.

There are only two possibilities for k , either it is odd or even; likewise, m may either be odd or even.

If k is odd, while m is even:

The 2-height of k will be '0' and hence will be less than that of m .

If both k and m are odd:

The 2-heights of both k and m will be '0', thus equals to heights

If $k = 2m$:

The 2-height of k will be '1' more than that of m (Here, it does not matter whether m is even or odd, either ways, the 2-height of k is greater than that of m).

Hence, there is no definite answer. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

We have: $\frac{k}{m}$ is an even number

$\Rightarrow k = m \times (\text{an even number})$

$\Rightarrow k = m \times 2^p$; where p is any positive integer

Thus, the 2-height of k will be p greater than that of m . – Sufficient

The correct answer is option B.

252. From statement 1:

We have: $k = 4q + 1$; where q is any positive integer (in this case, the quotient).

Since the value of q is unknown, we cannot determine the value of k . – Insufficient

From statement 2:

We have: $k^\# = k^2 + 1$.

$18 \leq k^\# \leq 36$

$\Rightarrow 18 \leq k^2 + 1 \leq 36$

$\Rightarrow 17 \leq k^2 \leq 35$

Since k is a positive integer, k^2 must be a perfect square between 17 and 35.

Thus: $k^2 = 25$

$\Rightarrow k = 5$. – Sufficient

The correct answer is option B.

253. Let the number of biology students in classes K and L be k and l , respectively.

Thus, we have:

$$k = 7n$$

$$l = 6p + 1$$

We need to determine the value of l .

From statement 1:

We have: $n = p$

Thus, we have:

$$k = 7p$$

$$l = 6p + 1$$

However, there may be many values for p , thus correspondingly many values for l .

Thus, we cannot find the value of l . – Insufficient

From statement 2:

We have: $k = l + 5$

Thus, we have:

$$7n = (6p + 1) + 5$$

$$\Rightarrow 7n = 6(p + 1)$$

$$\Rightarrow \frac{n}{p + 1} = \frac{6}{7}$$

There may be many values possible for n and p :

$n = 6$, $p = 6$; $n = 12$, $p = 13$ etc.

Thus, the value of p is not unique.

Hence, $l = 6p + 1$ is also not unique. – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

$$\frac{n}{p+1} = \frac{6}{7} \text{ and } n = p$$

Thus, we have:

$$\frac{p}{p+1} = \frac{6}{7}$$

$$\Rightarrow p = 6.$$

Thus: $l = 6p + 1 = 37$. – Sufficient

The correct answer is option C.

254. The number of positive factors of a number N expressed in its prime form as $N = p^x q^y$, where p and q are distinct primes, given by $(x+1)(y+1)$.

For example: $24 = 2^3 \times 3^1$.

The number of positive factors = $(3+1)(1+1) = 8$.

The factors of 24 are: 1, 2, 3, 4, 6, 8, 12, 24; i.e. 8 in number.

From statement 1:

$n = a^4 b^3$; where a and b are different prime numbers.

Thus, the number of positive factors = $(4+1)(3+1) = 20$. – Sufficient

From statement 2:

Here, n can take multiple possible values.

For example, 5×7 , $5^2 \times 7^3$, $5^4 \times 7$ etc. all have 5 and 7 as the only two prime factors.

However, the number of factors of each of the above numbers is different. – Insufficient

The correct answer is option A.

255. Since $\sqrt{x}$ is an integer, x must be a perfect square.

From statement 1:

We have: $11 < x < 17$

The only perfect square between 11 and 17 is 16.

Thus, we have:

$x = 16$.

$\Rightarrow \sqrt{x} = 4$ ($\sqrt{x}$ only takes the positive square root of x). – Sufficient

From statement 2:

We have: $2 < \sqrt{x} < 5$

The possible values of $\sqrt{x}$ are 3 or 4.

Thus, the value of $\sqrt{x}$ is not unique. – Insufficient

The correct answer is option A.

256. We have:

$$xy^{\left(\frac{4}{3}\right)} = \sqrt[3]{432}$$

Cubing both sides:

$$x^3y^4 = 432 = 3^3 \times 2^4$$

We need to determine whether $x + y = 5$.

From statement 1:

Nothing is mentioned about x .

For example, two possible solutions are:

If $x = 3$, $y = 2 \Rightarrow x + y = 5$;

OR

if $x = \sqrt[3]{432}$, $y = 1 \Rightarrow x + y \neq 5$. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

Nothing is mentioned about y .

For example, two possible solutions are:

If $x = 3$, $y = 2 \Rightarrow x + y = 5$;

OR

If $x = 1$, $y = \sqrt[4]{432} \Rightarrow x + y \neq 5$. – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

Both x and y are integers and $y > 0$.

Thus, the only way in which $x^3y^4 = 432 = 3^3 \times 2^4$ is $x = 3$, $y = 2 \Rightarrow x + y = 5$. – Sufficient

The correct answer is option C.

257. From statement 1:

The value of y is not known.

Hence, we cannot determine the value of $\frac{25x^2}{y^2}$ – Insufficient

From statement 2:

$$5x - 2y = 0$$

$$\Rightarrow 5x = 2y$$

$$\Rightarrow \frac{x}{y} = \frac{2}{5}$$

$$\Rightarrow \frac{x^2}{y^2} = \left(\frac{2}{5}\right)^2 = \frac{4}{25}$$

Thus, we have:

$$\frac{25x^2}{y^2} = 25 \times \frac{4}{25} = 4 \text{ – Sufficient}$$

The correct answer is option B.

258. $|m + 4| = 2$

$$\Rightarrow m + 4 = \pm 2$$

$$\Rightarrow m = -4 \pm 2$$

$$\Rightarrow m = -2 \text{ or } -6.$$

From statement 1:

We have: $m < 0$.

Thus, as per the information given in the question $m = -2$ or -6 .

Thus, there is no unique value for m . – Insufficient

From statement 2:

$$m^2 + 8m + 12 = 0$$

$$\Rightarrow (m + 2)(m + 6) = 0$$

$$\Rightarrow m = -2 \text{ or } -6.$$

Thus, both values of m are possible. – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

Even after combining both statements, we have:

$m = -2$ or -6 . – Insufficient

The correct answer is option E.

259. $|n + 5| = 5$
 $\Rightarrow n + 5 = \pm 5$
 $\Rightarrow n = -5 \pm 5$
 $\Rightarrow n = 0$ or -10 .

From statement 1:

We have: $n^2 \neq 0$

$\Rightarrow n \neq 0$

$\Rightarrow n = -10$. – Sufficient

From statement 2:

$$n^2 + 10n = 0$$

$$\Rightarrow n(n + 10) = 0$$

$$\Rightarrow n = 0 \text{ or } -10.$$

Thus, both values of n are possible, i.e. n is not unique. – Insufficient

The correct answer is option A.

260. For any decimal number, say $a.bcd$, where b, c, d are the digits after the decimal point, the tenth's digit refers to the digit b .

From statement 1:

$$d + 0.01 < 2$$

$$\Rightarrow d < 1.99$$

$$\Rightarrow 1 < d < 1.99$$

Thus, the tenth's digit of d may be 9 (if $d = 1.98$) or less than 9 (if $d = 1.88$). – Insufficient

From statement 2:

$$d + 0.05 > 2$$

$$\Rightarrow d > 1.95$$

$$\Rightarrow 1.95 < d < 2.$$

Thus, the tenth's digit of d must always be 9. – Sufficient

The correct answer is option B.

261. From statement 1:

$3a + 4b$ is even:

For any integer value of b , $4b$ is even, [since $(\text{even}) \times (\text{any integer}) = \text{even}$].

Thus, $3a$ must be even [since $(\text{even}) + (\text{even}) = \text{even}$].

Hence, a is even.

However, b may be even or odd. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

$3a + 5b$ is even:

Two odd numbers when added result in an even number OR two even numbers when added also result in an even number.

Thus, both $3a$ and $5b$ are odd i.e. both a and b are odd

OR

Both $3a$ and $5b$ are even i.e. both a and b are even

Thus, b may be even or odd. – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

From statement 1: a is even.

Hence, from statement 2: b is even. – Sufficient

The correct answer is option C.

262. From statement 1:

We know that a is a factor of b .

However, we have no information on the exponents k and m , which is likewise important.

For example:

2 is a factor of 6.

Also, 2^3 is a factor of 6^4 .

However:

2 is a factor of 6.

But, 2^4 is not a factor of 6^3 .

Thus, we need to know whether $k \leq m$. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

We know: $k \leq m$.

However, there is no information on a and b . – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

a is a factor of b ;

$k \leq m$

Thus, a^k is a factor of b^m . – Sufficient

The correct answer is option C.

263. From statement 1:

Since the product of the four numbers (10, -2 , -8 and 0) is zero, it is immaterial what the fifth integer be; for any value of the fifth integer, the product of five integers would still be '0'. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

The sum of the four integers = $10 \pm 2 \pm 8 + 0 = 0$.

Since '0' divided by any number is '0', we can only conclude that the fifth integer is not '0', as '0' divided by '0' is not defined; however we cannot determine the value of fifth integer. – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

Even after combining both the statements, we cannot get the value of the fifth integer.

The correct answer is option E.

264. We know that J, S and V lie is a straight line.

However, the order in which they are present is not known and whether they are positive or negative is also not known.

From statement 1:

The distance between J and $S = 20$.

However, the distance between V and either of J or S is not known; neither is the order in which the points are present is known. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

The distance between J and $V = 25$.

However, the distance between S and either of J or V is not known; neither is the order in which the points are present is known. – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

The order in which the points are present is not known.

For example, if the points are as: J_S_V , then the distance between S and V is $\Rightarrow 25 - 20 = 5$

However, if the points are as: S_J_V , then the distance between S and V is $\Rightarrow 25 + 20 = 45$

Thus, the distance between S and V cannot be determined. – Insufficient

The correct answer is option E.

265. The remainder when a number is divided by 10 is the unit's digit of the number.

For example: The remainder when 12 is divided by 10 is 2, which is the unit's digit of 12.

The exponents of 2 follow a cycle for the last digit as shown below (p is a positive integer):

Exponent of 2	Unit's digit
2^{4p+1}	2
2^{4p+2}	4
2^{4p+3}	8
2^{4p}	6

From statement 1:

Since k is divisible by 10, k may or may not be a multiple of 4.

For example, if $k = 20$: Unit's digit of $2^k = 2^{20} \equiv 6$.

Whereas, if $k = 30$: Unit's digit of $2^k = 2^{30} = 2^{(4 \times 7) + 2} \equiv 4$.

Thus, we do not have a unique remainder. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

Since k is a multiple of 4, its unit's digit is always 6. – Sufficient

The correct answer is option B.

266. From statement 1:

We know that: k and m are even and p is odd.

Thus, $(k - m - p)$ is

$((\text{Even} - \text{Even}) - \text{Odd}) = (\text{Even} - \text{Odd}) = \text{Odd}$. – Sufficient

From statement 2:

Since k, m and p are consecutive integers, there are two possibilities:

(1) $k = \text{Even}, m = \text{Odd}, p = \text{Even}$

$\Rightarrow (k - m - p)$ is $((\text{Even} - \text{Odd}) - \text{Even}) = (\text{Odd} - \text{Even}) = \text{Odd}$.

(2) $k = \text{Odd}, m = \text{Even}, p = \text{Odd}$

$\Rightarrow (k - m - p)$ is $((\text{Odd} - \text{Even}) - \text{Odd}) = (\text{Odd} - \text{Odd}) = \text{Even}$.

Hence, the nature of value of $(k - m - p)$ is not unique. – Insufficient

The correct answer is option A.

267.
$$\frac{k}{6} + \frac{m}{4} = \frac{t}{12}$$
$$\Rightarrow 2k + 3m = t$$

From statement 1:

k is a multiple of 3

$\Rightarrow k = 3u$; where u is an integer.

Thus, we have:

$$2k + 3m = t$$

$$\Rightarrow 6u + 3m = t$$

$$\Rightarrow t = 3(2u + m)$$

Thus, t is a multiple of 3.

Thus, t and 12 do have a common factor greater than 1. – Sufficient

From statement 2:

m is a multiple of 3

$\Rightarrow m = 3v$; where v is an integer.

Thus, we have:

$$2k + 3m = t$$

$$\Rightarrow 2k + 9v = t$$

Thus, we cannot definitely conclude that t is a multiple of 2 or 3.

Thus, t and 12 may or may not have a common factor greater than 1. – Insufficient

The correct answer is option A.

268. From statement 1:

There is no information about whether m and v are positive.

Hence, there would be different combinations of values of m and v possible, leading to different values of $(m + v)$.

The possible integer values of m and v satisfying the equation $mv = 6$ are:

m	v	$m + v$
1	6	7
2	3	5
3	2	5
6	1	7
-1	-6	-7
-2	-3	-5
-3	-2	-5
-6	-1	-7

Thus, there is no unique value of $(m + v)$. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

$$(m + v)^2 = 25$$

$$\Rightarrow m + v = \pm 5$$

Thus, there is no unique value of $(m + v)$. – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

Even after combining both statements, we have $(m + v) = \pm 5$

Thus, there is no unique value of $(m + v)$. – Insufficient

The correct answer is option E.

269. From statement 1:

In order to check if the number of digits of m^3 is unique, we check with the minimum and maximum values of m .

If $m = 100$ (smallest number with three digits):

$$m^3 = 1000000$$

$\Rightarrow m^3$ has seven digits (minimum).

If $m = 900$ (the largest number with three digits is 999, however, 900 would suffice):

$$m^3 = 729000000$$

$\Rightarrow m^3$ has nine digits (maximum).

Thus, the number of digits of m^3 , where m is a three digit number can be seven, eight or nine.

Thus, the number of digits of m^3 is not unique. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

We know that m^2 has five digits.

For example, if $m = 100$ (the smallest three digit number):

$$m^2 = 10000$$

$\Rightarrow m^2$ has five digits.

Here: $m^3 = 1000000$

$\Rightarrow m^3$ has seven digits.

However, if $m = 300$ (another three digit number):

$$m^2 = 90000$$

$\Rightarrow m^2$ has five digits as well.

Here: $m^3 = 27000000$

$\Rightarrow m^3$ has eight digits.

Thus, the number of digits of m^3 is not unique. – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

Even after combining, the number of digits of m^3 can be seven or eight and hence, is not unique.
– Insufficient

The correct answer is option E.

270. The product mpt will be even if at least one among m , p and t is an even integer.

From statement 1:

$$t - p = p - m$$

$$\Rightarrow m + t = 2p$$

Thus, we see that $(m + t)$ is twice of an integer and hence, is even.

However, it may be that m and t are both odd or both even.

Similarly, p may be odd or even.

For example:

$m = 3, t = 19, p = 11$: all are odd, the product mpt is odd.

OR

$m = 3, t = 5, p = 4$: at least one of them is even, the product mpt is even.

Thus, the product mpt may be even or odd. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

$$t - m = 16$$

Since the difference of t and m is 16 (even), it may be that m and t are both odd or both even.

Also, there is no information on whether p is even.

Thus, the product mpt may be even or odd. – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

Even after combining both statements, we can have all of m , p and t as odd or at least one of them even.

Thus, the product mpt may be even or odd. – Insufficient

The correct answer is option E.

271. We have: $n = 3k$

$$\Rightarrow k = \frac{n}{3}$$

Thus, k will be an integer if n is a multiple of '3'.

From statement 1:

We cannot say whether n is a multiple of '3'. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

We have: $\frac{n}{6}$ is an integer

$\Rightarrow n$ is a multiple of '6'

$\Rightarrow n$ is a multiple of '3'. – Sufficient

The correct answer is option B.

272. From statement 1:

We have no information on k . – Insufficient

From statement 2:

We have no information on n . – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

n is divisible by 8

$\Rightarrow n = 8p$, where p is an integer.

k is divisible by 4

$\Rightarrow k = 4q$, where q is an integer.

Thus, we have:

$$\frac{n}{k} = \frac{8p}{4q} = \frac{2p}{q} = 2 \times \frac{p}{q}$$

If $\frac{p}{q}$ is an integer, then $\frac{n}{k}$ is an even integer.

However, if $\frac{p}{q}$ is not an integer, then $\frac{n}{k}$ is not an even integer.

For example, if $\frac{p}{q} = \frac{1}{2} \Rightarrow \frac{n}{k} = 1$; not an even integer.

For other non-integer values of $\frac{p}{q}$, $\frac{n}{k}$ is not an integer at all.

Hence, the answer to the question may be 'Yes' or 'No'. – Insufficient

The correct answer is option E.

273. From statement 1:

$$n = k(k+1)(k-1)$$

This can also be written as: $n = (k-1)k(k+1)$

Thus, n is the product of three consecutive integers $(k-1)$, k and $(k+1)$.

Possible values of k are 1, 2, 3 ...

If $k = 1$:

$n = 0$; which is divisible by 6.

For any other value of k , since n is the product of three consecutive integers, there is at least one even integer and one integer which is a multiple of 3.

Thus, n is divisible by $3 \times 2 = 6$.

Hence, n is divisible by 6 for any positive integer value of k . – Sufficient

Alternatively:

Product of 'n' consecutive integers must be divisible by $n!$ thus, product of three consecutive integers must be divisible by $3!$ i.e. 6. – Sufficient

From statement 2:

There is no information about the relation between k and n . – Insufficient

The correct answer is option A.

274. From statement 1:

2 is not a factor of n

$\Rightarrow n$ is an odd number.

If $n = 5$:

Remainder (r) when $(n - 1)(n + 1) = n^2 - 1 = 24$ is divided by 24 is '0'.

If $n = 9$:

Remainder (r) when $(n - 1)(n + 1) = n^2 - 1 = 80$ is divided by 24 is '8'.

Thus, the value of r is not unique. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

3 is not a factor of n

$\Rightarrow n$ is not a multiple of 3.

If $n = 5$:

Remainder (r) when $(n - 1)(n + 1) = n^2 - 1 = 24$ is divided by 24 is '0'.

If $n = 8$:

Remainder (r) when $(n - 1)(n + 1) = n^2 - 1 = 63$ is divided by 24 is '15'.

Thus, the value of r is not unique. – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

n is neither a multiple of 2 nor 3

$\Rightarrow n$ is not a multiple of 6.

Thus, n when divided by 6 will leave a remainder of either 1 or 5, since it cannot leave remainders 2, or 4 (n is not a multiple of 2) and 3 (n is not a multiple of 3).

Thus, we have:

$n = 6p + 1$ or $n = 6p - 1$, where p is a positive integer.

Thus, we have the following situations:

If $n = 6p + 1$	If $n = 6p - 1$
$(n - 1)(n + 1)$ $= \{(6p + 1) - 1\} \{(6p + 1) + 1\}$ $= 6p \times (6p + 2)$	$(n - 1)(n + 1)$ $= \{(6p - 1) - 1\} \{(6p - 1) + 1\}$ $= (6p - 2) \times 6p$

Thus, we observe that:

$$\begin{aligned}
 &(n - 1)(n + 1) \\
 &= 6p \times (6p \pm 2) \\
 &= 12p \times (3p \pm 1)
 \end{aligned}$$

Now, we have two situations depending on p as even OR p as odd:

- (1) If p is even:
 $\Rightarrow 12p(3p \pm 1)$ is a multiple of 24.
- (2) If p is odd:
 $\Rightarrow (3p \pm 1)$ is even
 $\Rightarrow 12p(3p \pm 1)$ is a multiple of 24.

Thus, we see that $(n - 1)(n + 1)$ is always divisible by 24.

Hence, the remainder (r) when $(n - 1)(n + 1)$ is divided by 24 is '0'. – Sufficient

The correct answer is option C.

275. From statement 1:

$$n = 2k + 1$$

Thus, we have:

$$\begin{aligned}
 &n^3 - n \\
 &= n(n^2 - 1) \\
 &= n(n - 1)(n + 1)
 \end{aligned}$$

$$= (2k + 1)(2k)(2k + 2)$$

$$= 4k(2k + 1)(k + 1)$$

$\Rightarrow (n^3 - n)$ is divisible by 4. – Sufficient

Alternatively:

$$n = 2k + 1$$

$\Rightarrow n$ is an odd number.

Thus, $(n - 1)$ and $(n + 1)$ must be even.

Thus, we have:

$$n^3 - n$$

$$= n(n^2 - 1) = n \times (n - 1)(n + 1)$$

= odd $\times$ even $\times$ even, which must be divisible by 4. – Sufficient

From statement 2:

We have: $(n^2 + n)$ is divisible by 6

$\Rightarrow n(n + 1)$ is divisible by 6.

If $n = 2$:

It satisfies $n(n + 1)$ divisible by 6.

However, $(n^3 - n) = 6$, which is not divisible by 4.

Again, if $n = 3$:

It satisfies $n(n + 1)$ divisible by 6.

However, $(n^3 - n) = 24$, which is divisible by 4.

Hence, we do not have a unique answer. – Insufficient

The correct answer is option A.

276. From statement 1:

We know that $3n$ is odd.

Since n is an integer and '3' is odd, n must be an odd integer (since: $\text{odd} \times \text{odd} = \text{odd}$). – Sufficient

From statement 2:

We know that $(n + 3)$ is odd.

Since '3' is odd, n must be odd (since: $\text{odd} + \text{odd} = \text{even}$). – Sufficient

The correct answer is option D.

277. From statement 1:

Since n divided by 3 leaves a remainder 2, we have:

$n = 3k + 2$, where k is a positive integer.

However, the value of n cannot be determined as k is unknown. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

We know that n^2 divided by 3 leaves a remainder 1.

We know that any number n divided by 3 leaves a remainder of 0 or 1 or 2.

Thus, n^2 when divided by 3 would leave a remainder $0^2 = 0$ or $1^2 = 1$ or $2^2 = 4 \equiv 1$ (since 4 is greater than 3, we divide 4 by 3 to get the actual remainder as 1).

Thus, n^2 when divided by 3 leaves remainder 0 or 1.

It is obvious that the remainder 0 occurs when the number n is a multiple of 3.

For all other values of n , the remainder would be 1.

Thus, there are infinitely many possible values of n , for example: 4, 5, 7, 8, 10 ...

Thus, we cannot determine any unique value of n . – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

From statement 1, we have:

$$n = 3k + 2$$

$$\Rightarrow n^2 = 9k^2 + 12k + 4$$

$$\Rightarrow n^2 = 3(3k^2 + 4k + 1) + 1$$

Thus, n^2 when divided by 3 would leave a remainder 1.

However, this is exactly what statement 2 conveys.

Thus, statement 2 provides the same information as statement 1.

Since there is no additional information provided about n , the value of n cannot be determined.
– Insufficient

The correct answer is option E.

278. From statement 1:

Since $30^n > 1000$, we have:

$$n \geq 3 \text{ (since } 30^2 = 900 < 1000 \text{ and } 30^3 = 27000 > 1000\text{)}.$$

Since $n \geq 3$, the number of trailing zeroes in 30^n must be at least '3'.

Thus, the hundreds' digit of 30^n is '0'. – Sufficient

From statement 2:

Possible values of n are 3, 6, 9 ...

If $n = 3$, we have:

$$30^n = 30^3 = 27000.$$

Thus, when $n = 3$ there are '3' trailing zeroes in 30^n .

For higher values of n , the number of trailing zeroes would be higher.

Thus, the hundred's digit in 30^n is '0'. – Sufficient

The correct answer is option D.

279. From statement 1:

n is a multiple of 36 such that its value is between 100 and 200.

Thus, possible multiples of 36 are: $36 \times 3 = 108$, $36 \times 4 = 144$, and $36 \times 5 = 180$.

Since $\frac{n}{36}$ is an odd integer, possible values of n are $36 \times 3 = 108$ or $36 \times 5 = 180$.

Thus, the value of n is not unique. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

n is a multiple of 45 such that its value is between 100 and 200.

Thus, possible multiples of 45 are: $45 \times 3 = 135$, and $45 \times 4 = 180$.

Since $\frac{n}{45}$ is an even integer, the only possible value of n is $45 \times 4 = 180$.

Thus, the value of n is unique. – Sufficient

The correct answer is option B.

280. From statement 1:

Factors of 15 are: 1, 3, 5, and 15.

Possible factors of 15 (lying between 2 and 6) are 3 and 5.

Thus, possible values of n are 3 or 5.

Thus, the value of n is not unique. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

Factors of 21 are: 1, 3, 7, and 21.

The only possible factor of 21 (lying between 2 and 6) is 3.

Thus, the only possible value of n is 3. – Sufficient

The correct answer is option B.

281. $x^n - x^{-n} = 0$

$$\Rightarrow x^n - \frac{1}{x^n} = 0$$

$$\Rightarrow x^n = \frac{1}{x^n}$$

$$\Rightarrow x^n \times x^n = 1$$

$$\Rightarrow x^{2n} = 1$$

Thus, there are two possibilities:

- (1) $x = \pm 1$ (here, n can be any number: since '1' raised to any exponent is always '1' and '-1' raised to any even exponent (i.e. 2) is always 1)

OR

- (2) $n = 0$ (here, x can be any number: since any non-zero number raised to '0' is always '1')

Thus, we need to use the statements 1 and 2 to decide which of the above cases is possible.

From statement 1:

We only know that x is an integer.

We have no information on whether n is '0'.

Thus, the value of x cannot be determined. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

Since $n \neq 0$, we must have:

$$x = \pm 1$$

However, we cannot uniquely determine the value of x . – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

Even after combining both statement, we still have $x = \pm 1$.

Thus, the value of x cannot be uniquely determined. – Insufficient

The correct answer is option E.

282. From statement 1:

We know that the sum of the two digits of n is a prime number.

Thus, apart from $n = 11$ (sum of the digits is 2, the only even prime), for all other values of n , one digit of n must be even and the other digit of n must be odd (since the sum of an even and odd number is always odd and all prime numbers above 2 are odd).

Thus, possible values of n could be: 23 (sum of digits = 5, a prime number), 89 (sum of digits = 17, a prime number), etc.

Thus, n may be less than 80 or more than 80. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

We know that each of the two digits of n is a prime number.

In order that $n > 80$ (but less than 99), we need to have a prime number greater than or equal to 8 but less than or equal to 9 in the tens' position of n .

However, this is not possible.

Thus, all possible values of n would have a digit less than 8 in the tens' position.

Possible such digits are: 7, 5, 3, or 2.

Hence, $n < 80$. – Sufficient

The correct answer is option B.

283. $\frac{n}{7}$ will be an integer only if n is a multiple of 7.

From statement 1:

Since $\frac{3n}{7}$ is an integer, we can conclude that $3n$ is divisible by 7.

However, 3 and 7 have no common factors.

Thus, n must be divisible by 7.

Hence, $\frac{n}{7}$ must be an integer. – Sufficient

From statement 2:

Since $\frac{5n}{7}$ is an integer, we can conclude that $5n$ is divisible by 7.

However, 5 and 7 have no common factors.

Thus, n must be divisible by 7.

Hence, $\frac{n}{7}$ must be an integer. – Sufficient

The correct answer is option D.

284. $10^n \leq 0.001$

$$\Rightarrow 10^n \leq 10^{-3}$$

$$\Rightarrow n \leq -3$$

From statement 1:

Possible values of n are: $-2, -3, -4 \dots$

Thus, we have:

$$n = -2 (\not\leq -3)$$

OR

$$n = -3, -4 \text{ etc. } (\leq -3).$$

Thus, we do not have a unique answer to the question. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

Possible values of n are: $-4, -3, -2, -1 \dots$

Thus, we have:

$$n = -4 \text{ or } -3 (\leq -3)$$

OR

$$n = -2, -1 \text{ etc. } (\not\leq -3)$$

Thus, we do not have a unique answer to the question. – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

We still have:

$$n = -2 (\not\leq -3)$$

OR

$$n = -4 \text{ or } -3 (\leq -3)$$

Thus, we do not have a unique answer to the question. – Insufficient

The correct answer is option E.

285. We need to verify whether:

$$\frac{p}{r} = \frac{s}{t}$$

From statement 1:

We have:

$$s = 3p \dots (i)$$

$$t = 3r \dots (ii)$$

Dividing (i) by (ii)

$$\frac{s}{t} = \frac{3p}{3r} = \frac{p}{r} \text{ - Sufficient}$$

From statement 2:

We have:

$$3p = 2r$$

$$\Rightarrow \frac{p}{r} = \frac{2}{3} \dots (iii)$$

$$3s = 2t$$

$$\Rightarrow \frac{s}{t} = \frac{2}{3} \dots (iv)$$

From, (iii) and (iv)

$$\frac{p}{r} = \frac{s}{t} \text{ - Sufficient}$$

The correct answer is option D.

286. From statement 1:

Let us factorize 728:

$$728 = 2^3 \times 7 \times 13.$$

Thus, we have:

$$p^3st = 2^3 \times 7 \times 13.$$

Since p, s , and t are prime numbers, we have:

$$p = 2, s = 7, t = 13$$

OR

$$p = 2, s = 13, t = 7$$

In either case, $p^3s^3t^3 = 2^3 \times 7^3 \times 13^3$. - Sufficient

From statement 2:

We have no information on p and s . – Insufficient

The correct answer is option A.

287. We have:

x is a multiple of 12

$\Rightarrow x^2$ is a multiple of $12^2 = 144 = 2^4 \times 3^2$.

Also, y is a multiple of $14 = 2 \times 7$.

Or, x^2y is a multiple of $2^5 \times 3^2 \times 7$

In order that x^2y is a multiple of 216 ($= 2^3 \times 3^3$), we must ensure that there are three 2's and three 3's in x^2y . We see that there are sufficient 2's (five), but deficient by one 3.

From statement 1:

We already know that x^2 is a multiple of 144 i.e. it is a multiple of 8.

Also, we have seen that the maximum exponent of 2 in 216 is 2^3 .

Thus, the requirement of three 2's in x^2y is already satisfied.

But, this statement does not provide any information on number of multiples of 3. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

We have: y is a multiple of 6

Also, we know that x^2 is a multiple of 144.

Thus, x^2y is a multiple of $144 \times 6 = 864 = 216 \times 4$.

Thus, x^2y is a multiple of 216. – Sufficient

The correct answer is option B.

288. Since $0 < q < 17$, the remainder (r) when 17 is divided by q can be any of the following:

$r = 0, 1, 2, 3 \dots 15$ or 16.

From statement 1:

Since $q > 10$, possible values of q are: 11, 12, 13, 14, 15 or 16.

Thus, the corresponding values of r are: 6, 5, 4, 3, 2 or 1.

Thus, the value of r is not unique. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

Since $q = 2^k$ and also less than 17, possible values of q are: $2^1 = 2$, $2^2 = 4$, $2^3 = 8$ or $2^4 = 16$.

Thus, the values of the remainder (r) when 17 is divided by 2, 4, 8 or 16 is 1 in each case.

Thus, the value of r is unique. – Sufficient

The correct answer is option B.

289. We have: $r > 0$

We need to determine whether: $rs > 0$

We need to determine whether $s > 0$, since $r > 0$ and, Positive $\times$ Positive = Positive

From statement 1:

We have:

$$s \leq r:$$

If $s = r$:

$$rs = s^2 > 0$$

If $s < r$:

The value of s may be positive (but less than r) or the value of s may be negative.

If $s < 0$:

$$rs < 0$$

Thus, there is no unique answer to the question. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

We have: $s \geq r$:

Since $r > 0$

$$\Rightarrow s \geq r > 0$$

Since both s and r are positive, we have:

$rs > 0$. – Sufficient

The correct answer is option B.

290. From statement 1:

We have: rs is divisible by 49.

There may be a possibility that both r and s are divisible by 7 and hence, their product is divisible by 49.

However, there is another possibility that s is divisible by 49 and r is not divisible by 7.

Thus, there is no unique answer to the question. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

We have no information about r . – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

Even after combining both statements, we cannot determine whether r is divisible by 7. – Insufficient

The correct answer is option E.

291. From statement 1:

$$r - 1 = (s + 1)(s - 1)$$

$$\Rightarrow r - 1 = s^2 - 1$$

$$\Rightarrow r = s^2$$

$$\Rightarrow \frac{r}{s} = s \text{ (which is given to be an integer). – Sufficient}$$

From statement 2:

We have:

$$r - s = 20$$

A few possible values of r and s are:

$$r = 22, s = 2 \Rightarrow \frac{r}{s} = \frac{22}{2} = 11 \text{ (an integer)}$$

$$r = 23, s = 3 \Rightarrow \frac{r}{s} = \frac{23}{3} \text{ (not an integer)}$$

Thus, there is no unique answer to the question. – Insufficient

The correct answer is option A.

292. From statement 1:

$$\text{We have: } t^{r-1} = 1$$

Possible situations are:

- (1) $t = 1$ (here r can be any number)
- (2) $t = -1$ (here $(r - 1)$ must be an even number)
- (3) $r - 1 = 0 \Rightarrow r = 1$ (here t can be any number)

Thus, the value of t cannot be uniquely determined. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

We do not have any information about t . – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

Even after combining both statements, we have:

- (1) $t = 1$ (here r can be any number)
- (2) $t = -1$ (here $(r - 1)$ must be an even number)

(Note: $t = 1$ is no longer applicable using the information from statement 2)

Thus, the value of t cannot be uniquely determined. – Insufficient

The correct answer is option E.

293. From statement 1:

We have:

$$a_{n-1} + a_n = pn(n-1)$$

$$\text{Substituting } n = 30 : a_{29} + a_{30} = p \times 30 \times 29 \dots \text{(i)}$$

$$\text{Substituting } n = 31 : a_{30} + a_{31} = p \times 31 \times 30 \dots \text{(ii)}$$

Thus: (ii) – (i) (since $a_{31} - a_{29}$ is mentioned in the statement 1):

$$a_{31} - a_{29} = 30 \times (p \times 31 - p \times 29) = 60p.$$

Thus, we have:

$$60p = 120$$

$\Rightarrow p = 2$. - Sufficient

From statement 2:

We have:

$$a_{n-1} + a_n = pn(n-1)$$

$$\text{Substituting } n = 2 : a_1 + a_2 = p \times 2 \times 1 = 2p \dots \text{(iii)}$$

Since $a_2 = 6$, we have:

$$a_1 + 6 = 2p$$

However, we have no information on the value of a_1 , we cannot determine the value of p . - Insufficient

The correct answer is option A.

- 294.** We have find out whether $|R - T| \geq 9$.

From statement 1:

$$|R - S| = 50$$

$$\Rightarrow R - S = \pm 50 \dots \text{(i)}$$

However, we do not have any information about T . - Insufficient

From statement 2:

$$|S - T| = 41$$

$$\Rightarrow S - T = \pm 41 \dots \text{(ii)}$$

However we do not have any information about R . - Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

Adding (i) and (ii):

$$(R - S) + (S - T) = \pm 50 \pm 41$$

$$= 50 + 41 = 9$$

OR

$$= 50 - 41 = 9$$

OR

$$= -50 + 41 = -9$$

OR

$$= -50 - 41 = -91$$

$$\Rightarrow R - T = \pm 91 \text{ OR } \pm 9$$

$$\Rightarrow |R - T| = 91 \text{ OR } 9$$

Thus, the value of $|R - T|$ is at least 9. – Sufficient

The correct answer is option C.

295. From statement 1:

We have no information about t . – Insufficient

From statement 1:

We have no information about r . – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

$$(r + s) + (s + t) = \text{even} + \text{even} = \text{even}$$

$$\Rightarrow r + 2s + t = [\text{even}]$$

$$\Rightarrow r + s + t = [\text{even}] - s$$

However, s may be even or odd.

Thus, we have:

$$r + s + t = \text{even} - \text{even} = \text{even}$$

OR

$$r + s + t = \text{even} - \text{odd} = \text{odd}$$

Thus, we cannot determine the nature of $(r + s + t)$. – Insufficient

The correct answer is option E.

296. $w = 60r + 80s$

$$\Rightarrow w = 80(r + s) - 20r$$

$$\Rightarrow w = 80 - 20r \text{ (since } (r + s) = 1).$$

Note: We deliberately took $80(r + s)$ so that we could relate w and r .

We need to determine whether $w > 70$:

$$\Rightarrow 80 - 20r > 70$$

$$\Rightarrow 20r < 10$$

$$\Rightarrow r < \frac{1}{2}$$

From statement 1:

$$\text{We have: } r > \frac{1}{2}$$

This is contrary to what we needed i.e. $r < \frac{1}{2}$

Thus, we have a unique answer ‘No’. – Sufficient

From statement 2:

$$\text{We had obtained: } r < \frac{1}{2}$$

Since $r + s = 1$, we have:

$$s = 1 - r > 1 - \frac{1}{2}$$

$$\Rightarrow s > \frac{1}{2}$$

$$\Rightarrow s > r.$$

This is contrary to the information of statement 2 i.e. $r > s$

Thus, we have a unique answer ‘No’. – Sufficient

The correct answer is option D.

297. From statement 1:

We can have 10 consecutive integers including -3 in the following ways:

$$S = \{-3, -2, -1 \dots 5, 6\}; (5 \text{ is present in } S)$$

OR

$$S = \{-5, -4, -3 \dots 4\}; (5 \text{ is not present in } S), \text{ etc.}$$

Thus, the integer 5 may be or may not be present in S . – Insufficient

From statement 2:

We can have 10 consecutive integers including 4 in the following ways:

$$S = \{4, 5, 6 \dots 13\}; (5 \text{ is present in } S)$$

OR

$$S = \{-5, -4, \dots 3, 4\}; (5 \text{ is not present in } S), \text{ etc.}$$

Thus, the integer 5 may be or may not be present in S . – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

We need to have both -3 and 4 in the set S .

We can have the following ways:

$$S = \{-5, -4, \dots 3, 4\}; (5 \text{ is not present in } S)$$

OR

$$S = \{-4, -3 \dots 4, 5\}; (5 \text{ is present in } S)$$

Thus, the integer 5 may be or may not be present in S . – Insufficient

The correct answer is option E.

298. From statement 1:

We know that the 242nd term is -494 .

However, the relation between consecutive terms is not known.

Hence, the 243rd term cannot be determined. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

We know that the first term of S is -12 and each term of S after the first term is 2 less than the preceding term.

Thus, if we denote the first term as a , and the difference between two consecutive terms as d , we have:

$$a = -12$$

$$d = -2$$

Thus, the second term $t_2 = -12 + 1 \times (-2)$

The third term $t_3 = t_2 - 2 = -12 + 2 \times (-2)$, etc.

Thus, the n^{th} term is given as:

$$t_n = a + (n - 1)d$$

Hence, the 243rd term $t_{243} = -12 + (243 - 1) \times (-2)$

$$= -12 - 484 = -496. \text{ – Sufficient}$$

The correct answer is option B.

299. From statement 1:

$$d < \frac{1}{4}$$

$$\Rightarrow d < 0.25$$

For all values of $h = 0, 1, 2, 3$ or 4 , we have $d < 0.25$

Thus, the value of d rounded to the nearest tenth is:

(1) For $h = 0 : d = 0.206 \approx 0.2$

(2) For $h = 1 : d = 0.216 \approx 0.2$

(3) For $h = 2 : d = 0.226 \approx 0.2$

(4) For $h = 3 : d = 0.236 \approx 0.2$

(5) For $h = 4 : d = 0.246 \approx 0.2$

Thus, the value of d to the nearest tenth is 0.2 – Sufficient

From statement 2:

Since $h < 5$, possible values of h are 0, 1, 2, 3 or 4.

This is the same result as obtained from statement 1. – Sufficient

The correct answer is option D.

300. From statement 1:

Since n has exactly two distinct positive factors, n must be a prime number (the factors of a prime number are 1 and the number itself).

Since 2 is a prime number, we can have $n = 2$.

However, there are other prime numbers greater than 2 as well, for example 3, 5, etc. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

We know that the difference of any two distinct positive factors of n is odd.

This is only possible if one factor is even and the other factor is odd (since the difference between an even and odd number is odd, whereas the difference between any two odd numbers or any two even numbers is even).

Thus, the number must have exactly two factors, one odd (i.e. 1) and the other even (i.e. 2).

Thus, we have: $n = 1 \times 2 = 2$. – Sufficient

The correct answer is option B.

301. Possible values of n so that the product of the digits is 12 are: 26, 34, 43 and 62.

From statement 1:

We know that n can be expressed as the sum of perfect squares in only one way.

Let us see for each of the above numbers:

26:

- (1) With 1, we have: $1^2 + 5^2 = 26$;
- (2) With 2: $2^2 + 2^2 = 26$; however, 22 is not a perfect square
- (3) With 3: $3^2 + 1^2 = 26$; however, 17 is not a perfect square

(4) With 4: $4^2 + 10 = 26$; however, 10 is not a perfect square

34:

(1) With 1: $1^2 + 33 = 34$; however, 33 is not a perfect square

(2) With 2: $2^2 + 30 = 34$; however, 30 is not a perfect square

(3) With 3: $3^2 + 5^2 = 34$; we see that it can be expressed as the sum of two perfect squares

(4) With 4: $4^2 + 18 = 34$; however, 18 is not a perfect square

Thus, we see that both 26 and 34 can be expressed as the sum of two perfect squares in exactly one way.

Thus, it is enough to observe that statement 1 is not sufficient.

Note: Both 43 and 62 cannot be expressed as the sum of two perfect squares in any way.

Thus, we do not get a unique value of n . – Insufficient

From statement 2:

Since n is smaller than 40, possible values of n are 26 and 34. – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

Even after combining both statements, we still have possible values of n as 26 and 34. – Insufficient

The correct answer is option E.

302. From statement 1:

We know that the sum of three equal integers is even.

Thus, thrice of an integer is even.

Hence, we can conclude that the integer in question is even.

Thus, each of the three equal integers is even.

Thus, their product must be a multiple of $2 \times 2 \times 2 = 8$.

Hence, the product of the three integers is a multiple of 4. – Sufficient

From statement 2:

Since the sum of three integers is even, we can say that two of them are odd and the remaining integer is even (since we know that all three integers are not even).

The even integer itself can be a multiple of 4 which would make the product of the three integers a multiple of 4 as well.

However, the even integer may simply be a multiple of 2 (and not higher exponents of 2) which would result in the product of the three integers only a multiple of 2 and not 4.

Thus, we do not have a unique answer. – Insufficient

The correct answer is option A.

303. From statement 1:

We know that the tens digit of k is non-zero.

Thus, in the number $(k + 9)$, the tens digits when added would always lead to a carryover of '1' to the tens' place.

For example:

If the three digit number is 321, where the tens digit is the smallest, i.e. 1, then we have: $321 + 9 = 330$ i.e. the tens' digit has increased by 1.

Again, if the three digit number is 329, where the tens digit is the largest, i.e. 9, then too we have: $329 + 9 = 338$ i.e. the tens' digit has increased by 1.

Since the tens' digit in $(k + 9)$ is 3, the tens' digit in k (i.e. before adding 9) must have been $3 - 1 = 2$ (subtracting the carry of '1').

Thus, the tens' digit in k is 2. – Sufficient

From statement 2:

We know that the tens digit of k is non-zero.

Thus, in the number $(k + 4)$, the tens digits when added may lead to a carryover of '1' to the tens' place if the tens digit in k is 6 or greater; or there may not be any carryover to the tens' place if the tens digit in k is 5 or smaller.

For example:

If the three digit number is 326, where the tens digit is 6, then we have:

$326 + 4 = 330$ i.e. the tens' digit has increased by 1.

Again, if the three digit number is 329, where the tens digit is the largest, i.e. 9, then too we have:

$$329 + 4 = 333 \text{ i.e. the tens' digit has increased by 1.}$$

However, if the three digit number is 321, where the tens digit is the smallest, i.e. 1, then we have:

$$321 + 4 = 325 \text{ i.e. the tens' digit has not increased by 1.}$$

Again, if the three digit number is 325, where the tens digit is 5, then too we have:

$$325 + 4 = 329 \text{ i.e. the tens' digit has not increased by 1.}$$

Thus, if there is a carryover, the tens' digit in k would have been $2 - 1 = 1$.

However, if there is no carryover, the tens' digit in k would have been 2 itself.

Thus, there is no unique answer. – Insufficient

The correct answer is option A.

304. From statement 1:

$$vw = v^2$$

$$\Rightarrow vw - v^2 = 0$$

$$\Rightarrow v(w - v) = 0$$

$$\Rightarrow v = 0 \text{ or } w = v$$

However, we know that: $w \neq v$, since they are different integers.

Thus, we have: $v = 0$ – Sufficient

From statement 2:

We have no information about v . – Insufficient

The correct answer is option A.

305. We know that: $vmt \neq 0$

$$\Rightarrow \text{None among } v, m \text{ and } t \text{ is '0'}$$

$$v^2m^3t^4$$

$$= v^2 t^4 m^2 \times m$$

We know that $v^2 t^4 m^2 \geq 0$ (since the exponents are even i.e. the numbers are perfect squares, they must be non-negative).

We need to show that:

$$v^2 m^3 t^4 > 0$$

$$\Rightarrow v^2 t^4 m^2 \times m > 0$$

As, $v^2 t^4 m^2 > 0$, thus,

$\Rightarrow m > 0$ (This is what we need to know to get the answer to the question)

From statement 1:

$$m > v^2$$

However, $v^2 > 0$

$$\Rightarrow m > 0$$

$$\Rightarrow v^2 m^3 t^4 > 0 \text{ - Sufficient}$$

From statement 2:

$$m > t^3$$

However, t^3 may be positive or negative depending on the value of t

$\Rightarrow m$ may be positive or negative.

$\Rightarrow v^2 m^3 t^4$ may be positive or negative. – Insufficient

The correct answer is option A.

306. From statement 1:

$$2y - x = x^2 - y^2$$

$$\Rightarrow 2y + y^2 = x^2 + x$$

$$\Rightarrow y(y + 2) = x(x + 1)$$

Let us look into two possibilities for x :

- (1) If x is odd: $x(x + 1) = \text{odd} \times \text{even} = \text{even}$
- (2) If x is even: $x(x + 1) = \text{even} \times \text{odd} = \text{even}$

Thus, we have: $y(y + 2)$ as even.

If y is odd, $(y + 2)$ is also odd

$\Rightarrow y(y + 2) = \text{odd} \times \text{odd} = \text{odd}$; however, $y(y + 2)$ is even, thus, y cannot be odd.

If y is even, $(y + 2)$ is also even

$\Rightarrow y(y + 2) = \text{even} \times \text{even} = \text{even}$.

Thus, we have y as even. – Sufficient

From statement 2:

We have no information about y . – Insufficient

The correct answer is option A.

307. From statement 1:

We have: $x^{2y} = 16$

Thus, we have:

$$2x^{6y} - 4$$

$$= 2(x^{2y})^3 - 4$$

$$= (2 \times 16^3 - 4) \text{ – Sufficient}$$

Note: We do NOT need to try and get the values of x and y from $x^{2y} = 16$.

From statement 2:

We have: $xy = 4$

Two possible values of $(2x^{6y} - 4)$ depending on the values of x and y are:

- (1) $x = 1, y = 4$: $(2x^{6y} - 4) = 2 \times 1 - 4 = -2$
- (2) $x = 2, y = 2$: $(2x^{6y} - 4) = 2 \times 2^{12} - 4$

Thus, there is no unique value. – Insufficient

The correct answer is option A.

308. From statement 1:

Since x is a factor of 54 and is less than half of 54, the possible values of x are: 1, 2, 3, 6, 9 or 18.

Again, we know that 18 is a multiple of xy^2

$\Rightarrow xy^2$ is a factor of 18

The factors of 18 are: 1, 2, 3, 6, 9 and 18.

If $x = 1$, the possible values of y are 1 or 3.

Thus, we observe that the value of y cannot be uniquely determined. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

Since xy^2 is a factor of 18, the possible values of xy^2 are: 1, 2, 3, 6, 9 or 18.

Also, we know that: y is a multiple of 3

$\Rightarrow y^2$ is a multiple of $3^2 = 9$

Thus, the only possible value of y is 3 (higher multiples of 3 as the value of y would not be possible since xy^2 is a factor of 18). – Sufficient

The correct answer is option B.

309. We have:

$$x^y = x^{2y-3}$$

$$\Rightarrow x^y = \frac{x^{2y}}{x^3}$$

$$\Rightarrow x^{2y-y} = x^3$$

$$\Rightarrow x^y = x^3$$

$$\Rightarrow y = 3, \text{ for all values of } x \text{ except } 1$$

OR

$$y = \text{any positive integer if } x = 1$$

Thus, though it appeared that $y = 3$, it is not necessarily so.

Thus, we need to refer to the statements to get the value of y .

From statement 1:

We have: $x = 2$, (i.e. $x \neq 1$)

Thus, $y = 3$

$\Rightarrow y^x = 3^2 = 9$ - Sufficient

From statement 2:

We have: $x^2 < 9$

$\Rightarrow 0 < x < 3$ (since x is positive)

$\Rightarrow$ Possible values of x are: 2 or 1.

$\Rightarrow y = 3$, if $x = 2$

OR

$y =$ any positive integer if $x = 1$

Since the values of x and y cannot be uniquely determined, we cannot determine the unique value of y^x . - Insufficient

The correct answer is option A.

310. We have: $x^{ky} = x^{(ly^2-8)}$

Since $x \neq 1$, we have:

$$ky = ly^2 - 8$$

$$\Rightarrow y(ly - k) = 8$$

From statement 1:

We have: $k = -6$

$$\Rightarrow y(ly + 6) = 8$$

Possible values of y are: 2 or 4.

If $y = 2$:

$$2(2l + 6) = 8$$

$$\Rightarrow l = -1$$

$$\Rightarrow kl = (-6) \times (-1) = 6 > 2$$

If $y = 4$:

$$4(4l + 6) = 8$$

$$\Rightarrow l = -1$$

$$\Rightarrow kl = (-6) \times (-1) = 6 > 2$$

Thus, there is a unique answer and the answer is 'Yes'. – Sufficient

From statement 2:

$$\text{We have: } 3l - k = 3$$

$$\text{We know that: } y(l - k) = 8$$

Possible values of y are: 2 or 4.

If $y = 2$:

$$2(2l - k) = 8$$

$$\Rightarrow 2l - k = 4$$

$$\Rightarrow (3l - k) - l = 4$$

$$\Rightarrow 3 - l = 4$$

$$\Rightarrow l = -1$$

$$\Rightarrow k = 3l - 3 = -6 \text{ (using the equation: } 3l - k = 3)$$

$$\Rightarrow kl = (-6) \times (-1) = 6 > 2$$

If $y = 4$:

$$4(4l - k) = 8$$

$$\Rightarrow 4l - k = 2$$

$$\Rightarrow (3l - k) + l = 2$$

$$\Rightarrow 3 + l = 2$$

$$\Rightarrow l = -1$$

$$\Rightarrow k = 3l - 3 = -6 \text{ (using the equation: } 3l - k = 3)$$

$$\Rightarrow kl = (-6) \times (-1) = 6 > 2$$

Thus, there is a unique answer and the answer is 'Yes'. – Sufficient

The correct answer is option D.

311. From statement 1:

We have: $|x| + |y| = 5$, where $1 < |x| < y$

Thus, y must be a positive integer (since $y > 1$).

Since $|x| + |y| = 5$, and

$$|x| > 1$$

$$\Rightarrow |y| < 4$$

Thus, possible values of y are: 3, 2 or 1.

If $y = 3$: $|x| = 2$; thus $y > |x|$ is satisfied.

Here, $|x| = 2$

$$\Rightarrow x = \pm 2$$

However, if $y = 2$: $|x| = 3$ i.e. $y \not> |x|$

Also, if $y = 1$: $|x| = 4$ i.e. $y \not> |x|$

Thus, the only possible values of x and y are:

$$x = 2, y = 3$$

OR

$$x = -2, y = 3$$

Thus, we have:

$$x^{2y} - 1 = (\pm 2)^{2 \times 3} - 1 = (\pm 2)^6 = 64 - \text{Sufficient}$$

From statement 2:

$$\text{We have: } |x^2 - 4| + |y - 3| = 0$$

The sum of two absolute values can be '0' only if each of them is zero.

Thus, we have:

$$|x^2 - 4| = 0$$

$$\Rightarrow x^2 - 4 = 0$$

$$\Rightarrow x = \pm 2$$

Also,

$$|y - 3| = 0$$

$$\Rightarrow y - 3 = 0$$

$$\Rightarrow y = 3$$

Thus, the only possible values of x and y are:

$$x = 2, y = 3$$

OR

$$x = -2, y = 3$$

This is the same result as obtained from statement 1. – Sufficient

The correct answer is option D.

- 312.** The remainder when a number is divided by 10 is essentially the tens digit of the number.

Thus, we need to determine the tens digit of $(3^{4x+2} + y)$.

The tens digit of exponents of 3 follows a cycle as shown below:

- (1) $3^{4k+1} \equiv 3$
- (2) $3^{4k+2} \equiv 9$
- (3) $3^{4k+3} \equiv 7$
- (4) $3^{4k} \equiv 1$

Thus, the remainder r is the same as the tens digit of $(3^{4x+2} + y)$, which is the same as the tens digit of $(9 + y)$.

Thus, we need to determine the value of y .

From statement 1:

We have no information about y . – Insufficient

From statement 2:

We have: $y = 1$

Thus, the remainder $r = \text{tens digit of } (9 + 1) \equiv 0$ – Sufficient

The correct answer is option B.

313. From statement 1:

We know that:

$$x = y - 3$$

However, there can be infinitely many positive integer values of x and y satisfying the above equation.

Thus, the value of $(x + y)^2$ cannot be uniquely determined. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

We know that: x and y are prime numbers.

However, there can be infinitely many values of x and y possible.

Thus, the value of $(x + y)^2$ cannot be uniquely determined. – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

We have:

$x = y - 3$, where x and y are prime numbers.

$$\Rightarrow y - x = 3$$

Since the difference between two prime numbers is 3 (an odd number), one prime must be even and the other odd.

Thus, one of the prime numbers must be 2 (the only even prime, also the smallest prime number).

Thus, we have: $x = 2$

$$\Rightarrow y - 2 = 3$$

$$\Rightarrow y = 5.$$

Thus, we have:

$$(x + y)^2 = (2 + 5)^2 = 49 - \text{Sufficient}$$

The correct answer is option C.

314. From statement 1:

We need to find which combination of exponents of 3 and 5 add up to 134.

Since the exponents of 5 would reach 134 faster than the exponents of 3, we need to try with the exponents of 5 so that we can get the answer(s) in the least possible trials.

$$\text{If } y = 1 : 3^x + 5 = 134$$

$$\Rightarrow 3^x = 129$$

However, 129 cannot be expressed as an exponent of 3 $\Rightarrow y \neq 1$

$$\text{If } y = 2 : 3^x + 25 = 134$$

$$\Rightarrow 3^x = 109$$

However, 109 cannot be expressed as an exponent of 3 $\Rightarrow y \neq 2$

$$\text{If } y = 3 : 3^x + 125 = 134$$

$$\Rightarrow 3^x = 9$$

$$\Rightarrow x = 2$$

Thus, there is only one solution: $x = 2$ – Sufficient

From statement 2:

There is no information about x . – Insufficient

The correct answer is option A.

315. From statement 1:

$$x^2 - 6x + y^2 - 4y = 0$$

$\Rightarrow (x^2 - 6x + 9) + (y^2 - 4y + 4) - 9 - 4 = 0$; (combining x and y terms separately to form perfect squares)

$$\Rightarrow (x - 3)^2 + (y - 2)^2 = 13$$

Thus, we need to add two perfect squares to get 13.

There is only one such combination possible: $2^2 + 3^2 = 13$

Thus, we have two possible situations:

$$(1) \quad (x - 3)^2 = 2^2 \\ \Rightarrow x - 3 = \pm 2$$

$$\Rightarrow x = 3 \pm 2$$

$$\Rightarrow x = 5 \text{ or } 1$$

$$(y - 2)^2 = 3^2$$

$$\Rightarrow y - 2 = \pm 3$$

$$\Rightarrow y = 2 \pm 3$$

$$\Rightarrow y = 5 \text{ or } -1$$

$$\Rightarrow y = 5 \text{ (since } -1 \text{ is not positive)}$$

Thus, we have:

$x = 5, y = 5$ (this is not possible, since x and y are distinct)

Thus,

$$x = 1, y = 5$$

$$\Rightarrow |x - y| = |1 - 5| = 4, \text{ which is a factor of } 12.$$

$$(2) \quad (x - 3)^2 = 3^2 \\ \Rightarrow x - 3 = \pm 3$$

$$\Rightarrow x = 3 \pm 3$$

$$\Rightarrow x = 6 \text{ or } 0$$

$$\Rightarrow x = 6 \text{ (since 0 is not positive)}$$

$$(y - 2)^2 = 2^2$$

$$\Rightarrow y - 2 = \pm 2$$

$$\Rightarrow y = 2 \pm 2$$

$$\Rightarrow y = 4 \text{ or } 0$$

$$\Rightarrow y = 4 \text{ (since 0 is not positive)}$$

Thus, we have:

$$x = 6, y = 4 \Rightarrow |x - y| = |6 - 4| = 2, \text{ which is a factor of 12.}$$

Thus, there is a unique answer 'Yes'. – Sufficient

From statement 2:

There is no information about y . – Insufficient

The correct answer is option A.

316. From statement 1:

$$x^2 = 15 + z^2$$

$$\Rightarrow x^2 - z^2 = 15$$

$$\Rightarrow (x + z)(x - z) = 15$$

Since x and z are positive integers, we have: $x + z > x - z$

Thus, there are two possible cases:

$$(1) \quad x + z = 15, \text{ and } x - z = 1$$

$$\Rightarrow 2x = 16; \text{ (adding the two equations above)}$$

$$\Rightarrow x = 8$$

$$\Rightarrow z = 7$$

Thus, at least one among x and z is prime.

$$(2) \quad x + z = 5, \text{ and } x - z = 3$$

$$\Rightarrow 2x = 8; \text{ (adding the two equations above)}$$

$$\Rightarrow x = 4$$

$$\Rightarrow z = 1$$

Thus, none between x and z is prime.

Thus, there is no unique answer. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

We know: $(x - z)$ is a prime number.

We can have a situation where both x and z are prime, for example: $x = 5, z = 3$.

We can also have a situation where none among x and z are prime, for example: $x = 12, z = 9$

Thus, there is no unique answer. – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

We have:

$$x = 8, z = 7 \Rightarrow x - z = 1, \text{ which is not a prime}$$

OR

$$x = 4, z = 1 \Rightarrow x - z = 3, \text{ which is a prime.}$$

Thus, the only solution is: $x = 4, y = 1$.

Hence, at least one among x and z is prime. – Sufficient

The correct answer is option C.

- 317.** The remainder obtained when a number is divided by 100 is the last two digits of the number.

For example, when 1234 is divided by 100, the remainder obtained is 34, which is the last two digits of the number.

Thus, $(7^x + 1)$ when divided by 100 will leave a remainder having 0 as the tens digit only if $(7^x + 1)$ has 0 as its tens digit as well.

This is possible only if the tens digit of 7^x is 9 (since $9 + 1 = 10 \equiv$ the tens digit is 0)

The tens digit of exponents of 7 follows a cycle as shown below:

$$(1) \quad 7^{4k+1} \equiv 7$$

$$(2) \quad 7^{4k+2} \equiv 9$$

$$(3) \quad 7^{4k+3} \equiv 3$$

$$(4) \quad 7^{4k} \equiv 1$$

Thus, the tens digit of 7^x is 9 only if $x = 4k + 2$ where k is any positive integer.

From statement 1:

We have:

$x = 4n + 2$, where n is a positive integer.

This is exactly the condition as discussed above. – Sufficient

From statement 2:

We have: $x > 5$.

Thus, possible values of x are:

$x = 6$, which is of the form $4n + 2$ – satisfies

$x = 7$, which is not of the form $4n + 2$ – does not satisfy

Thus, we do not have a unique answer. – Insufficient

The correct answer is option A.

318. From statement 1:

$(2xy - x)$ is even

$\Rightarrow x(2y - 1)$ is even

For any integer value of y , $2y$ is even.

Thus, $(2y - 1) = \text{even} - 1 = \text{odd}$.

Thus, we have: x is even

$\Rightarrow xz$ is even (since an even number multiplied with any integer is even). – Sufficient

From statement 2:

$(x^2 + xz)$ is even

$\Rightarrow x(x + z)$ is even

Possible situations are:

(1) x is even, z is even $\Rightarrow xz$ is even

OR

(2) x is even, z is odd $\Rightarrow xz$ is even

OR

(3) x is odd, z is odd $\Rightarrow xz$ is odd

Thus, xz may be even or odd. – Insufficient

The correct answer is option A.

319. From statement 1:

$$y^2 = xz$$

$\Rightarrow x, y$ and z form a geometric series

For example:

$x = 1, y = 2, z = 4$: Here, $y > x$ (common ratio of the geometric series is greater than 1)

$x = 4, y = 2, z = 1$: Here, $y < x$ (common ratio of the geometric series is smaller than 1)

Thus, there is no unique answer. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

There is no information about y . – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

We know that: $z - x > 0$

$\Rightarrow z > x$

Thus, combining with the information from statement 1, we see that x, y, z form a geometric series with the common ratio greater than 1.

Thus, we have: $y > x$ – Sufficient

The correct answer is option is C.

320. We know that the absolute value of any number is always non-negative.

Thus, we have:

$$|x - y| \geq 0$$

Here, $|x - y| > 0$ will be satisfied only if $x \neq y$.

From statement 1:

$$xy + 2z = z$$

$$\Rightarrow xy = -z$$

$$\Rightarrow xy < 0 \text{ (since } z \text{ is positive)}$$

$$\Rightarrow x > 0 \text{ and } y < 0$$

OR

$$x < 0 \text{ and } y > 0$$

Thus, we can conclude that $x \neq y$

$$\Rightarrow |x - y| > 0 \text{ – Sufficient}$$

From statement 2:

$$x^2 - 2x = 0$$

$$\Rightarrow x(x - 2) = 0$$

Since $x \neq 0$, we have: $x = 2$

However, we have no information about y .

$$\text{If } y = 2: |x - y| = |2 - 2| = 0$$

$$\text{If, however } y \neq 2: x - y \neq 0 \Rightarrow |x - y| > 0$$

Thus, there is no unique answer. – Insufficient

The correct answer is option A.

321. We know that: $y = |x| + x^3$

We need to determine whether:

$$y = 0$$

$$\Rightarrow |x| + x^3 = 0$$

$$\Rightarrow |x| + x^2 \times x = 0$$

$$\Rightarrow |x| + |x|^2 \times x = 0 \text{ (since } |x|^2 = x^2 \text{)}$$

$$\Rightarrow |x| (1 + |x| \times x) = 0$$

$$\Rightarrow |x| = 0 \Rightarrow x = 0$$

OR

$$(1 + |x| \times x) = 0 \Rightarrow |x| \times x = -1$$

This is possible only if x is negative and its absolute value is 1 i.e. $x = -1$

Thus, we need to determine whether x can take a value only among 0 or -1 .

From statement 1:

$$x < 0 :$$

Possible values of x are $-1, -2$, etc.

Here, x can take values other than only 0 or -1 . – Insufficient

From statement 2:

$$y < 1 :$$

$$\Rightarrow |x| + x^3 < 1$$

It is best here to try out with some values of x :

(1) For any fractional value of x , i.e. $0 < x < 1$ or $-1 < x < 0$, y can never be an integer.

(2) If $x = 0$: $y = |x| + x^3 = 0 \Rightarrow y < 1$

Here, $y = 0$ – satisfies

(3) If $x = -1$: $y = |x| + x^3 = 0 \Rightarrow y < 1$

Here, $y = 0$ - satisfies

(4) If $x = -2$: $y = |x| + x^3 = 2 - 8 = -6 \Rightarrow y < 1$

Here, $y \neq 0$ - does not satisfy

Thus, there is no unique answer. – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

Even after combining both statements, we still have the following situations:

$x = 0 \Rightarrow y = 0$ - satisfies

OR

$x = -1 \Rightarrow y = 0$ - satisfies

OR

$x = -2 \Rightarrow y \neq 0$ - does not satisfy

Hence, there is no unique answer. – Insufficient

The correct answer is option E.

322. From statement 1:

Since $0 < x < 1$ and $16x$ is an integer, we must have: $x = \left(\frac{\text{An integer less than 16}}{16} \right)$.

(1) If $x = \frac{1}{16}$ (smallest possible value of x): $x = 0.0625 \Rightarrow$ The tenths' digit is zero.

(2) If $x = \frac{15}{16}$ (largest possible value of x): $x = 0.9375 \Rightarrow$ The tenths' digit is non-zero.

Thus, there is no unique answer. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

Since $0 < x < 1$ and $8x$ is an integer, we must have: $x = \left(\frac{\text{An integer less than 8}}{8} \right)$.

If $x = \frac{1}{8}$ (smallest possible value of x):

$x = 0.125 \Rightarrow$ The tenths' digit is non-zero.

Since for the smallest possible value of x , the tenths' digit is non-zero, the tenths' digit will always be non-zero for all higher values of x . – Sufficient

The correct answer is option B.

323. We know that for all n :

$$t_{(n+1)} = \frac{t_n}{2}$$

Thus, we have:

$$t_2 = \frac{t_1}{2}, t_3 = \frac{t_2}{2}, \dots$$

Thus, we see that every number starting from t_2 is half of the previous number.

From statement 1:

$$t_3 = \frac{1}{4}$$

$$\Rightarrow t_4 = \frac{1}{2} \times \frac{1}{4} = \frac{1}{8}$$

$$\Rightarrow t_5 = \frac{1}{2} \times \frac{1}{8} = \frac{1}{16} - \text{Sufficient}$$

From statement 2:

Let $t_5 = x$

$$\Rightarrow t_1 = 2 \times t_2$$

$$= 2^2 \times t_3$$

$$= 2^3 \times t_4$$

$$= 2^4 \times t_5$$

$$= 16x$$

$$\Rightarrow t_1 - t_5 = 16x - x = 15x$$

$$\Rightarrow 15x = \frac{15}{16}$$

$$\Rightarrow x = t_5 = \frac{1}{16} - \text{Sufficient}$$

The correct answer is option D.

324. From statement 1:

We have:

$$2^{\sqrt{x}} = 8$$

$$\Rightarrow 2^{\sqrt{x}} = 2^3$$

$$\Rightarrow \sqrt{x} = 3$$

$$\Rightarrow x = 3^2 = 9$$

$$\Rightarrow 2^x = 2^9 = 512 > 100 - \text{Sufficient}$$

From statement 2:

We have:

$$\frac{1}{2^x} < 0.01$$

For any value of x , 2^x is positive, also $\frac{1}{0.01}$ is positive. Thus,

$$\Rightarrow 2^x > \frac{1}{0.01}$$

$$\Rightarrow 2^x > 100 - \text{Sufficient}$$

The correct answer is option D.

325. We need to determine whether:

$$|x| < 1$$

$$\Rightarrow -1 < x < 1$$

From statement 1:

$$|x + 1| = 2|x - 1|$$

$$\Rightarrow x + 1 = \pm 2(x - 1)$$

$$\Rightarrow x + 1 = \pm (2x - 2)$$

$$\Rightarrow x + 1 = 2x - 2$$

$$\Rightarrow x = 3 - \text{Does not satisfy the required condition}$$

OR

$$x + 1 = -(2x - 2)$$

$$x = \frac{1}{3} - \text{Satisfies the required condition}$$

Thus, there is no unique answer. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

We have:

$$|x - 3| \neq 0$$

$$\Rightarrow x \neq 3$$

However, we do not have any possible values x can take. – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

Combining both statements, we arrive at:

$$x = \frac{1}{3} - \text{Satisfies the required condition}$$

Thus, we have a unique answer. – Sufficient

The correct answer is option C.

326. We know that the radical sign i.e. $\sqrt{k}$ takes only the positive square root of k .

Thus, we can have the following cases:

$$(1) \sqrt{(x - 5)^2} = (x - 5) - \text{Condition: If } x - 5 \geq 0 \Rightarrow x \geq 5$$

$$(2) \sqrt{(x - 5)^2} = \sqrt{(5 - x)^2} = (5 - x) - \text{Condition: If } 5 - x \geq 0 \Rightarrow x \leq 5$$

For the given condition to be satisfied, x must be ≤ 5

From statement 1:

$$-x|x| > 0$$

We know that $|x| \geq 0$ for all values of x

$$\Rightarrow -x > 0$$

$$\Rightarrow x < 0$$

Thus, it satisfies the condition that $x < 5$

Thus, we have:

$$\sqrt{(x-5)^2} = (5-x) - \text{Sufficient}$$

From statement 2:

$$5-x > 0$$

$$\Rightarrow x < 5$$

$$\Rightarrow \sqrt{(x-5)^2} = (5-x) - \text{Sufficient}$$

The correct answer is option D.

327. $\frac{x}{y} < xy$ is true under the following conditions:

(1) If x is positive, i.e. $x > 0$:

Canceling x from both sides:

$$\frac{1}{y} < y$$

$$\Rightarrow y > 1: (\text{Say, } y = 2 \Rightarrow \frac{1}{y} = \frac{1}{2} < 2 = y)$$

OR

$$-1 < y < 0: (\text{Say, } y = -\frac{1}{2} \Rightarrow \frac{1}{y} = -2 < -\frac{1}{2} = y)$$

(2) If x is negative, i.e. $x < 0$:

Canceling x from both sides and reversing the inequality sign:

$$\frac{1}{y} > y$$

$$\Rightarrow 0 < y < 1: (\text{Say, } y = \frac{1}{2} \Rightarrow \frac{1}{y} = 2 > \frac{1}{2} = y)$$

OR

$$y < -1: (\text{Say, } y = -2 \Rightarrow \frac{1}{y} = -\frac{1}{2} > -2 = y)$$

From statement 1:

We have:

$$xy > 0$$

$$\Rightarrow x > 0 \text{ and } y > 0$$

OR

$$x < 0 \text{ and } y < 0$$

However, we do not get any of the conditions above. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

We have:

$$y < -1$$

However, we do not know whether x is positive or negative. – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

We have:

$$y < -1 \text{ i.e. } y \text{ is negative.}$$

Also, since $xy > 0$, we have:

$$x < 0$$

Thus, we have:

$$x < 0 \text{ and } y < -1$$

Thus, it satisfies condition (b) above. – Sufficient

The correct answer is option C.

6.2 Percents

328. From statement 1:

We do not have information on the attorney's fees. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

We do not have information on the assessed value of the estate. – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

The required percent = $\frac{2400}{1.2 \times 10^6} \times 100 = 0.2\%$ – Sufficient

The correct answer is option C.

329. From statement 1:

We have no information on the number of people employed. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

Since 20% (more than 10%) of the men are employed and 10% of the women are employed among the population 65 years old or older, we can definitely say that on an average, more than 10% of that population must be employed (Minimum term Average Maximum term). – Sufficient

The correct answer is option B.

330. From statement 1:

The initial price of the candy bar is not known.

Hence, the percent increase in the price cannot be determined. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

The amount of increase in price of the candy bar is not known.

Hence, the percent increase in the price cannot be determined – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

Increase in price of the candy bar = 5 cents.

Price of the candy bar after increase = 45 cents.

Thus, initial price of the candy bar = $(45 - 5)$ cents = 40 cents.

Hence, the percent increase in the price

$$= \frac{5}{40} \times 100 = 12.5\% - \text{Sufficient}$$

The correct answer is option C.

331. From statement 1:

Payment for the bicycle excluding 10% sales tax = \$ $0.9x$

Thus, payment for the bicycle including sales tax

$$= \$ (0.9x + 10\% \text{ of } 0.9x)$$

$$\Rightarrow \$ (0.9x + 0.09x)$$

$$\Rightarrow \$ 0.99x < \$ x - \text{Sufficient}$$

From statement 2:

The value of x is not given, hence a comparison with x is not possible – Insufficient

The correct answer is option A.

332. From statement 1:

Tim's weight is 80 percent of Joe's weight

$$\Rightarrow \frac{\text{Tim's weight}}{\text{Joe's weight}} = \frac{80}{100} = \frac{4}{5}$$

$\Rightarrow$ Joe weighs more than Tim. – Sufficient

From statement 2:

Joe's weight is 125 percent Of Tim's weight

$$\Rightarrow \frac{\text{Joe's weight}}{\text{Tim's weight}} = \frac{125}{100} = \frac{5}{4}$$

$\Rightarrow$ Joe weighs more than Tim. – Sufficient

The correct answer is option D.

333. Let the total sales be \$ x .

Amount paid to the salesman per week is:

$\$(300 + 5\% \text{ of } (x - 1000))$; provided $(x > 1000)$

OR

\$300; provided ($x \leq 1000$).

From statement 1:

If $x \leq 1000$:

\$300 = 10% of x

$$\Rightarrow x = \$300 \times \frac{100}{10} = \$3000$$

However, this contradicts our assumption $x \leq 1000$.

Thus, we can conclude that $x \not\leq 1000$ i.e. $x > 1000$.

If $x > 1000$:

$\$(300 + 5\% \text{ of } (x - 1000)) = 10\% \text{ of } x$

$$\Rightarrow 300 + \frac{5(x - 1000)}{100} = \frac{10x}{100}$$

$$\Rightarrow x = 5000$$

Thus, amount paid to the salesman = 10% of \$5000 = \$500 – Sufficient

From statement 2:

Since the total sales of the salesman was \$5000 ($> \1000), the amount paid to him was:

$\$(300 + 5\% \text{ of } (5000 - 1000)) = \500 – Sufficient

The correct answer is option D.

334. Let the total sales be $\$x$.

Amount paid to Connie per week is:

$\$(500 + 20\% \text{ of } (x - 1500))$; provided ($x > 1500$)

OR

\$500; provided ($x \leq 1500$).

From statement 1:

Since Connie's pay exceeds \$500, we can conclude that $x > 1500$.

Thus, we have:

$$\$(500 + 20\% \text{ of } (x - 1500)) = 1200 \Rightarrow 500 + \frac{20(x - 1500)}{100} = 1200$$

$\Rightarrow x = 5000$ – Sufficient

From statement 2:

Since Connie received some commission, we can conclude that $x > 1500$.

Thus, we have:

$$20\% \text{ of } (x - 1500) = 1200 \Rightarrow \frac{20(x - 1500)}{100} = 1200$$

$\Rightarrow x = 5000$ – Sufficient

The correct answer is option D.

335. Charge for parts excluding sales tax = \$50.00

Sales tax on charge for parts = \$(6% of 50) = \$3.

Thus, charge for parts including sales tax = \$(50 + 3) = \$53.

We need to determine the charge for labor including sales tax to determine the total charge for the repair.

From statement 1:

Sales tax on labor = 6% of the labor charge = \$9.60

$$\text{Thus, labor charge} = \$9.60 \times \frac{100}{6} = \$160.$$

Hence, charge for labor including sales tax = \$(160 + 9.60) = \$169.60.

Hence, charge for repair including sales tax = \$(169.60 + 53) = \$223.20. – Sufficient

From statement 2:

Total sales tax = \$12.60.

Sales tax on charge for parts = \$3.

Thus, tax on charge for labor = \$(12.60 – 3) = \$9.60.

This is the same information as in statement 1. Subsequent to this, following the calculation as we did in statement 1, we get the answer. – Sufficient

The correct answer is option D.

336. From statement 1:

We have no information on the total number of people tested for the infection. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

Since 90% of the people tested negative, $(100 - 10) = 10\%$ of the people tested positive.

However, the specific information about the number of people having the infection among the ones tested positive, and the number of people not having infection among the ones tested negative is not known. For example, it may be that of the 10% who tested positive, not all actually had the infection or that there may be others who had the infection but were tested negative.

The corresponding information on how many actually had the infection is not available.

Hence, the accuracy of the test cannot be determined. – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

We know that of those who tested positive, 8 did not have the infection.

However, we have no information about the number of people who actually had the infection but were tested negative.

Hence, the accuracy of the test cannot be determined. – Insufficient

The correct answer is option E.

337. From statement 1:

We have no information about the trade in 1994.

Hence, the percentage change cannot be determined. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

We have no information about the trade in 1985.

Hence, the percentage change cannot be determined. – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

We have no information on the value of the gross domestic product in 1994 as compared to that in 1985.

Hence, the percentage change cannot be determined. – Insufficient

The correct answer is option E.

338. From statement 1:

We have no information about the total value of goods consumed in the United States in 2007 as compared to 2004.

Hence, the percentage change in the value of foreign goods consumed from 2004 to 2007 cannot be determined. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

We have no information about the value (or proportion) of foreign goods consumed in 2004 and 2007.

Hence, the percentage change in the value of foreign goods consumed from 2004 to 2007 cannot be determined. – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

Let the total value of goods consumed in the United States in 2004 be \$ $100x$.

Thus, the total value of goods consumed in the United States in 2007
= \$ (120% of $100x$) = \$ $120x$.

The value of foreign goods consumed in the United States in 2004
= \$ (20% of $100x$) = \$ $20x$.

The value of foreign goods consumed in the United States in 2007
= \$ (20% of $120x$) = \$ $24x$.

Hence, the percentage change in the value of foreign goods consumed from 2004 to 2007
$$= \frac{24x - 20x}{20x} \times 100 = 20\%$$

Since the value of foreign goods consumed forms a constant percentage share of the total value of goods consumed, the percentage change in the value of foreign goods consumed must be the same as the percentage change in the total value of goods consumed, 20%. – Sufficient

The correct answer is option C.

339. From statement 1:

The statement gives us information on the balance on May 30 had the rate been 12%.

This can be used to determine the balance on May 1.

However, since the actual percent increase has not been mentioned, we cannot determine the actual balance on May 30. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

The statement gives us information on the actual percent increase from May 1 to May 30.

However, since the balance on May 1 has not been mentioned, we cannot determine the actual balance on May 30. – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

Let the balance on May 1 be \$ x .

Thus, at 12% increase, the balance on May 30 = \$ (112% of x)

Thus, we have:

$$\frac{112}{100} \times x = 504$$
$$\Rightarrow x = 4500$$

Thus, actual balance on May 30 (at 8% increase) = \$ (108% of 4500) = \$4860. – Sufficient

The correct answer is option C.

340. From statement 1:

There is no information about Guy's deductions. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

There is no information about Guy's gross income. – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

There is no information about Guy's actual gross income and actual deductions or the deductions as a percent of the gross income ratio. – Insufficient

Had the deductions d as a percent of the gross income i been known, say $k\%$, the percent change in net income could have been calculated as follows:

Initial net income: $(100 - k)\%$ of i

Final net income: $(100 - 1.15k)\%$ of $1.04i$; from information provided in statements 1 & 2.

Thus, percent change in net income could have been calculated.

The correct answer is option E.

341. From statement 1:

We know that the number of children with brown hair = $\frac{60}{100} \times 100 = 60$.

However, we cannot determine the number of boys with brown hair. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

We only know the number of boys is 40.

However, we cannot determine the number of boys with brown hair. – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

Even after combining the statements, we cannot determine the number of boys with brown hair (since the percent of boys with brown hair is not known: we cannot assume that since 60% of the children have brown hair, 60% of the boys would also have brown hair). – Insufficient

The correct answer is option E.

342. Since each of Jack's and Kate's annual salaries in 2005 were 10% higher than that in 2004, the sum of their salaries in 2005 would also be 10% higher than that in 2004.

From statement 1:

The sum of Jack's and Kate's annual salaries in 2004 = \$ 80,000.

Thus, the sum of Jack's and Kate's annual salaries in 2005 = $\$ 80,000 \times \frac{110}{100} = \$ 88,000$

However, we cannot determine Jack's individual salary in 2004. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

The sum of Jack's and Kate's annual salaries in 2005 = \$ 88,000.

Thus, the sum of Jack's and Kate's annual salaries in 2004 = $\$ 88,000 \times \frac{100}{110} = \$ 80,000$

However, we cannot determine Jack's individual salary in 2004. – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

Even after combining both statements, we cannot determine Jack's individual salary in 2004, as we are only aware of the sum of Jack's and Kate's salary, but no individual salary is known. – Insufficient

The correct answer is option E.

343. We need to verify if:

20% of $n > 10\%$ of $(n + 0.5)$

$$\Rightarrow \frac{20n}{100} > \frac{10(n + 0.5)}{100}$$

$$\Rightarrow \frac{n}{5} > \frac{n + 0.5}{10}$$

$$\Rightarrow 2n > n + 0.5$$

$$\Rightarrow n > 0.5$$

From statement 1:

$$n < 0.1$$

$$\Rightarrow n \neq 0.5$$

Thus, the answer to the question is 'No'. – Sufficient

From statement 2:

$$n > 0.01$$

Thus, we may have $n = 0.8(> 0.5)$ or $n = 0.2(\neq 0.5)$.

Thus, the answer to the question is not unique. – Insufficient

The correct answer is option A.

344. We need to verify whether:

$$p \times \frac{25}{100} = r \times \frac{10}{100}$$

$$\Rightarrow \frac{p}{4} = \frac{r}{10}$$

$$\Rightarrow p = \frac{2r}{5}$$

From statement 1:

$$r = (100 + 300)\% \text{ of } p$$

$$\Rightarrow r = 400\% \text{ of } p$$

$$\Rightarrow r = \frac{400}{100} \times p$$

$$\Rightarrow r = 4p$$

$$\Rightarrow p = \frac{r}{4} \text{ - the answer is No - Sufficient}$$

From statement 2:

$$p = (100 - 80)\% \text{ of } (r + p)$$

$$\Rightarrow p = 20\% \text{ of } (r + p)$$

$$\Rightarrow p = \frac{20}{100} \times (r + p)$$

$$\Rightarrow p = \frac{r+p}{5}$$

$$\Rightarrow p - \frac{p}{5} = \frac{r}{5}$$

$$\Rightarrow \frac{4p}{5} = \frac{r}{5}$$

$$\Rightarrow p = \frac{r}{4} - \text{the answer is No - Sufficient}$$

The correct answer is option D.

345. Let the expenditures for books, newspapers and periodicals be \$ x , \$ y and \$ z respectively.

$$\text{Thus: } x + y + z = 35000 \dots (i)$$

From statement 1:

$$y = (100 + 40) \% \text{ of } z$$

$$\Rightarrow y = 1.4z \dots (ii)$$

The above equation along with equation (i) cannot be used to solve for x since there are three unknowns and only two equations. – Insufficient

$$\Rightarrow y + z = \frac{3x}{4} \dots (iii)$$

Substituting $(y + z)$ above in equation (i):

$$x + \frac{3x}{4} = 35000$$

$$\Rightarrow \frac{7x}{4} = 35000$$

$$\Rightarrow x = 20000 - \text{Sufficient}$$

The correct answer is option B.

346. From statement 1:

There is no information about the income of or amount of taxes paid by Mr. Jacobs in 1994. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

There is no information about the amount of taxes paid by Mr. Jacobs in 1993.

Hence, the amount of taxes paid in 1994 cannot be determined. – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

Taxes paid in 1993 = $\$(4.8\% \text{ of } 42500) = \2040 .

Thus, taxes paid in 1994 = $\$(2040 + 232) = \2272 .

However, the taxable income in 1994 is not known.

Thus, the percentage of taxable income paid as taxes cannot be determined. – Insufficient

The correct answer is option E.

347. Let Joe's income in 2001 be \$100

Thus, taxes paid in 2001 = $\$(5.1\% \text{ of } 100) = \5.1

From statement 1:

Joe's income in 2002 = $\$ \{(100 + 10)\% \text{ of } 100\} = \110 .

However, there is no information about the amount of taxes Joe paid in 2002. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

Taxes paid in 2002 = $\$(3.4\% \text{ of } 100) = \3.4

However, there is no information about Joe's income in 2002. – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

Joe's income in 2002 = \$110.

Taxes paid by Joe in 2002 = \$3.4

Thus, percent of income paid in taxes = $\frac{3.4}{110} \times 100 < 5.1$ – Sufficient

The correct answer is option C.

Alternate Approach:

Since income has increased from 2001 to 2002, while the taxes in 2002 has fallen as a percent of the income in 2001, the percent of income paid in taxes in 2002 would be even lower.

Hence, the answer is 'Yes'. – Sufficient

348. We know that the number of female employees in 1997 = 300.

Let number of female employees in 1977 be n .

Thus, the number of female employees in 1987 = $(100 + 60)\%$ of $n = \frac{160}{100} \times n = \frac{8n}{5}$.

From statement 1:

Number of female employees in 1997 = $(100 + 200)\%$ of $n = \frac{300}{100} \times n = 3n$.

Thus, we have:

$$3n = 300$$

$$\Rightarrow n = 100$$

$$\Rightarrow \text{The number of female employees in 1987} = \frac{8}{5} \times 100 = 160.$$

$$\begin{aligned} \text{Thus, the percent increase in the number of female employees from 1987 to 1997} \\ = \frac{300 - 160}{160} \times 100 \end{aligned}$$

$$= 87.5\% - \text{Sufficient}$$

From statement 2:

We have: $n = 100$

This is the same information as obtained from statement 1. – Sufficient

The correct answer is option D.

349. We need to find the ratio of the number of sales transactions made by X and Y in June 1989.

From statement 1:

The relation between the number of sales transactions made by X in June to the number of sales transactions made by Y in May is given.

However, there is no relation given regarding the number of sales transactions made by Y in June. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

The relation between the number of sales transactions made by Y in June to the number of sales transactions made by Y in May is given.

However, there is no relation given regarding the number of sales transactions made by X in June. – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

Let the number of sales transactions made by Y in May be p .

Thus, the number of sales transactions made by X in June = $(100 + 50)\%$ of $p = \frac{3p}{2}$.

Also, the number of sales transactions made by Y in June = $(100 + 25)\%$ of $x = \frac{5p}{4}$.

Thus, the required ratio = $\frac{3p}{2} : \frac{5p}{4} = 6 : 5$. – Sufficient

The correct answer is option C.

6.3 Profit & Loss

350. Gross profit = $(y - x)$

The gross profit as a percent of the cost = $\left(\frac{y - x}{x}\right) \times 100 = \left(\frac{y}{x} - 1\right) \times 100$.

From statement 1:

$y - x = 20$ However, we have no information on the value of $\left(\frac{y}{x}\right)$. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

$$\frac{y}{x} = \frac{5}{4}.$$

Thus, the gross profit as a percent of the cost = $\left(\frac{y}{x} - 1\right) \times 100$

$$= \left(\frac{5}{4} - 1\right) \times 100$$

= 25%. – Sufficient

The correct answer is option B.

351. Total earning from the project = \$500,000.

Profit = Earning – Cost.

Let the cost for labor = \$ l .

Let the cost for materials = \$ m .

Hence, profit = \$(500000 – ($m + l$)).

We need to check if the profit is greater than \$150,000

$$\Rightarrow (500000 - (m + l)) > 150000 \Rightarrow m + l < 350000.$$

From statement 1:

$$l + m = 3m$$

$$\Rightarrow l = 2m.$$

We do not have information on the values of l and m – Insufficient

From statement 2:

$$500000 - (m + l) > l$$

$$\Rightarrow m + 2l < 500000$$

We have no information on the value of ($m + l$) – Insufficient

From statements 1 and 2 together:

We have: $m + 2l < 500000$, and $l = 2m$

$$\Rightarrow m + 2(2m) < 500000$$

$$\Rightarrow m < 100000$$

$$\Rightarrow l = 2m < 200000$$

Thus, we have: $m + l < 100000 + 200000 = 300000$ – Sufficient

The correct answer is option C.

352. From statement 1:

We know that the percentage discount on the coat was 2 percentage points more than that on the sweater.

However, the sale price of the two items of clothing before the discount is not known.

Thus, we cannot determine which item was discounted by a greater amount. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

We know that the sale price of the coat was \$10 less than the sale price of the sweater.

However, we have no information on the discounts offered on the two items.

Thus, we cannot determine which item was discounted by a greater amount. – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

Let the percentage discount on the sweater be $s\%$.

Thus, the percentage discount on the coat = $(s + 2)\%$.

Let the sale price of the sweater before the discount be \$ p .

Thus, the sale price of the coat before the discount be \$ $(p - 10)$.

Thus, discount on the coat = $\$ \frac{(s + 2)(p - 10)}{100}$ and the discount on the sweater = $\$ \frac{sp}{100}$.

Since the coat has a higher percentage discount on a lower price, we cannot compare which of the two items has a higher discount. – Insufficient

The correct answer is option E.

353. Let the price at which the computers of Brand C and Brand D were purchased by the store be \$ c and \$ d respectively.

Let the price at which the computers of Brand C and Brand D were sold by the store be $\$x$ and $\$y$ respectively.

Thus, the profit on Brand C = $x - c$ & profit on Brand D = $y - d$

We have to calculate, $\frac{(x - c) - (y - d)}{(y - d)} \times 100\%$

From statement 1:

$$x = y + 15\% \text{ of } y$$

$$\Rightarrow x = y \left(1 + \frac{15}{100}\right) = 1.15y$$

We have no information about the cost of the two computers.

Hence, we cannot determine the answer. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

$$y - d = 300$$

We have no information about the profit on sale of Brand C.

Hence, we cannot determine the answer. – Insufficient

Hence, from statements 1 and 2 together:

We have no information on the cost of the computer of Brand C.

Hence, we cannot determine the answer. – Insufficient

The correct answer is option E.

354. From statement 1:

List price = $(100 + 25)\%$ of (Cost price)

$$\Rightarrow \text{Cost price} = (\text{List price}) \times \frac{100}{125}$$

$$= \$12300 \times \frac{100}{125}$$

$$= \$9840 - \text{Sufficient}$$

From statement 2:

Selling price of the car = \$11070.

Thus, we have:

$$11070 = (100 + 12.5) \% \text{ of (Cost price)}$$

$$\Rightarrow 11070 = \left(1 + \frac{1}{8}\right) \times (\text{Cost price})$$

$$\Rightarrow \text{Cost price} = \$11070 \times \frac{8}{9}$$

$$= \$9840 - \text{Sufficient}$$

The correct answer is option D.

6.4 Averages (including weighted averages)

355. From statement 1:

R_1 refers to the average of all the amounts in the 1st row.

Similar reasoning is valid for the other rows as well.

Let us take an example:

R_1	1	2	3	6	Average = $\frac{12}{4} = 3$
R_2	4	6	7	7	Average = $\frac{24}{4} = 6$
Average of all the values = $\frac{1 + 2 + 3 + 6 + 4 + 6 + 7 + 7}{8} = 4.5$					
Average of R_1 and $R_2 = \frac{3 + 6}{2} = 4.5$					
Thus, average of all the elements is the same as the average of R_1 and R_2					

Thus, we can say that the average of all the 20 elements

$$= \frac{R_1 + R_2 + R_3 + R_4 + R_5}{5} = \frac{550}{5} = 110 - \text{Sufficient}$$

From statement 2:

Similar reasoning is applicable as in statement 1.

Thus, we can say that the average of all the 20 elements

$$= \frac{C_1 + C_2 + C_3 + C_4}{4} = \frac{440}{4} = 110 - \text{Sufficient}$$

The correct answer is option D.

356. From statement 1:

We know that average height of the students in only one class.

Hence, we cannot determine the average height of all the seniors. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

We only know the ratio of the average heights of the seniors in the two classes.
Hence, we cannot determine the average height of all the seniors. – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

Average height of the seniors in the larger class = 70 inches.

Thus, average height of the seniors in the smaller class = $\frac{4}{5} \times 70 = 56$ inches.

However, we do not know the number of students in each class, or either the ratio of number of students in each class. If the ratio of larger number of students to smaller number of students is known = $\frac{x}{y}$, then the average would have been = $\frac{70x}{56y}$

Hence, we cannot determine the average height of all the seniors. – Insufficient

The correct answer is option E.

357. From statement 1:

The average annual salary of the employees in Division R is \$30,000.

However, we have no information on the employees in any other division in Company Q.

Hence, the average annual salary of the employees at Company Q cannot be determined. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

The average annual salary of the employees not in Division R is \$35,000.

However, we have no information on the salary of the employees in Division R in Company Q.

Hence, the average annual salary of the employees at Company Q cannot be determined. – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

We know the average annual salary of the employees in Division R and also the employees not in Division R.

However, we have no information on the ratio of the number of employees in Division R and the number of employees in Division R.

If the ratio $\frac{\text{Number of employees of Division R}}{\text{Number of employees not in division R}} = \frac{x}{y}$,

Then, the average salary of all the employees in Company Q = $\left(\frac{x \times 3000 + y \times 3500}{x + y} \right)$

Hence, the average annual salary of the employees at Company Q cannot be determined – Insufficient

The correct answer is option E.

358. From statement 1:

There is no information on the number of Sedans sold, the number of Coupes sold, the average selling price of the Coupes. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

There is no information on the number of Sedans sold, the number of Coupes sold, the average selling price of the Sedans. – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

Let the number of Sedans sold and the number of Coupes be s & c , respectively; thus, the average price for all the cars

$$= \$ \left(\frac{10600s + 8400c}{s + c} \right)$$

However, there is no information about c & s . – Insufficient

The correct answer is option E.

359. Jill's average score for three games = 168.

Thus, Jill's total score for three games = $168 \times 3 = 504$.

From statement 1:

Jill's highest score = 204.

Thus, sum of Jill's two lowest scores = $504 - 204 = 300$.

However, we cannot determine Jill's lowest scores. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

Sum of Jill's two highest scores = 364.

Thus, Jill's lowest score = $504 - 364 = 140$. – Sufficient

The correct answer is option B.

360. We know that there are 20 friends in all.

Let the average amount spent by each friend = $\$a$.

The amount spent by the first five friends = $\$ (5 \times 21) = \105 .

The average amount spent by the remaining $(20 - 5) = 15$ friends = $\$ (a - x)$.

Thus, the total amount spent by the 15 friends = $\$ (15 \times (a - x))$.

Thus, the total amount spent by all the friends = $\$ \{15 \times (a - x) + 105\} \dots (i)$

Thus, the average amount spent by all the friends = $\$ \left(\frac{15 \times (a - x) + 105}{20} \right)$.

Thus, we have:

$$\frac{15(a - x) + 105}{20} = a$$

$$\Rightarrow 15(a - x) + 105 = 20a$$

$$\Rightarrow 3(a - x) + 21 = 4a$$

$$\Rightarrow 3a - 3x + 21 = 4a$$

$$\Rightarrow a + 3x = 21 \dots (ii)$$

From statement 1:

$$x = 3$$

Thus, from (ii), we have:

$$\Rightarrow a + 3 \times 3 = 21$$

$$\Rightarrow a = 12 - \text{Sufficient}$$

From statement 2:

The total amount spent is \$240.

Thus, from (i), we have:

$$\Rightarrow 15 \times (a - x) + 105 = 240$$

$$\Rightarrow 15(a - x) = 135$$

$$\Rightarrow a - x = 9$$

$$\Rightarrow x = a - 9$$

From (ii), we have:

$$a + 3(a - 9) = 21$$

$$\Rightarrow 4a = 48$$

$$\Rightarrow a = 12 - \text{Sufficient}$$

The correct answer is option D.

Alternate Approach:

The total amount spent is \$240, and total friends are 20.

$$\text{The average amount spent} = \frac{240}{20} = 12. - \text{Sufficient}$$

6.5 Ratio & Proportion

361. Let the number of staff members = n .

From statement 1:

$$x : y : z = 2 : 3 : 4$$

$\Rightarrow x = 2k, y = 3k, z = 4k$, where k is a constant of proportionality.

However, we have no information on n . – Insufficient

From statement 2:

$$nx = 18, ny = 27, nz = 36.$$

We have no information about x, y, z .

Hence, we cannot determine the value of n . – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

Substituting the values of x or y or z from statement 1 in the information from statement 2, we have:

$$nx = 18 = 2k$$

$$n = \frac{9}{k}$$

Since k is unknown, we cannot determine n . – Insufficient

The correct answer is option E.

362. Number of members at the beginning of the year in the Finance and Planning Committees were n each.

Number of members at the end of the year in the Finance and Planning Committees are $(n - 5)$ and $(n - 3)$, respectively.

From statement 1:

$$\text{Number of members who left at the end of the year} = 3 + 5 = 8.$$

$$\text{Thus, number of members at the beginning of the year} \frac{6}{1} \times 8 = 48.$$

$$\text{Thus: } 2n = 48$$

$$\Rightarrow n = 24 - \text{Sufficient}$$

From statement 2:

Number of members remained in the Planning committee = 21.

Number of members who had left the Planning committee = 3.

Thus, number of members in the Planning committee at the beginning of the year
= $21 + 3 = 24$.

Thus, $n = 24$ – Sufficient

The correct answer is option D.

363. From statement 1:

Before the water from X was poured, X was $\frac{1}{3}$ full.

However, the capacity of Y in terms of X is not known.

Hence, fraction of water in Y after pouring cannot be determined. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

Let the capacity of X and Y be c units.

Though we know the initial amount of water in $Y = \frac{c}{2}$, we do not know the initial amount of water present in X .

Hence, fraction of water in Y after pouring cannot be determined. – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

The capacity of X and Y is c units.

Initial amount of water in X and $Y = \frac{c}{3}$ and $\frac{c}{2}$ respectively.

Final amount of water in Y when all the water in X is poured in $Y = \frac{c}{2} + \frac{c}{3} = \frac{5c}{6}$.

Hence, fraction of water in Y after pouring = $\frac{5}{6}$ – Sufficient

The correct answer is option C.

364. Ratio in which the inks are blended is given as:

Red : Blue : Green : Yellow = 6 : 5 : 2 : 2.

Thus, we have:

Quantity of red ink = $6k$

Quantity of blue ink = $5k$

Quantity of green ink = $2k$

Quantity of yellow ink = $2k$, where k is the constant of proportionality

We need to determine the quantity of green ink used i.e. $2k$.

From statement 1:

Since quantity of red ink used is 2 liters more than that of blue ink, we have:

$$6k = 2 + 5k$$

$$\Rightarrow k = 2$$

$$\Rightarrow \text{The quantity of green ink used} = 2k = 2 \times 2 = 4 \text{ liters} - \text{Sufficient}$$

From statement 2:

$$\text{Total volume of color X ink} = 6k + 5k + 2k + 2k = 15k.$$

$$\text{Thus, we have: } 15k = 30$$

$$\Rightarrow k = 2$$

$$\Rightarrow \text{The quantity of green ink used} = 2k = 2 \times 2 = 4 \text{ liters} - \text{Sufficient}$$

The correct answer is option D.

365. From statement 1:

We have the ratio of apple juice and cranberry juice that were mixed.

Since no volume is mentioned, we cannot determine the number of liters of apple juice. - Insufficient

From statement 2:

The volume of cranberry juice is known. However, we cannot determine the number of liters of apple juice. - Insufficient

Thus, from 1 and 2 together:

$$\frac{\text{Apple juice}}{\text{Cranberry juice}} = \frac{3}{2}$$

$$\Rightarrow \frac{\text{Apple juice}}{5} = \frac{3}{2}$$

$$\Rightarrow \text{Apple juice} = 5 \times \frac{3}{2} = 7.5 \text{ liters.} - \text{Sufficient}$$

The correct answer is option C.

366. From statement 1:

The ratio of the number of male employees to female employees = 2 : 3.

There is no information about the present scenario. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

Let the number of male employees last January be m .

Let the number of female employees last January be w .

Thus, the number of male employees at present = $(m + 400)$.

The number of female employees at present = w .

Thus, we have:

$$\frac{m + 400}{w} = \frac{3}{4}$$

There are two unknowns and hence, this equation cannot be solved. – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

$$\begin{aligned} m : w &= 2 : 3 \\ \Rightarrow w &= \frac{3m}{2} \end{aligned}$$

Substituting this in the equation obtained in statement 2, we have:

$$\frac{(m + 400)}{\frac{3m}{2}} = \frac{3}{4}$$

$$\Rightarrow m = 3200$$

$$\Rightarrow w = 3 \times \frac{3200}{2} = 4800$$

Thus, the number of male employees at present = $(m + 400) = 3600$.

The number of female employees at present = $w = 4800$.

Thus, the total number of employees at present = $3600 + 4800 = 8400$. – Sufficient

The correct answer is option C.

367. From statement 1:

Jim caught $\frac{2}{3}$ of the total fish they caught together.

Thus, Tom caught $\left(1 - \frac{2}{3}\right) = \frac{1}{3}$ of the total fish they caught together.

Thus, Jim caught more fish than Tom did. – Sufficient

From statement 2:

We know that Jim caught 12 more fish than what he had caught till Tom was fishing with him.

However, we have no information on the number of fish either Tom or Jim had actually caught.
– Insufficient

The correct answer is option A.

368. We know that:

The ratio of the number of male and female workers in 2002 = 3 : 4.

Let the number of male and female workers in 2002 be $3k$ and $4k$ respectively, where k is a constant of proportionality.

From statement 1:

We know that:

The ratio of the number of male workers in 2002 to 2003 = 3 : 5.

The number of male workers in 2002 = $3k$.

Thus, the number of male workers in 2003 = $\frac{5}{3} \times 3k = 5k$.

However, we have no information about the number of female workers in 2003. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

We know that:

The ratio of the number of male and female workers in 2003 = 10 : 7.

Let the number of male and female workers in 2003 be $10l$ and $7l$ respectively where l is another constant of proportionality (not necessarily the same as k).

Percent increase in the number of male workers from 2002 to 2003 = $\left(\frac{10l - 3k}{3k}\right) \times 100$

$$= \left(\frac{10l}{3k} - 1\right) \times 100 = P_m$$

Percent increase in the number of female workers from 2002 to 2003 = $\left(\frac{7l - 4k}{4k}\right) \times 100$

$$= \left(\frac{7l}{4k} - 1\right) \times 100 = P_f$$

Comparing P_m and P_f , we see that there are two ratios involved: $\left(\frac{10l}{3k}\right)$ and $\left(\frac{7l}{4k}\right)$ respectively.

Comparing the ratios, we see that:

$$\left(\frac{10l}{3k}\right) = \frac{10}{3} \times \frac{l}{k} = 3.33 \times \frac{l}{k}$$

$$\left(\frac{7l}{4k}\right) = \frac{7}{4} \times \frac{l}{k} = 1.75 \times \frac{l}{k}$$

As, l and k both are positive thus, ratio $\left(\frac{l}{k}\right)$ must also be positive. Hence, from above equations we can conclude that

Thus, we can say that:

$$\left(\frac{10l}{3k}\right) > \left(\frac{7l}{4k}\right)$$

$\Rightarrow P_m > P_f$ – Sufficient

The correct answer is option B.

369. From statement 1:

There is no information about the male members in the club. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

There is no information about the female members in the club. – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

We know that 10 male members are over 75 years of age.

However, we cannot find the number of female members over 75 years of age.

Also, the total number of members is not known.

Thus, the answer cannot be determined. – Insufficient

The correct answer is option E.

370. From statement 1:

There is no information about the male members in the club. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

There is no information about the female members in the club. – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

$$\text{Percent of female members who are mechanical engineers} = \frac{1}{3} \times 75\% = 25\%.$$

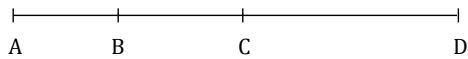
$$\text{Percent of male members who are engineers} = 30\%.$$

Thus, the percent of male members who are mechanical engineers $\leq 30\%$, (since only engineers can be mechanical engineers).

Since for both male and female members, the fraction of mechanical engineers among them is less than $\frac{1}{3}$ among all members, the fraction of mechanical engineers is definitely not more than $\frac{1}{3}$. - Sufficient

The correct answer is option C.

371. From statement 1:



$$AD = AC + BD - BC$$

However, the length of BC is not known. - Insufficient

From statement 2:

$$BC^2 = AB \times CD$$

However, none of the lengths are known. - Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

Let the length of $BC = x$.

Thus, from statement 1, we have:

$$AB = 10 - x$$

$$CD = 15 - x$$

Thus, from statement 2, we have:

$$x^2 = (10 - x)(15 - x)$$

$$\Rightarrow x^2 = 150 - 25x + x^2$$

$$\Rightarrow 25x = 150$$

$$\Rightarrow x = 6$$

Thus, we have:

$$AD = AC + BD - BC$$

$$= 10 + 15 - 6 = 19 - \text{Sufficient}$$

The correct answer is option C.

6.6 Mixtures

372. We need to find the minimum concentration of milk in any of the two containers so that when mixed they result in 80% milk solution.

Since one container has the minimum milk concentration, the other must have the maximum possible milk concentration, i.e. 100% (this is the limiting case).

Also, in order to find the minimum concentration in one container, we must have 100% concentration of milk in the container having the larger volume so that a large quantity of milk is obtained.

From statement 1:

We have:

$$x = 2y$$

$$\Rightarrow x > y$$

Thus, the container with x liters must be taken to be 100% milk.

Since the entire contents of both containers are mixed to get 30 liters of solution, we have:

$$x + y = 30$$

$$\Rightarrow 2y + y = 30$$

$$\Rightarrow y = 10$$

$$\Rightarrow x = 20$$

Thus, we have two solutions: 20 liters of 100% concentration of milk and 10 liters of $n\%$ concentration of milk, where $n\%$ represents the minimum concentration of milk.

Thus, equating the final concentration of milk, we have:

$$\frac{20 \times \left(\frac{100}{100}\right) + 10 \times \left(\frac{n}{100}\right)}{20 + 10} = \frac{80}{100}$$

$$\Rightarrow 20 + \frac{n}{10} = \frac{4}{5} \times 30$$

$$\Rightarrow 20 + \frac{n}{10} = 24$$

$$\Rightarrow n = 40 - \text{Sufficient}$$

From statement 2:

We have:

$$x = y + 10$$

$$\Rightarrow x > y$$

Thus, the container with x liters must be taken to be 100% milk.

Since the entire contents of both containers are mixed to get 30 liters of solution, we have:

$$x + y = 30$$

$$\Rightarrow (y + 10) + y = 30$$

$$\Rightarrow y = 10$$

$$\Rightarrow x = 20$$

The correct answer is option D.

373. From statement 1:

We have:

$$x = 10, \text{ and}$$

$$y = 100$$

However, the value of z is not known (we should not assume that $x = z$). – Insufficient

From statement 2:

We have:

$$x = 20\% \text{ of } y, \text{ and}$$

$$z = 10\% \text{ of } y$$

Since we need the fraction of milk finally present in the mixture, we can assume a suitable value for y for ease of calculations.

Let $y = 100$

Thus, we have:

$x = 20$, and

$z = 10$

Thus, we have:

From 100 liters of milk in a cask, 20 liters are removed and then 10 liters of water are added.

This process is repeated twice.

Thus, in the first cycle, fraction of the total contents of the cask removed = $\frac{20}{100} = \frac{1}{5}$

Thus, fraction of contents left = $1 - \frac{1}{5} = \frac{4}{5}$

Thus, amount of milk left after the first cycle = $100 \times \frac{4}{5} = 80$ liters.

Now, 10 liters of water are added.

Thus, total contents of the cask = $(80 + 10) = 90$ liters.

Thus, in the second cycle, fraction of the total contents of the cask removed = $\frac{20}{90} = \frac{2}{9}$

Thus, fraction of contents left = $1 - \frac{2}{9} = \frac{7}{9}$

Thus, amount of milk left after the second cycle = $80 \times \frac{7}{9} = \frac{560}{9}$ liters.

Total volume of cask after removal = $(90 - 20) = 70$ liters.

Now, 10 liters of water are added.

Thus, total contents of the cask = $(70 + 10) = 80$ liters.

Thus, required fraction of milk = $\left(\frac{\frac{560}{9}}{80} \right) = \frac{7}{9}$ - Sufficient

The correct answer is option B.

- 374.** We need to find the minimum concentration of milk in any of the two containers so that when mixed they result in 80% milk solution.

Since one container has the minimum milk concentration, the other must have the maximum possible milk concentration, i.e. 100% (this is the limiting case).

Also, in order to find the minimum concentration in one container, we must have 100% concentration of milk in the container having the larger volume so that a large quantity of milk is obtained.

From statement 1:

We have:

$$x = 2y$$

$$\Rightarrow x > y$$

Thus, the container with x liters must be taken to be 100% milk.

Since the entire contents of both containers are mixed to get 30 liters of solution, we have:

$$x + y = 30$$

$$\Rightarrow 2y + y = 30$$

$$\Rightarrow y = 10$$

$$\Rightarrow x = 20$$

Thus, we have two solutions: 20 liters of 100% concentration of milk and 10 liters of $n\%$ concentration of milk, where $n\%$ represents the minimum concentration of milk.

Thus, equating the final concentration of milk, we have:

$$\frac{20 \times \left(\frac{100}{100}\right) + 10 \times \left(\frac{n}{100}\right)}{20 + 10} = \frac{80}{100}$$

$$\Rightarrow 20 + \frac{n}{10} = \frac{4}{5} \times 30$$

$$\Rightarrow 20 + \frac{n}{10} = 24$$

$$\Rightarrow n = 40 - \text{Sufficient}$$

From statement 2:

We have:

$$x = y + 10$$

$$\Rightarrow x > y$$

Thus, the container with x liters must be taken to be 100% milk.

Since the entire contents of both containers are mixed to get 30 liters of solution, we have:

$$x + y = 30$$

$$\Rightarrow (y + 10) + y = 30$$

$$\Rightarrow y = 10$$

$$\Rightarrow x = 20$$

This is the same result as obtained from statement 1.

Hence, we would obtain a unique answer. –Sufficient

The correct answer is option D.

375. From statement 1:

We have:

$$x = 10, \text{ and}$$

From statement 2:

Now, 10 liters of water are added.

Thus, total contents of the cask = $(70 + 10) = 80$ liters.

Thus, required fraction of milk = $\left(\frac{\frac{560}{9}}{80} \right) = \frac{7}{9}$ - Sufficient

The correct answer is option B.

6.7 Speed, Time, & Distance

376. From statement 1:

Mieko's average speed was $\frac{3}{4}$ of Chan's speed.

Thus, Mieko's travel time

$= \frac{1}{\left(\frac{3}{4}\right)} = \frac{4}{3}$ of Chan's travel time (since for the same distance, time is inversely proportional to speed).

Chan's travel time = 15 minutes.

Thus, Mieko's travel time = $15 \times \frac{4}{3} = 20$ minutes – Sufficient

From statement 2:

The length of the route is of no use since actual speeds are not mentioned. – Insufficient

The correct answer is option A.

377. Let the length of the route be d miles.

From statement 1:

Time taken to cover the route at 55 miles per hour is $\frac{d}{55}$ hours.

Time taken to cover the route at 50 miles per hour is $\frac{d}{50}$ hours.

Thus, we have:

$$\frac{d}{55} = \frac{d}{50} - 1$$

$\Rightarrow d = 550$ miles. – Sufficient

From statement 2:

Speed over the first half of the route = 25 miles per hour.

Time taken to cover the first half of the route = 11 hours.

Hence, length of the first half of the route = $11 \times 25 = 275$ miles.

Hence, length of the entire route = $2 \times 275 = 550$ miles. – Sufficient

The correct answer is option D.

378. From statement 1:

There is no information about Joan's average speed. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

There is no information about the distance. – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

Let the actual distance be d miles.

Thus, Joan's estimate of the distance ranged from $(d + 5)$ miles to $(d - 5)$ miles.

Let Joan's actual average speed be s miles/hour.

Thus, Joan's estimate of her speed ranged from $(s + 10)$ miles to $(s - 10)$ miles/hour.

Thus, actual time = $\frac{d}{s}$ hours.

Maximum value of estimated time = $\left(\frac{d + 5}{s - 10}\right)$ hours.

Minimum value of estimated time = $\left(\frac{d - 5}{s + 10}\right)$ hours.

We need to determine whether:

$$(1) \quad \left(\frac{d + 5}{s - 10}\right) - \frac{d}{s} \leq 0.5,$$

AND

$$(2) \quad \frac{d}{s} - \left(\frac{d - 5}{s + 10}\right) \leq 0.5$$

Since the relation between s and d is not known, we cannot determine the answer.

Let us take some values to verify:

(1) If $d = 20, s = 15$:

$$\text{Condition (a): } \left(\frac{d + 5}{s - 10}\right) - \frac{d}{s} = \frac{25}{5} - \frac{20}{15} = 5 - \frac{4}{3} = \frac{11}{3} > 0.5 - \text{does not satisfy}$$

$$\text{Condition (b): } \frac{d}{s} - \left(\frac{d - 5}{s + 10}\right) = \frac{20}{15} - \frac{15}{25} = \frac{4}{3} - \frac{3}{5} = \frac{11}{15} > 0.5 - \text{does not satisfy}$$

(2) If $d = 60, s = 50$:

$$\text{Condition (a): } \left(\frac{d+5}{s-10} \right) - \frac{d}{s} = \frac{65}{40} - \frac{60}{50} = \frac{13}{8} - \frac{6}{5} = \frac{17}{40} < 0.5 - \text{satisfies}$$

$$\text{Condition (b): } \frac{d}{s} - \left(\frac{d-5}{s+10} \right) = \frac{60}{50} - \frac{55}{60} = \frac{6}{5} - \frac{11}{12} = \frac{17}{60} < 0.5 - \text{satisfies}$$

Thus, there is no unique answer. – Insufficient

The correct answer is option E.

379. Time (t) taken to travel d feet at r feet per second

$$t = \frac{d}{r}$$

Time (T) taken to travel D feet at R feet per second

$$T = \frac{D}{R}$$

From statement 1:

$$d = D + 30 \dots (i)$$

However, there is no information on the values of r and R . – Insufficient

From statement 2:

$$r = R + 30 \dots (ii)$$

However, there is no information on the values of d and D . – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

From (i) and (ii), we have:

$$\begin{aligned} t &= \frac{d}{r} \\ &= \frac{D+30}{R+30} \\ &= \frac{\left(\frac{D+30}{R} \right)}{\left(\frac{R+30}{R} \right)} \\ &= \frac{\left(\frac{D}{R} + \frac{30}{R} \right)}{\left(1 + \frac{30}{R} \right)} \end{aligned}$$

$$= \frac{\left(T + \frac{30}{R}\right)}{\left(1 + \frac{30}{R}\right)}$$

$$\text{Let } \frac{30}{R} = k$$

Thus, we have:

$$t = \frac{T + k}{1 + k}$$

There are 2 possible cases:

(1) If $T > 1$: $\frac{T + k}{1 + k} < T$; for example:

$$\text{If } T = 2 \text{ and } k = 1: \frac{T + k}{1 + k} = \frac{3}{2} < 2$$

$$\Rightarrow t < T$$

(2) If $T < 1$: $\frac{T + k}{1 + k} > T$; for example:

$$\text{If } T = \frac{1}{2} \text{ and } k = 1: \frac{T + k}{1 + k} = \frac{\left(\frac{3}{2}\right)}{2} = \frac{3}{4} > \frac{1}{2}$$

$$\Rightarrow t > T$$

Thus, there is no unique answer. – Insufficient

The correct answer is option E.

6.8 Time & Work

380. From statement 1:

Time taken to produce 40 screws = 56 seconds.

However, no information is provided about the time taken to produce a bolt. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

Time taken to produce 1 bolt = 1.5 times the time taken to produce one screw.

However, no information is provided about the time taken to produce one screw. – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

Time taken to produce one screw = $\frac{56}{40} = 1.4$ seconds.

Thus, time taken to produce one bolt = $1.4 \times 1.5 = 2.1$ seconds.

Thus, time taken to produce 300 bolts = $2.1 \times 300 = 630$ seconds. – Sufficient

The correct answer is option C.

381. From statement 1:

We have information about only one machine. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

We do not have any information about the actual rate at which the copies are made. – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

We know that one machine produces copies at the rate of 250 copies per minute.

Since one machine is twice as fast as the other machine (we have no information about which machine is twice as efficient), we can have the second machine making copies at the rate of

$$(1) \quad \frac{250}{2} = 125 \text{ copies per minute}$$

OR

$$(2) \quad 250 \times 2 = 500 \text{ copies per minute}$$

Thus, we do not know the actual rate at which the copies are made by the other machine. – Insufficient

The correct answer is option E.

382. Time taken by 5 skilled workers to complete the job = 18 hours.

Thus, time taken by 1 skilled worker to complete the job = $18 \times 5 = 90$ hours ... (i)

Also, number of skilled workers required to complete the job in 1 hour = $5 \times 18 = 90$... (ii)

We need to find the time it takes for a group of 3 skilled workers and 4 apprentices to do the same job.

From statement 1:

Since an apprentice works at $\frac{2}{3}$ the rate of a skilled worker, we can say that 1 apprentice is equivalent to $\frac{2}{3}$ of a skilled worker.

Thus, 3 apprentices are equivalent to $\left(3 \times \frac{2}{3}\right) = 2$ skilled workers.

Thus, 4 skilled workers and 3 apprentices are equivalent to $(4 + 2) = 6$ skilled workers.

Thus, from (i), we have:

Time taken by 6 skilled workers to complete the job

$$= \frac{90}{6} = 15 \text{ hours} - \text{Sufficient}$$

From statement 2:

Time taken by 6 apprentices and 5 skilled workers to complete the job = 10 hours.

Thus, in order to complete the job in 1 hour, number of people required

$$= 6 \times 10 \text{ apprentices and } 5 \times 10 \text{ skilled workers}$$

$$= 60 \text{ apprentices and } 50 \text{ skilled workers}$$

Thus, from (ii), we have:

$$60 \text{ apprentices and } 50 \text{ skilled workers} \equiv 90 \text{ skilled workers}$$

$$\Rightarrow 60 \text{ apprentices} \equiv 40 \text{ skilled workers}$$

$$\Rightarrow 1 \text{ apprentice} \equiv \frac{40}{60} = \frac{2}{3} \text{ skilled worker}$$

This is the same information as in statement 1. – Sufficient

The correct answer is option D.

6.9 Computational

383. Say there are n number of sales people.

Thus from statement 1, total number of cars = $4n + 23$ - Insufficient

Thus from statement 2, total number of cars = $6n + 5$ - Insufficient

Thus from statement 1 & 2 together, $6n + 5 = 4n + 23 \Rightarrow n = 9$ - a unique answer

The correct answer is option C.

384. Let the employee worked for x hours today and for y hours yesterday.

The employee gets paid \$9 per hour for 8 hours i.e. \$72 for a total of 8 hours.

Hence, for an excess of 8 hours, his pay per hour = $\$9 \times \left(1\frac{1}{2}\right) = \$\left(9 \times \frac{3}{2}\right) = \$\left(\frac{27}{2}\right)$.

From statement 1:

Since we have no information on the number of hours the employee worked yesterday, we cannot calculate his yesterday's pay.

Thus, we cannot find his today's pay.

Hence, we cannot determine the number of hours he worked today. - Insufficient

From statement 2:

We have no information on the pay received by the employee today.

Hence, we cannot determine the number of hours he worked today. - Insufficient

From statements 1 and 2 together:

Since the employee worked for 8 hours yesterday, he received \$72 as pay.

Hence, the pay received by the employee today $\$(27 + 72) = \99 .

For the first 8 hours today, the employee received \$72.

Hence, he received an extra of \$27 today.

For each hour of additional work, the employee receives = $\$ \frac{27}{2}$.

Hence, number of hours he worked extra today = $\frac{27}{\frac{27}{2}} = 2$ hours.

Hence, the employee worked for $8 + 2 = 10$ hours today. - Sufficient

The correct answer is option C.

385. Let the regular-size box contain r ounces cereal.

From statement 1:

The family-size box contains $(r + 10)$ ounces cereal.

We cannot determine the cost per ounce since no price is mentioned. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

Cost of the family-size box = \$5.40

We cannot determine the cost per ounce since no quantity is mentioned. – Insufficient

Thus from statements 1 and 2 together:

Cost per ounce of the family-size box = $\$ \left(\frac{5.40}{r + 10} \right)$.

We cannot determine the cost per ounce since r is unknown. – Insufficient

The correct answer is option E.

386. From statement 1:

We have no information on how many customers purchased how many books. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

We know that 20 customers purchased two books each.

This accounts for $20 \times 2 = 40$ books.

We have no information on the number of books purchased by the others. – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

Let x customers purchased one book each.

Also, 20 customers purchased two books each (from Statement 2).

Thus, the remaining $100 - (x + 20) = (80 - x)$ customers purchased exactly three books each (since no one purchased more than three books (from Statement 1)).

Total books purchased = 200.

Thus: $x \times 1 + 20 \times 2 + (80 - x) \times 3 = 200$

$\Rightarrow x = 40$ – Sufficient

The correct answer is option C.

387. Let the number of employees = x .

$$\text{Thus, number of males} = x \times \frac{25}{100} = \frac{x}{4}.$$

$$\text{Number of sales staff} = x \times \frac{50}{100} = \frac{x}{2}.$$

From statement 1:

We know that there are seven males who are sales staff.

However, we cannot determine x from this information. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

$$\text{Number of males} = \frac{x}{4}.$$

$$\text{Thus, number of females} = x - \frac{x}{4} = \frac{3x}{4}.$$

$$\text{Hence, we have: } \frac{3x}{4} - \frac{x}{4} = 16$$

$$\Rightarrow x = 32 - \text{Sufficient}$$

The correct answer is option B.

388. Let the price of each orange yesterday be $\$x$.

$$\text{Thus, the price of each apple yesterday} = \$(x + 0.10)$$

$$\text{Let the number of apples sold} = a$$

$$\text{Let the number of oranges sold} = r$$

$$\text{We have to calculate: Total revenue} = rx + a(x + 0.10)$$

From statement 1:

$$r = a + 5.$$

Since we do not know the actual number of oranges sold, we cannot determine the revenue from the oranges. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

$$\text{Revenue from apples} = a \times (x + 0.10) = 15.$$

Since we do not know the number of oranges sold or the price of each orange, we cannot determine the revenue from the oranges – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

$$\text{Revenue from oranges} = rx = (a + 5)x; (\text{substituting } r = a + 5).$$

We have: $a \times (x + 0.10) = 15$;

However, we cannot determine the value of a or x .

Hence, we cannot determine the revenue from the oranges. – Insufficient

The correct answer is option E.

389. Total amount of inventory, in dollar, at the end = Total amount of inventory, in dollar, at the beginning + Total amount of purchases in the month – Total amount of sale in the month

From statement 1:

The store effectively had purchased 250 writing pads at \$0.75 per pad and 150 pads at \$0.80 per pad.

However, the number of pads sold and its price are not known.

Hence, total amount of inventory, in dollar, of stock by the store at the end of last month cannot be determined – Insufficient

From statement 2:

The total revenue from the sale of writing pads = \$180.

However, the number of writing pads purchased by the store and its price in the last month is not known.

Hence, total amount of inventory, in dollar, of stock by the store at the end of last month cannot be determined – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

Total amount of inventory, in dollar, at the end

$$= 250 \times 0.75 + 150 \times 0.80 - 180 = 187.50 + 120 - 180 = 127.50 - \text{Sufficient}$$

The correct answer is option C.

390. From statement 1:

We have:

$$H = kJ,$$

$$J = 60000.$$

However, since k is unknown, we cannot determine the value of H – Insufficient

From statement 2:

We have:

$$H = kJ,$$

$$J = 37500,$$

$$H = 7500$$

Thus,

$$k = \frac{H}{J} = \frac{7500}{37500} = \frac{1}{5}.$$

Thus, we have:

$$H = \frac{J}{5}$$

However, no information is given on the number of jobs to be created i.e. J .

Hence, the value of H cannot be determined – Insufficient

From statements 1 and 2 together:

We know:

$$H = \frac{J}{5},$$

$$J = 60000$$

Thus, we have:

$$H = \frac{60000}{5} = 12000 \text{ – Sufficient}$$

The correct answer is option C.

391. From statement 1:

We have no information about the distance travelled in one gallon of gasoline.

Hence, the cost of gasoline per mile cannot be determined – Insufficient

From statement 2:

We have no information about the cost of gasoline.

Hence, the cost of gasoline per mile cannot be determined – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

Since we need to find the cost of gasoline per mile, we need to know the total cost of gasoline and the total number of miles travelled.

The cost per gallon of gasoline is known.

Since the number of gallons of gasoline used is not known, we cannot determine the total cost of gasoline.

Hence, the cost of gasoline per mile cannot be determined – Insufficient

The correct answer is option E.

392. Total number of parents = 20.

We also know that more parents chose Monday than Tuesday.

From statement 1:

We know that the maximum number of parents present on any weekday = 5.

If no parent attended on Friday, then 20 parents attended the conference on four days (Monday to Thursday).

This is only possible if on each day, there were $\frac{20}{4} = 5$ parents attending the conference.

However, we know that more parents chose Monday than Tuesday.

Since maximum number of parents on any day can be five, we must have four or less parents on Tuesday.

Thus, 19 parents (five on each of Monday, Wednesday and Thursday and four on Tuesday) have been accounted for.

Thus, the remaining parent must have been present on Friday. – Sufficient

From statement 2:

We have more parents on Monday than both Tuesday and Wednesday.

This does not help in determining the number of parents present on Friday. – Insufficient

The correct answer is option A.

393. From statement 1:

We have: $v + z = 6$

Since none of the numbers are more than '3', the above equation is valid only if $v = z = 3$.

We also know that each of the numbers 1, 2, 3 appear exactly once in each row and column.

Thus, in the first row: $s \neq 3$ (as in column 2 $\Rightarrow v = 3$ is already present) and $t \neq 3$ (as in column 3 $\Rightarrow z = 3$ is already present).

$\Rightarrow r = 3$ - Sufficient

From statement 2:

Since each of the numbers 1, 2, 3 appear exactly once in each row and column.

Thus, the sum of each row and each column = $1 + 2 + 3 = 6$.

Hence, we have:

$$r + s + t = 6; \text{ (considering the first row)}$$

$$r + u + x = 6; \text{ (considering the first column)}$$

Adding the above two equations, we have:

$$2r + s + t + u + x = 12.$$

$$\text{However, we know: } s + t + u + x = 6$$

$$\text{Hence, } 2r = 12 - (s + t + u + x) = 12 - 6 = 6$$

$\Rightarrow r = 3$ - Sufficient

The correct answer is option D.

394. From statement 1:

$$t \triangle 2 = 74$$

$$\Rightarrow (t + 2)^2 + (2 + 3)^2 = 74$$

$$\Rightarrow (t + 2)^2 = 49$$

$$\Rightarrow t + 2 = \pm 7$$

$$\Rightarrow t = 5 \text{ or } -9.$$

Hence, we do not have a unique value of t . - Insufficient

From statement 2:

$$2 \triangle t = 80$$

$$\Rightarrow (2 + 2)^2 + (t + 3)^2 = 80$$

$$\Rightarrow (t + 3)^2 = 64$$

$$\Rightarrow t + 3 = \pm 8$$

$$\Rightarrow t = 5 \text{ or } -11.$$

Hence, we do not have a unique value of t . – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

We find that $t = 5$ is common to both statements 1 and 2.

Hence, $t = 5$. – Sufficient

The correct answer is option C.

395. Total deduction = $p \times \frac{t}{100} + s = \frac{pt}{100} + s$.

$$\text{Thus, amount of Leland's payment left} = p - \frac{pt}{100} + s = p - s - \frac{pt}{100}.$$

From statement 1:

$$p - s = 244$$

However, we do not have the value of t . – Insufficient

From statement 2:

$$pt = 7552$$

However, we do not have the value of s . – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

$$\begin{aligned} \text{Amount of payment left} &= (p - s) - \frac{pt}{100} \\ &= 244 - \frac{7552}{100} = 244 - 75.52 = 168.48 - \text{Sufficient} \end{aligned}$$

The correct answer is option C.

396. Let the daily water supply be x gallons.

$$\text{Loss in water supply per day} = \frac{12x}{100} \text{ gallons.}$$

Let the cost to the city for every gallon lost be \$ y .

Thus, we need to determine:

The dollar cost to the city per day for the loss = \$ $\left(\frac{12xy}{100}\right)$

From statement 1:

We know $x = 350 \times 10^6$ gallons.

However, the value of y is unknown.

Hence, the dollar cost to the city per day for the loss cannot be determined. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

The statement gives us the cost to the city for every gallon lost as $y = \$ \left(\frac{2}{12000}\right) = \$ \left(\frac{1}{6000}\right)$

However, the value of x is unknown.

Hence, the dollar cost to the city per day for the loss cannot be determined. – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

$$x = 350 \times 10^6$$

$$y = \$ \left(\frac{1}{6000}\right)$$

Thus, the dollar cost to the city per day for the loss:

$$= \$ \left(\frac{12 \times (350 \times 10^6) \times \left(\frac{1}{6000}\right)}{100} \right) = \$70000. \text{ – Sufficient}$$

The correct answer is option C.

397. From statement 1:

$$y = x + 5$$

Since the actual values of x and y are unknown, we cannot determine the total amount saved per week i.e. $(x + y)$. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

Amount saved by Ann in six weeks = \$ $6x$.

Amount saved by Beth in six weeks = \$ $5y$.

Thus, we have:

$$6x = 5y$$

Since the actual values of x and y are unknown, we cannot determine the total amount saved per week i.e. $(x + y)$. – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

We have:

$$6x = 5y$$

$$\Rightarrow y = \frac{6x}{5}$$

Substituting the value of y from statement 1, in the equation, we have:

$$\frac{6x}{5} = x + 5$$

$$\Rightarrow x = 25$$

$$\Rightarrow y = \frac{6 \times 25}{5} = 30$$

Thus, the total amount saved per week = \$ $(x + y)$ = \$ 55. – Sufficient

The correct answer is option C.

398. From statement 1:

Let the regular price of the ice cream Antonio bought be \$ x per half-liter carton.

Thus, the price for the second half-liter carton he paid = \$ $\left(\frac{x}{2}\right)$.

Thus, Antonio's savings = \$ $\left(\frac{x}{2}\right)$.

Total regular price (without the discounted offer) = \$ $2x$.

Thus, the percent of the total regular price saved:

$$\Rightarrow \frac{\left(\frac{x}{2}\right)}{2x} \times 100 = 25\%. \text{ – Sufficient}$$

From statement 2:

The offered discounted rate is not mentioned.

Hence, the percent of the total regular price saved cannot be determined. – Insufficient

The correct answer is option A.

399. We know that '∇' represents either of addition, subtraction, multiplication or division.

From statement 1:

$$10 \nabla 5 = 2$$

Checking one at a time:

- (1) $10 + 5 = 15 \neq 2$
- (2) $10 - 5 = 5 \neq 2$
- (3) $10 \times 5 = 50 \neq 2$
- (4) $10 \div 5 = 2$

Thus, we can say that ' ∇ ' represents division.

$$\Rightarrow 6 \nabla 2 = 6 \div 2 = 3 - \text{Sufficient}$$

From statement 2:

$$4 \nabla 2 = 2$$

Checking one at a time:

- (1) $4 + 2 = 6 \neq 2$
- (2) $4 - 2 = 2$
- (3) $4 \times 2 = 8 \neq 2$
- (4) $4 \div 2 = 2$

Thus, we can say that ' ∇ ' represents either of subtraction or division.

$$\Rightarrow 6 \nabla 2 = 6 - 2 = 4$$

OR

$$\Rightarrow 6 \nabla 2 = 6 \div 2 = 3$$

Thus, there is no unique answer. – Insufficient

The correct answer is option A.

400. Number of shares of stock X with Mr. John = n .

Dividend earned on the above n shares in 2005 = \$150.

Thus, dividend earned per share in 2005 = $\$ \left(\frac{150}{n} \right)$.

Number of shares of stock X with Mrs. John = 300.

Since the shares are of the same stock X, the dividend earned per share is the same.

Thus, the dividend earned on the above 300 shares in 2005 = $\$ \left(\frac{150}{n} \times 300 \right) = \$ \left(\frac{45000}{n} \right)$.

From statement 1:

We have:

$$\frac{150}{n} = 0.75$$

$$\Rightarrow n = 200$$

$\Rightarrow$ Mrs. John's total dividend on her 300 shares in 2005 = $\$ \left(\frac{45000}{n} \right) = \$ \left(\frac{45000}{200} \right) = \225 . - Sufficient

From statement 2:

$$n = 200$$

This is the same information as obtained from statement 1. - Sufficient

The correct answer is option D.

401. Let the lower limit and upper limit for the population be p and q .

Let the lower limit and upper limit for the total income be i and j .

From statement 1:

There is no information about the total income. - Insufficient

From statement 2:

There is no information about the population. - Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

We have:

$$p = 330000$$

$$i = \$5500000000$$

Thus, based on the lower estimates, the average income per person

$$= \$ \left(\frac{5500000000}{330000} \right)$$

$$= \$16666.7$$

$$= \approx \$16666 > \$16500$$

However, while looking the higher estimates of population and total income, it may be possible that the higher estimate of population was considerably higher than the corresponding lower estimate, whereas, the higher estimate of total income was slightly higher than the corresponding lower estimate. As a result, the average income per person could fall lower than \$16666 and in fact, go on to be lower than \$16500.

For example:

Let the higher estimate of population be 500,000.

Let the higher estimate of total income be \$5,600,000,000.

Thus, based on the higher estimates, the average income per person

$$= \$ \left(\frac{5600000000}{500000} \right)$$

$$= \$11200 < \$16500$$

Thus, the average income per person may be greater or lesser than \$16500.

Thus, there is no unique answer. – Insufficient

The correct answer is option E.

- 402.** Since ■, △ and ∇ represent positive digits, their values can only be from 1 to 9 (inclusive).

From statement 1:

If ∇ = 4, there is only one possible value of ■ and △ so that ■ < △: ■ = 1, △ = 3. – Sufficient

From statement 2:

If ■ = 1, the possible values of △ are: 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7 or 8; since in each case, the addition does not lead to a carry.

Thus, the value of △ cannot be uniquely determined. – Insufficient

The correct answer is option A.

6.10 Simple Interest

403. From statement 1:

We only have information about the ratio of the rates of interest.

However, we have no information on the amounts invested at the given rates $x\%$ and $y\%$.

Thus, we cannot determine the value of x . – Insufficient.

From statement 2:

The amount invested at $x\% = \$ \left(\frac{3}{3+2} \right) \times 60000 = \$36,000$.

The amount invested at $y\% = \$ \left(\frac{2}{3+2} \right) \times 60000 = \$24,000$.

However, we have no information on the rates of interest.

Thus, we cannot determine the value of x . – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

We have: $x = \frac{3}{4}y$

$\Rightarrow y = \frac{4x}{3}$.

Thus, total interest:

$$36000 \times x\% + 24000 \times y\% = 4080$$

$$36000 \times \frac{x}{100} + 24000 \times \frac{y}{100} = 4080$$

$$\Rightarrow 360x + 240 \left(\frac{4x}{3} \right) = 4080$$

$$\Rightarrow x = \frac{4080}{680} = 6\% - \text{Sufficient}$$

The correct answer is option C.

404. Let John had lent $\$x$ at 10% and $\$y$ at 22%.

From statement 1:

$$x + y = 2400$$

However, there is no information about the interest received on each amount. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

Since the average rate of interest obtained was 15%, we have:

$$\frac{(x \times 10) + (y \times 22)}{(x + y)} = 15$$

$$\Rightarrow 10x + 22y = 15x + 15y$$

$$\Rightarrow 5x = 7y$$

$$\Rightarrow \frac{x}{y} = \frac{7}{5}$$

Thus, the higher part is \$ x and the lower part is \$ y

Thus, the higher part was lent at 10% rate of interest. – Sufficient

The correct answer is option B.

6.11 Compound Interest

405. From statement 1:

$$D(1) = 11000$$

$$\Rightarrow 10,000\left(1 + \frac{r}{100}\right)^1 = 11000$$

$$\Rightarrow 1 + \frac{r}{100} = \frac{11000}{10000} = 1.1$$

$$\Rightarrow \frac{r}{100} = 0.1$$

$$\Rightarrow r = 10.$$

Amount after three years

$$= D(3) = 10,000\left(1 + \frac{10}{100}\right)^3 - \text{Sufficient.}$$

From statement 2:

$$r = 10\%$$

It is the same information as obtained from statement 1 – Sufficient.

The correct answer is option D.

6.12 Functions

406. From statement 1:

$$f(2) = a^2 = 100$$

$$\Rightarrow a = \pm 10$$

$$\text{Thus: } f(1) = a^1 = a = \pm 10.$$

Hence, we do not have a unique value of a . – Insufficient

From statement 2:

$$f(3) = a^3 = -1000$$

$$\Rightarrow a = -10$$

$$\text{Thus: } f(1) = a^1 = a = -10. \text{ – Sufficient}$$

The correct answer is option B.

407. From statement 1:

$$f(c) = 3c + 1 = 13$$

$$\text{Thus: } 3c + 1 = 13$$

$$\Rightarrow c = 4.$$

$$\text{Thus, we have: } g(c) = \frac{c-1}{3} = \frac{4-1}{3} = 1. \text{ – Sufficient}$$

From statement 2:

$$f(1) = 3 \times 1 + 1 = 4.$$

$$\text{Thus, we have: } c = 4. \text{ We can easily find } g(c) = g(4) \text{ – Sufficient}$$

The correct answer is option D.

408. From statement 1:

$$|c| = 2$$

$$\Rightarrow c = \pm 2$$

If $c = 2$:

$$f(c) = f(2) = 2 \times 2 = 4; \text{ (since } c \geq 0, f(c) = 2c)$$

If $c = -2$:

$$f(c) = f(-2) = (-2)^2 = 4; \text{ (since } c < 0, f(c) = c^2)$$

Thus, we have a unique value of $f(c) = 4$. – Sufficient

From statement 2:

$$c < 0$$

$$\Rightarrow f(c) = c^2$$

However, the value of c is not known.

Hence, the value of $f(c)$ cannot be determined. – Insufficient

The correct answer is option A.

6.13 Permutation & Combination

409. We are given that total number of bulbs = 10, and number of defective bulbs $n < 5$.

From statement 1:

We know that

$$\begin{aligned}\frac{C_2^n}{C_2^{10}} &= \frac{1}{15} \\ \Rightarrow \frac{\frac{n \cdot (n-1)}{1 \cdot 2}}{\frac{10 \cdot 9}{1 \cdot 2}} &= \frac{1}{15} \\ \Rightarrow n \times (n-1) &= 6 = 3 \times 2\end{aligned}$$

Since $n \times (n-1)$ is a product of two consecutive integers, which are 3 & 2, thus $n = 3$ - Sufficient.

From statement 2:

$$\begin{aligned}\text{We know that } \frac{C_1^n \cdot C_1^{(10-n)}}{C_2^{10}} &= \frac{7}{15} \\ \Rightarrow \frac{\frac{n \cdot (10-n)}{1 \cdot 2}}{\frac{10 \cdot 9}{1 \cdot 2}} &= \frac{7}{15} \\ \Rightarrow n \cdot (10-n) &= 7 \times 3.\end{aligned}$$

Thus $n = 7$ or 3. Since $n < 5$, thus $n = 3$ - Sufficient.

The correct answer is option D.

410. Probability that the marble chosen is red = $\frac{r}{b+w+r}$.

$$\text{Probability that the marble chosen is white} = \frac{w}{b+w+r}.$$

From statement 1:

$$\begin{aligned}\frac{r}{b+w} &> \frac{w}{b+r} \\ \Rightarrow 1 + \frac{r}{b+w} &> 1 + \frac{w}{b+r} \quad (\text{adding 1 to both sides}) \\ \Rightarrow \frac{b+w+r}{b+w} &> \frac{b+r+w}{b+r} \\ \Rightarrow \frac{1}{b+w} &> \frac{1}{b+r}; \quad (\text{canceling } (b+w+r) \text{ from both sides}) \\ \Rightarrow b+r &> b+w\end{aligned}$$

$$\Rightarrow r > w.$$

Since the number of red marbles is greater than the number of white marbles, the probability that the marble chosen will be red is greater than the probability that the marble chosen will be white. – Sufficient

From statement 2:

$$b - w > r$$

$$\Rightarrow b > w + r$$

We can see that the number of black marbles is the greatest.

However, we have no information on whether $r > w$. – Insufficient

The correct answer is option A.

411. From statement 1:

There are nine women out of which four are students.

$$\text{Thus, required probability} = \frac{4}{21} \text{ - Sufficient}$$

From statement 2:

Since five of the nine women are not students, number of women who are students = $9 - 5 = 4$.

$$\text{Thus, required probability} = \frac{4}{21} \text{ - Sufficient}$$

The correct answer is option D.

412. From statement 1:

We have no information on the total number of eggs or on the number of green eggs. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

$$\text{The probability that the egg will be blue} = \frac{1}{3}$$

$$\text{Thus, the probability that the egg will be red or green} = 1 - \frac{1}{3} = \frac{2}{3}$$

Since we do not know the probability of the egg being red, we cannot determine the probability of the egg being green. – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

Since we do not know the total number of eggs, we cannot determine the probability of the egg being red.

Hence, we cannot determine the probability of the egg being green. – Insufficient

The correct answer is option E.

413. Let the number of women be w .

Thus, we have:

$$p = \frac{C_2^w}{C_2^{10}}$$

We need to determine whether $p > \frac{1}{2}$.

From statement 1:

Number of women, $w > \frac{10}{2} = 5$.

If $w = 6$:

$$p = \frac{C_2^w}{C_2^{10}} = \frac{C_2^6}{C_2^{10}} = \frac{15}{45} = \frac{1}{3} < \frac{1}{2}.$$

Thus, if $w \geq 6$: $1 \geq p \geq \frac{1}{3}$.

Thus, the value of p can be less than $\frac{1}{2}$ or even be more than $\frac{1}{2}$ (for example, if $w = 10$, then $p = 1$).

Thus, the answer cannot be uniquely determined. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

Number of men = $(10 - w)$.

We know that the probability that both representatives are men is less than $\frac{1}{10}$.

Thus, we have:

$$\frac{C_2^{(10-w)}}{C_2^{10}} < \frac{1}{10}.$$

Rather than solving, it is best to put a few values of w .

Since the probability $\frac{1}{10}$ is very small, possible values of w would be on the higher side, but less than or equal to '8' (since there are at least two men):

$$w = 8 : \frac{C_2^{(10-w)}}{C_2^{10}} = \frac{C_2^2}{C_2^{10}} = \frac{1}{45} < \frac{1}{10}; \text{ (satisfies)}$$

$$w = 7 : \frac{C_2^{(10-w)}}{C_2^{10}} = \frac{C_2^3}{C_2^{10}} = \frac{3}{45} = \frac{1}{15} < \frac{1}{10}; \text{ (satisfies)}$$

$$w = 6 : \frac{C_2^{(10-w)}}{C_2^{10}} = \frac{C_2^4}{C_2^{10}} = \frac{6}{45} = \frac{2}{15} \not< \frac{1}{10}; \text{ (does not satisfy)}$$

Thus, possible values of w are 7 or 8.

Let us now calculate the probability that both representatives are women i.e. p .

$$\text{At } w = 7 : p = \frac{C_2^w}{C_2^{10}} = \frac{C_2^7}{C_2^{10}} = \frac{21}{45} \not> \frac{1}{2}$$

$$\text{At } w = 8 : p = \frac{C_2^w}{C_2^{10}} = \frac{C_2^8}{C_2^{10}} = \frac{28}{45} > \frac{1}{2}$$

Thus, the answer cannot be uniquely determined. – Insufficient

Thus, statements 1 and 2 together:

Even after combining both statements, p may be more than $\frac{1}{2}$ or less than $\frac{1}{2}$. – Insufficient

The correct answer is option E.

- 414.** Let the number of seniors and the number of juniors be s and j , respectively.

We need to determine the value of $(s + j)$.

From statement 1:

$$\text{The probability of selecting a senior} = \left(\frac{s}{s + j} \right).$$

Thus, we have:

$$\begin{aligned} \frac{s}{s + j} &= \frac{4}{7} \\ \Rightarrow s &= \frac{4j}{3} \end{aligned}$$

Since the exact values of s and j are not known, we cannot determine the value of $(s + j)$. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

$$s = j + 5$$

Since the exact values of s and j are not known, we cannot determine the value of $(s + j)$. - Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

Substituting the value of $s = \frac{4j}{3}$ in the equation from statement 2, we have:

$$\frac{4j}{3} = j + 5$$

$$\Rightarrow j = 15$$

$$\Rightarrow s = j + 5 = 20$$

$$\Rightarrow s + j = 35. - \text{Sufficient}$$

The correct answer is option C.

6.14 Sets

415. From statement 1:

It is known that each of the voters voted for exactly one candidate.

We also know that 80 percent of the female voters voted for Edith.

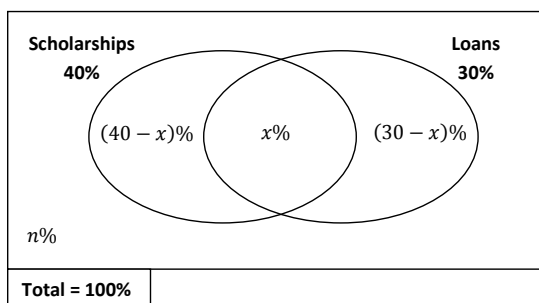
Thus, the remaining $(100 - 80)\% = 20\%$ of the female voters voted for Jose. – Sufficient

From statement 2:

There is no information about the female voters. – Insufficient

The correct answer is option A.

416. Let us draw the corresponding Venn-diagram:



We need to determine the value of n .

From statement 1:

We have:

$$(40 - x)\% = 25\%$$

$$\Rightarrow x = 15\%$$

Thus, the percent of students who received scholarships or loans

$$= (40 + 30 - x)\%$$

$$= 55\%$$

Thus, the percent of students who received neither student loans nor scholarships ($n\%$)

$$= (100 - 55)\%$$

= 45% – Sufficient

From statement 2:

Percent of students who received loans = 30%.

Thus, percent of students who received loans as well as scholarships ($x\%$)

= 50% of 30%

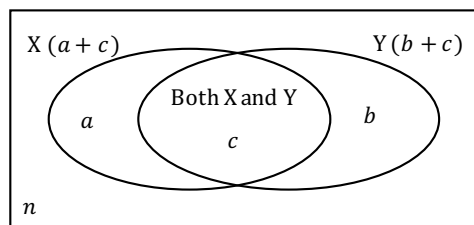
$$= \frac{50}{100} \times 30\%$$

= 15%

This is the same information as obtained from statement 1. – Sufficient

The correct answer is option D.

417. Let us refer to the Venn-diagram shown below:



From statement 1:

$$c = 20\% \text{ of } (a + c)$$

$$\Rightarrow c = \frac{a + c}{5}$$

$$\Rightarrow 5c = a + c$$

$$\Rightarrow a = 4c \dots (i)$$

However, there is no information on the value of b . – Insufficient

From statement 2:

$$c = 30\% \text{ of } (b + c)$$

$$\Rightarrow c = \frac{3}{10} (b + c)$$

$$\Rightarrow b = \frac{7c}{3} \approx 2.3c \dots (ii)$$

However, there is no information on the value of b . – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

From (i) and (ii):

$$a > b$$

$$\Rightarrow a + c > b + c$$

$\Rightarrow$ The number of members of Club X is greater than that of Club Y. – Sufficient

Alternately, we have:

$$20\% \text{ of } X = 30\% \text{ of } Y$$

$$\Rightarrow \frac{X}{Y} = \frac{30}{20} > 1$$

$$\Rightarrow X > Y$$

$\Rightarrow$ The number of members of Club X is greater than that of Club Y. – Sufficient

The correct answer is option C.

6.15 Statistics & Data Interpretation

418. Standard deviation (SD) is a measure of deviation of items in a set w.r.t their arithmetic mean (average). Closer are the items to the mean value, lesser is the value of SD, and vice versa; thus, it follows that if a set has all equal items, its SD = 0.

Statement 1 is clearly insufficient as we do not know how many numbers of eggs are there in each nest; merely knowing the mean value is insufficient.

Statement 2 is clearly sufficient. As discussed above since each set has an equal number of eggs, their mean = number of eggs in each set, so SD = 0—no deviation at all!

The correct answer is option B.

419. The median weight of 89 boxes would be the weight of the $\left(\frac{89 + 1}{2}\right)^{\text{th}} = 45^{\text{th}}$ box after the boxes have been arranged in increasing order of weight (the boxes may be arranged in decreasing order of weight as well).

Since each of the 45 boxes on shelf J weighs less than each of the 44 boxes on shelf K, the median weight will be the weight of the heaviest box on shelf J.

From statement 1:

The heaviest box on shelf J weighs 15 pounds.

Hence, the median weight of 89 boxes = 15 pounds. – Sufficient

From statement 2:

The lightest box on shelf K weighs 20 pounds.

However, we need information on the heaviest box on shelf J. – Insufficient

The correct answer is option A.

420. From statement 1:

Standard deviation (SD) is a measure of deviation of items in a set with respect to their arithmetic mean (average). Closer are the items to the mean value, lesser is the value of SD, and vice versa.

Thus, it follows that if a set has all equal items, its SD = 0.

Since the SD of the amounts of the eight awards is the same, the amount for each award must have been the same. – Sufficient

From statement 2:

The total amount of the eight awards will not help us to determine whether the amount for each award was the same. – Insufficient

The correct answer is option A.

421. Let the five numbers be a, b, c, d and e (where $a > b > c > d > e$).

Thus, we have:

$$\frac{a + b + c + d + e}{5} = 12$$

$$\Rightarrow a + b + c + d + e = 60$$

We need to determine the median of the five numbers.

It is clear that the median is one of the five numbers.

Since we have assumed $a > b > c > d > e$, the median must be c .

From statement 1:

Thus, we have:

$$c = \frac{1}{3} (a + b + d + e)$$

$$\Rightarrow c = \frac{1}{3} \{(a + b + c + d + e) - c\}$$

$$\Rightarrow c = \frac{1}{3} (60 - c)$$

$$\Rightarrow 3c = 60 - c$$

$$\Rightarrow c = 15$$

Thus, the median is 15. – Sufficient

From statement 2:

It is clear that the median is one of the five numbers.

Since we have assumed $a > b > c > d > e$, the median must be c .

Thus, we have:

$$a + b + d + e = 45$$

However, we have:

$$a + b + c + d + e = 60$$

$$\Rightarrow c = 60 - 45 = 15$$

Thus, the median is 15. – Sufficient

The correct answer is option D.

422. Let the four numbers be a, b, c and d .

Thus, we have:

$$\frac{a + b + c + d}{4} = 30$$

$$\Rightarrow a + b + c + d = 120$$

From statement 1:

We know that none of the four numbers is greater than 60.

However, it may be that only one number is greater than 30 or three numbers are greater than 30 as shown below:

- (1) 27, 28, 29, 36: Average is 30; only one number greater than 30
- (2) 28, 29, 31, 32: Average is 30; two numbers greater than 30
- (3) 24, 31, 32, 33: Average is 30; three numbers greater than 30

Hence, we cannot determine the answer. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

We know that two of the numbers are 9 and 10.

Without loss of generality, we can assume that:

$$a = 9$$

$$b = 10$$

$$a + b + c + d = 120$$

$$\Rightarrow 9 + 10 + c + d = 120$$

$$\Rightarrow c + d = 101$$

Thus, it may be that:

Both c and d are more than 30, for example: $a = 50, b = 51$

OR

Only one among them is more than 30, for example: $a = 80, b = 21$

Hence, we cannot determine the answer. – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

We know that none of the numbers is greater than 60.

Also, we have: $c + d = 101$.

Thus, maximum value of either c or d is 60.

Hence, the value of the other number = $101 - 60 = 41$.

Thus, we can see that two of the numbers are greater than 30. – Sufficient

The correct answer is option C.

423. The average of the assessed values of x houses = \$ 212,000.

Thus, the total of the assessed values of x houses = \$ 212,000 x .

The average of the assessed values of y houses = \$ 194,000.

Thus, the total of the assessed values of y houses = \$ 194,000 y .

Thus, the total of the assessed values of $x + y$ houses = \$ (212000 x + 194000 y).

Thus, the average of the assessed values of $x + y$ houses = \$ $\left(\frac{212000x + 194000y}{x + y} \right)$.

From statement 1:

We only know the value of $(x + y)$ and not the relation between x and y .

Hence, the average of the assessed values of $(x + y)$ houses cannot be determined. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

We have: $x = 2y$.

Thus, the average of the assessed values of $x + y$ houses

$$\begin{aligned} &= \$ \left(\frac{212000x + 194000y}{x + y} \right) \\ &= \$ \left(\frac{212000 \times 2y + 194000y}{2y + y} \right) \\ &= \$ 206000. \text{ - Sufficient} \end{aligned}$$

The correct answer is option B.

424. Standard deviation (SD) is a measure of deviation of items in a set with respect to their arithmetic mean (average). Closer are the items to the mean value, lesser is the value of SD, and vice versa; this follows that if a set has all equal items, its $SD = 0$.

From statement 1:

We know that the average salary of Company Y's employees is greater than the average salary of Company Z's employees.

However, we have no information about the deviation of the actual salaries of the employees about the mean.

Hence, we cannot compare the standard deviations. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

We know that the median salary of Company Y's employees is greater than the median salary of Company Z's employees.

However, we have no information about the deviation of the actual salaries of the employees about the mean.

Hence, we cannot compare the standard deviations. – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

Even after combining the two statements we cannot determine the deviation of the actual salaries of the employees about the mean. – Insufficient

The correct answer is option E.

6.16 Linear Equations

425. From statement 1:

Let the price of a 16-ounce loaf be x and that of a 24-ounce loaf be y .

We need to find the value of y .

Thus: $x + y = 2.40$ – Insufficient

From statement 2:

Let the price of a 16-ounce loaf be x and that of a 24-ounce loaf be y .

We need to find the value of y .

Thus: $2x + y = 3.40$ – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

We can solve for y : $(x + y = 3.40) - (x + y = 2.40) = x = 1 \Rightarrow y = 1.40$ – Sufficient

The correct answer is option C.

426. We need to find the value of x .

From statement 1:

$x + 50y = 150$ – Insufficient

From statement 2:

$x + 100y = 225$ – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

$$(x + 100y = 225) - (x + 50y = 150) \Rightarrow y = \frac{3}{2}$$

$\Rightarrow x = 75$ – Sufficient

The correct answer is option C.

427. Let the price of the shirt be s and the price of the pair of gloves be g .

Thus, we have: $s + g = 41.70$.

From statement 1:

$$s = 2g.$$

$$\text{Thus: } s + g = 41.70$$

$$\Rightarrow 2g + g = 41.70$$

$$\Rightarrow g = \$13.90 - \text{Sufficient}$$

From statement 2:

$$s = 27.80.$$

$$\text{Thus: } g = 41.70 - s = 41.70 - 27.80$$

$$\Rightarrow g = \$13.90 - \text{Sufficient}$$

The correct answer is option D.

428. Let the charge of a family membership be f .

The charge of an individual membership = \$300.

Let the number of family and number of individual memberships be x and y , respectively.

Thus, revenue from family and revenue from individual memberships are xf and $300y$, respectively.

$$\text{Thus: } xf + 300y = 480000.$$

We need to determine the value of f .

From statement 1:

$$300y = \frac{1}{4}(480000)$$

$$\Rightarrow y = 400$$

We have no information on x .

Hence, we cannot determine f . – Insufficient

From statement 2:

$$x = 1.5y$$

We have no information about the value of x and y .

Hence, we cannot determine f . – Insufficient

From statements 1 and 2 together:

$$xf + 300y = 480000$$

$$\Rightarrow 1.5yf + 300y = 480000; (\text{Substituting } x = 1.5y \text{ from Statement 2})$$

$$\Rightarrow 1.5 \times 400f + 300 \times 400 = 480000 (\text{Substituting } y = 400 \text{ from Statement 1})$$

$\Rightarrow f = 600$. – Sufficient

The correct answer is option C.

429. Let the price of each book and each magazine be $\$b$ and $\$m$ respectively.

We need to find: $3b + 4m = ?$

From statement 1:

$$b = m + 1.45.$$

We do not know the actual value of m and b .

Hence, we cannot determine the answer – Insufficient

From statement 2:

$$6b + 8m = 43.70$$

$$\Rightarrow 2(3b + 4m) = 43.70$$

$$\Rightarrow 3b + 4m = \frac{43.70}{2} = 21.85 \text{ – Sufficient}$$

The correct answer is option B.

430. From statement 1:

Let the number of smaller shelves (holding 30 books each) required be x .

Number of smaller shelves is six more than those currently present.

Thus, the number of shelves present currently (holding 50 books each) = $(x - 6)$.

Thus, equating the total number of picture books:

$$50(x - 6) = 30x$$

$$\Rightarrow 20x = 300$$

$$\Rightarrow x = 15 \text{ – Sufficient}$$

From statement 2:

Number of shelves present currently (holding 50 books each) = 9.

Thus, total number of picture books = $9 \times 50 = 450$.

Each smaller shelf can hold 30 books.

Thus, the number of smaller shelves required = $\frac{450}{30} = 15$ - Sufficient

The correct answer is option D.

431. From statement 1:

We have no information on n - Insufficient

From statement 2:

$$6m = 9n$$

$$\Rightarrow 2m = 3n; \text{ (canceling 3 from both the sides)}$$

$$\Rightarrow 2m - 3n = 0 \text{ - Sufficient}$$

The correct answer is option B.

432. Let John work for t hours.

$$\text{If } t \leq 40 : \text{John's earnings} = \$xt$$

$$\text{If } t > 40 : \text{John's earnings} = \$ (40x + (t - 40)y)$$

From statement 1:

$$y = 1.5x$$

Since x is unknown, we cannot determine the value of y . - Insufficient

From statement 2:

$$\text{John's earnings for 45 hours} = \$ (40x + (45 - 40)y) = 570 \Rightarrow 40x + 5y = 570.$$

There are two unknowns, hence we cannot determine the value of y . - Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

$$\text{Substituting } y = 1.5x \text{ in the equation: } 40x + (t - 40)y = 570$$

$$40x + 5 \times 1.5x = 570$$

$$\Rightarrow 47.5x = 570$$

$$\Rightarrow x = \frac{570}{47.5} = 12$$

$$\Rightarrow y = 12 \times 1.5 = 18. \text{ - Sufficient}$$

The correct answer is option C.

433. Let the number of additional people be p .

Thus, total daily cost for all $(p + 1)$ people = $\$(120 + xp)$.

We need to calculate the value of x .

From statement 1:

Total daily cost for 4 people (i.e. 3 additional people) = $\$(120 + 3x)$.

Thus, average daily cost for 4 people = $\$ \frac{(120 + 3x)}{4}$.

Thus, we have: $\frac{120 + 3x}{4} = 45$

$\Rightarrow x = 20$. – Sufficient

From statement 2:

Total daily cost for 2 people (i.e. 1 additional person) = $\$(120 + x)$.

Thus, average daily cost for 2 people = $\$ \frac{(120 + x)}{2}$.

Similarly, average daily cost for 4 people = $\$ \frac{(120 + 3x)}{4}$; (from statement 1).

Thus, we have: $\frac{(120 + x)}{2} - \frac{(120 + 3x)}{4} = 25$

$\Rightarrow \frac{120 - x}{4} = 25$

$\Rightarrow x = 20$. – Sufficient

The correct answer is option D.

434. Total tickets sold = 500

Let the number of tickets sold to adults = x .

Thus, the number of tickets sold to children = $(500 - x)$

From statement 1:

Revenue from ticket sales = $\$(25x + 15(500 - x))$

Thus, we have:

$$25x + 15(500 - x) = 10500$$

$\Rightarrow x = 300$ – Sufficient

From statement 2:

Revenue from ticket sales = $\$(25x + 15(500 - x))$

$$\text{Thus, average price per ticket sold} = \$ \left(\frac{25x + 15(500 - x)}{500} \right)$$

Thus, we have:

$$\frac{25x + 15(500 - x)}{500} = 21$$

$$\Rightarrow 25x + 15(500 - x) = 10500.$$

This is the same as the information in statement 1. – Sufficient

The correct answer is option D.

435. Let the number of hours worked in a week be w .

If $w \leq t$: Raymond's earnings = $\$ xw$.

If $w > t$: Raymond's earnings = $\$ (xt + 2(w - t))$.

From statement 1:

We have: $w = (t - 3)$; i.e. $w < t$.

Raymond's earnings = $\$ (x(t - 3))$.

Thus, we have: $x(t - 3) = 14$

Possible values of x and t are:

- (1) $x = 14; t - 3 = 1 \Rightarrow t = 4$: not possible since $t > 4$
- (2) $x = 7; t - 3 = 2 \Rightarrow t = 5$: possible
- (3) $x = 2; t - 3 = 7 \Rightarrow t = 10$: possible
- (4) $x = 1; t - 3 = 14 \Rightarrow t = 17$: possible

There are multiple possible values of t possible, hence we cannot determine the value of t . – Insufficient

From statement 2:

We have: $w = (t + 3)$; i.e. $w > t$.

Raymond's earnings = $\$ (xt + 2((t + 3) - t)) = \$ (xt + 6)$.

Thus, we have: $xt + 6 = 23$

$\Rightarrow xt = 17$.

Possible values of x and t are:

- (1) $x = 17; t = 1$: not possible since $t > 4$
- (2) $x = 1; t = 17$: possible

Thus, we have a unique value of t . – Sufficient

The correct answer is option B.

436. The price of a share on May 1, 1980 was half the price of a share on May 1, 1995.

We need to determine the price of a share on May 1, 1980.

From statement 1:

There is no information regarding the price of a share on May 1, 1995. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

There is no information regarding the actual price of a share on May 1, 2004. – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

Let the price of a share on May 1, 1980 be \$ x .

Thus, the price of a share on May 1, 1995 = \$ $2x$.

Hence, the price of a share on May 1, 2004 = \$ $(2 \times 2x) = \$ 4x$.

Thus, increase in price of a share from May 1, 1995 to May 1, 2004 = \$ $2x$.

Thus, we have:

$$2x = 4.50$$

$$\Rightarrow x = 2.25. \text{ – Sufficient}$$

The correct answer is option C.

437. Let the number of books with Ricardo be n .

From statement 1:

$$n - 15 = \frac{n}{2}$$

$$\Rightarrow n = 30. \text{ – Sufficient}$$

From statement 2:

This statement gives us information on the ratio of types of books with Ricardo and not the total number of books. – Insufficient

The correct answer is option A.

438. Let the number of years for which Dr. Jones lived be x .

From statement 1:

Let the number of years for which Dr. Jones had been a doctor be y .

Thus, we have:

$$y + 10 = \frac{2x}{3} \dots (i)$$

We cannot determine x from this equation since there are two unknowns. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

Let the number of years for which Dr. Jones had been a doctor be y .

Thus, we have:

$$y - 10 = \frac{x}{3} \dots (ii)$$

We cannot determine x from this equation since there are two unknowns. – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

Subtracting equations (i) and (ii):

$$20 = \frac{x}{3}$$

$$x = 60. \text{ – Sufficient}$$

The correct answer is option C.

439. We have:

$$r = \frac{x + y}{2} \text{ \& } s = \frac{x - y}{2}$$

$$\Rightarrow r + s = \frac{(x + y) + (x - y)}{2} = x.$$

Now, in order to find $(r + s)$, we need to find x .

From statement 1:

We do not have the value of x . – Insufficient

From statement 2:

$$r + s = x = 6. \text{ – Sufficient}$$

The correct answer is option B.

440. We have:

$$\frac{x}{600} = \frac{y}{300}$$

$$\Rightarrow x = 2y.$$

From statement 1:

$$x + y = 3000$$

$$\Rightarrow 2y + y = 3000; \text{ (substituting } x = 2y \text{)}$$

$$\Rightarrow y = 1000. - \text{ Sufficient}$$

From statement 2:

$$3x = 6000$$

$$\Rightarrow x = 2000$$

$$\Rightarrow 2y = 2000; \text{ (substituting } x = 2y \text{)}$$

$$\Rightarrow y = 1000. - \text{ Sufficient}$$

The correct answer is option D.

441. From statement 1:

Pete was born in 1986 and is 2 years older than Ellen.

Thus, Ellen must have been born 2 years after Pete was born, i.e. in the year

$$1986 + 2 = 1988 - \text{ Sufficient}$$

From statement 2:

We have no information on Ellen. – Insufficient

The correct answer is option A.

6.17 Quadratic Equations & Polynomials

442. Let the number of men and women be m and w respectively.

We need to determine the value of $(m - w)$.

From statement 1:

We have:

$$m + w = 20.$$

We cannot determine $(m - w)$ from this information. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

We have:

$$m = w^2.$$

We cannot determine $(m - w)$ from this information. – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

$$m = w^2 \text{ and } m + w = 20:$$

$$w^2 + w = 20$$

$$w(w + 1) = 20$$

$$\Rightarrow w = 4$$

$$\Rightarrow m = 4^2 = 16$$

$$\Rightarrow m - w = 16 - 4 = 12. \text{ – Sufficient}$$

The correct answer is option C.

443. $(x + y)^2 = x^2 + y^2 + 2xy$

$$\Rightarrow (x + y) = \pm\sqrt{(x^2 + y^2 + 2xy)}.$$

From statement 1:

$$(x + y) = \pm\sqrt{(x^2 + y^2) + 2xy}$$

$$\Rightarrow (x + y) = \pm\sqrt{1 + 0} = \pm 1.$$

Thus, the value of $(x + y)$ may be or may not be '1'. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

$$(x + y) = \pm\sqrt{(x^2 + y^2) + 2xy}$$

$$\Rightarrow (x + y) = \pm\sqrt{1 + 2x \times 0} = \pm 1.$$

Thus, the value of $(x + y)$ may be or may not be '1'. – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

Even after combining, we still get the same solution: $(x + y) = \pm 1$. – Insufficient

The correct answer is option E.

444. From statement 1:

$$(1 - x)(1 - y) = 1$$

$$\Rightarrow 1 - x - y + xy = 1$$

$$\Rightarrow x + y = xy. \text{ – Sufficient}$$

From statement 2:

$$x^2 - y^2 = x^2y - xy^2$$

$$\Rightarrow (x + y)(x - y) = xy(x - y)$$

We know:

$x \neq y$ i.e. $(x - y) \neq 0$ and hence it can be cancelled from both sides.

$$\Rightarrow x + y = xy \text{ – Sufficient}$$

The correct answer is option D.

445. $x(x - 5)(x + 2) = 0$

$$\Rightarrow x = 0, 5 \text{ or } -2.$$

From statement 1:

$$x^2 - 7x \neq 0$$

$$\Rightarrow x(x - 7) \neq 0$$

$$\Rightarrow x \neq 0 \text{ and } x \neq 7.$$

However, from the question statement, we can still have: $x = 5$ ($\neq 0$) or $x = -2$ (< 0). – Insufficient

From statement 2:

$$\begin{aligned}x^2 - 2x - 15 &\neq 0 \\ \Rightarrow (x - 5)(x + 3) &\neq 0 \\ \Rightarrow x &\neq 5 \text{ and } x \neq -3.\end{aligned}$$

However, from the main question, we can still have: $x = 0$ ($\neq 0$) or $x = -2$ (< 0). – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

$$\begin{aligned}x &\neq -3 \text{ and } x \neq 0 \text{ and } x \neq 5 \text{ and } x \neq 7. \\ \text{Thus, from the main question, we have: } x &= -2 (< 0). \text{ – Sufficient}\end{aligned}$$

The correct answer is option C.

446. $\frac{1}{x} + \frac{1}{y} = \frac{x+y}{xy}$

From statement 1:

The value of xy is not known.

Hence, the value of $\left(\frac{1}{x} + \frac{1}{y}\right)$ cannot be determined. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

$$\begin{aligned}xy &= 6(x + y) \\ \Rightarrow \frac{x+y}{xy} &= \frac{1}{6} \Rightarrow \frac{1}{x} + \frac{1}{y} = \frac{1}{6}. \text{ – Sufficient}\end{aligned}$$

The correct answer is option B.

447. $x^2 - y = w$
 $\Rightarrow x^2 = w + y.$

From statement 1:

$$w + y = 4$$

$$\begin{aligned}\text{Thus: } x^2 &= w + y = 4 \\ \Rightarrow x &= \pm 2\end{aligned}$$

Thus, the value of x is not unique. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

The value of w is unknown.

Hence, the value of x cannot be determined. – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

Even after combining both statements, we cannot determine a unique value of x . – Insufficient

The correct answer is option E.

$$\begin{aligned}
 448. \quad & (y + 3)(y - 1) - (y - 2)(y - 1) = r(y - 1) \\
 \Rightarrow & (y + 3)(y - 1) - (y - 2)(y - 1) - r(y - 1) = 0 \\
 \Rightarrow & (y - 1)((y + 3) - (y - 2) - r) = 0 \\
 \Rightarrow & (y - 1)(5 - r) = 0 \\
 \Rightarrow & y = 1 \text{ or } r = 5
 \end{aligned}$$

Looking at the results, it seems that the question is sufficient in itself and not even a single statement is needed as it yields $y = 1$; however it is not so. The meaning of $y = 1$ or $r = 5$ is that if $r \neq 5$, then $y = 1$, else not!

Moreover, if $r = 5$, y may have any value under the sun!

So the question boils down to the either the determination of value of y or the determination whether $r \neq 5$.

From statement 1:

$$\begin{aligned}
 r^2 &= 25 \\
 \Rightarrow r &= \pm 5
 \end{aligned}$$

If $r = 5$, y can take any value.

If $r = -5 (\neq 5)$, then $y = 1$.

Thus, the unique value of y cannot be determined. – Insufficient.

From statement 2:

If $r = 5$, y can take any value.

Thus, the unique value of y cannot be determined. – Insufficient.

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

Even after combining both statements, we cannot determine the unique value of y . – Insufficient

The correct answer is option E.

449. We have:

$$x^2 + bx + c = (x + d)^2$$

$$\Rightarrow x^2 + bx + c = x^2 + 2dx + d^2$$

Since this is true for all values of x , we can compare the coefficients of x and the constant terms on either side:

$$b = 2d;$$

$$c = d^2$$

From statement 1:

$$c = d^2 = 3^2 = 9. \text{ - Sufficient}$$

From statement 2:

$$b = 2d$$

$$\Rightarrow 6 = 2d$$

$$\Rightarrow d = 3$$

$$\Rightarrow c = d^2 = 9. \text{ - Sufficient}$$

The correct answer is option D.

450. Since the equation $x^2 + 3x + c = x^2 + x(a + b) + ab$ is valid for all values of x , we have (equating the coefficients of x and constants):

$$a + b = 3 \dots (i)$$

$$ab = c \dots (ii)$$

From statement 1:

$$\text{We have: } a = 1$$

Thus, from (i), we have:

$$b = 2$$

Thus, from (ii), we have:

$$c = 1 \times 2 = 2 \text{ - Sufficient}$$

From statement 2:

$$\text{We know that: } a + b = 3$$

Since a and b are positive integers, possible solutions are:

$$a = 1, b = 2$$

OR

$$a = 2, b = 1$$

In either of the two cases: $c = ab = 1 \times 2 = 2$ – Sufficient

The correct answer is option D.

6.18 Inequalities

451. Let the average number of books that Carolyn read per week = c ,
and the average number of books that Jacob read per week = j .

We need to determine whether $c > j$.

From statement 1:

$$2c > 2j - 5$$

$$\Rightarrow 2j - 2c < 5$$

$$\Rightarrow c > j - \frac{5}{2}$$

However, we cannot determine whether $c > j$, since c is greater than a quantity j , which is reduced by a certain amount, $\frac{5}{2}$ – Insufficient

From statement 2:

We only have information about the last five weeks of the vacation.

We have no information about the situation during the remaining part of the vacation; also we do not know vacation is for how many weeks.

Hence, we cannot determine whether $c > j$ – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

Even after combining the statements, we do not get any concrete information – Insufficient

The correct answer is option E.

452. Let the larger and the smaller numbers be l and s respectively.

Thus, we have:

$$\frac{l}{4} > 5s$$

$$\Rightarrow s < \frac{l}{20}$$

We need to determine if:

$$s < 4$$

$$\Rightarrow l < 80.$$

From statement 1:

We have: $l > 70$

We may have $l < 80$ (say, if $l = 75$) OR $l \not< 80$ (say, if $l = 85$). – Insufficient

From statement 2:

We have: $l < 80$. – Sufficient

The correct answer is option B.

453. We have: $xy \neq 0$
 $\Rightarrow$ None of x or y is '0'.

From statement 1:

$$x^2 = y^2$$

$$\Rightarrow x = \pm y$$

$$\Rightarrow \frac{x}{y} = \pm 1$$

Thus, $\frac{x}{y}$ may or may not be equal to 1. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

$$xy > 0$$

$$\Rightarrow x > 0 \text{ and } y > 0$$

OR

$$x < 0 \text{ and } y < 0.$$

However, we cannot determine whether $x = y$ or $\frac{x}{y} = 1$. – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

$$\text{We have: } x > 0 \text{ and } y > 0$$

OR

$$x < 0 \text{ and } y < 0$$

$$\Rightarrow \frac{x}{y} > 0$$

From statement 1 we had: $\frac{x}{y} = \pm 1$

Thus, we can conclude: $\frac{x}{y} \neq -1$, (since $\frac{x}{y} > 0$)

$$\Rightarrow \frac{x}{y} = 1. \text{ - Sufficient}$$

The correct answer is option C.

454. We have: $xyz \neq 0$

$\Rightarrow$ None of x , y or z is '0'.

$$x(y + z) \geq 0$$

$$\Rightarrow x \geq 0 \text{ and } (y + z) \geq 0$$

OR

$$x \leq 0 \text{ and } (y + z) \leq 0.$$

From statement 1:

$$|y + z| = |y| + |z|$$

$\Rightarrow y$ and z are of the same sign i.e. $y \geq 0$ and $z \geq 0$

OR

$$y \leq 0 \text{ and } z \leq 0.$$

However, there is no information on x . - Insufficient

From statement 2:

$$|x + y| = |x| + |y|$$

$\Rightarrow x$ and y are of the same sign i.e. $x \geq 0$ and $y \geq 0$

OR

$$x \leq 0 \text{ and } y \leq 0.$$

However, there is no information on y . - Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

We have two possibilities:

$$(1) \quad x \geq 0, y \geq 0, z \geq 0 \Rightarrow x \geq 0 \text{ and } (y + z) \geq 0$$

$$(2) \quad x \leq 0, y \leq 0, z \leq 0 \Rightarrow x \leq 0 \text{ and } (y + z) \leq 0$$

In both the cases, we have: $x(y + z) \geq 0$. – Sufficient

The correct answer is option C.

455. We have:

$$R = \frac{P}{Q}$$

Thus, for $R \leq P$, we have:

$$Q \geq 1 \text{ if } (R \geq 0 \text{ and } P \geq 0)$$

OR

$$Q < 0 \text{ if } (R \leq 0 \text{ and } P \geq 0)$$

From statement 1:

$$P > 50$$

Since no information on Q is provided, we cannot determine if $R \leq P$. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

$$0 < Q \leq 20.$$

Since no information on P is provided, we cannot determine if $R \leq P$. – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

We find that both P and Q are positive, thus R is also positive.

However, $Q \geq 1$ or $0 < Q \leq 1$ is possible.

$$Q \geq 1 \Rightarrow R \leq P$$

Whereas, $0 < Q \leq 1 \Rightarrow R \geq P$ – Insufficient

The correct answer is option E.

456. $s^4v^3x^7 < 0$

$$\Rightarrow (s^4v^2x^6)(vx) < 0$$

$$\Rightarrow vx < 0; \text{ since } (s^4v^2x^6) > 0 \text{ being a perfect square.}$$

We need to determine whether $svx < 0$.

If $svx < 0$, then we have:

$s > 0$, (since $vx < 0$)

Thus, we need to determine whether $s > 0$.

From statement 1:

There is no information on s . – Insufficient

From statement 2:

There is no information on s . – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

There is still no information on s . – Insufficient

The correct answer is option E.

457. $\frac{x}{2} = \frac{3}{y}$
 $\Rightarrow xy = 6$.

From statement 1:

$$y \geq 3.$$

Since we want to know whether $x < y$, we must test the inequality for minimum possible value of y against the maximum possible value of x .

The minimum value of y results in the maximum value of x since xy is constant.

Minimum value of $y = 3$.

Thus, we have the maximum value of $x = \frac{6}{3} = 2$.

Since the maximum value of x is less than the minimum value of y , we have: $x < y$. – Sufficient

From statement 2:

$$y \leq 4.$$

We know that the maximum value of y results in the minimum value of x since xy is constant.

Maximum value of $y = 4$.

Thus, we have the minimum value of $x = \frac{6}{4} = \frac{3}{2}$.

However, x can attain values higher than $\frac{3}{2}$ while y can attain values lower than 4.

For example: if $y = 4$

$$\Rightarrow x = \frac{6}{4} = \frac{3}{2} \text{ i.e. } x < y.$$

However, if $y = 1$

$$\Rightarrow x = \frac{6}{1} = 6 \text{ i.e. } x > y.$$

Thus, there is no unique answer. – Insufficient

The correct answer is option A.

458. $-2x > 3y$

$$\Rightarrow 2x < -3y$$

$$\Rightarrow x < -\frac{3y}{2}$$

If y is positive, the answer is Yes, else No.

From statement 1:

$$y > 0$$

$$\Rightarrow -\frac{3y}{2} < 0$$

Thus, we have:

$$x < -\frac{3y}{2} < 0. \text{ – Sufficient}$$

From statement 2:

$$2x + 5y - 20 = 0$$

$$\Rightarrow 2x + 5y = 20 \dots (i)$$

$$\text{We know: } -2x > 3y$$

$$\Rightarrow -2x - 3y > 0 \dots (ii)$$

Adding (i) and (ii), we get:

$$-3y + 5y > 20$$

$$\Rightarrow y > 10$$

$$\Rightarrow y > 0.$$

This is the same as in statement 1. – Sufficient

The correct answer is option D.

459. We need to determine whether:

$$(a^{-1} + b^{-1})^{-1} < (a^{-1}b^{-1})^{-1}$$

$$\Rightarrow \frac{1}{\frac{1}{a} + \frac{1}{b}} < \frac{1}{\frac{1}{ab}}$$

$$\Rightarrow \frac{ab}{a+b} < ab$$

$$\Rightarrow \frac{1}{a+b} < 1 \text{ (canceling } (ab) \text{, since } a > 0, b > 0)$$

$$\Rightarrow a + b > 1 \text{ (the inequality does not change while taking reciprocal since } a > 0, b > 0)$$

From statement 1:

$$a = 2b$$

However, we cannot determine whether $a + b > 1$. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

$$a + b > 1. \text{ – Sufficient}$$

The correct answer is option B.

460. We need to determine whether:

$$\frac{a}{b} \times \frac{c}{d} > \frac{c}{b}$$

$$\Rightarrow \frac{a}{d} \times \frac{c}{b} > \frac{c}{b} \text{ (rearranging terms)}$$

Since a, b, c and d are positive, we can cancel out $\frac{c}{b}$ from both sides, it implies that:

$$\Rightarrow \frac{a}{d} > 1$$

$$\Rightarrow a > d$$

From statement 1:

$$\text{We have: } c > b$$

However, there is no comparison between a and d . – Insufficient

From statement 2:

$$\text{We have: } a > d \text{ – Sufficient}$$

The correct answer is option B.

461. From statement 1:

$$w + c > 50$$

Since w and c are any integers, we can have a situation where:

- (1) $w = 0$ and $c = 51 \Rightarrow w + c = 51 > 50$
- (2) $w = 3$ and $c = 50 \Rightarrow w + c = 53 > 50$
- (3) $w = -2$ and $c = 56 \Rightarrow w + c = 54 > 50$

Thus, w may be greater than '0' or equal to '0' or less than '0'. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

There is no information about w . – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

Even after combining the statements, we can still have all the situations shown for statement 1.
– Insufficient

The correct answer is option E.

462. From statement 1:

We have:

$$wz < 2, \text{ and } w > 2$$

Since the product wz is smaller than 2 with w itself being greater than 2, we must have z as either a fraction between '0' and '1' or a number less than or equal to '0'

For example:

- (1) $w = 3, wz = 1$
 $\Rightarrow z = \frac{1}{3} < 1$
- (2) $w = 3, wz = -1$
 $\Rightarrow z = -\frac{1}{3} < 1$

Thus, we have:

$$z < 1 \text{ – Sufficient}$$

From statement 2:

We have:

$$wz < 2, \text{ and } z < 2$$

Since the product wz is smaller than 2 with z itself being smaller than 2, z can take any value depending on the value assigned to w .

For example:

$$\begin{aligned} (1) \quad & \text{If } z > 1 \\ & z = \frac{3}{2}, w = 1 \\ & \Rightarrow wz < 2 \end{aligned}$$

$$\begin{aligned} (2) \quad & \text{If } z < 1 \\ & z = \frac{1}{2}, w = 2 \\ & \Rightarrow wz < 2 \end{aligned}$$

Thus, there is no unique answer. – Insufficient

The correct answer is option A.

463. We know that $x > 0$.

There are two possibilities:

(1) $0 < x < 1$: Here, x is a proper fraction.

Thus, higher the exponent of x , smaller is the value of (since the denominator is greater than the numerator).

$$x^4 < x^3 < x^2 < x$$

For example: $x = 0.2$

$$\Rightarrow x^2 = 0.04 < 0.2 = x$$

(2) $x > 1$:

Here, higher the exponent of x , higher is the value (since the numerator is greater than the denominator).

For example: $x = 2$

$$\Rightarrow x^2 = 4 > 2 = x$$

From statement 1:

We have:

$$0.1 < x < 0.4$$

$$\Rightarrow 0 < x < 1$$

$$\Rightarrow x^2 < x \text{ - Sufficient}$$

From statement 2:

We have:

$$x^3 < x^2$$

As, $x > 0$ canceling x^2 from both sides:

$$x < 1$$

$$\Rightarrow 0 < x < 1$$

$$\Rightarrow x^2 < x \text{ - Sufficient}$$

The correct answer is option D.

464. From statement 1:

$$\frac{x^2}{xy + x} < 1$$

$\Rightarrow x^2 < xy + x$ (since both x and y are positive, $(xy + x)$ is positive and hence can be cross-multiplied without reversing the inequality)

$$\Rightarrow x^2 < x(y + 1)$$

$\Rightarrow x < y + 1$ (since x is positive, we can cancel x from both sides without reversing the inequality)

However, we cannot determine whether $x < y$ – Insufficient

From statement 2:

$$\frac{xy}{y^2 - y} < 1$$

$$\Rightarrow \frac{xy}{y(y - 1)} < 1$$

$$\Rightarrow \frac{x}{y - 1} < 1$$

$\Rightarrow x < y - 1$ (since $y > 1 \Rightarrow y - 1 > 0$, we can cross-multiply $(y - 1)$ without reversing the inequality)

$$\Rightarrow x + 1 < y$$

Thus, we can definitely say that: $x < y$ - Sufficient

The correct answer is option B.

465. We need to determine whether:

$$\frac{x^2}{|x|} < 1$$

$$\Rightarrow \frac{|x|^2}{|x|} < 1, \text{ as } x^2 = |x|^2$$

$$\Rightarrow |x| < 1$$

$$\Rightarrow -1 < x < 1$$

From statement 1:

We know: $x < 1$

However, we do not have the lower bound. - Insufficient

From statement 2:

We know: $x > -1$

However, we do not have the higher bound. - Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

We have: $-1 < x < 1$; which is the required condition. - Sufficient

The correct answer is option C.

466. Let us understand the concept of the modulus (or the absolute value):

$|x - a|$ refers to the distance of the point x from the point a on either side of .

Thus: $|x - a| = b$ implies that the distance of the point x from the point a on either side of a is b units.

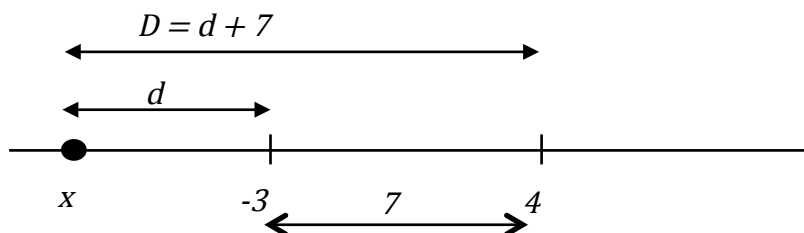
$$\text{We have: } y = |x + 3| + |4 - x|$$

$$\Rightarrow y = |x - (-3)| + |x - 4|$$

We need to determine whether $y = 7$

Let us see the different possibilities shown on the number line below:

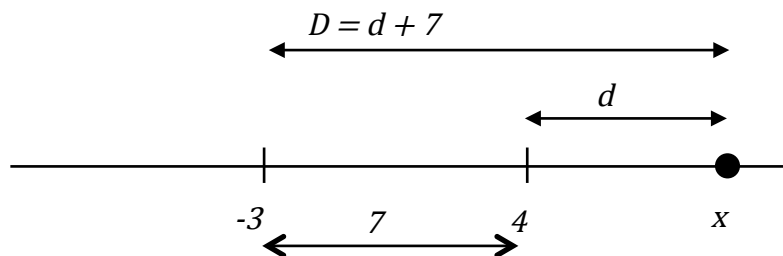
- (1) If $x < -3$:



$$\text{We have: } d + d + 7 = 7 \Rightarrow d = 0$$

$$\Rightarrow x = -3$$

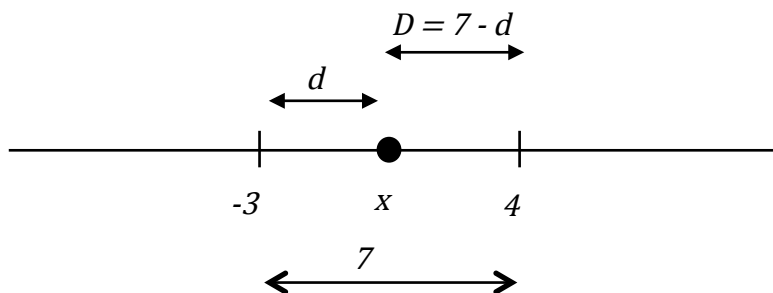
- (2) If $x > 4$:



$$\text{We have: } d + d + 7 = 7 \Rightarrow d = 0$$

$$\Rightarrow x = 4$$

- (3) If $-3 < x < 4$:



We have: $d + 7 - d = 7$, which is true for all x from -3 to 4 .

In short, we can see that if x is to the left of -3 OR to the right of 4 , the sum of the distances of x from the points -3 and 4 is greater than 7 .

However, if x lies between -3 and 4 (both inclusive), the sum of the distances of x from the points -3 and 4 is equal to 7 .

Thus, we have:

$$y = 7 \Rightarrow -3 < x < 4$$

From statement 1:

We know: $x < 4$

However, we do not have the lower bound. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

We know: $x > -3$

However, we do not have the higher bound. – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

We have: $-3 < x < 4$; which is the required condition. – Sufficient

The correct answer is option C.

Alternate Approach:

We know that:

$|a| + |b| = |a + b|$ holds true only if:

(1) a and b are both positive

OR

(2) a and b are both negative

Thus, we have to determine if:

$$y = |x + 3| + |4 - x| = 7 = |(x + 3) + (4 - x)|$$

This would hold true if:

(1) $x + 3 > 0 \Rightarrow x > -3$ AND $4 - x > 0 \Rightarrow x < 4 \Rightarrow -3 < x < 4$

OR

(2) $x + 3 < 0 \Rightarrow x < -3$ AND $4 - x < 0 \Rightarrow x > 4$, which is not possible.

Thus, we have the required condition by combining the statements.

467. From statement 1:

$$7x - 2y > 0$$

$$\Rightarrow 2y < 7x$$

$$\Rightarrow y < \frac{7x}{2}$$

Thus, we see that y is smaller than a positive quantity i.e. $\left(\frac{7x}{2}\right)$.

Thus, the value of y may be positive, may be zero or may even be negative. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

$$-y < x$$

$$\Rightarrow y > -x$$

Thus, we see that y is greater than a negative quantity i.e. $(-x)$.

For example:

If $x = 5$:

$$-x = -5,$$

$$\Rightarrow y > -5$$

Thus, the value of y may be positive, may be zero or may even be negative. – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

$$-x < y < \frac{7x}{2}$$

Like the previous example, if $x = 5$

$$-5 < y < \frac{7 \times 5}{2}$$

Thus, depending on the value of x , the value of y may be positive, may be zero or may even be negative. – Insufficient

The correct answer is option E.

468. From statement 1:

$$x^2 < 1$$

$$\Rightarrow -1 < x < 1$$

Since x is an integer, $x = 0$

However, we have no information about y . – Insufficient

From statement 2:

We have: $y < 1$

y may be positive or negative or zero.

Also, we have no information about x . – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

We have:

$$x = 0, \text{ and}$$

$$y < 1$$

Thus, we have:

$$x + y < 0 + 1$$

$$\Rightarrow x + y < 1 - \text{Sufficient}$$

The correct answer is option C.

469. Since $y = \sqrt{9 - x}$; in order that y can be a positive integer (a real number), we must have:

$$9 - x > 0$$

$$\Rightarrow x < 9$$

From statement 1:

We have: $x < 8$:

Possible values of x are: 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6 or 7.

The only value of x for which y is an integer is: $x = 5$

Thus, we have:

$$y = \sqrt{9 - 5} = \sqrt{4} = 2$$

Note: The radical sign i.e. $\sqrt{n}$, by definition, only taken the positive square root of n .

Thus, we have a unique value of y . – Sufficient

From statement 2:

We have: $y > 1$

We have already established that: $x < 9$

Thus, possible values of x are: 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7 or 8.

The possible values of x for which y is an integer are: $x = 5$ or 8

$$\text{If } x = 5: y = \sqrt{9 - 5} = 2 > 1$$

$$\text{If } x = 8: y = \sqrt{9 - 8} = 1 \not> 1$$

Thus, there is only possible value of $y = 2$ – Sufficient

The correct answer is option D.

470. From statement 1:

$$x > y + 4$$

$$\Rightarrow 3x > 3y + 12$$

However, there is no relation between $(3y + 12)$ and $7y$ since y can be any positive number.

Thus, we cannot conclude that $3x > 7y$. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

$$-5x < -14y$$

$$\Rightarrow x > \left(\frac{-14}{-5}\right)y$$

$$\Rightarrow x > 2.8y$$

$$\Rightarrow 3x > 8.4y$$

Since $y > 0$, we have:

$$8.4y > 7y$$

$$\Rightarrow 3x > 7y - \text{Sufficient}$$

The correct answer is option B.

471. From statement 1:

$$x > y - x$$

$$\Rightarrow 2x > y$$

$$\Rightarrow 4x > 2y$$

Thus, $4x$ may be greater than $3y$ or be equal to $3y$ or even be smaller than $3y$.

For example:

$$\text{If } y = 2 : 4x > 2y$$

$$\Rightarrow 4x > 4$$

$\Rightarrow$ Possible values of $4x$ may be anything more than 4, say 5, 6, 10, etc.

$$\text{Here, } 3y = 6.$$

$$\text{If } 4x = 5 : 4x < 3y$$

$$\text{If } 4x = 6 : 4x = 3y$$

$$\text{If } 4x = 10 : 4x > 3y$$

Hence, there is no unique answer. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

$$\frac{x}{y} < 1$$

$\Rightarrow x < y$ (since x and y are positive, we can cross-multiply without reversing the inequality)

$$\Rightarrow 4x < 4y$$

Thus, $4x$ may be greater than $3y$ or be equal to $3y$ or even be smaller than $3y$.

Hence, there is no unique answer. – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

We have:

$$4x > 2y, \text{ and}$$

$$4x < 4y$$

$$\Rightarrow 2y < 4x < 4y$$

Thus, possible values of $4x$ may be equal to $3.5y$, $3y$ or $2.5y$

Thus, $4x$ may be greater than $3y$ or be equal to $3y$ or even be smaller than $3y$.

Hence, there is no unique answer. – Insufficient

The correct answer is option E.

472. From statement 1:

$$x^2 + 6x < 7$$

$$\Rightarrow x^2 + 6x + 9 < 16 \text{ (in order to convert the quadratic equation to a perfect square)}$$

$$\Rightarrow (x + 3)^2 < 16$$

$$\Rightarrow -4 < x + 3 < 4$$

$$\Rightarrow -7 < x < 1$$

But, we know that $x < 0$.

Thus, possible values of x are: $-1, -2, -3, -4, -5$ or -6 .

Thus, x may be greater than -3 or equal to -3 or even smaller than -3 . – Insufficient

From statement 2:

$$x^2 + |x| \leq 2$$

We know that both x^2 and $|x|$ are non-negative.

Also, $x^2 + |x|$ must be an integer since x is a negative integer.

Thus, we have:

$$(1) \quad x^2 + |x| = 2$$

This is only possible if each of x^2 and $|x|$ are 1

$$\Rightarrow x^2 = |x| = 1$$

$$\Rightarrow x = -1, \text{ which is not less than } -3$$

$$(2) \quad x^2 + |x| = 0$$

$$\Rightarrow x = 0, \text{ which is not negative, hence not valid.}$$

Thus, we only have $x = -1 \not< -3$.

Thus, we have a unique answer 'No'. – Sufficient

The correct answer is option B.

473. We have:

$$x + y > 0 \Rightarrow x > -y \dots (i)$$

From statement 1:

$$x^{2y} < 1 \Rightarrow (x^2)^y < 1$$

We know that $x^2 \geq 0$ for all values of x .

The above inequality can be satisfied in any of the following situations:

(1) $x > 1$ and $y < 0$, for example:

$$x = 2 \text{ and } y = -1 \text{ (satisfying } x + y > 0)$$

$$\Rightarrow x^{2y} = 2^{-2} = \frac{1}{4} < 1$$

$$\Rightarrow xy = 2 \times (-1) = -2 < 0$$

(2) $0 < |x| < 1$ and $y > 1$, for example:

$$x = \pm \frac{1}{2} \text{ and } y = 2 \text{ (satisfying } x + y > 0)$$

$$\Rightarrow x^{2y} = \left(\frac{1}{2}\right)^4 = \frac{1}{16} < 1$$

$$\Rightarrow xy = \left(\frac{1}{2}\right) \times 2 = 1 > 0$$

OR

$$xy = \left(-\frac{1}{2}\right) \times 2 = -1 < 0$$

(3) $|x| = 0$ and y is any number except 0, where $x^2y = 0$ and $xy = 0$

Thus, xy may be positive, negative or zero. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

$$x + 2y < 0$$

$$\Rightarrow x < -2y \dots (ii)$$

Thus, combining (i) with (ii), we have: $-y < x < -2y$

Thus, we have: $-y < -2y$

$$\Rightarrow y > 2y$$

$$\Rightarrow y < 0$$

Thus, y is negative.

Hence, $-y$ and $-2y$ are both positive.

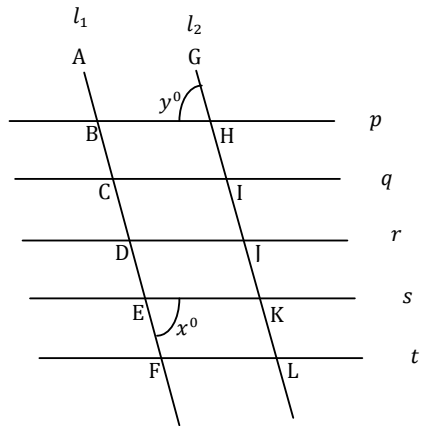
Thus, x lies between two positive numbers, implying x is positive.

Thus, we have: $x > 0$ and $y < 0 \Rightarrow xy < 0$ – Sufficient

The correct answer is option C.

6.19 Geometry-Lines

474. Let us reproduce the figure, assigning names for intersection points.



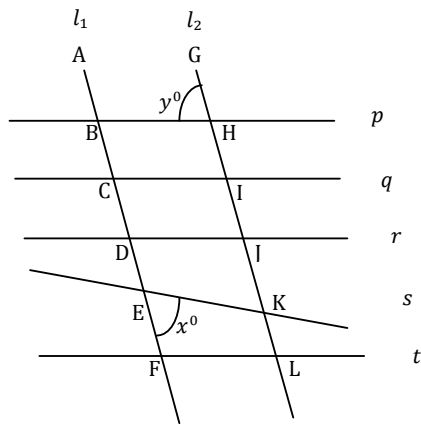
From statement 1:

Since $p \parallel r$, we have $\angle GHB = \angle GJD = y^\circ$ (corresponding angles).

Since $r \parallel t$, we have $\angle GJD = \angle GLF = y^\circ$ (corresponding angles).

Since it is not given that $t \parallel s$, we cannot relate $\angle FEK$ and $\angle GHB$.

The above diagram may be as following.



Note: If it were known that $t \parallel s$, since $p \parallel r$ and $r \parallel t$, we would have $s \parallel p$.

In that case, we would have:

$\angle JKE = x^\circ = \angle FEK$ (alternate angles) and $\angle GHB = y^\circ = \angle JKE$ (corresponding angles).

Thus, we would have had $x = y$.

Hence, we cannot conclude that $x = y$ – Insufficient

From statement 2:

Since $q \parallel s$, we have $\angle FCI = \angle FEK = x^\circ$ (corresponding angles).

Since it is not given that $q \parallel p$, we cannot relate $\angle FEK$ and $\angle GHB$.

Note: If it were known that $q \parallel p$, since $q \parallel s$, we would have $s \parallel p$.

Thus, following the reasoning presented in statement 1, we would have had $x = y$.

Hence, we cannot conclude that $x = y$ – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

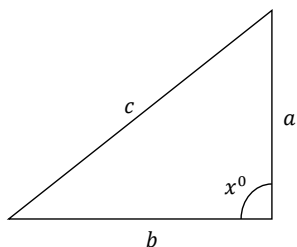
Even after combining both statements, we cannot relate $\angle FEK$ and $\angle GHB$.

Hence, we cannot conclude that $x = y$ – Insufficient

The correct answer is option E.

6.20 Geometry–Triangles

475. We need to determine if $x > 90$:



If c is the longest side of the triangle then,

- (1) If $x = 90$, we have: $c^2 = a^2 + b^2$
- (2) If $x < 90$, we have: $c^2 < a^2 + b^2$
- (3) If $x > 90$, we have: $c^2 > a^2 + b^2$

Thus, we need to check which of the above three conditions is true.

From statement 1:

We have no information about c . – Insufficient

From statement 2:

We have no information about a and b . – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

We know that:

$$a^2 + b^2 < 15$$

Also, we know that:

$$c > 4$$

$$\Rightarrow c^2 > 16$$

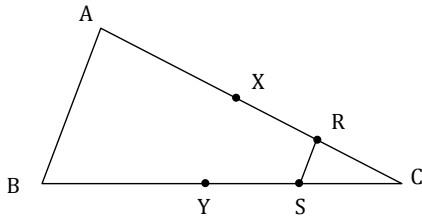
Thus, we see that:

$$c^2 > a^2 + b^2$$

$$\Rightarrow x > 90 \text{ – Sufficient}$$

The correct answer is option C.

476. The figure depicting the information in the problem is shown below:



We know that:

$$AX = CX \dots (i)$$

$$RX = RC \dots (ii)$$

$$BY = CY \dots (iii)$$

$$YS = SC \dots (iv)$$

We have:

$$\frac{CR}{CA} = \frac{CR}{2 \times CX} = \frac{CR}{2 \times 2 \times CR} = \frac{1}{4}$$

Also, we have:

$$\frac{CS}{CB} = \frac{CS}{2 \times CY} = \frac{CS}{2 \times 2 \times CS} = \frac{1}{4}$$

Thus, triangle CRS is similar to triangle CAB since:

$$\frac{CR}{CA} = \frac{CS}{CB}, \text{ and } \angle RCS = \angle ACB \text{ (included angle)}$$

$$\text{Thus, ratio of the corresponding sides of the above two similar triangles} = \frac{CR}{CA} = \frac{CS}{CB} = \frac{1}{4}$$

Thus, ratio of the areas of the above two similar triangles

$$= \frac{\text{Area of triangle CRS}}{\text{Area of triangle CAB}} = (\text{Ratio of their corresponding sides})^2 = \left(\frac{1}{4}\right)^2 = \frac{1}{16} \dots (i)$$

From statement 1:

$$\text{Area of triangle ABX} = 32$$

We know that a line drawn from the vertex which divides the base in the ratio 1 : 1, also divides the area in the same ratio i.e. 1 : 1.

Since $AX = CX$, we have:

Area of triangle BCX = Area of triangle ABX = 32.

Thus, area of triangle CAB = 32 + 32 = 64.

Thus, from (i):

$$\frac{\text{Area of triangle CRS}}{64} = \frac{1}{16}$$

$$\Rightarrow \text{Area of triangle CRS} = \frac{64}{16} = 4 - \text{Sufficient}$$

From statement 2:

We only know the length of an altitude of triangle ABC.

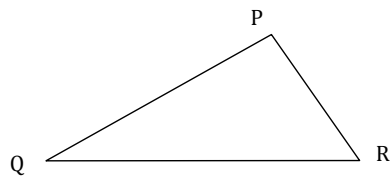
However, the length of the corresponding base of the triangle ABC is not known.

Hence, the area of triangle ABC cannot be determined.

Hence, the area of triangle CRS cannot be determined either. – Insufficient

The correct answer is option A.

477. The figure depicting the information in the problem is shown below:



We know that:

$$\angle P = 30^\circ + 2 \times \angle Q \dots (i)$$

Also, in triangle PQR:

$$\angle P + \angle Q + \angle R = 180^\circ$$

$$\Rightarrow (30^\circ + 2 \times \angle Q) + \angle Q + \angle R = 180$$

$$\Rightarrow 3 \times \angle Q + \angle R = 150^\circ \dots (ii)$$

From statement 1:

Since PQ = QR, we have:

$$\angle P = \angle R$$

Thus, from (i), we have:

$$\angle R = 30^\circ + 2 \times \angle Q \dots \text{(iii)}$$

From (ii) and (iii), we have:

$$3 \times \angle Q + (30^\circ + 2 \times \angle Q) = 150^\circ$$

$$\Rightarrow 5 \times \angle Q = 120^\circ$$

$$\Rightarrow \angle Q = 24^\circ$$

Thus, from (iii)

$$\Rightarrow \angle R = 30^\circ + 2 \times \angle Q$$

$$= 30^\circ + 2 \times 24^\circ$$

$$= 78^\circ - \text{Sufficient}$$

From statement 2:

We have:

$$\angle P = 78^\circ$$

Thus, from (i), we have:

$$78^\circ = 30^\circ + 2 \times \angle Q$$

$$\Rightarrow \angle Q = 24^\circ$$

Thus, from (ii), we have:

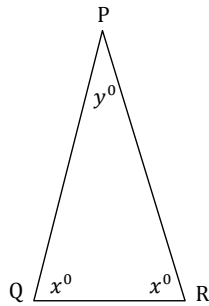
$$3 \times 24^\circ + \angle R = 150^\circ$$

$$\Rightarrow \angle R = 150^\circ - 72^\circ$$

$$= 78^\circ - \text{Sufficient}$$

The correct answer is option D.

478. Let us bring out the figure.



We know that the sum of the angles in a triangle is 180°

$$\Rightarrow 2x + y = 180 \dots (i)$$

From statement 1:

$$\frac{3}{2}x = 120$$

$$\Rightarrow x = 120 \times \frac{2}{3} = 80$$

Thus, from (i), we have:

$$2 \times 80 + y = 180$$

$$\Rightarrow y = 20 - \text{Sufficient}$$

From statement 2:

$$x + y = 100$$

$$\Rightarrow x = 100 - y$$

Thus, from (i), we have:

$$\Rightarrow 2(100 - y) + y = 180$$

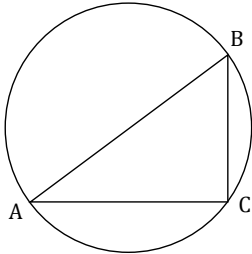
$$\Rightarrow 200 - y = 180$$

$$\Rightarrow y = 20 - \text{Sufficient}$$

The correct answer is option D.

6.21 Geometry–Circles

479. From statement 1:



Since we have no information about the nature of the triangle ABC, we cannot determine the sides of the triangle.

Hence, we cannot determine the radius of the circle.

Hence, we cannot determine the circumference of the circle. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

Let the length of the sides BC, AC and AB respectively be $3x$, $4x$ and $5x$, where x is a constant of proportionality.

$$\text{We see that: } (5x)^2 = (3x)^2 + (4x)^2$$

=> Triangle ABC is right-angled at C.

=> AB is the diameter of the circle (since the diameter subtends 90° at the circumference).

However, the exact lengths are not known.

Hence, we cannot determine the radius of the circle.

Hence, we cannot determine the circumference of the circle. – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

$$\text{Sum of the three sides} = 3x + 4x + 5x = 12x.$$

Thus, we have:

$$12x = 48$$

$$\Rightarrow x = 4$$

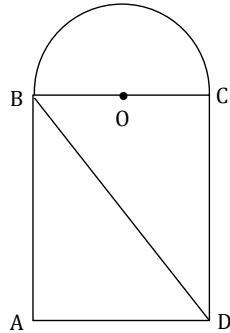
$$\Rightarrow \text{Diameter of the circle} = AB = 5x = 20$$

$$\Rightarrow \text{Radius of the circle} = \frac{20}{2} = 10$$

$$\Rightarrow \text{Circumference of the circle} = 2\pi \times 10 = 20\pi - \text{Sufficient}$$

The correct answer is option C.

480. Area of a semi-circle = $\frac{\pi r^2}{2}$, where r is the radius of the semi-circle.



Thus, to determine the area, we need to determine the radius using the relation: $BC = 2r$.

From statement 1:

We only know the ratio of the sides of the rectangle.

We have no information about any actual dimensions. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

We know: $BD = 25$

From Pythagoras' theorem:

$$AB^2 + BC^2 = BD^2$$

$$\Rightarrow AB^2 + BC^2 = 25^2$$

However, we cannot determine BC since both BC and AB are unknowns. – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

$$\frac{BC}{AB} = \frac{3}{4}$$

$\Rightarrow$ Let $BC = 3x$ and $AB = 4x$, where x is a constant of proportionality.

Thus, we have:

$$AB^2 + BC^2 = 25^2$$

$$\Rightarrow (4x)^2 + (3x)^2 = 25^2$$

$$\Rightarrow x^2 = 25$$

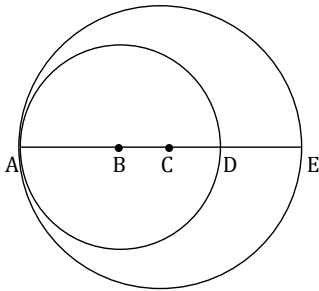
$$\Rightarrow x = 5 \text{ (} x \text{ cannot be } -5 \text{ since lengths must be positive)}$$

$$\Rightarrow BC = 3x = 15$$

$$\Rightarrow \text{Radius of the semi-circle} = \frac{15}{2}. \text{ - Sufficient}$$

The correct answer is option C.

481. Required area = (Area of bigger circle with centre C) – (Area of smaller circle with centre B)
 $= \pi \times AC^2 - \pi \times AB^2$



From statement 1:

We know:

$$AB = 3 \text{ and } BC = 2$$

$$\Rightarrow AC = AB + BC = 3 + 2 = 5$$

Thus, required area

$$= \pi \times AC^2 - \pi \times AB^2$$

$$= \pi (5^2 - 3^2)$$

$$= 16\pi \text{ - Sufficient}$$

From statement 2:

We know:

$$CD = 1 \text{ and } DE = 4$$

$$\Rightarrow CE = 1 + 4 = 5$$

$$\Rightarrow AC = CE = 5$$

Also, we have:

$$AD = AE - DE$$

$$= 2 \times AC - DE$$

$$= 10 - 4 = 6$$

$$\Rightarrow AB + BD = 6$$

$$\Rightarrow 2 \times AB = 6$$

$$\Rightarrow AB = 3$$

Thus, we have: $AC = 5$ and $AB = 3$, which is the same result as obtained from statement 1. – Sufficient

The correct answer is option D.

6.22 Geometry–Polygon

482. We need to check if the rectangular glass sheet covers the entire tabletop.

From statement 1:

We only have information on the dimensions of the tabletop.

However, we have no information on the rectangular glass sheet. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

We only have information on the area of the glass sheet.

However, we have no information on the tabletop. – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

Combining both statements we can see:

The area of the glass sheet = 2,400 square inches

The area of the table top = $36 \times 60 = 2160$ square inches

Thus, the area of the glass sheet is more than that of the tabletop.

However, it is not sufficient to determine if the glass sheet can cover the table top entirely.

Say, for example, if the glass sheet is 40 inches by 60 inches, i.e. both the length and breadth are more than or equal to the corresponding dimensions of the tabletop, the glass sheet will cover the tabletop entirely.

However, if the glass sheet is 30 inches by 80 inches, i.e. both the length and breadth are **not** more than or equal to the corresponding dimensions of the tabletop, the glass sheet will not cover the tabletop entirely.

Hence, we cannot determine if the glass sheet covers the entire tabletop. – Insufficient

The correct answer is option E.

483. Let the width of the rectangle be x units.

Thus, the length of the rectangle = $(x + 2)$ units.

Hence, the perimeter = $2(x + (x + 2)) = (4x + 4)$ units.

From statement 1:

Diagonal of the rectangle = $\sqrt{x^2 + (x + 2)^2}$

Thus, we have:

$$\sqrt{x^2 + (x + 2)^2} = 10$$

$$\Rightarrow x^2 + (x + 2)^2 = 100$$

$$\Rightarrow 2x^2 + 4x - 96 = 0$$

$$\Rightarrow x^2 + 2x - 48 = 0$$

$$\Rightarrow (x + 8)(x - 6) = 0$$

$$\Rightarrow x = 6 \text{ or } -8$$

However, the width cannot be negative.

Hence, $x = 6$

Thus, the perimeter $= 4x + 4 = 28$ units. – Sufficient

From statement 2:

Area of the rectangle $= x(x + 2)$ square units.

Thus, we have:

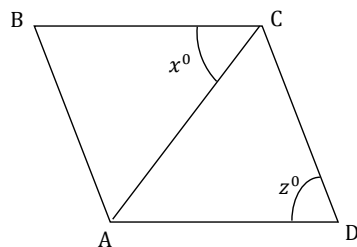
$$x(x + 2) = 48$$

$$\Rightarrow x^2 + 2x - 48 = 0$$

This is the same as the result obtained from statement 1. – Sufficient

The correct answer is option D.

- 484.** We know that in a triangle, the longest side is opposite to the largest angle and the shortest side is opposite to the smallest angle.



From statement 1:

Since $BC \parallel AD$, we have:

$$\angle BCA = \angle CAD = x^\circ = 50^\circ \text{ (alternate angles)}$$

Thus, the sum of the other two angles in triangle $ACD = 180^\circ - 50^\circ = 130^\circ$.

If CD has to be the shortest side, $\angle CAD$ must be the smallest angle.

However, since the other two angles in triangle ACD are not known, we can have:

- (1) $\angle ACD = 20^\circ, \angle CDA = 110^\circ$
 $\Rightarrow \angle ACD$ is the smallest angle
 $\Rightarrow AD$ is the shortest side
 $\Rightarrow AC$ is not the shortest side.
- (2) $\angle ACD = 110^\circ, \angle CDA = 20^\circ$
 $\Rightarrow \angle CDA$ is the smallest angle
 $\Rightarrow AC$ is the shortest side.

Thus, we cannot uniquely determine whether AC is the shortest side of the triangle. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

We have:

$$\angle CDA = z^\circ = 70^\circ$$

Thus, the sum of the other two angles in triangle $ACD = 180^\circ - 70^\circ = 110^\circ$.

If AC is the shortest side, then $\angle CDA$ should be the smallest angle.

It follows that the other two angles of the triangle ACD must be more than 70° .

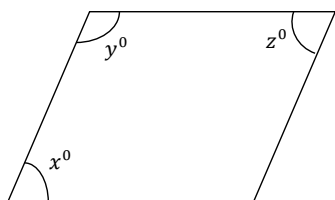
In such an event, the sum of those two angles should be more than 140° , which is not possible.

Thus, $\angle CDA$ is not the smallest angle

$\Rightarrow AC$ is not the shortest side. – Sufficient

The correct answer is option B.

485. In the parallelogram above, we have:



$x = z$; (angles at opposite vertices are equal) ... (i)

$x + y = y + z = 180$; (angles at adjacent vertices are supplementary) ... (ii)

From statement 1:

We know:

$$y = 2x$$

Substituting the above value of y in (ii), we have:

$$x + y = 180$$

$$\Rightarrow x + 2x = 180$$

$$\Rightarrow x = 60 - \text{Sufficient}$$

From statement 2:

We know:

$$x + z = 120$$

Using relation (i) along with the equation above, we have:

$$x = z = \frac{120}{2} = 60 - \text{Sufficient}$$

The correct answer is option D.

6.23 Co-ordinate geometry

486. The equation of a circle in the XY-plane with its centre at the origin is given by:
 $x^2 + y^2 = r^2$, where r is the radius of the circle and (x, y) are the coordinates of any point on the circle.

From statement 1:

$$x^2 + y^2 = 4^2 = 16.$$

Thus, sum of the squares of the coordinates of any point P on the circle is 16 – Sufficient

From statement 2:

$$\begin{aligned}x + y &= 0 \\ \Rightarrow (x + y)^2 &= 0 \\ \Rightarrow x^2 + y^2 &= -2xy.\end{aligned}$$

Since we do not know the values of x and y , we cannot determine the answer – Insufficient

The correct answer is option A.

487. $y = mx + b$

We need to determine the slope of the above line i.e. the value of m .

From statement 1:

We know that:

$$y = (1 - m)x + (b + 1) \text{ and } y = mx + b \text{ are parallel.}$$

Thus, their slopes should be same.

Thus, we have:

$$\begin{aligned}(1 - m) &= m \\ \Rightarrow m &= \frac{1}{2}. \text{ - Sufficient}\end{aligned}$$

From statement 2:

We know that:

$$y = mx + b \text{ and } y = 2x + 3 \text{ intersect at } (2, 7).$$

Substituting $x = 2, y = 7$ in $y = mx + b$, we have:

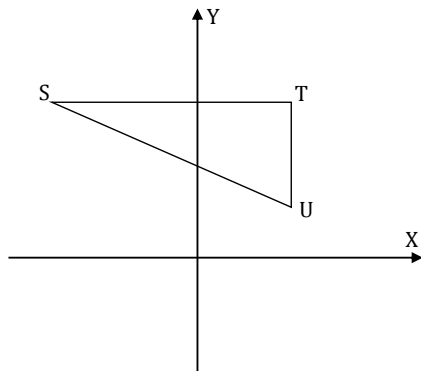
$$7 = 2m + b$$

Since there are two unknowns, we cannot determine the value of m . – Insufficient

The correct answer is option A.

488. Let the coordinates of S be (a, b) .

Let the coordinates of U be (c, d) .



Thus, the coordinates of $T = (c, b)$, since S and T have the same Y-coordinate (ST parallel to X-axis, also, U and T have the same X-coordinate (UT parallel to the Y-axis).

From statement 1:

We have: $d = 1$.

However, we cannot determine the values of c or b . – Insufficient

From statement 2:

We have: $a = -5$.

However, we cannot determine the values of c or b . – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

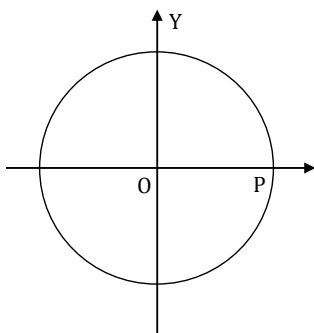
We have: $a = -5, d = 1$.

However, we still cannot determine the values of c or b . – Insufficient

The correct answer is option E.

489. The equation of the above circle having centre at the origin and radius 50, is:

$$x^2 + y^2 = 50^2$$



From statement 1:

Let the coordinates of point Q be $(-30, a)$.

Since Q is on the circle, it must satisfy the equation of the circle. Thus:

$$(-30)^2 + a^2 = 50^2$$

$$\Rightarrow a^2 = 1600$$

$$\Rightarrow a = \pm 40$$

Thus, the length of PQ = $\sqrt{(50 - (-30))^2 + (0 - a)^2}$

$$= \sqrt{(50 - (-30))^2 + (0 - (\pm 40))^2}$$

$$= \sqrt{80^2 + 40^2}$$

$$= \sqrt{8000}$$

$$= 40\sqrt{5} - \text{Sufficient}$$

From statement 2:

Let the coordinates of point Q be $(b, -40)$.

Since Q is on the circle, it must satisfy the equation of the circle. Thus:

$$b^2 + (-40)^2 = 50^2$$

$$\Rightarrow b^2 = 900$$

$$\Rightarrow b = \pm 30$$

Thus, the length of PQ = $\sqrt{(50 - (\pm 30))^2 + (0 - (-40))^2}$

$$\begin{aligned}
 &= \sqrt{(50 \mp 30)^2 + (40)^2} \\
 &= \sqrt{20^2 + 40^2} \text{ OR } \sqrt{80^2 + 40^2} \\
 &= \sqrt{2000} \text{ OR } \sqrt{8000} \\
 &= 20\sqrt{5} \text{ OR } 40\sqrt{5}
 \end{aligned}$$

Thus, there is no unique answer. – Insufficient

The correct answer is option A.

- 490.** The points (r, s) and (u, v) would be equidistant from the origin $(0, 0)$ if:

$$\begin{aligned}
 \sqrt{(r-0)^2 + (s-0)^2} &= \sqrt{(u-0)^2 + (v-0)^2} \\
 \Rightarrow r^2 + s^2 &= u^2 + v^2; \text{ (this is the condition we need to verify).}
 \end{aligned}$$

From statement 1:

We have no information about u and v . – Insufficient

From statement 2:

We have:

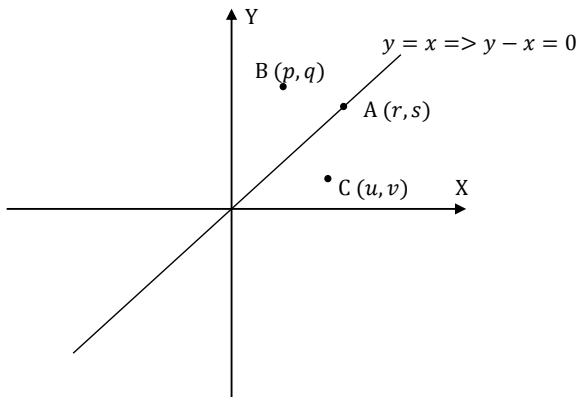
$$\begin{aligned}
 u &= 1 - r \text{ and } v = 1 - s \\
 \Rightarrow u^2 + v^2 &= (1 - r)^2 + (1 - s)^2 \\
 &= 2 + r^2 + s^2 - 2(r + s)
 \end{aligned}$$

We do not know the value of $(r + s)$. – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

$$\begin{aligned}
 u^2 + v^2 &= 2 + r^2 + s^2 - 2(r + s) \\
 &= 2 + r^2 + s^2 - 2 \text{ (since } r + s = 1) \\
 &= r^2 + s^2 - \text{Sufficient}
 \end{aligned}$$

The correct answer is option C.



491.

Let us refer to the figure above:

- (1) For a point A on the line, it must satisfy the equation of the line. Thus, we have:

$$\begin{aligned} y - x &= 0 \\ \Rightarrow s - r &= 0 \\ \Rightarrow s &= r \end{aligned}$$

- (2) For a point B above the line, we have:

$$\begin{aligned} y - x &> 0 \text{ (it can be observed that the value of the Y-coordinate is greater than the value of the X-coordinate)} \\ \Rightarrow q - p &> 0 \\ \Rightarrow q &> p \end{aligned}$$

- (3) For a point C below the line, we have:

$$\begin{aligned} y - x &< 0 \text{ (it can be observed that the value of the Y-coordinate is smaller than the value of the X-coordinate)} \\ \Rightarrow v - u &< 0 \\ \Rightarrow v &< u \end{aligned}$$

Thus, we need to determine which of the above cases is true.

From statement 1:

There is no information about b . – Insufficient

From statement 2:

We have:

$$b = a + 2$$

$$\Rightarrow b - a = 2$$

$\Rightarrow b - a > 0$ (i.e. it satisfies $y - x > 0$)

$\Rightarrow$ The point is above the line $y = x$ – Sufficient

The correct answer is option B.

492. From statement 1:

Slope of the line joining (1, 1) and (–2, 5)

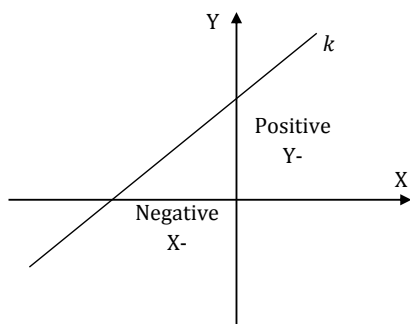
$$\begin{aligned} &= \frac{5 - 1}{-2 - 1} \\ &= -\frac{4}{3} \end{aligned}$$

Since the line k is perpendicular to the above line, product of slopes of the above line and the slope of the line k is -1 .

Thus, slope of line $k = \frac{3}{4}$ – Sufficient

From statement 2:

It is clear that the line must be oriented as shown in the diagram below:



If a line is increasing towards right hand side, the slope is positive.

If line is parallel to x- axis, the slope is 0.

And, if the line is decreasing towards the right hand side, the slope is negative.

Thus, we see that the line k has a positive slope. – Sufficient

The correct answer is option D.

493. From statement 1:

We have no information about the value of the slope of line k . – Insufficient

From statement 2:

We have no information about the line l . – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

We can see that line k passes through the points $(0, 0)$ and $\left(\frac{16}{5}, \frac{12}{5}\right)$.

$$\text{Thus, slope of line } k = \left(\frac{\frac{12}{5} - 0}{\frac{16}{5} - 0} \right) = \frac{3}{4}.$$

Since the product of the slopes of lines l and k is -1 , slope of line $l = -\left(\frac{1}{\frac{3}{4}}\right) = -\frac{4}{3}$. – Sufficient

The correct answer is option C.

494. If a line intersects the X-axis at $(p, 0)$ and the Y-axis at $(0, q)$, the slope of the line = $\frac{q - 0}{0 - p}$

$$= -\frac{q}{p}$$

$$= -\left(\frac{\text{Y intercept}}{\text{X intercept}}\right)$$

Let line b intersect the X-axis and Y-axis at points $(m, 0)$ and $(0, n)$ respectively.

We need to determine the value of n .

From statement 1:

Slope of line a

$$= -\left(\frac{-1}{-1}\right) = -1$$

Since lines a and b are parallel, slope of line b is -1 .

Thus, for line b , we have:

$$-\left(\frac{n}{m}\right) = -1$$

$$\Rightarrow n = m.$$

We cannot determine the value of n since m is not known. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

We see that line b passes through the point $(10, 20)$ and the points $(m, 0)$ and $(0, n)$ as assumed earlier.

We cannot determine the value of n , since we do not know the slope of line b . – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

We see that line b passes through the point $(10, 20)$ and the point $(0, n)$ and also has a slope of -1 .

Thus, we have:

$$\frac{20 - n}{10 - 0} = -1$$

$$\Rightarrow 20 - n = -10$$

$$\Rightarrow n = 30 \text{ - Sufficient}$$

The correct answer is option C.

495. The equation of a circle with centre at the origin and radius c is given by:

$$x^2 + y^2 = c^2$$

Since (r, s) lies on the circle, it must satisfy the equation of the circle.

Thus, we have:

$$r^2 + s^2 = c^2$$

From statement 1:

$$c = 2$$

$$\Rightarrow r^2 + s^2 = c^2 = 4 \text{ - Sufficient}$$

From statement 2:

Since the point $(\sqrt{2}, -\sqrt{2})$ lies on the circle, it must satisfy the equation of the circle.

Thus, we have:

$$(\sqrt{2})^2 + (-\sqrt{2})^2 = c^2$$

$$\Rightarrow c^2 = 4$$

$$\Rightarrow r^2 + s^2 = 4 - \text{Sufficient}$$

The correct answer is option D.

496. The point (r, s) would lie in region R if it satisfies the condition: $2x + 3y \leq 6$.

Thus, we have:

$$2r + 3s \leq 6 \dots (i)$$

From statement 1:

We have:

$$3r + 2s = 6$$

$$\Rightarrow (2r + 3s) + (r - s) = 6$$

$$\Rightarrow 2r + 3s = 6 + (s - r) \dots (ii)$$

Comparing (i) and (ii), we have:

$$6 + (s - r) \leq 6$$

$$\Rightarrow s - r \leq 0$$

$$\Rightarrow s \leq r$$

Thus, the point (r, s) would lie in region R if:

$$s \leq r$$

However, such a condition has not been stated in the problem.

Hence, the answer cannot be determined. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

We have:

$$r \leq 3$$

$$\Rightarrow 2r \leq 6 \dots (iii), \text{ and}$$

$$s \leq 2$$

$$\Rightarrow 3s \leq 6 \dots (iv)$$

Thus, from (iii) and (iv):

$$2r + 3s \leq 6 + 6$$

$$\Rightarrow 2r + 3s \leq 12 \dots (v)$$

Thus, we may have:

$$(a) \quad 2r + 3s \leq 6$$

OR

$$(b) \quad 6 \leq 2r + 3s \leq 12$$

Thus, the answer cannot be uniquely determined. – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

We have from statement 2:

$$r \leq 3 \Rightarrow 3r \leq 9, \text{ and}$$

$$s \leq 2 \Rightarrow 2s \leq 4$$

Thus, we have:

$$3r + 2s \leq 9 + 4$$

$$\Rightarrow 3r + 2s \leq 13$$

However, we also have from statement 1:

$$3r + 2s = 6$$

We cannot determine the value of $(2r + 3s)$ from the above two relations. – Insufficient

The correct answer is option E.

Alternate Approach:

Let us try with some values:

Statement 1:

$$3r + 2s = 6 :$$

- (1) $r = 2, s = 0: 2x + 3y \equiv 2r + 3s = 4 \leq 6$ - Satisfies
 (2) $r = \frac{2}{3}, s = 2: 2x + 3y \equiv 2r + 3s = \frac{4}{3} + 6 \not\leq 6$ - Does not satisfy

Thus, statement 1 is not sufficient.

Statement 2:

$$r \leq 3, s \leq 2 :$$

- (1) $r = 2, s = 0: 2x + 3y \equiv 2r + 3s = 4 \leq 6$ - Satisfies
 (2) $r = \frac{2}{3}, s = 2: 2x + 3y \equiv 2r + 3s = \frac{4}{3} + 6 \not\leq 6$ - Does not satisfy

Thus, statement 2 is not sufficient.

Combining statements 1 and 2:

We can still have the same above values of r and s .

Thus, even combining the statements is not sufficient.

497. From statement 1:

Slope (m) of the line k passing through $(0, 0)$ and (a, b) is:

$$m = \frac{b - 0}{a - 0} = \frac{b}{a}$$

Thus, we have:

$$\frac{b}{a} < 0$$

Thus, the possible cases are:

- (1) $a > 0$ and $b < 0$

OR

- (2) $a < 0$ and $b > 0$

Thus, there is no unique answer. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

We know that: $a < b$

However, it is not sufficient to determine the answer, whether $b > 0$. – Insufficient

Thus, from statements 1 and 2 together:

From statement 1, we had:

(1) $a > 0$ and $b < 0 \Rightarrow a > b$ – Does not satisfy the condition of statement 2

(2) $a < 0$ and $b > 0 \Rightarrow a < b$ – Satisfies the condition of statement 2

Thus, combining the statements, we can conclude that: $b > 0$. – Sufficient

The correct answer is option C.

498. $ax + by + c = 0$

$$\Rightarrow by = -ax - c$$

$$\Rightarrow y = \left(-\frac{a}{b}\right)x - \frac{c}{b}$$

$$\Rightarrow \text{The slope of the line} = \left(-\frac{a}{b}\right)$$

$$\Rightarrow -\frac{a}{b} = \frac{2}{3}$$

$$\Rightarrow \frac{a}{b} = -\frac{2}{3}$$

$$\Rightarrow b = -\frac{3a}{2}$$

From statement 1:

$$a = 4$$

$$\Rightarrow b = -\frac{3 \times 4}{2} = -6 \text{ – Sufficient}$$

From statement 2:

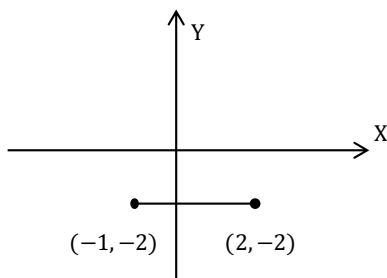
The value of c cannot be used to determine the value of b , as we are not aware of the value of the Y-intercept.

If Y-intercept would have been given it would be $-\frac{c}{b}$, and then we would have been able to find the value of b . – Insufficient

The correct answer is option A.

499. From statement 1:

The figure depicting the two vertices of the rectangle $(-1, -2)$ and $(2, -2)$ is shown below:



Thus, we know that the length of the rectangle is the difference between the X values of the coordinates of the two points (since the length is parallel to the X axis).

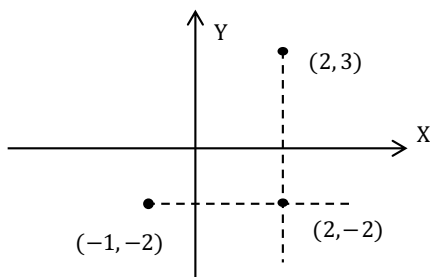
Thus, the length of the rectangle

$$= 2 - (-1) = 3$$

However, we do not know the width of the rectangle and hence, the perimeter cannot be determined. – Insufficient

From statement 2:

The figure depicting the two vertices of the rectangle $(-1, -2)$ and $(2, 3)$ is shown below:



Since the length and width of the rectangle are parallel to the X and Y axes, the dotted lines shown in the figure above must denote the length and width of the rectangle.

Thus, the third vertex must be the point of intersection of the dotted lines i.e. $(2, -2)$.

Thus, we know that the length of the rectangle is the difference between the X values of the coordinates of the two points (since the length is parallel to the X axis).

Thus, the length of the rectangle

$$= 2 - (-1) = 3$$

Also, the width of the rectangle is the difference between the Y values of the coordinates of the two points (since the width is parallel to the Y axis).

Thus, the width of the rectangle

$$= 3 - (-2) = 5$$

Thus, the perimeter of the rectangle

$$= 2 \times (\text{Length} + \text{Width})$$

$$= 2 \times (3 + 5)$$

$$= 16 - \text{Sufficient}$$

The correct answer is option B.

500. From statement 1:

Since the line l does not intersect with $y = 1 - x$, these lines are parallel.

Thus, their slopes are the same.

We have:

$$y = 1 - x$$

$$\Rightarrow y = -x + 1$$

$$\Rightarrow \text{Slope of the line is } -1$$

Thus, slope of the line l is -1 – Sufficient

From statement 2:

Since the line l intersects with $y = x - 1$, these lines are not parallel.

However, we do not know the angle at which the lines intersect.

Hence, we cannot determine the slope of the line l . – Insufficient

The correct answer is option A.
